I see that GAMES MAGAZINE came out with its annual GAMES 100 recently. BIG inhale for the Avalon Hill games: ACQUIRE, FACTS IN FIVE, OH-WAH-REE, SPEED CIRCUIT, CIVILIZATION, GETTYSBURG, NAPOLEON, STORM OVER ARNHEM, VICTORY IN THE PACIFIC, DUNE, TWIXT, SLEUTH, and, of course, your favorite and, well, almost mine, DIPLOMACY. Also included are AMBUSH! by Victory Games, and two Chaosium products soon to be taken by AH, RUNEQUEST and DRAGON PASS (originally WHITE BEAR & RED MOON). Only 13 AH titles? They're slipping.

Speaking of DUNE..., here's a quote from John Boardman's EMPIRE #180, dated September 3, 1983: "(Avalon Hill's) ad in the Con-Stellation program book was devoted to a forthcoming game based on Frank Herbert's science-fiction novel series Dune." Apparently, John must have been totally immersed in what a fabulous job then-President Carter was doing to notice that Avalon Hill released DUNE at ORIGINS 79 over four years ago. (Actually, when people list the things that Carter did wrong, most of the things came on or after November 3, 1979, well after ORIGINS.) Of, course, people with John Michalski's political orientations make a few timing errors as well...BATTLE OF THE BULGE (part 2) was released before ORIGINS 81, so it isn't "new". (I do agree that it isn't very exciting...)

"Say, Don, where are your game reviews?" Well, despite the fact that I just got a \$1000 scholarship check (with another grand due in January - and, with luck, I won't have to pay \$700 enrollment fees in the summer, although most of the companies interviewing this early are looking for December graduates to start in January and are coming back in the Spring for May grads). I haven't bought any new games lately, what with a few old ones still waiting to be opened. Have I reviewed STAR FLEET BATTLES? Well, it's space combat with typical STAR TREK weapons and things. HOWEVER....

INSTEAD of reviewing the usual stuff, this version is dedicated to Computer games, of which I currently own one, with two on order....

MYSTERY FUN HOUSE, Adventure #7 in the Scott Adams series, available for most systems (Atari requires 32k for disk, 24k for cassette) from Adventure International, Box 3435, Longwood, FL 32750, for about \$25. (Discount Mail-order places will charge about \$20)

It's hard to review adventure games, since too much review may spoil the fun of the adventure, but here goes. MYSTERY FUN HOUSE takes place in a Fun House, with the player as (I would assume, with the names "James", "M", and "Q") James Bond. The computer describes where you are, what you can see, and what items are present; using one or two words, you must tell the computer what to do next. (For example: if you want to turn a green knob, try TURN KNOB or TURN GREEN.) There are some "helpful words" given at the beginning, like SCORE, HELP, INVENTORY, and SAVE GAME. SCORE doesn't work on the Atari versions (and probably not on the other versions as well); SAVE GAME allows the game to be stopped, saved on tape/disk, and continued later; INVENTORY gives a list of what you are carrying; and HELP gives a clue.



Some things they don't tell you, but might be helpful: if you want to move in a certain direction (North, East, South, West, Up, Down), just type in the first letter (e.g. N for north) rather than MOVE NORTH. Don't waste time, since each action brings you closer to the time when the park closes. And if you ever apparently get stuck, try everything and then "QUIT" to start over.

Speaking of Scott Adams Adventures for Atari, does anyone have any of the others for the Atari? After all, once an adventure is solved, it stays solved, and it's cheaper to trade cassettes than buy new ones....

Boy, it's been a while since I've wed these:

Contestants may enter the contest at any time; however, contestants joining after one or more rounds have been completed will not be allowed to compete in those rounds, and will accordingly have a lower maximum possible seas. Contestants entering in the middle of a round cannot have that round's deadline extended, but may submit answers for that round.
- 4. In order to become a contestant in the QUIZ, a person must pay the entrance fee of \$2.00 in American currency or its equivalent in American stamps or foreign currency which can be converted into American currency without undue trouble. In addition, each contestant must include enough postage for the next set of QUIZ questions. QUIZ questions will be printed so that each set appears on one 8½ by 11 sheet of paper, so each contestant must plan the postage rates accordingly. NOTE: Subscribers to the 'zine LIFE OF MONTY may desire to have the questions mailed with the 'zine, thus passing the extra postage fees, but I can't take responsibility if you receive your questions any later because of the 'zine's schedule or any delays in the 'zine's publication.
- 5. The prize pool consists of all entrance fees converted to cash (i.e. \$2.00 per contestant) plus an additional 5% of this total donated be me personally; in other words, the total is \$2.10 multiplied by the number of contestants 20 contestants make a total of \$42.
- 6. SCORING: Unless otherwise stated, each question is worth one point. If a question requires a multiple-part answer, one point is given for having all parts correct; if any parts are incorrect, no points are awarded for that question. Each question may have a scoring provision different from this; if so, how a question is scored is printed with the question itself.
- 7. THE FINAL RESULTS: Each contestant's total score is the total number of points he/she has scored in the individual sections of the QUIZ. The total prize pool is given out as follows;

50% of the pool is given to/divided among the person(s) with the highest total score;

the other 50% is divided among the top 25% or top 10 scorers (whichever is lower) plus ties, in proportion to their scores. The other \$52.50 is divided in the proportion 250:200:200:180:180:150:150:100:100:100:100. \$52.50 divided by 1810 equals 2.90055c/point, so A receives (250 x 2.90055c) rounded down, B and C each receive (200 x 2.90055c) rounded down, and so on. Note that all values are rounded down; any extra cents are divided randomly among the pool-sharing players.

- 8. Other than myself, everybody is eligible to participate in the QUIZ. (That includes my subzine editors.) A subscription to LIFE OF MONTY is not necessary to participate; however, see rule 4. Well, you've probably already seen it, since this is rule 8, unless you read the rules backwards.


