Been a while, hasn't it? Well, be glad that issue 45 of LIFE OF MONTY, typed up, folded, addressed, stamped, and put into the mailbox by Don Del Grande, 142 Eliseo Drive, Greenbrae, CA 94904-1339, phone (415) 461-2692, uh, where was I? Oh, yes - that this issue 45 of LIFE OF MONTY has finally arrived into your mailbox, post office box, mail drop, or whatever the thing is that the mail types dump your LOM into. Thanks to these slightly-longer between-issue periods, there's a good chance of having both of the running Dip games actually appearing in their final forms - seems that the deadline was so short for 83EV last time that there was a correction to the report printed in LOM - there were no GMing errors, but the USPS decided to send the final report for Winter 1902 the same day that I mailed out the issues. (Don't worry - the players were notified. If you REALLY care about the game, the only change was that Austria built F Trieste instead of an NMR.)

Also, with a little luck, the TRIVIAL PURSUIT game may be heading toward a quick start. (Three people signed up within 10 days of the mailing of the issue - sure beats my Dip-opening rate, doesn't it?) Not only that, but my Kingmaker-filling has increased by 100%. That's right - now I've got TWO players!

And NOW for something - well, it's not exactly COMPLETELY different, but nevertheless it's....

Well, the Olympics will be over by the time I get this thing out, so now's as good a time as any to review my predictions made in issue 39. First, a couple of the "by default" predictions - I said that the USSR basketball team (men, that is) and Cuban boxer Teofilo Stevenson would not win, and I was right, wasn't I? (Look - after the problems the Americans had in 1980, I don't think the Soviets and Cubans should have booked their flights with Trans-Afghan Airlines!)

The other predictions: Liechtenstein will win a gold....Yugoslavia, Italy, and the USA are 1-2-3 in men's basketball....there will be a major controversy in men's gymnastics....no golds for our women gymnasts....the superheavyweight gold goes to either Biggs or Damiani.... Carl Lewis wins four golds but jumps less than 29 feet and runs the 100 in at least 10 seconds....San Marino wins a gold....ABC manages to show all of 10 minutes' worth of six events where the Americans don't plan to do well.

The results: Well, Liechtenstein and San Marino get another try in 1988 (maybe)....basketball went USA-Spain-Yugoslavia, although Italy was upset in the semi-finals....no major controversies in gymnastics....our women nabbed 2 golds (out of a possible 6)....ABC coverage managed to get around to everything, although shooting and archery weren't covered with much effort (then again, when you consider that these competitions consist of people taking long lengths of time to put things through targets, any coverage would be welcome)....Lewis did jump less than 29 feet, but managed a 9.99 run in the 100 en route to his Fab Four.... Biggs beat Damiani in the superheavyweight boxing final. Remember, a lot of these were made before the Soviets announced their boycott; indeed, I predicted they would come after we out-golded them at the track & field championships in Helsinki last year.

BY THE WAY, the stuff on page 2 concerning Zola Budd and Mary Decker was typed up before ABC showed all of their replays which point out that Zola and Mary bumped into each other a few times, and that Zola stuck her foot in front of Mary to regain balance after being bumped. Of course, nobody remembers that the big dual at the world championships was between Mary (who won) and a (boycotting) Soviet woman....

Speaking of the Olympics....OH, CANADA! Here's a situation involving Canadian boxer Willie De Witt against a boxer from an African country - Nigeria, I think. Anyway, in the third round (out of three rounds), the referee separates the fighters, stops the clock, and points toward the African boxer's corner. Under international rules, a boxer's corner men, while a round is in progress, cannot coach their country's boxer. The African corner received its third warning, which is an automatic ejection - not for the boxer, but the coach, who then left the arena floor. With about one minute remaining, the coach attempted to return to the corner. Under the rules, the ring security force - in this case, members of the Los Angeles Police - must escort the coach away from the ring. It seems that it required some bodily force to keep the coach away, which caught the crowd's attention, who sided mainly on the "anti-police" side (things like "police brutality", I suppose, they thought). It didn't get much better when De Witt got a unanimous decision in the fight (although he did deserve it).....

We wuz ROBBED! Evander Holyfield takes command of a New Zealand boxer in a light-heavyweight (81 kg / 179 pounds) semi-final, complete with 2 cautions (and 2 points taken away) to the NZ fighter, only to have our guy disqualified for hitting on the break. I don't care if it WAS the correct call (Holyfield did throw a punch well after the Yugoslav referee gave a "stop" command) - the New Zealander had his hand over the American's ear, among other things. At least the appeal jury decided to let our man keep his bronze medal (normally, disqualification - even in the finals - means no medal) - big deal. (It does begin to make up for the fact that another American boxer managed to win a fight because five members of the "international jury" happen to believe in "home ring advantage" or something like that - it's so big that Canadian Shawn O'Sullivan managed to ride in on one after being bashed around - er, uh, in a close contest with a French boxer.)

Biggest joke of the TV broadcasts goes to the Voice of America guy that came up with the idea of broadcasting radio Olympic broadcasts in many languages to the USSR. There is more than one language spoken there - but what are the chances that even one of the VOA broadcasts will get through in any detail past the Soviet jamming stations? (I'm surprised that Finnish TV broadcasts can be seen in Leningrad.)

Deja Vu: During the 1983 Pan-American games, in the 800-meter run, 1976 Olympic champion Alberto Juantorena was pinned against the inside curb of the track and fell to the ground in pain. Almost one year later, in the Olympic women's 3000, Zola Budd, the "instant Brit", managed to get a foot in front of Mary Decker - she literally had her foot directly in front (which is supposed to be illegal - then again, so is running into an inside lane too early, and our 4x400 relay team got away with it, although this didn't have any effect on the result), forcing Mary onto the infield with a hip injury. (Note that Budd finished well back, while the man who tripped Juantorena went on to win.)

Deja Vu Part II: Olympic marathon, 1972 - it was announced that Frank Shorter would enter the stadium. Frank came in about 300 meters after an impostor (what also would cause the normally-cool TV announcer Jim McKay to say something like "Throw him off the track!"). In the 1984 steeplechase final, the pack was followed over the first water jump by some banner-waving bozo who cut through the infield and almost caught the pack, while security guards chased him down the stretch. Naturally, this sort of thing will end up as proof that the Soviets were right in staying home because of the lack of security. (What would have happened had this guy tried this in Moscow? Making little ones out of big ones in Siberia, perhaps?)

And now for the big moment.....LOM's choice for ATHLETES OF THE OLYMPICS! Carl Lewis? No - people expected him to win those golds. Gymnast Marylou Retton? The only reason she won was that the Rumanian, Ecaterina Szabo, fell in the preliminaries (otherwise Szabo wins by 0.2 instead of losing by 0.05). How about Szabo and her 3 golds (plus the team gold), then? Are you kidding - after she was upset in the all-around? Diver Greg Louganis? The basketball team? The volleyball team? The water polo team, which fell one goal short of a gold? (They went undefeated, but gave up too many goals so the also-undefeated Yugoslavian team won on "goal differential".)

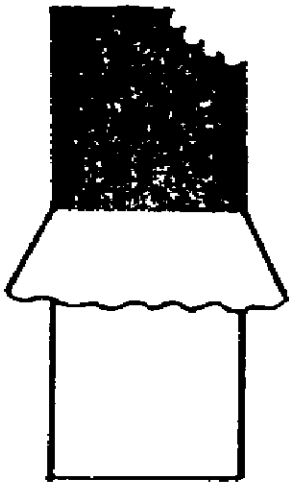

# FUDGE FACTOR

Just when you thought it was safe to follow things like Modern Calhamer Point Counts....it's too late! You're stuck with FUDGE FACTORS in this 'zine!

OK, I suppose you're asking, "What are Fudge Factors?" Well, the FUDGE FACTOR system is based on one simple proposal: that DIPLOMACY is NOT a balanced game.

Some people claim that it's the person, not the position, that determines the winner, and since all countries tend to win at one time or another, all games should be treated equal. As I recall, the old WAR AT SEA rules (US ships could only come into play on a roll of 6) allowed both sides to win - but the Germans won twice as many times! Besides, everyone knows that Russia is easier to play than Austria.

So, somebody had to come up with a way to give each country an adjustment in order to make a win with a "hard" country more than one with an "easy" one - these are the FUDGE FACTORS.

A person's FF score for a game is the product of two things: one is the country's fudge factor, and the other is (maximum number of centers held in the game / 18) + (Calhamer points awarded). Note that the second factor is always 2 for a winning position, regardless of the number of centers held at the end (even on a concession). Each country's fudge factor is calculated by determining how many "standard errors" away from the mean of 1/7 that country's average CPC-per-game is (based on the last 8 issues of EVERYTHING). A "standard error" is  $1/7 \times$  the square root of (6 / the total number of games). For example: if Austria has a win, 2 2-way draws, and 4 7-way draws out of 24 games, the CPC total is 18/7, so the average is (18/7)/24, or 3/28, and the standard error is  $1/7 \times \text{sqrt}(6/24)$ , or 1/14. 3/28 is 1/28 below 1/7, so Austria is 1/2 of a standard error below the mean.

The actual "fudge factor" is 1 plus 0.2 for every standard error below the mean (so non-winning countries get large FFs) or minus 0.2 for every standard error above the mean. In the example, Austria is 1/2 of a standard error below the mean (which is always 1/7), so the FF for Austria is 1.100. Thus, a win as Austria would be worth  $1.1 \times 2$ , or 2.2 points.

NOTE that the final scores are multiplied by 100, so that the points for that Austrian win are recorded as 220, not 2.2.

There are two kinds of overall fudge factor ratings for a player; the average score and the total score. Personally, I prefer the average, since using a total gives a big advantage to players who are in many games (this is one thing wrong with the CPC). There is a minimum number of games needed for a player to be eligible for rating; only one person per country per game gets that rating - usually the one who had the most SCs (in a win or draw power, the last player), but there are exceptions. Also, some, but not all, "irregular" games are counted; for example, most "irregular standby policy" games count, but "local" games don't. Also, electronic mail games count if they would otherwise count had they been PBM. (However, anonymous games are variants!)

OK, I know that went over most of your heads - suffice to say that you should look at the numbers and leave the grinding to me & my Atari. If you want to know how you stand through the last 4 issues of EVERYTHING, let me know. (By the way....a game is scored as it appears in EVERYTHING, so if you are a recent winner, your new scores may not be included. Also, fudge factors change with each new issue of EVERYTHING - the issue a game appears in uses the total games of that issue and the 7 before it to calculate the FFs; however, games in issues 57 and 58 were based on 7-issue counts.)

Last Minute Software Review

In the interest of time I wasn't going to do a software review this, until I found out that I would be borrowing ToA shortly. This is one of the best D&D type games I've seen, and it's available for several computers, including Apple and (what else?) The Commodore 64. Characters, Dungeons, and what not can be saved on disk for future use.

One feature I like, and a D&D nut may not, is the way experience is applied. One of my complaints about D&D is that a sufficiently advanced character may have more "hit points", that is, be able to take more damage, than a Red Dragon. Such interesting but rather ridiculous events do not take place in ToA.

Among other things, there are four "levels" to the "Dunjon", with a total of 233 rooms, seven classes of magical items, and 24 types of monsters. The combat system is highly playable, though perhaps slightly over-simplified. The handling of traps, secret doors, and listening might fare somewhat better under a human gamemaster.

The character, (That's right, I said the, as in one at a time. Gone are the multi-character expeditions that are a staple of most RPG's.) has six basic attributes; intelligence, which affects the characters ability to parley with monsters and the innkeeper; intuition, which affects the ability to detect secret doors, traps, and unpleasant surprises; ego, which also affects your ability to influence others, as well as measuring how determinedly your character fights when wounded; strength, constitution, and dexterity, which have basically the same usage as in other RPG's.

The manual is very well done, with a light touch, as we have come to expect from Jon Freeman. (The author of the manual for this and other Epyx games, among other things.) One of the monster descriptions: "Jellies- are formless masses of translucent jelly about three feet high and six or eight feet across; their touch dissolves flesh. The have no socially redeeming value."

One really nice touch is the character set that is used. On the C-64, at least, it is child's play to replace the Commodore character set with just about anything you want. For you non-programmers, this just means that all the letters in ToA are in Old English script.

If this review seems unorganized, that's because I'm kind of rushed for time. I wanted to send this to Don much earlier, but I knew I'd be borrowing ToA eventually and just had to include a review. Anyway, it gets high marks from me. How much? Well, I stayed up till 1:30 two nights in a row playing. (This is not something that I recommend as a regular thing, especially after a TaeQwonDo class. I'm so stiff I can hardly move!)

I just got SUMMER GAMES by EPYX (this is the Atari version) - I don't recommend you get a cassette version, if one exists, because for each of the 8 events, you have to load in the event you want separately, which will take a long time on tape. Anyway, the events are: 100m dash, 4x400 relay, pole vault, gymnastics (vault), diving (10m platform), skeet shooting, 100m freestyle swim, and 4x100m freestyle relay. Each player gets the choice of one of 18 countries (one of which is "Epyx") complete with anthem (although Australia gets "Waltzing Matilda", Epyx gets the Jumpman theme, and the USSR song is not the anthem - I wonder about some of the others, although I know that the USA, Canada, (West) Germany, and Italy (oh...and France) have the correct anthems.

I suggest you wait until the bugs are fixed - the events are all fine, but the pre-event and post-event routines need more work (once, the graphics mode changed when I made a nationality change), especially the bit that tends to switch bronze and silver medalists! (A pole vaulter jumping 4.8m - about 15 feet 9 inches - lost to someone who missed 3 times at his first height!)

Personal attacks, that have little or nothing to do with the hobby or any portion thereof, really have no place in the hobby. The object of the attack can only be injured, and nobody benefits from it. Period.

Hobby-related attacks, such as accusations of GMing or publishing improprieties, or questioning the abilities of a hobby custodian, are not out of line, as long as they have foundation and are not combined with unrelated personal attacks. Unfortunately, there are many who do not know the difference between a personal attack and a hobby-related one. Combining the two is no better than a personal attack alone.

Other debates, such as political discussions, also have had personal attacks introduced into them. If people really want to argue over Grenada, nuclear freezes, Olympic boycotts and whatnot, stay on the subject and don't attack someone personally just because his/her views may be different from yours.

Well, that's how most feuds keep going. How do they start? That's a good question, especially since I should have covered it first. Disorganization, disorganization...

Many feuds start because of something that happens in a game that gets carried on long after the game is over. I suppose telling these people "it's only a game" sounds pretty trite, but it still applies. Other times, someone takes another's comments, such as a humorous remark or some constructive criticism, the wrong way. Such oversensitivity is unfortunate, but continuing to exploit that sensitivity is much less than fair. And for some reason, there are a few who choose to level attacks on people for no apparent reason whatsoever, or for reasons so far removed from the hobby that they seem rather ridiculous.

You might say, "Well, it takes two to make a feud," and that certainly is true in many cases, where both sides continue going at each other long after their ammo has run out. Some are too eager to accept a challenge. Others adhere to a policy of "ignore them and they'll go away". But from what I have seen, if someone is intent enough on starting a feud, he'll succeed, no matter how long his target tries to ignore him. The target will reach the breaking point sooner or later and the feud is on. Everyone loses.

And the worst of all is when an active effort is made to drive someone out of the hobby completely for little or no reason. Fortunately this doesn't happen too often, though, and it's a good thing. Trying to do such a thing is about as low as you can get.

"The....the FNORD? Isn't that cruel and inhuman?"

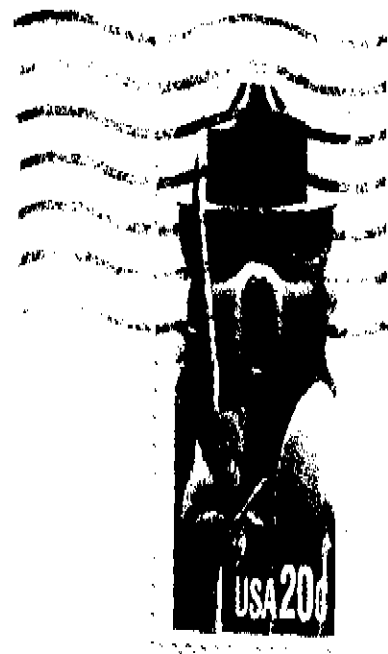
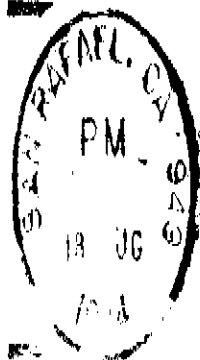
