"Analysis?" asks Calberchian.

"You know," answers John Pole-O, "where the opposition parties start to make comments about the speech, only to have them destroyed by-"

"EXCUSE ME?"

"OOPS - of course I meant to say that the opposition parties commit self-destruction rather than pale in comparison to the supreme everythingness of THE EMPEROR!"

"We won't count that against you. Let's see - one count of failure to listen to all of one of THE EMPEROR's speeches, and one count of rigging the election."

"Rigging?" interrupts Rod Seaparter. "But I lost, remember?"

"That's worse - inefficiency. Energise the demolition packs - load the excess *Penguin Dip* - all remaining issues of *The Scribblerist* - and are those back issues of *Meeting of Minds*? Now launch - IN THE NAME OF THE ALMIGHTY HIM!"

COMBAT: Holland fights Beaufort at Weymouth (40-30) and wins (MERCENARY STRIFE/Majority). Then, Courtenay comes along to fight Holland (Holland 40-30). TURN 5 EVENTS: non-events to Nixon and Ozog; ROYAL VISIT (ignored); non-event to Anderson; RELIGIOUS DIET (Percy to Wells); STORMS AT SEA (Le Michael to Douglas; Le Swan to Cardiff or Bristol, but if it lands in Bristol, it requires the permission of Knights of the High Sierra to move it out again)

QUESTION: "Can a ship pick up a passenger in the middle of a move and drop it off somewhere else later in the same move?"

ANSWER: No; pickup occurs at the beginning of a move, and dropoff at the end. However, if a ship and a noble(s) end their regular move in the same port, the ship can use a Free Move to transport the passengers (which are allowed to land at another port). Note that only one Free Move is needed to move ship and picked-up passengers.

SPECIAL ANNOUNCEMENT

There were some complaints last year that the scoring system did not take into account the number of rounds played in the tournament - a tournament with 2 rounds was treated "the same" as one with 4 rounds, despite the latter being "a truer test of a player's diplomatic skills". After working on a number of ideas, I have come up with a rating system that takes into account the number of rounds played, while not giving this factor too much of a weight to the rating. This system will be used for the 1990 IDTR ratings unless I get serious objections and/or change recommendations. The new system is the same as the current system except that the number of points given to the winner of a tournament is equal to the square root (rounded down) of:

7.5 x N if there are two rounds in the tournament;

10 x N if there are three rounds in the tournament;

12.5 x N if there are four or more rounds in the tournament

where N is the number of persons in the tournament. (Subsequent places still score 80 percent of the next-higher place.)

CHARACTERS (All players got their first choice, except the one that selected the Philosopher, as I found it too hard to enforce the "show the next Adventure card" rule in simultaneous play)

Pierce: **WARRIOR**

Hopcroft: **SWASHBUCKLER** - when the Swashbuckler wins a combat, his extra turn comes in the next PBM turn

Dorneman: **WIZARD**

D. Hanson: **MONK**

R. Hanson: **CENTAUR** - as some of you do not have the expansion sets, here are his special abilities:

- 1) Always safe in the forest
- 2) Add up to two (after the die roll) to each movement die
- 3) May fire a bow in Outer or Middle regions (must be fired in the same region as the Centaur) at any character, face-up enemy, or stranger, up to 3 spaces away, instead of a normal encounter. This is treated as a combat; the Centaur does not lose a life if he loses a bow combat.
- 4) The Siren has no effect
- 5) When encountering another Centaur, roll a die; if the roll is more than the encountered Centaur's strength, that Centaur becomes a follower until the next combat

QUESTIONS ASKED: Jim Goode wants to know if someone other than the President of a corporation can send in operating orders. Yes; according to HR 6, anyone with a corporation's stock can send in operating orders for that corporation, and if the president does not send in operating orders, the person with the most stock in that corporation (among the persons sending in orders) has his orders used.

Dick Martin wants to know if NMR deposits that are taken away are "restored" every time the GM delays the game due to a GM error. There was a policy in LOM that gave sub credit for players in games delayed by GM errors (assuming they didn't NMR that turn) - for example, a player in 2 games got half of that issue's price back if one game was delayed or the entire price if both were delayed (in the old days, this was not uncommon - right, Rich?). If anyone makes a reasonable request for a credit because of delays, sub credit will be given.

K ЯЕМЛИН " AIN'T MISBEHAVIN' ", TURN 2A - All aboard the Siberian Express

CURE: RNM declares 1 on Boremtodev (K) and sends him to the sanatorium.

Aging: Aparatschik (A) ages 3 to 87, Protsky (E) ages 3 to 78, Manjak (P) ages 1 to 63, Boremtodev (K) ages 2 to 68, and Satin (O) ages 1 to 63.

PURGE: OLM declares 3 on Satin (O).

KGB head Krakembeds (E) successfully purges, in order, Protsky (U), Putschnik (Y), Wasolin (Z), Nogoodnik (V), Boremtodev (K), and Purgemoff (F) - and note each die roll was at least two above the minimum needed to purge. The purged politicians go to Siberia; Boremtodev comes out of the sanatorium, and *all declared IP on these politicians is lost*. As a result of the six purges, Krakembeds ages 6 to 84.

SPY: As Defense is vacant, Foreign chief Manjak (P) closes the investigation on himself (remove "?") and ages 1 to 63.

HEALTH: Aparatschik (87++) rolls 14 and dies; Krakembeds (84++) rolls 10 and dies; Manjak (63) rolls 1 and becomes 63++; Satin (63+) rolls 4 and becomes 63++.

Agents of the Okhrana have been dispatched to arrest these dangerous individuals in order that they may be dealt with in an appropriate matter. The spectre of communism will soon be dispelled from the USSR. Long live the Tsar!

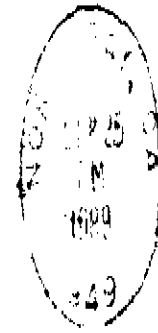
