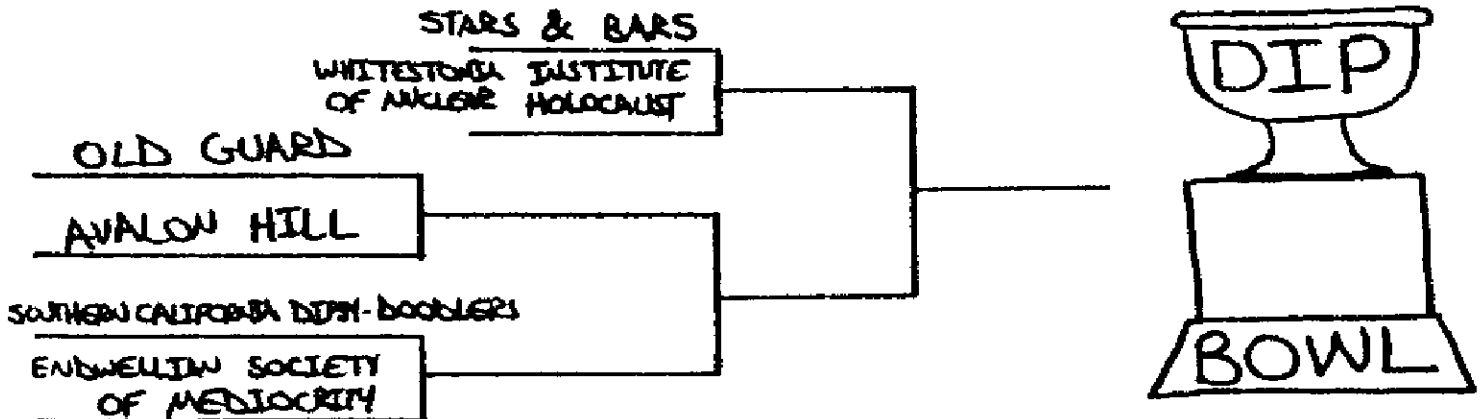

In the zine poll, any publication substantially devoted to Diplomacy which has been published at least once since April 1, 1981 can be rated. (For example, DIPLOMACY DIGEST, DIPLOMACY WORLD, and the CALIFORNIA DIPLOMACY NEWSLETTER can be rated, whereas John Boardman's EMPIRE can't.) Rate the series, not individual issues (i.e. rate (e.g.) LIFE OF MONTY based on LOMs as a whole and not any specific issue), and rate only zines of which you have seen enough issues to form an objective assessment of the quality of the publication. DO NOT rate zines based on hearsay evidence! (In other words, don't give BLACK FROG a bad rating just because of the evidence linking Jack Masters with plagiarism of stories, or LE FRONT.... because of the Ian Eckloff thing, or GRAUSTARK simply because you voted Republican in the last election, for example.) (Actually, John Leeder said "do not base votes on hobby feuds, agreement or disagreement with the editor's opinions, etc.") Again, rate the zines alphabetically, and from 0 to 10 without fractions. GMS may not rate themselves, publishers may not rate their own zines, and no GM or zine outside of North America may be rated, although people from outside NA may rate GMS and zines of NA. YOU MUST SIGN YOUR NAME AND INDICATE WHAT YOUR INVOLVEMENT IN THE DIPLOMACY HOBBY IS! Ballots should be mailed to: JOHN LEEDER, 605 15th STREET NW, CALGARY, ALTA. T2N 2B1, CANADA. Remember that "C" stamps cannot be used (nor can "A", "B", or the 1981 Xmas issue (USA)). Deadline is JUNE 30. Results will first appear in DIPLOMACY WORLD.
