

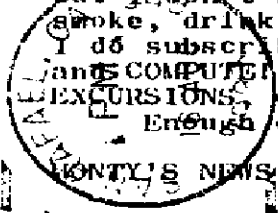

Howaya, howaya, howaya, howaya? This here is issue 34 of, uh, what's thing called? MONTY'S NEWS AND COMMENT is brought to you - aw, who cares?

Time to get back on the soapbox. It seems that Bern Sampson has come out with STARS (Sampson's Totally Awesome Rating System) (well, something like that). Bern's system is simply the Calhamer Point Count with two limitations: games which began more than five years ago don't count, and games which end on or before 1904 don't count. As you may have guessed, spots one and two are occupied by Kathy Byrne and Jack Masters.

Big deal. Do we really need another rating system, especially one which makes the same presumptions as all of the others - mainly that a win as Austria is worth just as much as a win as Russia? Let's face it - Diplomacy is NOT a balanced game. It is not CLOSE. Proof by example: "Kathy Byrne must be a good player if she has three wins as Italy." Italy is, obviously, a tough country; if it is just as easy to win with Italy as any other country, three wins as Italy wouldn't mean that much. Can anyone out there name a system besides mine which doesn't treat each country equally? Also, losses "just don't exist", so you can have 3 wins, 2 2-way draws, and 56 eliminations in 1901, and be better than someone with 3 wins and one 2-way draw - and no games where he/she didn't win/draw. There are systems which punish you for losing; this isn't one of them.

Just how should players be rated? Let's look at the details. There is no possible way to give a relative chance to each country - each game's result depends on much more than how good the players are. Alliances can be based on any number of factors, whereas in a game like SQUAD LEADER, there are no alliances - it's you against your opponent (as long as the scenario is balanced!). Ratings in 2-player games can be justified through both players playing each side. To do this in Diplomacy requires over 40,000 games! (Each combination of players to countries, that is.)

What about tournaments? In Kingmaker and Empires of the Middle Ages, only a certain number advance to succeeding rounds through a score. (In KM, parliamentary strength; in EMA, victory points.) Thus, someone way behind either must catch up or give up. Remember Dipcon 82, where a previously-mentioned female was on the verge of elimination? By stalling until the end of play (time limit), she was given part of a draw of virtually equal strength with the players with more SCs, thus just about eliminating these players from any chance of winning the tournament. If the first player obviously (and by her own admission) (see the Dipcon 82 Souvenir Booklet) couldn't win, why are the others punished? Actually, under the Bumpas/Pacificon system, the opposite can happen - two players going for a 2-way draw can prolong the other players' eliminations to raise their SC averages and gain points. However, we'll just have to suffer, since the alternative is not to have Diplomacy tournaments.

DID YOU KNOW that the USPS, in the AUG/SEP PHILATELIC CATALOG, lists a postcard featuring the "Soaring Air Mail Rate"? (#0229, p.18) At least they admit it....

OK, enough talk on ratings. Now for something else. I saw that Phil Donahue talked with Jean Kirkpatrick about what happened to her in Berkeley. You don't know? I'll tell you. Jean Kirkpatrick was asked by the University to give two talks on some subject which I don't know about. (This took place sometime in early 1983, I think.) During her first talk, a number of students which were members of SAINTES (Students Against Intervention in El Salvador, a campus organization) began to interrupt her with heckling. She continued. So did they. It got to the point where she left the podium - and came back later to finish. The second talk was never given.

That's probably the end of the story you heard. None of you read THE DAILY CALIFORNIAN (UCH's daily newspaper), do you? Immediately after the incident, letters started coming in. Half of the letters condemned SAINTES for allowing this to happen to a University guest. The other half condemned Kirkpatrick for the UN's failure to do anything about El Salvador, and applauded the actions taken during the talk. In true Berkeley fashion, there were the noontime rallies in Sproul Plaza. More talking. More yelling and screaming. The only things which lowered the attention level of this conflict were the \$100 surcharge ordered by the Governor and an attack by members of the Beta Theta Phi fraternity of four Chicano students. I don't know if any actions were taken by anybody as a result of the Kirkpatrick incident. I'll soon find out....

Nice, huh? OK, WAKE UP! Well, ORIGINS is over, and DIPCON was won by some FTfer, so no big deal. Next year's DIPCON follows ORIGINS to Dallas. With luck, I should be able to go to one of the eastern cons, but I'm not going to ORIGINS. More on this in upcoming months, OK? I've still got this year's PACIFICON to go to.

Speaking of September...it's football season (American football, that is, although I think the opening rounds of the F.A. Cup tournament begin right about now), and people still remember the last 4 seconds of last year's Big Game (California vs. Stanford). 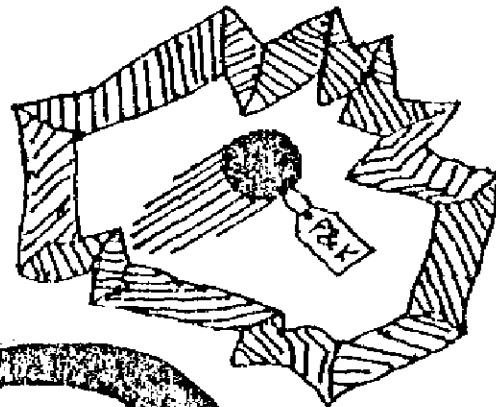

"Thank you, thank you, and welcome to the biggest bunch of filler since homemade chili, BATTLESTARS. How are all of you today?"

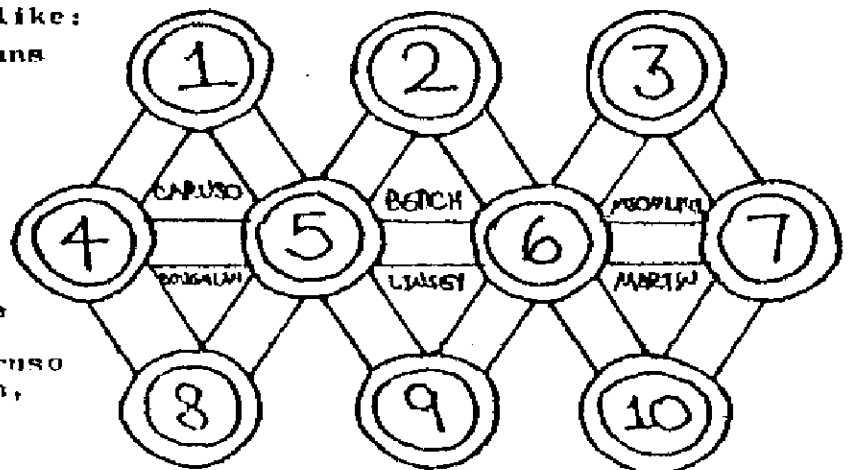
"Finethanksgoodmoonwownrhubarb"

"Same to you. And now, here are our contestants: first, a certified public nuisance straight out of UCLA, of course, Paul Somebody, and over here, a black-market video movie dealer and part-time Brooklyn Bridge jumper, Joanne Overhere. (NOTE: Contestants do not represent members of the hobby unless their actual names are used - any similarities are coincidental. Celebrities do indeed represent actual hobby members or ex-members; however, all material appearing in BATTLESTABS is not necessarily based on fact, but is just what the author - me - happened to think up at the time. If you don't want your name used in this series, let me know - otherwise, you take your chances, although nobody ever reads these things, and besides, people liked DIP BOWL and it had 25% more hobbyists per issue. Hokay?)

"Since this is the FIRST episode, here's how it works: it's an awful lot like BATTLESTARS with an R, but I'll explain. See those 6 triangles? Now, those 10 numbers are at the vertices - well, the corners of the triangles. The player that takes off the third number of a triangle captures that celebrity. Capture three, and you win, allowing you to go on for all sorts of neat things which you'll probably have to sell to pay the taxes on. To take off numbers, whoever is in control at the time selects a number on the board, usually at random. One of the celebs touching the number is asked a question; there are 2 answers, and the celeb chooses one. You, not knowing the other answer, must guess whether the given answer is right or wrong. If it's right, you remain in control and may select any remaining number arbitrarily; if you blow it, your opponent takes control, and if the number would have given you one or more triangles, it remains lit. If you are wrong but it doesn't complete a triangle, it comes off anyway."

Here's what the board looks like:

So, for example, number 1 means a question for John Caruso, while 7 means one for either Michalski or Martin. NOTE: If one or more of the celebs can be captured by that number immediately, only one of those celebs can answer the question. For example, if 1 and 4 are out and 5 is chosen, John Caruso must take the question; if 1,4,6,9 are out and 5 is chosen, John Caruso or Bruce Linsey may be chosen, but not Mark Berch or Gary Coughlan.

Now that those weapons are loaded, it's time for the launching. "Ready weapons....distance and direction determined and corrected....tracking systems ON....detonation SET....coffee!"

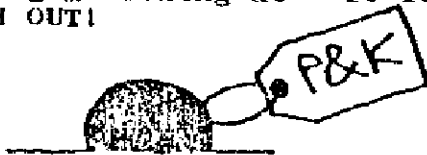
Wait a minute - what's that thing in the sky?
