Recently, I've been forced to switch to a more expensive copying service. At the moment, each

issue of LOM - that is, each copy of each issue - costs me 11¢ per 2-sided page. That means a 20-page issue costs me 55¢ (I can get 4 pages of LOM on a 2-sided sheet) to produce, plus 22¢ to mail, for a loss of 27¢ per copy. The sub count is about 50 - that's over \$13 per issue, or over \$130 per year. (That's \$130 per year LOSS, not cost!) I don't make that much money so that I can really afford that much of a loss per year (well, I probably could afford that much of a loss - I've been doing fine so far, and I'm due a \$2000/year raise in November). THEREFORE, issues of LIFE OF MONTY will now have variable prices based on how large the issues are.

A far cry from \$13 per issue, wouldn't you agree? But since I'm such a NICE guy, this issue will go for the usual 50¢, since you had no idea beforehand. I'm sorry to spring this on you, but perhaps I'll be able to reduce costs so that the price can come back down. (Note to trades - I don't intend to cut any of my current trades, so don't panic about having to dig into your wallets to get your usual dose of DIP WARZ or whatever-it-is you get this thing for.)

By the way - using the new system, the last 10 issues of LOM (not including this one) would have cost you \$6.70 instead of the \$5 you paid, although 24 and 28 page issues are harder to come by quite recently. (Issues 47 and 48 had 24; issue 51 had 28 - had they all had 20, the price would have been \$6.20.)

WRESTLING WRESTLING

- 1. These matches are sanctioned by the INTERNATIONAL WRESTLING HOBBY (INH), headquartered here. The decisions of the INH are final.
- 2. Each person represents a manager of one or more wrestlers. Each manager may manage, at any one time, up to two individual wrestlers and/or one tag-team of two wrestlers. (If a manager manages one individual and one tag-team, one of the tag-team partners may also wrestle as an individual. If a manager manages exactly two wrestlers, they may both wrestle individually and as a tag-team.)
- 3. Each manager, before the first match of one of his ("his" refers to women as well if Cyndi Lauper can do it, it should be a snap for someone like Julie Martin or Cathy Ozog or any number of people named Byrne) wrestlers, must provide the following information about the wrestler:
 - a) The wrestler's name don't use the names of real wrestlers;
 - b) The wrestler's physical description height, weight, hair style, muscular or bulky, and whatever costume the wrestler wears;
 - c) The wrestler's attitude hero or villain (note that a tag-team cannot consist of a hero and a villain);
 - d) The wrestler's "finishing hold" (i.e. the one maneuver the wrestler uses at the end of a match - for example, a figure-four leg scissors, a belly-to-belly souflex, or a dive from the top rope (sometimes known as a "Superfly"));
 - e) any other details for example, what music is to be played when the wrestler enters the ring, if any, or any other per-match or post-match details (examples: singing the wrestler's country's anthem, pulling somebody from the seats and dancing with them after the match, doing a goose-step before applying the finishing hold (German types only for that one)).
- 4. Each wrestler can be involved in one interview per issue, either by himself or with his tag-team partner. The manager may be present at any interviews where his wrestlers are involved. An "interview" consists of a statement made by the wrestler(s)/manager anything can be said, although the IWH has the right to censor interviews. Challenges may be made in interviews; these will aid in making matches in future issues.
- 5. The IVH determines the matches to be fought in the next issue. The outcome of the match is determined by methods known only to the IVH. The match will follow the styles of the wrestlers involved, as determined by the managers' descriptions of the wrestlers. Also, managers may describe special actions that will occur during the match (for example, the wrestler will attack his opponent when the opponent tries to enter the ring, or the wrestler's tag-team partner will sneak into the ring during the match for some 2-on-1).
- 6. Some details concerning championship matches: championship bouts (as well as most others) are one fall. The title can change hands only if the champion is pinned or gives up not if he's disqualified or counted out of the ring. The length of a bout is usually somewhere from 15 minutes to 1 hour (championship matches must be at least 1 hour). The IWH has the right to declare what kind of match will be fought (e.g. no disqualification, cage match, chain match).
- 7. NMR: because of the abstract nature of this thing, an NMR isn't much of a penalty, although the TWH can withdraw a manager if it appears that he is not involved in the matches.
- 8. FEES: none. All matches are held within the 'zine.
- 9. There is NO rule nine.
- 10. Until further notice, only male wrestling is held in the TWH. Female managers, OK female wrestlers, sorry.
- 11. Anyone who doesn't play is, as they say in Australia, "thick as a brish".

- This issue of LOM may be a bit small that's because I spent most of the time normally devoted to typing this time in the East. East coast, that is. For those of you who want the details, here they are:
- WEDNESDAY, June 26 up at 5:00 in the morning (local time) to catch a 7:00 flight from Oakland to Baltimore via Newark on George Burns (a/k/a World) Airways. It happened to be a flight from Honolulu to Frankfurt, Fed. Rep. of Germany (West Germany) via Oakland, Newark, Baltimore, and London. (Those are all of the cities served by World except for Los Angeles and Kansas City.) George Burns never mentions the \$3 charge for headphones to listen to the movie. Since it was "The Sure Thing", I passed on that opportunity. Anyway, when I get off the plane brass bands? Screaming crowds? Large banners? Vivid imagination? (Choose one out of four!) At least I was named "Guest of the Day" at the Towson Quality Inn.
- THURSDAY I expected to wait for an hour at the ORIGINS check-in line. When I arrived, there was (literally) NOBODY else in line: Some people had already checked in (it opened a few minutes early), but the fact that it was Thursday morning kept most people away. (Not everybody takes a week off....) Open up the program...what do you MEAN, the dealers' area (or, for you John Boardman types out there, "hucksters' boothes") won't open until Friday?! At least the dorms opened early, so I wouldn't have to lug my stuff around all day. Not much else happened, except that I met a few fellow THE BUZZARD'S BREATH subscribers at the THIRD REICH seminar.
- FRIDAY who put the gymnasium so far from everything else? There are free shuttle buses, fortunately enough...only a few hundred waiting in line before the first opening. Victory Games has an ad in the program announcing "the return of the monster game PACIFIC WAR, with 2400 counters and 2 maps for \$45". They have a sign at their booth "Coming This Fall". Over to the Avalon Hill booth "ADVANCED SQUAD LEADER will be ready in two months. However, BEYOND VALOR, the first ASL module (with over 2000 counters and 5 new maps), is available for \$40. As a special ORIGINS deal, get BEYOND VALOR now and we'll send you the ASL rules for \$30 a \$5 discount." I couldn't pass that up....

 OK, now onto the ASL seminar, hosted by Don Greenwood. What's taking the rules so long? Well, TAHGC (don't call it "Avalon Hill") decided to print the rules in 4 colors instead of 2 like most of their rules. The new ASL counters attempt to put every bit of information on each counter, so nobody has to look up anything in the back of the rules. I hope none of the infantry point values are changed those are also on the counters! (By the way SQUAD LEADER will still be sold, and "it is recommended that SL be played before ASL", since SL is "programmed instruction" and ASL isn't.

 Besides boards 1 and 8 are needed for ASL.)
- SATURDAY onto the FIREPOWER tournament. Only 16 people show up for this one, probably because it was released in April. The players are divided into teams of 2 each, so there were 4 "boards" of 2-vs.-2 in a special "Iran-Iraq" scenario thought up by game designer Craig Taylor. The team I was on won both of our games, but I only finished sixth because I wasn't aggressive enough.
- THE DIPLOMACY HORBY MEETING hosted by Robert Sacks. Too bad John Boardman wasn't there (I did meet him earlier) actually, fewer than 20 people showed up! The main event was the DipCon site approval that is, which site(s) would be "endorsed by the meeting". Robert wanted Atlanticon; Dick Warner, host of MaryCon, wanted his con. Neither site was fully endorsed there were claims that having both cons submit bids would split any east coast vote. Some of the "official" actions:

The meeting asks the BNC (Bill Quinn) to reconsider his new local game policy (where any player can: ask that a game in which 2 players live within 50 miles of each other be irregular) - I was later informed that Bill had reconsidered, so this is moot.

PAGE 3 likes the old Coke-er, policy

The meeting also asks the BNC to allow any standby policy that is applied "fairly and uniformly". This was in response to one or more of Robert's games being declared irregular because he doesn't name standbys, but instead allows the first person to mail in orders to take the position (other than players already in the game, of course). If the players KNOW the standby policy (it's in the house rules) and play anyway, they shouldn't be allowed to ask for irregular status later in the game.

The meeting endorses Ed Wrobel as Deputy Registrar of Projects. The meeting makes a suggestion that Mike Mills be added to the nominees for the KGO Zine Directory editor for 1986.

SUNDAY. - the H-17 tournament. I bought so much stuff that my bags are falling apart and I'm having trouble lugging things around the campus. 

MEN AT WORK--TWO HEARTS
It's been a while, hasn't it? Nen at work starts
out with two albums in rapid succession, (too rapid)
then waits almost two years before the third one
comes out.

There have been some changes during this hiatus. First of all, the group is now officially down to three members: lead singer Colin Hay. Keyboard/cax player Greg Ham and guitarist Ron Strykert. One wouldn't think that this would have much of an effect on the music, since these three did all the songwriting on the first two albums, but "Two Hearts" is very different from its predecessors.

Then I listened to the album for the first time, I was waiting for something bouncy, funny, and insane like "Down Under", "Who Can it Be Now?", or "Dr. Heckyll & Mr. Jive." It never came, although "Stay at Home" comes within striking distance. The tone of the entire album stays fairly constant throughout, with mainly mid-tempo stuff, relatively mellow by most standards. There is a lot of good writing here, much of it cynical, some of it reflective, but all of it listenable.

Overall, "Two Hearts" is a good album, although to compare it with Men At Work's previous albums is an apples-and-oranges type affair. It is certainly worth at least one listen.







- MOST IMPROVED 'ZINE no doubt about this one....NO FIXED ADDRESS.


 (How many other 'zines have spiral binding? True, it was only for one extra-large issue....)
