## HER MAJESTY'S GOVERNMENT HEALTH WARNING

It SOUNDS crazy, but now I have PROOF. It was just coincidence that the British 'zines The Acolyte, The Thing On The Met, Greatest Hits, C'est Magnifique, and Psychopath either folded or had severe cutbacks soon after I started receiving them. Even when Simon Billeaness came over here with Excitement City Unlimited, he didn't escape. Then, all of a midden, Wieden Crichet Monthly switches to a mailing service which sends all of the Air Mail inspes via Surface Mail, and Punch started going through all of those changes. These were more coincidences, as was all of that rain in Britain in 1987 - the year I'm there on vacation.

But NOW, the last piece in the puzzle.

Back in 1981, Private Bye printed a story about the wife of a convicted mass murderer. (Another was printed in 1983.) However, it was after I started a subscription (late last year, mind you) when the wife in question sued the magazine - and won a libel judgment of 600,000 pounds (about \$1,000,000). Now there's talk of closing the magazine down. "Just a coincidence," right?

MONTY'S NEWS AND COMMENT is brought to you by the 1988 DIPCON Diplomacy Tournament Director and speaking of cons, here's an ORIGINS SPECIAL featuring the highlights.

First, the results of the tournaments I entered. In PATTON'S BEST, I decided to drive my tank right through a city in northwest France somewhere. Rounding a corner, I was - well, all that I know was that it was an anti-tank shell at point-blank range.

Enough said.

Then, B-17. This was a two-mission tournament, so - you guessed it; I was shot out of the sky twice. The first run ended abruptly just short of the target when the #3 engine fuel tank caught fire; the second mission was slow and painful, as I took three hits on the bombs without an explosion only to have #2 engine fuel tank get torched on the way back after totally missing the target (thanks to a destroyed bombsight and a KIA bombsrdier).

The Histolium's Room Dealer's Assa was, probably, more famous for what wasn't there than for what was. True, TAHGC (Avalon Hill) did have Hollow Legions (the Italians in ASL), and Steve Jackson had GURPS Supers (superheroes), but the no-shows included TSR's AD&D Second Bdition Monatrous Compendium (a couple of display copies showed up, and TSR promised release by the time you read this), Amstralian Design Group's 1936-1939 expansion for World in Plannes (advance orders were taken; estimated release is early October), Task Force's expansion for Pederation & Happire (sometime next year), and TAHGC's remake of Siege of Jaruanium (they did show counters and the map, as well as the map for the ASL Stalingrad campaign).

The Anctions featured one fairly big surprise: SPI's War in the Pacific was not the high price item of the show. Although a mint WITP went for \$340, it lost out to \$365 for a mint, SPI double flatbox, shrinkwrapped edition of SPI's Prestags Masterpack (or whatever they called the combined Chariot, Spartan, Logion, Viking, and Youman). A mint War in Europe in two flatboxes went for \$165, while 1961 GRI editions of

Diplomacy ranged from \$25 to \$49 depending on condition.

The item of the auction was a 1961 edition of Monopoly made in France (that's what the houses and hotels all had stamped on them, anyway) in a rosewood case for \$175.

Just in case you're interested, here are some other prices: Empires of the Middle Ages sold for \$95 mint and \$37 "well-played"; TAHGC versions of Diplomacy with wooden blocks sold for \$21; the Hartland Trefoil edition of Civilization sold for \$50; the first edition (British, with the "unplayable rules" - for example, no Plague Calais) Kingmaker sold for \$25.

DIPLOMACY - I wasn't in the tournament, but I did meet Tim Moore, Don Williams, Ron Cameron (who I referred to as "Scott" at least once; for those of you who don't know, Ron Cameron is on the DIPCON committee, while Scott publishes Protosoan), and (for the second time in five years) Larry Peery.

RUMORS AND GOSSIP from the "Industry News, Trends, and Gossip" meeting: those of you familiar with the "Wildcards" books should know that Steve Jackson bought the rights to use the characters in GURPS (he also has rights for The Prisoner), but SJG bought the rights for what were announced as nearing "ripoff" prices; The Source has been bought by Compuserve, while Genie is talking with TSR about online AD&D; in PBM, someone is running a PBM WWII game with a \$40 setup and \$20 turns, which brought about shouts of "Give me the players' names - I have a bridge in New York for sale".

However, the Milton Bradley representative made two comments worth noting. First, the board game industry is being destroyed, slowly but definitely, by Nintendo. Second, the talk about PBM led to his comment about a game in the mid-seventies called something like "Lords of Valetia" which resulted in the GM stopping the game without refunding the players' balances. Who is this "take the money and run" GM? BLMER HINTON - the same Elmer Hinton who wants to run Dip at \$1/turn after an "unsuccessful" previous hobby presence. Fool us carce, shame on you - fool us twice, shame on us. (According to the latest House of Lords, it's up to \$5 per game year plus \$14 for 12 issues.)

FLASH! The hobby is OVER! It's been OVERRUN by - dare we say it - CRICKET TYPES! Yes, now Michael Hopcreft has came out of the closet as a fine of the sport. Now that there are TWO of us over here, plus the "invadors" from Europe and Australia, you might as well get used to it . . .

## MEETING OF MINDS #28

This is Meeting of Minds #28, the official subzine of International Diplomacy Tournament Ratings (IDTR), edited by Don Del Grande, 142 Elisco Drive, Greenbrae, CA 94904-1339 (but you probably already know that).

If you're looking for the ORIGINS results - Tim Moore said that the results would be available about a week after ORIGINS ended; this was mailed two weeks after ORIGINS. He'll be at DIPCON (he's the assistant tournament director), so, with some

lack, results will appear in the next MOM.

Meanwhile, David Hood sent in the results from Dixiecon (this is the first year this tournament has been IDTR-sanctioned) as well as a report in his 'zine, Carolina Command & Commentary (June 1989; available from David Hood, 15-F Estes Park, Carrboro, NC 27510, for 75c).

The con was scheduled for May 26-28 at the University of North Carolina in Chapel Hill, but the fireworks started early as Robert Sacks was talked into a "friendly" game on May 22. (Robert, like myself, sounds like the kind of person whose playedgames of Dip are few and far between . . .) Anyway, there were ten games actually played among 33 persons in three "rounds". However, seven of the players are listed on the final results as "ineligible", and only 26 players were scored. (One of the "ineligibles" is Bernie Oaklyn - no, Buddy Tretick and Ian Eckloff weren't in the tournament. I'm not sure if the ineligibles got that way because they were tournament hosts, only played in one game, or a combination of both.)
