9. Once, in a late-1970s TV series, there was a character named Sandra Sue Abbott. Most people know her full married name better than this given name. Just what is her more popular name? (I want the character, not the person portraying her.)
10. What do (I hope this is spelled right) Emanuel Brabec and Lori Singer have in common?

Time for some page-filling gossip - I have four full pages to fill! I'd print some letters, but I haven't got any. (At least I don't print "Not For Print" letters - I don't think I do, at least.)

Kathy Byrne, in the latest WHITESTONIA, wants me to put the questions and answers in the same issue. Just for you, that's what I did this issue. Too bad there aren't any prizes....

Speaking of the Stirge herself, I just got the latest EVERYTHING (the listing of game starts and finishes as listed by Don Ditter, the current BNC). I don't believe this - there are TWO games in which Kathy didn't win OR draw!! (There is a Kathy win as Turkey and her 5-way MASS MURDERS draw, to keep things normal, but this is a shock.) To top things off, one of these losses was to an Italy!

And SPEAKING OF ITALY....there are this quarter's FUDGE FACTORS:

KEY: 2WD - 2-way draw (same for 3 through 6), CP - Calhamer Points (1 for a win, 1/2 for a 2-way draw, ..., 1/6 for a 6-way draw), FF - Fudge Factor (a multiplier used to "equate" wins by different countries, insofar as Diplomacy is NOT totally balanced; the higher the FF, the worse the country did - FF equals 1 plus 20% of the number of standard errors below the average CP (in this case, with 50 games, 50/7, or about 7.142)).

For comparison: in LOM #25, I took the Fudge Factors for EVERYTHING #s 49-52 combined. Italy was 1.334; Russia was 0.682. NOW, Italy has dropped to 0.871 - a jump from very poor to very good! However, FFs don't mean much unless taken over a wider spread than one EVERYTHING. Still, it shows that England better get back on the ball.

On to other things....Randolph Smyth wants to call the Leeder Poll (the ex-Leeder Poll, that is) the Runestone Poll, after John's soon-to-fold-if-not-already-done-'zine. Speaking of which.....

You know as well as PAGE 8 does that the FUDGE FACTOR is rather arbitrary - but as I always say, the best system is no system. The reductions didn't come out too well - that's why the smudges.

((The following is a leaflet I received. My comments are clearly marked; in addition, slight additions/deletions/changes have been made without affecting the content in order to clarify things))

THE 1983 RUNESTONE ZINE & GM POLL

The Sixth Annual North American Gamemaster (GM) Poll: You may rate any GM in whose postal game or games you were a player during the period beginning April 1, 1982, and whom you played under for long enough to gain an objective assessment of his or her competence as a GM ((for you LOMers, that's SOLE and SLAS - SOG had ended before the given date)). Rate each GM on a scale of 0 to 10 (0 being the lowest rating, 10 being the highest). Use whole numbers only, please - no fractions nor decimal values. Gamemasters may not rate themselves. Others may not rate GMs unless they played under those GMs on or after April 1, 1982, in regular Diplomacy games ((this is a DIPLOMACY poll, isn't it?)). Violations of these rules will result in invalidation of the entire ballot. ((Invalid ballots will be saved up and mailed to John Caruso and Roy Henricks for insertion into their fireplaces to live through next year's winters, probably))

Rate each GM by name, not by zine. Votes must have the GM's name to be counted, even if there is only one GM in a listed zine. List the GMs in alphabetical order by last name in order to facilitate tabulation.

The Seventh Annual North American Zine Poll: You may rate any publication substantially devoted to Diplomacy (including genzines, house zines of organizations, etc.) which has published at least three issues since April 1, 1982. ((Examples of 'zines that count: WHITESTONIA, DIPLOMACY DIGEST, DIPLOMACY WORLD - examples of 'zines that don't: EMPIRE, ITALIANO PRIBE, THE GENERAL, any fakes)) Rate only those zines of which you have seen enough issues to form an objective assessment of the quality of the publication, and base your rating on this assessment; do not base votes on hobby feuds, agreement or disagreement with the editor's opinions, etc. ((Why does Randolph say this? I know as well as you do that there will be many grudge votes - I wouldn't be surprised if EUROPA EXPRESS, WHITESTONIA, THE VOICE OF DOOM, HANSARD, GRAUSTARK - and, after this lambasting, LIFE OF MONTY - got more than their share of grudge votes)) As usual, give a whole-number rating for each zine from 0 to 10 (10 is highest). IMPORTANT: SPECIFY AND LIST SUBZINES SEPARATELY! Subzines will not be listed along with zines in the final listing. ((Last time, subzines got abnormally high ratings - Gary Coughlan refused to realize this, and was not exactly happy when Mark Berch listed zines and subzines separately in DIPLOMACY DIGEST))

Publishers may not rate their own zines; violation will result in invalidation of the entire ballot. Sign your ballot and indicate one way in which you participate in the hobby (player, GM, etc.) to establish eligibility.

All votes will be kept confidential. List zines and subzines (as well as GMs - in three separate lists, one for each category). Randolph Smyth reserves the right to invalidate any ballot not following the given guidelines.

RESULTS OF THE POLL: Results will be tabulated as soon as possible after the deadline. To get the results, either call (403) 526-7963, or send \$1 (US cash is OK, but not US stamps) to Randolph with your ballot for the detailed written report, to be released (maybe) in July. Only North American zines and GMS may be rated.

CHANGES: The only major changes are the separation of subzines from zines ((a good move, considering last year's result)) and the availability of the results ((last year, John sold the rights of first publication to Rod Walker for DIPLOMACY WORLD - which was delayed when Rod caught the flu)).

Mark Berch has suggested in MAGUS (Steve Langley's zine) that Randolph is shying away from necessary changes in the poll format. Technically, this is true, if you agree with Randolph that the poll is due for an overhaul, but Randolph has his reasons for being conservative this year. Apart from the listed changes, there has been no overwhelming support for any specific procedural changes. Of course, quite a number of people have bitched for several years about the effect of grudge votes on the results under the current format, but Randolph has seen no proposals to solve this problem without causing others. Also, to some extent, all the grumblers are talking through their hats, since only John Leeder can even approximate the true effect of grudge votes and other suspected flaws in the current procedure. ((Without the current 0-10 system, the poll would have the voters list their top 5, 10, or whatever, zines/GMS in order - this is not right, since a GM which may be much better than the others can't get a vote much better than the others. Comparative votes have to include all GMS/zines involved, but we're back to grudge votes. There's no way out. Personally, I'd rather had grudge votes than the system used in, e.g., the Marco Poll)) The voting patterns have to be analyzed for a year before any changes can even be considered.

Randolph is not trying to put down the alternatives - every system will have advantages and disadvantages. There can be a half-dozen theories on how to re-work the poll; unfortunately, most are mutually incompatible, and while several look pretty good to Randolph, no specific one has generated overwhelming enthusiasm across the hobby. If you have a pet idea, it's not Randolph you have to convince - but he can only use one idea if the objective is one ranking list. Until a large percentage of the hobby starts pulling for a certain change, Randolph is inclined to stick with the mix of advantages and disadvantages that have been in place for six years and have been winning increasing hobby acceptance. In Randolph's view, hobby-wide acceptance and support is what it's really all about; a rather rickety system will give a far truer result if 200 voters respond (this would minimize the effect of a small number of grudge votes) than the perfect method which measures the opinions of only 20 voters.

Notice the phrase "the objective is one ranking list". The hobby is so competitive that it may be essential to the success of any poll to establish a winner every year, and even the losers like to be able to say that they finished fifth or thirty-third. ((However, I did NOT institute my "guest GMS only" policy because of my last-place finish in the Leeder Poll last year, although the events leading up to the rating - my bad GMing - had everything to do with it.)) The \$1 fee includes the complete calculations, including the application of several statistical methods to the results.

Don't use Fudge Factors! This is
PAGE 10, if you weren't too sure.
I didn't expect the Spanish Influenza.

Randolph is certainly willing - it's his duty as pollmaster - to examine the alternatives over this fall in preparation for the 1984 poll. ANY LETTERS RANDOLPH RECEIVES CONCERNING METHODS OF IMPROVING THE POLL WHICH ARE SENT WITH THE POLL VOTES WILL BE INCLUDED IN THE FINAL REPORT.

Randolph will be incommunicado from now until the poll deadline, due to his continent-covering job. Barring disaster, results should be available by August 1. Remember - anything sent to Randolph won't be read until July 4.

*****The original flyer was in first person and signed by Randolph. If you ask me, and he did, the poll is fine the way it is. You don't want grudge votes? Disregard the poll! It's that easy. If you don't like the way the poll is handled, nobody is saying "You will accept these poll results as the true and correct rating of zines, subzines, and GMs in North America, or you WILL LEAVE THE HOBBY." Quick - name some high-ranking 'zines that haven't been involved in serious controversy lately (by "lately", I mean in the previous two years or so).

As the person running the poll, Randolph should have the right to look at a ballot, say "This is a grudge vote," and remove it. That's the only way to clean up the poll. If we can't put our trust in the person running the poll, why have it in the first place? Grudge votes should be easy to catch - if somebody gets votes in the 7-10 range, clearly a 0 or a 1 is a grudge vote. (A better, but much harder, method is to make the voters put reasons why they gave votes of 4 or less. If there is a good reason for a low vote, it should be put down. Suppose somebody gives me a 4 in the GM poll and says "Don's GMing is awful." This is clearly true - it's a good thing I couldn't vote for myself, because I would have given myself a 3 - so the vote counts. Do the same thing with Gary Coughlan, and that's a grudge vote - Gary has made ONE mistake since EE first came out.

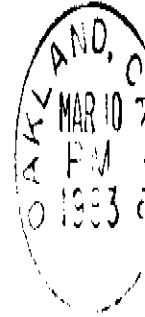
Polls always create controversy - remember when Digger Phelps and three other coaches left Nevada-Las Vegas off of the NCAA Basketball Top 15? How about SMU - the only major college football team to go undefeated, and yet they didn't win the national championship? There will always be some favoritism - remember UCLA a few years back, when they finished fourth in the Pacific 10 in basketball, only to be invited to the NCAA tournament and finish second overall? (As a side note, their second place finish was withdrawn when they received their probation - but they got to keep the money...in the NBA, the worst teams get the top players, but the NCAA tends to put the best schools and the best players together - but this is beside the point, isn't it? It's not easy filling out these things) As long as there are polls, there will be controversy. Why can't we live with it? Do we HAVE to know who's the best, even though it's going to change dramatically within the next year? (Actually, GMs tend to stay in place - 'zines are a different story.) You have your favorites - I have mine.

What's this? The end of LOM - and it's only been FOUR WEEKS since the last one! (Actually, four weeks and a day or two, most likely - but well under five weeks between issues.) Don't count on any continuation of this pattern, though - you were lucky this time.

Dave Grabar WINS? Another shock! I've had it for this issue. Next time - probably a review of Victory Games' GULF STRIKE, plus the usual stuff. Rod Walker, tell Rex Martin and Don Greenwood to get with it on THE GENERAL - let's see the Jan/Feb 1985 issue in April....
