

However, the fault lies not with the ISE, but with Simon Billenness, publisher of Flame, who has (finally) announced the fold of Flame. Apparently, Simon has sent the money back to the ISE, so I'm giving them a second chance....now watch Lokasenna fold and have this business start up again....

- BEST SUPPORTING ACTOR who played the Cambodian sidekick in "The Killing Fields"?
- BEST SUPPORTING ACTRESS nobody's really stood out this year nobody GOOD, that is! (I can think of two you can forget about Bo Derek and Kate Capshaw.)
- BEST SONG if "Ghostbusters" doesn't win, the fix is IN. (Side note: watch the presentation the song with the biggest production number invariably wins!)
- Of course, CHOSTBUSTERS won the big award MOST MONEY. That's all that really matters, doesn't it? Where does it rank on the all-time list, anyway? (Fifth, I think behind E.T. and the three STAR WARS films.)

Speaking of movies....my latest claim to fame is that I introduced John Caruso to Bill Murray movies (despite the fact that Phyllis Byrne is a big Bill Murray movie buff). It's a good thing it wasn't his ill-fated dramatic performance, in whatever that movie was called, or he'd probably never speak to me!

And now for the latest word from the feurer, disputer of the century. Anyway, Doug Reyerlein and Rod Walker, among others, have been leaning toward an arbitration solution to this mess. I had similar thoughts, but there happen to be two flaws here: first, no one person should be in a position to make such a decision; perhaps a "hobby supreme court" of some sort (three people? five? one hundred and thirty-seven?) could be assembled. Second, and most important, such an ombudsman or group of arbitrators can make what can even come close to a binding decision. For example, they can't order one side or another to stop printing certain things - there is such a thing as "freedom of speech". There could also be the risk of libel in the decision's statement. (However, one of the three "tests of libel", as made clear in the recent Time Magazine decision, is that a libelous statement must be made with the stater's knowledge that it is false; an arbitration decision couldn't meet this standard if it was fairly made.) The arbitors (or is that "arbiters"?) can't even demand an apology - nobody should be forced to apologize if they believe they are right. Finally, such a case will almost certainly come down to who can dig up the most evidence against the others.

For those of you who are still reading this, which means that you aren't tired of this feu-- er, disagreement - let me ask you this: take the following three "decisions" separately: (1) the "New York person" wins; (2) the "Massachusetts person" wins; (3) it's "called a draw" since neither side ends up being 100% innocent. Would you honestly accept the consequences to the affected party/parties in each circumstance? (Let be who is without guilt cast the first "no".)

OK, THE TALK ABOUT THE LATEST FEU-er, ARGUMENT - IS OVER. NOW, BACK TO THE STUFF THAT MADE LOW THE THING IT IS TODAY - yes, more garbage filler talking by your friendly neighborhood publisher.....

The PEERIPOLL results are out - unlike the other polls, this one rates 'zines in 11 categories, ranging from price and reproduction to house rules and stimulation. 11 people decided to vote for LOM (that is, vote on LOM); out of 53 game-running 'zines and 10 non-game 'zines and magazines, LOM rates 8th in scheduling, 4th in entertainment, 13th in game variety - and 40th in house rules, not to mention 51st in GMing. Speaking of GMing, the 11 votes included 4 non-applicable, 2 3s, and 1 zero. Somebody even gave me a zero in house rules! Why - because I have them for too many games?

OK, it's just about time to ask: which com(s) are YOU going to this year? The major choices are: MaryCon (late May/early June - exact dates unknown), ORIGINS (late June, in Baltimore), and DIPCON (late August, in Seattle). As for ma, I have enough leave saved up (I will, that is) to go to ORIGINS - after all, I'm not a Dip-only type. (Besides - maybe I'll be very lucky and The Avalon Hill Game Company (don't call it Avalon Hill) will release ADVANCED SQUAD LEADER like Don Greenwood and Rex Martin say they will. Then again, maybe TSR will admit that they have more money than they know what to do with, courtesy of SPI's creditors.) I'll be lucky if I have enough money - or interest - for PACIFICON (Labor Day weekend) after ORIGINS, much less DIPCON.

Good news! I just got a raise - from \$8.25 per hour to \$8.54. Only nine months to go before I jump to \$10 or so per hour. (And after 33 more months, I*11 get 3/8 of a day in leave per week instead of the 1/4 of a day per week now.) These figures assume there isn't a 5% pay cut and I don't happen to be fired, laid off, drafted, or something equally likely. (Could this be part of a plot in which the government hires all draftable college graduates so they can make sure where to go in case the draft comes back? Or is it just a coincidence that most of the high-paying high-tech jobs are for companies with defense contracts?

AMOUNT IN SUB or TRADE: XEMOGOGIC NOTES: And now, to celebrate this 50th issue, Jan Feringa of Radijsstraat 11 B, 9741 BJ Groningen, THE NETHERLANDS, has contributed an article entitled "The Dutch Hobby, Differing Both In Size And Structure From The American".

Let's start with some history. On 3 March 1973 the first game of Diplomacy on Dutch soil is played, with a set bought in London. In 1976 Diplomacy gets integrated in DUCOSIM (Dutch Association for Conflict Simulation). In 1977 DUCOSIM gets a zine, "De Conflictguzet", which among other things features postal Diplomacy. In the same year the first FTF-championship is held. In 1981 the first genuine Dippy-zine starts, Oxymoron from Jaap Jacobs (at #39 nowadays). In 1982 a second zine comes through, JM, a sound system to select the seven finalists for the FTF championship gets developed and Jan Ferigna presents his postal rating system. Jumbo offers a Dutch Diplomacy-game.

In 1983 Brutus sees the light and the first seven players of the postal rating system are invited for the postal championship 1983.

At the moment we see a prospering hobby, with a growing number of members, no fauds, three major zines, two local zines and a smooth organization.

The three zines are:

Oxymoron, Jaap Jacobs, Vincent van Goghlaan 16, 2343 KM Oegstgeest. 32-36 pages. Digest (reduced to A5), stencilled. Offers Diplomacy (alsi International), Stab, Downfall, Sopwith, United, and lots of other postal games. A letter column now and then, occasionally English articles or letters.

Je Maintiendrai, Hauke Janmen, Beresteinlaan 385, 2542 JK Den Haag. 24-28 pages. Digest (reduced to A5) photocopied. Offers Dippy, United, Gesta Danorum, 1958. Sometimes it contains a letter column or a subzine, Famous for its good-looking-ness. Dippy-games are accompanied by maps.

Brutus, Teijo Doornkamp, Esdoornlaan 732, 9741 MT Groningen. 28-36 pages. Offers Diplomacy, Vain Rats, Sopwith, postal FRP, Snits Revenge, Stab. Letter Column, 4-6 pages, English for the biggest part. Some articles (especially FRP-concerning) are written in English too. Contains an English extract foreign readers each issue. Dippy-games are accompanied by maps.

The three zines like foreign players to participate and are willing to take steps to make up for the disadvantage in time foreign players have. The current FTF champion is Paul Michel. Because the 1983 postal championship still goes on, there is no postal champion at the moment. In April EUROCON will be held in Eindhoven, where lots of continental (and, hopefully, some British) players will meet.

- *****Thank you, Jan, for the Dutch Dippy article. For those of you who may be a little confused about some of the things mentioned, I'll give a few clarifications:
- "A5" it's a page size, about 8% inches high and 6% wide. Standard digest is 8% by 5%.
- Sopwith a WWI air-fighting game, similar to GDW's Blue Max (especially since, unlike The Avalon Hill Game Company's Richthofen's War, these games have no altitude differential).
- EUROCON the European championships, in Eindhoven, The Netherlands. "Continental" refers to mainland Europe. (Remember that Europe is a lot smaller than North America, and that a lot of Europe is behind the Iron Curtain.

And now for the BIG ANNOUNCEMENT that usually comes with big "milestone" issues like LOM #50....in the shade of Britain's Rusty Bolt awards and the late Ellinent Awards of Mike Mills comes the first annual LIFER ACHIEVEMENTS AWARDS, otherwise known as the



The Rusty Bolts mainly consist of "silly" awards, while the EMinent Awards were "typical" categories. Typical RB categories are "upstart of tye year", "hobby heartthrob", and "strangest 'zine"; typical EM categories were "best 'zine", "best new 'zine", "best variant", and "best letter column". THE LIFERS won't include awards siready covered by major awards - the Rod Walker Award's "best writer", the Don Miller Memorial Award for "distinguished hobby service", the DPP/Marco/Runestone polls for "best zine/subzine/GM/player" - but the demise of the EMinent Awards leaves a gap in the North American hobby that THE LIFERS intend to fill,

Here's how this thing works: with

- (1) Any person associated if the hobby anyone who subscribes to a 'zine, or plays in a PBM game, or publishes a 'zine/subzine, or whatever excuse you can come up with - is eligible to make nominations. Up to 5 nominations may be made in each category per person. The 5 persons/'zines/whatever receiving the most nominations will be put on the final ballot; however, write-ins will be allowed.
- (2) Once the nominations are closed and the final ballots determined, any person associated with the hobby is eligible to vote. Only one person/'zine/whatever per category can be selected per person voting. Whoever/whatever receives the most votes is considered the winner; ties are not broken, but the tied entrants share the award.

The categories are:

DIRTIEST FOLD - the 'zine which folds without making arrangements for its games, or takes subbers' money and runs, or anything else that made a 'zine's folding bad.

HOBBY GENTUS - the hobby's smart guy, the one who knows everything.
(Perhaps the one most likely to win at TRIVIAL PURSUIT?)

MOST BORING TOPIC - the thing you've heard over and over again in 'zines and hobby talk that you wish people would shut up about.

MOST IMPROVED 'ZINE - "improved" is up to you.

BEST 'ZINE FOR GAMES OTHER THAN DIPLOMACY - the 'zine you'd recommend for games other than Diplomacy or its variants.

BEST 'ZINE FOR HOBBY NEWS - this one is self-explanatory.

HEST LETTER COLUMN - again, this should be clear.

REST GAME OTHER THAN DIPLOMACY OR VARIANTS - your favorite game besides Dip or any of its variants.

BIGGEST HOBBY PERSONALITY - the person you'd most associate with the hobby at the present time.

and, finally, the big one.....

FRUE HOBBY MASTER - the one person you believe to see all, know all, and especially control all in the hobby today.

Book Review

The Integral Trees

by Larry Niven

I don't know how to decribe this book. It's incredible. Larry Niven has done something that I thought was impossible. He wrote a book that is conceptually greater in scope than Ringworld. Ringworld was, after all, a ring I million miles wide and 600 million miles long spun for gravity. In the Integral Trees, we have a rotating, breathable gas torus around a neutron star, and humans have colonized it, sort of. The Integral Trees are organisms that grow up to 100 klicks in length and are so named because wind bends them into a shape similar to an integration symbol. Also because of tidal forces, there is "gravity" at the ends of the trees. (Figure it out for your self. The entire tree is in orbit. The end closer to the neutron star is traveling slower than orbital speed, so it wants to fall into the star. The other end is above orbital speed, and wants to fly sway. This stabilizes the tree and causes pseudo-gravity at the ends. As to the wind, remember that the gas is in orbit, and the ends are always moving too fast or slow.) This book is a must for all SF fans. The best book to come along in quite a while.

A Touch of the Bizzare Dept.


