Remember, if diplomacy had actually worked in the time and place in which DIPLOMACY is supposed to represent, then companies like The Avalon Hill Game Company wouldn't have had to come up with 1914 or RICHTHOFEN'S WAR or THE GUNS OF AUGUST (not to mention all of those WWII titles, probably), and we'd all probably be reading about PBM STATIS-PRO BASEBALL (if that's possible - you can forget about football, insofar as the defense has to be set up for each play, while in baseball the defense stands around in the same places, more or less). However, it didn't, and they did, and so you're reading this issue 61 of LIFE OF MONTY, typed up by Don Del Grande, 142 Eliseo Drive, Greenbrae, CA 94904-1339, phone (415) 461-2692, but after 5 PM (Pacific time) on weekdays and never after 11 PM, except maybe on Friday. For those of you who don't read things like "only call after...." and call whenever you feel like it, listen (read) carefully: anybody who is crazy enough to call after 11:15 on March 8 or April 12 will suffer the SUPREME punishment: yes, YOU will be painfully EXTERMINATED, and THEN reincarnate as a hamster and be forced to live with Woody.... (I go to extremes when somebody interrupts DOCTOR WHO - especially "Day of the Daleks" (March 1 - when first shown in the early 70s, it was the Daleks' first appearance in four years) and "The Three Doctors" (April 12 - the 10th anniversary show, and the only one in the United States (so far) with William Hartnell, the first doctor (albeit only appearing on TV screens in the show)))

One, from Dick Martin; the other, by me (immediately after I had finished copying about half of the pages - by then, it was too late, and even the "darker" setting on the copier didn't do much good). This time, at least the important stuff is typed.

Well, I'm glad to see that all of you read issue 60, since the alien attack didn't take place. (Well, actually, it did, but the first shot just happened to be in the Florida area, and the resulting explosion exerted just enough force to send the main attack squadrons into a path which trapped them in the gravitational pull of the sun. By some strange coincidence, said explosion took place exactly 3 minutes and 32.7 seconds after the Challenger explosion, so nobody paid much attention to it.) (I'll bet you thought it was the Challenger explosion that the attack created, didn't you?) And now that you're around for issue 61, here's....

MONTY'S NEWS AND COMMENT is brought to you by Americans for a Grenada Cricket Team, who recently celebrated a Windward Islands victory over the English 11. (Now that the USFL is moving to the fall, the only sports around here are Basketball and Hockey, at least until April, anyway, and who cares about April baseball?)

yes, LOM presents game openings in AH's newest railway game, 1830 (based on the British game 1829). More details when the game is released, which will probably be sometime in March, but that usually means "any time up until ORIGINS". (Those of you reading this that are publishers, would you list this opening in your 'zines in case you have a few lines of space left over for things like this? Well, Pete Doubleday doesn't have to, since I expect as much demand for 1830 over there as for 1829 over here, but the rest of you can earn the usual LOM "thank you" (as much as a CANNON SALUTE even) for spreading the word.

And speaking of that, MARYCON has the honor of hosting DIPCON 86, May 30 to June 1, at Mary Washington College in Fredericksburg, VA. This is a "variable round" tournament; that is, not everybody has to play in every round, which doesn't penalize those players who happen to have one bad round as much as a fixed-round tournament would, since you can play more rounds in an attempt to "cover up" the bad game. Then again, if you have a few good games, you don't have to play more games which might

botch up your good scores. As long as you play two rounds, you are eligible for the trophies (top three players, plus best countries). In addition, there will be "Vari-MaryCon" (a variant tournament - the variant hasn't been chosen yet, but I've heard Gunboat and various 9-player titles mentioned), the usual beer bash, the selection of the 1987 site (regions I and II - that is, the eastern USA - are eligible), amendments to the DIPCON Charter for future cons (although, according to an amendment passed in 1985, new amendments must be approved by two meetings - that is, two different DIPCON meetings - to be included), and the usual hobby silliness. An application for entry and lodging (if you need it - I recommend the food services there) is included in this issue. If you're worried about meeting me there, I won't be there, since I hardly ever go to Dip-only conventions (actually, MARYCON 1984 was my only one, since it was my first chance to meet the Eastern hobbyists) - I prefer ORIGINS, which I will be attending on July 3-6 in Los Angeles (at the Airport Hilton), although don't expect to see me in the Diplomacy tournament (I may show up for a minute on my way somewhere else - for example, the Dealer Area, the Firepower tournament (like last year - you should have seen John Boardman's face last year when, after a discussion about Californians, I told him who I was), off to eat somewhere, things like that).

Strange - one side of the ORIGINS flyer says LA Airport HILTON, the other LA Airport HYATT. (I was down for a job interview that had me stay at a hotel between The Forum and Hollywood Park once - the track wasn't open and the only team in town that night was the indoor soccer team, which chose that night to play the first 3/4 of the game without either team scoring a goal.) (Yes, but what does that have to do with ORIGINS?)

SHOCK! Gary Coughlan recently told me that EUROPA EXPRESS is slowly winding down to what could be a fold, claiming the usual excuses - too much work, not enough time, things like that. More on this as it develops.

MEANWHILE, I'm STILL looking for one or two new subzines. (All of the EE ones are spoken for, more or less, so don't say "Why don't you ask the EE subzines which may not have a home soon?") I've had one or two "Maybe in the future" from non-writers, but no definite offers yet. Do you know how hard it is to fill 11 pages every five weeks, what with only 2 games? (Three, if and when the Dick Martin game fills, but, knowing how long it takes to fill games in LOM, that may be a while. After all....who reads LOM to play Diplomacy?)

OOPS

I'm innocent this time. Included in this issue is a ballot for the 1986 RUNESTONE POLL, being run for the second straight year by Bruce Linsey. (For those of you who don't trust Linsey for one reason or another, Nelson Heintzmann is also accepting ballots, which will be forwarded - at least the votes will be, anyway - to Bruce.) The instructions appear on the ballot. Why the OOPS? Because Bruce has done it AGAIN - after being chewed out by people like me for what happened last year - ONCE AGAIN, THE SUBZINE "THE THRILL OF AGONY, THE VICTORY OF DEFEAT" (by Julie Martin in RETALIATION) IS NOT ON THE SUBZINE BALLOT! The deadline is June 21, by the way.

AND SPEAKING OF BRUCE....an announcement appears in this issue for his latest idea - a handbook for publishers. After reading what he has to say (how can you read what somebody says?), I think it's a good idea - if potential publishers have an idea of how better 'zines are run, they may pick up a few ideas. However, I do have some reservations (for 4 at 8:00 on 176th Street....).

First of all, although a lot of names are mentioned, I noticed that two of the publishers who "got me started" in the hobby (and have probably influenced, at least a little, the way LOM has turned out) and who are still publishing since 1980 aren't mentioned - Dick Martin and John Caruso. If I have to ask why they aren't mentioned, I'm afraid of how the reception will be to this publication. Second, I disagree with the title of "Beyond Supernova" - any sort of astronomy title will make it look more like a Linsey publication than a hobby one, and this shouldn't be dominated by any one person. (Twenty new 'zines would be nice - but not twenty clones of THE VOICE OF DOOM or any other 'zine.) And, while you're at it, Bruce, remember that Rod Walker's name does not appear on the cover of THE GAMER'S GUIDE TO DIPLOMACY.

All right - who said "Putting Linsey in charge of a publisher's

packet is like putting Bernie Oaklyn in charge of the players' publication"? True, Bruce did some questionable things in his 'zine, such as throwing players out of games (he says it was "GM deception", while others disagree) and writing house rules which tried to cover every situation - and, to Keith Sherwood's dismay, when they didn't, Bruce came up with controversial (er, CONTROVERSIAL) decisions (for those of you who don't know, Keith used "TRO" as an abbreviation for Tyrolia, which Bruce didn't accept), but how many pubbers can say that they consistently published more than 20 issues per year, or filled four games within one month after announcing the openings? (I still suggest putting this publication in the names of all contributors, with a "Editor: Bruce Linsey" in the credits.)

OK, how long before someone announces the "other" publishing packet? After all, there's as much chance of John Boardman, the first publisher, writing something for Bruce's packet as there is that every conservative christian in North America will simultaneously admit that Dungeons & Dragons isn't a tool of the devil after all.

The latest GAME NEWS magazine (well, number 12, anyway) has the following Avalon Hill (er, TAHGC) and Victory Games titles which are scheduled to be released sometime before ORIGINS (usually, a few titles make it out in March or April, while others appear at ORIGINS over July 4 weekend):

TAHGC - not including any of the RUNEQUEST stuff, the only titles are OD ("an odd card game") and 1830 (an American version of the British rail game 1829).

VG - besides the JAMES BOND stuff, there's BATTLE HYMN (a Pacific version of AMBUSH, but I don't think you need AMBUSH to play this like you do for MOVE OUT and PURPLE HEART), KOREA (the Korean War - the only other strategic Korean game I've seen is GDW's old YALU), and AEGEAN STRIKE (GULF STRIKE in the Aegean Sea area).

WHAT IS THE WORLD COMING TO WHEN....Nova's latest announcement of four new LOST WORLDS books includes a Winged Gargoyle, a Cleric (with Cleric spells, I suppose), and two books in their Lord of the Rings series, Gandalf and Balrog.

(How about a LORDS OF THE RING series - Sgt. Slaughter vs. the Iron Shiek?)

What next - C3PO and R2D2?

1830 - Avalon Hill's soon-to-be-released railway game (forget about RAIL BARON - with 1830, you make your own paths). Keep looking for more details.

RAILWAY RIVALS - (will not be played if 1830 fills first.) Made by Games Workshop (not to be confused with GDW). More on this when it's released out here.

DIPLOMACY - GM Dick Martin. There must be seven people out there trying to find another game. Well, this is the place! Step right up - no game fees needed.

STANDBYS - needed for Diplomacy and Kingmaker. Standbys get 50¢ for their first orders, 50¢ for their second, and \$1 for finishing the game. (Money refers to 'zine credit - but you can apply it to ANY 'zine.) Current Dip list: Caruso, Ehli, Ferguson, Johnson, Peel, Wilson, Young.

TALES OF THE ARABIAN KNIGHTS - well, I'm thinking on how this can be PBMed. The current PTF rules make it too easy to cheat in PBM by looking at the results of all reactions for an encounter and then choosing the most favorable one. There are (at least) two solutions: have each reaction chosen randomly, or make the encounter chart die roll in secret (for character encounters, randomly select one of the three numbers) and have the player select his reaction (if it is not allowed, a random choice is made). The only problem: this takes some of the player's actions out of the game (true, choosing a reaction was mainly guesswork) - the only thing the players do is decide where to move. Additional word on this one later....

DIP WARZ

The campaigning is getting more and more intense in these last few days before the latest election for EMPREOR OF THE DIPLOMATIC EMPIRE takes place. The two major candidates, Lord Sacks Fifthavenue, representing the Living Empire party - "If I am re-elected, the empire LIVES - if not, I can't guarantee anything" - and Rod Seaparter, representing the Rebel party. Excuse me, but there's a news bulletin ordered by THE EMPEROR to be broadcast over all subspace frequencies....

"Attention! THE EMPEROR has announced today that he has ordered that the Rebel Party is hereby, herewith, heretofore, and here&there illegal, and anything that looks like a meeting of Rebel party members - in fact, anything that, in THE EMPEROR'S opinion, could be considered as anything resembling a Rebel party meeting - will be broken up along with the bones of those attending. Those claiming innocence will be charged with calling THE EMPEROR a liar and will therefore be subjected to INCREDIBLY painful and THOROUGHLY agonizing treatments that all traitors deserve. Furthermore, all known Rebel hangouts, planets with the word "Rebel" in them, and just about anything beginning with the letter "R" and ending in a consonant, just to be on the safe side, will be wiped out. On a lighter note, THE EMPEROR has also allowed the use of small letters when referring to him, since he's such a NICE guy."

And now DIP WARZ brings you highlights of the Emperor's campaign on the pro-Rebel Biko-Hall planet, Berkeley star system. The usual assortment of massed bands, laser light shows, death threats, things like that, haven't worked here, so the Emperor is going all-out with the massed stunt fleet representing 89 pro-Empire planets. Unfortunately, the inhabitants were so unimpressed that they managed to form a very large spell-out of "SEAPARTER" on the planetary surface. Too bad it was a suicide stunt fleet, which, for its final act, decided to dive directly into the Berkeley star, creating a flare which managed to wipe out most of the Biko-Hall population, and turning some of the survivors into giant THINGS with six - well, there are six, whatever they are - and eight or nine - or maybe even 10?

Meanwhile, there's a capacity crowd of something in excess of 100,000 along with TRILLIONS of video viewers tuned in to the Mean-Gene planet in the Incredible Bulk system, for the INTERPLANETARY HYPERWRESTLING CHAMPIONSHIP between the current champion, Bulk Bogus, and the current victim - er, challenger - King Kong Porky, with his manager Bobby the Brainless.

"There's the ball - the Bulkster leaps out of his corner, while Porky pretty much bounces into the center of the ring. There's a grapple, with The Bulk throwing Porky into the ropes - he comes off and Bulk sends him down with a drop kick! Now it's Bulk with an elbow into the chest. Porky manages to get up, but Bulk throws him into the corner and follows up with another elbow - the ropes are really shaking after that one!"

We'll return for the conclusion of that match later.

What about the upcoming election? What about THE BOURSE? What about that piece of steel in Bobby the Brainless' pocket? You'll have to wait until next time, I suppose....

A Publisher's Handbook -- an Idea Whose Time has Come (Again)

I've recently been in touch with a number of postal Diplomacy's most accomplished GMs and publishers on the topic of producing a Publisher's Handbook. The idea seems to have generated a groundswell of support (not to mention a number of articles already), and I seem to have a bit of spare time and energy on my hands these days, so all systems are go.

The Handbook, which is going to be named Beyond Supernova, will be a collection of essays and other information designed to guide new or potential publishers and GMs. This is a service that the North American hobby hasn't had since the seventies, so we'll be filling a definite gap by producing it. Mike Barno, probably expressing a lot of people's viewpoints, writes, "I wish...a good Publisher's Handbook in general had been available when I was getting in."

I am soliciting pertinent articles from any hobbyist who cares to contribute. In order to avoid duplication of efforts, you might want to check with me before actually writing anything just to make sure the topic isn't already covered by someone else. To give you a quick idea of what's on tap already, or what I have already asked specific people to write, here's a rundown:

Mark Berch, helpful as always, has written several articles. These include "How Much of 'Yourself' to Put into your Zine", a short essay on addressing, and another on specializing. He will also be writing on the subzine route.

Hon (Canada) Brown's "Advice to the Novice Pubber" will be printed here, as will two of my own articles on publishing (one on how to get people to write for your zine, the other a satirical look at non-publishing).

I hope to get permission from Doug Beyerlein to run some of his material about GMing and publishing, as Doug is one of the most sensible and straightforward writers the hobby has ever had. Randolph Smyth once wrote an insightful article about GMing dilemmas which I hope to include.

Fred Davis will be writing a brief essay on GMing variants if his time permits. Knowing Fred, he'll likely come through.

Mike Barno's views on strict GMing are diametrically opposed to my own, so he and I will be writing a dialogue/debate on the pros and cons of that question, not with the idea of either side "winning", but of exposing new GMs to both viewpoints. I've asked Paul Rauterberg to take the "con" side in a similar debate on the merits of comprehensive house rules, though I haven't yet heard back from him. *

I've asked, or will be asking, for material from many other writers. In particular, I'm hoping for something on the Orphan Service from Jim Burgess, a summary of the BNC's role from Bill Quinn, the use of computers in publishing from Dave Kleiman, the evolution of Diplomacy publishing from that hyperliterate old-timer Conrad von Metzke, guest-GMing from Jeff Richmond (who did a lot of it, and very well, before he started Frobbozz). And maybe others will want to contribute. Rod Walker, Ken Peel, Alan Stewart, Bruce McIntyre, Gary Coughlan, Steve Hutton, Larry Peery and Steve Knight are just a few names that leap to mind, and from whom I'll be seeking written material.


To back up all these efforts from current North American hobbyists, I'll probably be reprinting some material from the old IDA Handbook and from the British Handbook.

Finally, I've covered a few topics on my own: deciding whether or not to publish, taking the plunge, ethics. I have some other ideas as well.

As you can see, we've already got quite a potential lineup. Still, I'm looking for additional relevant material from anyone who wishes to contribute. All contributors will receive a complimentary copy of BS. If you have an idea for an article (preferably on a topic not already mentioned), please let me know by early or mid-April. Submissions should be in my hands no later than early May, let's say May 9. That will give me time to get the final product ready for initial distribution at DipCon, if all goes well. Who among you would like to contribute to this effort?
