# Recipe of the Month



Title: Cat Poop Cookies

CHOCOLATE INGREDIENTS

1/2 c Honey 2 c Flour, whole wheat

1/3 c Cocoa powder 1 ea Egg

1 ts Vanilla

2/3 c Butter or marg

Grape-nuts(tm) cereal (opt)

GINGERBREAD INGREDIENTS

1/4 c Honey 1 ea Egg

2 1/3 c Flour (whole wheat)

1/4 c Molasses

2/3 c Butter or marg

SPICES

Ginger

Grape-nuts(tm)cereal

Cloves to taste

Cinnamon

MIX-INS

Coconut(tapeworms)

Cooked spagetti(roundworms)

Chocolate chips

Corn

Peanut butter chips

Butterscotch chips Peanuts

I seldom measure carefully so amounts may need adjustment, especially on flavoring. The cookies are dense and not very sweet, this is necessary so that they will keep their shape during baking. If you use white flour or sugar they may be tastier but they won't look like shit.

TO MAKE: microwave the honey till it bubbles(about 1 minute). add the butter, (i've been told using lard makes for a more realistic texture and softer cookie) and the molasses, if any. Add the egg, mix well, then mix in all the other stuff. Add mix-ins of your choice to some or all of the batter.

Chill 1 hour in the freezer or several hours in the fridge. Roll dough logs of random length and the diameter of cat poops. Roll logs in grape-nuts and bake at 350 degrees till done(maybe 10 to 15 minutes but with my flaky oven you

never know).

SERVE in a disposable cat litter box on a bed of grapenuts, with a cat litter scoop. I hear you get lovely effects by decorating the box and scoop with melted chocolate or pudding. I imagine brown sugar might work as a substitute for the new clumping litters, but i havent tried it.

Most of my hobby information comes from <u>Diplomacy World</u> and <u>Maniac's Paradise</u> so I usually don't have much to work with. I like to only comment on stuff I see first hand and since I don't see much, I have nothing to say.

Despite all the positive feedback I got from people telling me to publish, I don't think this hobby values honest feedback when comes to its publishing efforts. This hobby's idea of criticism is a mutual admiration society in which people just say how wonderful everyone else is---see Larry Perry for more on this. Unless, of course, you don't agree with the prevailing hobby attitude and actually critique someone's zine honestly, then you will be critiqued for daring to break up the hobby brotherhood.

Given all the controversy I usually stirred up with my brutally honest opinions, I was quite content to let things stay that way. All of this changed on Saturday, August 16 when Phil Reynolds's, who I thought had become the hobbies 90's version of Tom Nash, new zine Ishkibible landed in my mail box. I decided if I can't write what I want to write about in my subzine, what's the point so here goes....

Phil has attempted to start or started and failed with zines several times. Basically he had the same problem I had with my last subzine---I wanted it to be all things to all people. I wanted to run games, not just any games but big Dip variant types. I wanted a big letter column with lots of interaction between myself and the subscribers. I wanted at least a couple of articles or essays every month. I wanted...well, you get the idea. Phil wanted the same thing for his zines but after a few, or at most, six months of this you are burned out trying to keep up such an effort.

<u>Ishkibibble</u> is suppose to be small, manageable and timely, just like <u>Akrasia Phil's last effort</u>. Phil says he is trying for more of a <u>Cheesecake</u>, Andy Lischett's well-known timely

warehouse style zine. My concern is Phil is still saying he wants to run variants and have a small letter column. Phil does say he will only do articles and letters if he has time before the deadline. Phil does realize he has done this before so he is offering all of his players a free one year subscription (and he is apparently not taking anyone to just sub since he doesn't mention a sub price for non-players anywhere.)

The zine will run with deadlines on the last Monday of the month. There are openings in Diplomacy, Balkan Wars, Mitotic Dip (Phil's own variant where units clone themselves in their own space instead of being built back in home supply centers) and Power. Power is a non-Dip game that looks like Risk with more rules. If you want to play in any of these games send a preference list to Phil Reynolds at 2896 Oak St. Sarasota, FL 34237.

Brad Wilson came out with another issue of <u>Vertigo</u>, one of my favorite all-time zines that has been MIA for the last few years. Brad has interesting articles on his move to Easton, PA and his trips to New York city. His hobby column, From the Crow's Nest, is worth the price of the zine alone if you are looking for new zines to play in. And the usually Brad review of the last several hundred CD's he has listened to.

Brad, while not the greatest GM in the hobby (and he would be the first to admit this) does have an eclectic collection of players---mostly hobby old farts, but nice collection nonetheless. He has openings in Regular and Gunboat Dip. He's also has openings in his own home grown design, Philly Dip and Fictionary Dictionary

### THE CHEAP SEATS

THE MOVIE/BOOK/GAME REVIEW SECTION OF <u>YOU AND WHAT ARMY???!!!</u>
Remember the rating system is from 1 to 10 stars.

The Cable Guy: This is a reprint from last month as I forgot to put a rating on it. A weird movie where Jim Carrey plays a deranged cable guy who stalks his customers. His customer is played by a totally confused Matthew Broderick. I liked the movie mostly because it was impossible to figure what was going to happen next. It had a definite darkness in the background of the movie like. I give it 7 stars.

<u>Clueless:</u> A cute movie of a snobby, shallow teenager girls life in LA. The movie was light weight but throughly enjoyable. Tom Swider brought it over because the trainer he is working with in Texas is a lot like the main character---Cher---in the movie. I give it **6 stars**.

<u>Fierce Creatures:</u> This was John Cleese's remake of <u>A Fish Called Wanda</u> with Jamie Lee Curtis, Michael Pallin and Kevin Cline back but playing different roles. The movie is the usual farcical type of picture we've come to expect from Cleese. I liked Cline's double role of that of the bumbling son and of the ruthless, bullying media empire mogul who buys a zoo. Pallin plays his usual role of the animal-loving, know-it-all nerd and Cleese is the ex-TV producer who happens to be assigned to bring profits up to their 20% return. Curtis plays a career driven beauty who is holding off Kline's advances.

If you saw Wanda you know what Cleese can do with animals and the type of embarrassing situational humor he has been famous for since his Python/Faulty Towers days on the BBC. There are several gags involving Cleese being overheard on the phone by Curtis and Kline as he calls the animals by their female names. I give it 8 stars.

<u>Dead Man Walking:</u> This movie is based on a real life Catholic nun's book on her experience consoling a death row inmate. Unlike most movies on the death penalty, this movie didn't attempt to hide either side from the viewer. You heard from the guilty party, but also from the victims parents and families as well. The director also did a nice job of pacing the movie so that it moved along nicely.

Susan Sarandon and Sean Penn were excellent in their roles of the nun and the condemned prisoner. Both gave their characters a full fleshing out and neither was completely predictable. I was surprised at how both characters were able to move me throughout the movie. I give it 9 stars.

<u>High School High:</u> This is another wacky movie that Jon Lovitz stars in and is in the character of the movies made by the other <u>Saturday Night Live</u> alum, Chris Farley, currently making movies. Basically, this sheltered private school teacher is trying to get away from his father who owns and runs the private school so he gets a job at the toughest high school in the city.

The plot was complete predictable and the characters were completely two-dimensional, but then anyone watching this movie looking these characteristics in these type of nmovies has a problem to begin with. The movie was plotted nicely and most of the jokes were amusing. Worth a rent but I am glad I didn't pay six bucks to see it in a theater. I give it 6 stars.

Mother: This is Albert Brooks latest movie with Debbie Reynolds as Albert's mother. The plot is fairly straight-forward. Brooks has just gone through his second divorce and believes his problems with women come from his relationship with his mother. In an attempt find out what's wrong with his relationship he moves back home with his mother and puts his old room back the way it was when he was a child.

The interaction between Reynolds and Brooks is hilarious most of the time and found he had captured many of the behaviors that my own mother has that drive me nuts. Brooks also has a happily married younger brother who is a sports agent. The interaction between the brothers is also quite amusing. Friends star Lisa Kudrow makes a small appearance in the movie as Brooks date. She, of course, plays a dizzy blonde. I give it 9 stars.

Absolute Power: Another movie about the Presidency of the United States---this time our President is a rather weak man with a penchant for chasing the ladies. Sound familiar? The writers are now getting their ideas from the National Inquirer instead of the Washington Post. Clint Eastwood gets caught behind a one-way mirror and watches the President kill the wife of one of his biggest contributors.

The rest of the movie is Eastwood running away from the Secret Service and the cops with the only piece of physical evidence. Unfortunately I can't rate this movie as Tom Swider called me in the middle and I only saw the first half hour and the last fifteen minutes.

Relic: One of Marie's horror movies that wasn't that scary as it was very predictable and the characterization was none existent. The plotting was okay but it just wasn't anything special. I wasn't as disappointed as Maria was but then I didn't can't say that there is any reason to watch the movie. I give it 3 stars.

Event Horizon: Maria and I saw this last week. I like the premise of this movie. Basically a space ship uses magnetic fields to try and bend space to get around the speed limit of relativity, i.e. the speed of light. It is a thriller with a science fiction background as the rescue ship tries to figure out what happened to the crew.

Maria loved movie but I didn't find it scary and felt let down by the ending. Basically I liked the idea of what happened to the crew but very little time was spend on that an I felt cheated by that. I give it 5 stars.

Knightmare Chess: This is a Steve Jackson collectable card game that Tom picked up the Complete Strategist in King of Prussia. Basically you get to "buy" cards from the deck. Then you draw five cards and you can play this after your turn. They allow you move certain pieces in new ways (pass through your own pieces, move to another color squared, move again, etc., etc.) The art work is quite good and enjoyed the game. Winning didn't hurt my enjoyment in the least. However the game costs only \$15.00 and Tom picked up beautiful stone chess set for only \$25.00 in Texas.

I recommend the game as it also makes it more fun to play with people who are not at the same level of play. Steve Jackson also makes the point of encouraging people who go to his web site (www.sjgames.com) to buy from their local game stores. I like that kind of hobby responsibility from a game publisher. I give it 10 stars.

1 pound Ground Beef or Turkey (I use Prevolone use Turkey)

2 Eggs

3/4 cup Bread Crumbs

3/4 cup Bread Crumbs

3/4 cup Parmesan Cheese

1/4 cup BBQ Sauce or Tomato Sauce

Small Onion 2-3 cloves Garlic

2 ½ pounds red potatoes

Sour Cream (I use low fat)

1/4 cup Milk (I use skim)

Garlic & Onion Powder

Black Pepper

2 tbs Butter/Margarine

Before I begin, a word of warning, I do not use a "recipe" for making Meat Loaf and Mashed Potatoes, and it is rarely the same twice in a row as I change things. This is a rough estimate of ingredients and how much of each. You can of course add or leave out any ingredients you wish, i.e. I sometimes add mushrooms, and/or cooked carrots, or even peas.

- Step 1 Make sure you have everything you need BEFORE you start. If you don't you could find yourself eating something not quite right. Wash your hands, as you will be using them and lord only knows where they've been.
- Step 2 Dice/chop bell pepper, onion and garlic (I suggest very small pieces). For convience you may want to cut the potatoes at this time as well. Wash them well, and cut out any bad spots (you can peel them if you want, I don't as I like chunky mashed potatoes, and the skin is where all the healthy stuff is). Cut in chunks of about 1 or 2 inches, and put in the correct size pot (they should fit loosely, have room at the top), fill with water and pour off, then fill again (make sure water is "over" the potatoes). Turn on oven to 350 degrees!!
- Step 3 In a medium to large size mixing bowl put meat, Parmesan cheese, sauce, eggs, bread crumbs, onion, garlic, bell pepper, and a couple of dashes oregano, basil and parsley. Using hands mix throughly, this is important.
- Step 4 Put half the meat in a pan (I prefer using a regular small square pan, about 6" X 6" and 1 ½ " deep, or even a small rectangle one, but you can use a loaf pan) spread evenly, and layer half of the cheese slices on it, put the rest of the meat on top and spread evenly. Put meat in oven. Depending on which pan you used, and how well done you like your meat, cooking time is about 1 hour to 1 ½ hours (loaf pan takes longer). Turn burner on under the potatoes if you didn't do so before mixing the meat mix.

  Step 5 OK, time has gone by and the meat is just about cooked and potatoes are soft. Put the last of the cheese slices on top of the Meat Loaf, and turn the oven off. Pour water off of the potatoes and either in the same pot, or if you want more to wash, a bowl, mash the potatoes (either by hand, or mixer whichever you prefer). While mashing add milk and 4 ounces sour cream (I don't use fat, but if you do add the butter or margarine first) also put in a couple dashes garlic and onion powder and pepper (if potatoes are too dry add more sour cream until they are the consistency you want).

That's it, except for Vegies, and that's up to you.....

### Free Associations and Freudian Slips

THE ESSAY SECTION OF YOU AND WHAT ARMY???!!!

This month's essay concerns the size of the US armed forces as we go into the 21<sup>st</sup> century. Currently the US has a two major regional conflicts (MRCs in Pentagonize) force. Basically that is three Marine divisions, ten Army divisions, 10 carriers groups and 10 Air Force fighter and 8 bomber wings.

The rational behind this force to be able to take on Saddam Hussein on Iraq and a Kim Il Sung in North Korea at the same time. This a come down from the Cold War high force of about 18 Marine and Army divisions, 25 bomber/fighter Air Force wings and 25 carrier groups. In addition there have been major cuts in the US strategic forces and there are problems in acquiring and building new weapon system that were procured at the height of the Cold War.

The Air Force, for example, is still developing its new TFX fighter that is the successor to the F-18, the current fighter used by the Air Force and Navy or the Navy's new Seawolf attack submarine. In a bi-polar environment where the one superpower is competing directly with another one it makes sense for the US to pay large sums of money for Research & Development (R&D) on all major weapon systems, i.e. tanks, fighters, submarines, missiles, etc., etc. The current atmosphere is a much different uni-polar one with no direct pressure on the US.

Actually deploying weapons in this environment is a waste of resources and money. The weapons should be developed on a limited basis but most should not be deployed and we must not allow readiness of our forces be hampered by this.

In fact there has been an ongoing debate in the international relations field over how the US can conserve this moment---i.e. remain the lone superpower---or even if the US should attempt to try prolong this situation. Much like nineteenth century Britain--the US finds itself the chief defender of the world order. The hegemonic power, in this situation certainly has the most to lose should their be any change in the power structure of the current world order.

This brings me back to my original question---what type of force structure does the US need to defend its interest. Being a believer in realpolitik, I believe that the US needs less power, not more, as more power will on presents a threat to the rest of the world. In fact, there is an interesting article in the current issue of International Security

Basically the question the author asked was would realpolitik predict in a uni-polar world. The expectation is that an anarchic system---like the current international system---a dominate power should generate a coalition against it. The reason the US hasn't generated one is due to its lack of threat to any other power or region.

Currently the US has one army division in South Korea, one marine division in Japan and two army divisions in nominally deployed in Germany. I say nominally, because one is part of Task Force Eagle, which is the US peacekeeping force in the Bosnia and one battalion is deployed to Macedonia on its border with Serbia. Thus in reality the US has one division in Germany minus one battalion and another in Serbia, since Task Force Eagle is about the size of a division.

The US only needs a token presence in Europe and one division in Japan. I believe that any country with an economy the ten times the size of its primary regional foe, as in the case of South Korea versus North Korea, doesn't need the protection of US. There is no compelling military threat in Europe at the present time. The threat in the Far East is more immediate but still would take weeks, if not months, to develop.

Given this background the US should cut back to two Marine, six Army divisions with 8 fighter/7 bomber wings with eight carrier groups. This force would be sufficient to meet any sudden threats and the US does have the capability to mobilize more forces. This has been US strategy for its history up to and including World War II. While I don't think we should wait as long as we did in either world

war, however, I don't think that means we should have to maintain a military establishment that is as large, in monetary terms, as the next six powers combined as the US military establishment is today.

The US can also cut back its nuclear forces—although the Russian Duma is stalling on approving START II, mostly because of Russia's refusal to come to terms with its lost superpower status—the Russians will be cutting back their nuclear forces. Unilateral US cutbacks will encourage other nuclear powers to continue their own cut backs, as France did last year when they took their ICBMs out of service. The US simply has no reason to maintain 3000 strategic nuclear delivery vehicles (START II doesn't cover warheads, merely their modes of transport) as I simply don't see any enemy that presents type of threat

Glen McMaster 8/23/97: Thanks for your comments on Germany and Austria's critical roles in the outbreak of WWI. Just as a reminder, WWI was not caused by Austrian sponsored terrorists running around Europe murdering family members of the Tsar, it was cause by Russian directed military mafias trying to undermine Habsburg authority by murdering Austrian royalty through front-men in Serbia.

The reason that I said Germany was a attacked on a silly pretext is because England, allegedly a peace loving power, backed a revisionist terrorist state (Serbia) with full force of arms. If England loves peace why does she said with the power which committed the act of war at Sarajevo? If is's because of her devotion to her allies, why on Earth does she not sternly warn Germany when Germany first began discrete enquiries on Britain's position in a war (this had happened by July 12<sup>th</sup>.) And if Russia didn't use the crisis as a pretext, why did she commit a hostile act by commencing mobilization at Germany 3 days before Austria declared war on Serbia. (Actually to be technical, Russia had started mobilizing at Germany in February 1914, not July.) And if France didn't use Sarajevo as a pretext, please explain to me why Paris

started mobilizing July 29<sup>th</sup> without a whimper of a protest to Russia?

Shouldn't the proper response of the three Entente powers to jointly warn Germany, but NOT mobilize? Of course it is, but if they did that Germany would have ceased support of Austria ans as England you can't very well wipe out those pesky Krauts off the face of the Earth if you keep allowing them to escape the traps, can you?

Was Russia in charge of Serbia's terrorist? I am not sure, there was sympathy among the Slavophile Russia military but that doesn't mean they supported them. As for being revisionist—Austria was as revisionist as Serbia if not more so, after all, who annexed Bosnia and Herzegovina in 1909 and precipitated the last crisis? I believe that was Austria.

All of these "hostile acts" were in response to Austria's ultimatum to Serbia. If Germany or Austria were so concerned with other powers mobilizing they shouldn't give out ultimatums. As for specific reasons, Russia refused to be humiliated again as she had been in 1909 by Austria's annexation I mentioned above. France mobilized in response to Germany's demand that she pledge her neutrality and hand over several forts like Metz and Strasbourg or face a German attack. (Now you want a plan that demands war with certain powers check out the German plan. France HAD to be conquered before Russia and if the French weren't going to cooperate by declaring war the Germans would ensure that with their outrageous demand.) I will address England later in this letter.

As for warning Germany and not mobilizing---yes in an ideal world, perhaps that is what they should have done, but you have to stop assuming that all powers act in concert with perfect knowledge of what other powers are doing or trying to do. Emotion, stupidity and just dumb luck, often play a role in history.

Methinks England's protest of innocence look a little strained. After all, why is London stalling on delivering those Turkish dreadnoughts in May? How do they know an opportunity to seize them will be coming soon? (Of course, when juxtaposed against Russia's continuous "trial" mobilizations starting in

February, whose troops are never demobilized, it looks fairly sinister.) And why do they commit an act of war against Turkey by seizing the ships on July 28<sup>th</sup>, a day in which England is supposedly was still the neutralist mediator.

Given England's dependancy on the sea, did you really expect the English, once the crisis began, to simply deliver battleships to possible unfriendly powers. I don't see this as directed against anyone but simply prudent. I bet Krupp and Skoda works in Germany and Austria respectively stopped making any artillery for the Entente powers or possible Entente powers

As for the ships being from May, I think there were some delays in completing the gun turrets due to Royal Navy needs but I hadn't heard they were actively delaying the ships. After all, if the British were that upset at the Turks they could have refused to build the dreadnoughts. (Of course, the Germans would have probably loved to do the job to cement relations with the Ottomans.) Also don't confuse neutrality with a refusal to act in the nations best interest.

I'd like to hear more about these "trial" Russian mobilizations as I haven't heard of them before and I'd like to hear more.

The French blueprint for victory was Plan 17. The curious feature of this document is that they are completely confident in it for success, and that it fails to address any naval considerations whatsoever. When all of France's forces are attacking east, how does Joffre intend to defend his ports from invasion that would have an undefended march to Paris? And should the Germans violate Belgium, we see that the French are confident they will win the war by isolating the right wing of the German army in Belgium. How does Joffre intend to isolate the German right wing in compliance with Plan 17 if he hasn't earmarked a single soldier to occupy the Channel ports in Belgium and all his troops are deployed well away from the sea?

Why do the French need to address naval considerations? There is no way the Germans could evacuate five armies by sea. The Germans do not have the sealift capability to land troops in France and British won't let ANY battlefield sail into the Channel or control the Belgian coast line.

Obviously he is counting on England to protect his coast and seal the right wing of the German army of the sea. Since Plan 17 was the only plan, we know he had been assured of the Royal Navy by May of 1913. We can further prove this by a quick analysis of England's diplomacy. This is because if England is committed to Plan 17 instead of Belgian neutrality, her diplomacy to Germany will look somewhat different. Namely, should England actually have been concerned only for Belgium, then England will have warned Germany in no uncertain terms not to invade Belgium, and have done so by no later then July 26<sup>th</sup>, when Germany came asking on England's position officially.

Should England have been committed to Plan 17, than she must do two things, one is be evasive on any commitment to Belgium (the French PREFER that the Germans violate Belgian neutrality) until Germany has

invaded. Two, she must create a pretext to cover her commitments to Plan 17 in case Germany either does not invade Belgium, or the Belgians do not contest the Germans, and thereby there is no Belgian-German conflict. (Should the Belgians not contest the German army, it would be TOTALLY up to the Royal Navy to isolate the Germany right wing in accordance to the French war plan as Antwerp and other ports would be wide open.)

First the French did have a plan as late as 1905 to invade Belgium to get to Germany. Authored by Joffre successor, General Michael, it was called Plan 9 (no, the French aren't very creative with their military plan names.) It called for a thrust into Belgium to get to the Ruhr. The British said that couldn't support ANY country who violated Belgian neutrality so the French dropped the plan and went to Plan 17.

Second, the English don't need an excuse, or even Belgian resistance, to stand on a treaty from 1832. Clearly anyone who can read a map can see the English interest in who controls Antwerp.

Third, while it would have been nice if all powers sent unmistakable messages to each other but remember what I said about luck and stupidity in history.

As can be seen through Albertini's work, it was not until less than three hours before England declared war on Germany that Germany knew for certain that Belgium was war. Also, we see on August 1<sup>st</sup> Grey implementing the contingency pretest to ensure the Royal Navy covered its duties in accordance to Plan 17, specifically, France was guaranteed by Grey that the British navy would protect the French coast. The moral basis of the pretest was bogus (fear not my French friend of Dieppe, we in England love you and will die to protect you! What? Your from Paris? Oh, well, screw you then!) A moral commitment cannot be defined so finely as this and thus we can discard Grey's rational for the move.

Thus England's diplomacy matches a military commitment to Plan 17, not Belgian neutrality. Grey had told Germany on numerous occasions that he wasn't linked to France militarily, and now we can conclude for certain that he was lying. Since this is only could be to ensure war, it is shown that England is guilty of causing WWI.

England is a messy constitutional monarchy and they tend to be slow in making decisions because the need to debate things. What Grey told the Germans was that there was no firm alliance between France and England, not that England would not react to events on the continent.

Yes it would be nice if Germany got more notice of England's willingness to stand by its treaty with Belgium but if England signed a treaty in 1832 so they could destroy Germany in 1914---I'd be quite surprised. And I expect more proof than this of such a sweeping indictment.

### Mexico In Transition, 1810-1876

The differences between Spanish Mexico and post-Independence Mexico are striking. The former was a well-ordered colony with an established place in a world empire, while the latter was an unstable country facing an uncertain future as a new nation. These differences are most evident in population elements, the military, how the country was governed and the realm of finances. In Spanish Mexico, the populace owed their allegiance to one central figure - the King of Spain. This overshadowed regional or institutional fealty and gave each individual a common bond. Also, each had a sense of community with the entire populace of the Spanish Empire, including other nearby Spanish holdings.

A strongly entrenched caste system, with the native population segregated and exploited, provided stability to Spanish Mexico. Each individual knew their place in society and their role, providing a secure environment for daily activity. The natives provided a cheap labor pool for many activities.

The military of Spanish Mexico was one of tradition and professionalism. Well trained and led, the military's lineage could be traced back hundreds of years. The resources available from other nearby Spanish lands enhanced the local capabilities of the army and its ability to respond to a crisis quickly.

Further, the presence of the Spanish army limited the potential for foreign invasion. By attacking Mexico, an aggressor would not only have to contend with indigenous forces; but also the resources and military might of a world-spanning empire. Only the major European powers could hope to be successful in such a venture.

Similar to the traditions of the military, the Spanish bureaucracy had their own established legacy. Well-versed in running a colony they provided to the Empire an efficient means of managing the land and exploiting the resources of Mexico. Granted, many individuals bought their positions and, had as their primary goal, the acquisition of personal wealth. However, they still provided the Empire with competent service and gave the local populace an ever-present reminder of the Spanish Momarchy.

While Mexico was a colony, it had access to the resources and financial support of a world-spanning Empire. When it could not provide for itself, it could look to other colonies or Spain for assistance without acquiring a foreign debt or obligation. Internally, the Spanish had established a sound program for collecting funds to finance the colony and a surplus for the Monarchy. Efficient tax and tribute collection, market monopolies in industry and trade along with a well-organized exploitation of silver resources were instrumental to this program.

Spanish Mexico was a healthy colony, fitting in with the patchwork of the Empire. Resources flowed to Spain and Spanish holdings while Mexico provided a ready market for their goods, often in a circuitous route. Natural resources went to Spain and items manufactured from those resources were returned for sale.

Upon gaining independence, the common bond from being a part of Spain was shattered, leaving the country without a national identity. Many hallmarks that made Mexico a stable colony were removed (such as the bureaucracy), damaged (for example, silver mines and infrastructure) or destroyed (such as the minimal indigenous industrial base) during the battles of revolution.

One goal of the revolution was to make all individuals, whether native or immigrant, equal citizens in the Republic. While many who had been dominated by the upper classes in the caste system were pleased, prejudice was still ever present. It was especially pronounced when the poorly educated lower classes tried and failed to succeed in a society for which they were not prepared or trained.

The common Spanish bond was lost and not replaced with a strong Mexican identity. In the vacuum, the loyalty of the citizenry was given to regional or institutional affiliations. This created stress that many times fractured the country, undermining collective efforts issued from a distant government.

There was also an undercurrent of support for religious freedom, and an elimination of religious influence in politics by the Catholic Church. This further aggravated efforts to create a single national identity. It was a polarizing issue and, with some in the native population wishing a return to pre-Colombian religions, another factor in fueling prejudicial attitudes between individuals.

The well-ordered army of Spain was replaced by a homegrown one that drew it's roots from the countryside, not from a professional tradition. The allegiances of the individual units were often to their leaders, not to a central Mexican authority. Further, the rise of regional military forces under various caudillos, particularly in the periphery, stemmed from the immediate needs for protection that the army could not provide. However, they became rivals of the Mexican army for manpower and resources from those areas.

The new army was poorly trained and supplied, lacked modern equipment and was, for the most part, poorly led. This, coupled with the lack of an empire's military depth, allowed Mexico to be a victim of foreign intervention, internal revolt and conquest. Beginning with the Central American breakaway in 1824, followed by the Texas Revolution in 1835 and culminating in the Mexican-American War in 1846-8, Mexico lost half of its territory in just over two decades; while others became all but autonomous regions, such as the Mayan Yucat n. Interventions by England, France and Spain further eroded the strength of the military to protect the country and the faith of the Mexican populace in it.

The one arena where the military had a profound effect was in politics. Much of the standing army was concentrated around Mexico City and any national leader was at its mercy to remain in power. Numerous barracks coups took place when the current president could not satisfy the whims of the military leadership. Unfortunately, the Mexican army was not politically adept in supporting leaders. The revolving door that permitted Santa Anna to be removed from the presidency, time after time, just to be reappointed as the country's leader, is one example.

The Mexican government itself arose under similar difficult circumstances as did the army. Upon the withdrawal of Spain, the upper echelons of the bureaucracy left to Europe. The governmental apparatus that remained had little experience beyond the local or municipal level. Further, establishing a new nationwide bureaucracy took time, particularly with the size of the country. This allowed the formation of regional power-bases under the caudillos. In turn, these individuals resisted later efforts to be brought under a national system under which they would lose the power they had accumulated.

The heady days of revolutionary independence led directly into the difficult times of governing a new country. The initial Mexican leadership lacked a plan to forge a new nation. Coupled with sharp divisions between the conservatives, the liberals, and even monarchists, on the form the government would take further weakened efforts to create a new nation.

Another serious problem of the government was promoting an effective and popular leader. Santa Anna was the best known national figure; however his ineptitude from leading a superior army to defeat at San Jacinto to selling land to the United States to raise funds did more harm than good to the country. Few others had any national following; nor were many effective at implementing a nation-building program.

The finances of the new country were in stark contrast to the Spanish colony. Major areas of income from colonial times were seriously effected by the revolution. The nation was left with a large debt, a large army to support and cut off from the benefits of being a member of a secure trading Empire.

The economy was devastated, leaving many unemployed, which seriously eroded the tax base. Further, as all people in the country were equal citizens, tribute formerly collected was eliminated as funding. Thus, the direct source of government funds was minimal.

Silver mining operations were in ruins. Most mines were flooded and those that could still be opened had their supporting infrastructure destroyed. The war had also scattered the trained workers, either by conscription into the army or by emigration.

The elimination of the Empire's monopoly on trade opened Mexico to the world's free trade markets. Lacking a merchant fleet and industrial goods to trade; while having only resources to offer, Mexico was not in a beneficial trading climate. High tariffs to raise funds would only impede the development of the nation, which was dependent on foreign goods - particularily manufactured goods which were needed to establish an indiginous industrial base.

Many other aggravating problems hampered nation building. For instance, little industry had been situated in Mexico and most of it was destroyed during the revolution, leaving the country dependant on foreign purchases. Also, the Church held a large portion of the land, tax-free, and unexploited. This created a vacuum of "dead wealth" that did not contribute to the fledgling nation.

In seeking foreign investment to rebuild the country, Mexico was in a difficult situation. They were already heavily in debt from the revolution and they had lost access to previously beneficial Spanish investment opportunities. Further, they provided a poor investment risk, a risk that worsened as the political instability continued; and which threatened foreign intervention to recover the costs of previous obligations.

Mexico, in converting from a colony to a new nation, had a difficult path to forge. The primary areas of population factors, the military, government and financing the new nation all illustrated the serious problems faced by the country and which had been successfully resolved while a Spanish colony.

Unfortunately, each impacted on the next, compounding the problems in an ever worsening spiral. Low popular support of the government hindered tax collection leaving the country short of funds. Therefore, the army was underpaid and staged a coup against the leadership further eroding popular support.

Finally, in 1855, the liberals had control of the government and took positive steps to rectify the problems of the past. However, it took two years of legal reform and a new constitution, followed by three years of civil war to resolve the internal struggle. This was followed by five years of foreign occupation before the reforms could fully implement an effective government and a stable country.

# The Rise and Fall of the British Empire by Lawrence James

In amongst a number of items passed on to me by my grandfathers was a Pear's Soap Almanac. It was published in 1908, and, as a British publication, featured a particular conceit. The map of the World used the normal colour scheme, i.e. no two nations bordering each other were the same colour. Except: Britain and all the colonies and dominions were pink, lending a vast area of the map what would, 40 years later, seem a rather Communist tinge. This book is a look at that conceit, its origins and its more important effects.

Finding a middle ground in describing post-1066 British History is often very difficult. From the moment of William I's

first creation of a more-or-less unified Britain there has been a litany of domestic (Wales, Ireland, Scotland) and foreign struggle.

Historians generally fall to one side or the other of the divider between Imperialist supporter ("It did 'em bloody good to have a taste of British Law!") or anti-British fervour ("Let Englishmen fight England's wars.")

James has done a relatively good job of standing in the middle. His hope was to present the events of post-1600 British History as facts, and let a generous helping of references and quotes portray the contemporary sentiment.

Says James in his foreword:

"On this subject, I have been as careful as possible to sidestep the quagmire of post-imperial guilt, that particular angst which has troubled British and American intelligentsia for the past thirty or so years. Wherever possible I have avoided joining in those battles between armies of the night who contend over the rights and wrongs of empires. History cannot be unwritten or written in the subjunctive, and the wholesale application of late twentiethcentury values distorts the past and makes it less comprehensible. I have, therefore, left conquerors and colonists to speak for themselves, aware that their authentic voices may sometimes grate on today's sensibilities."

Those served best by this book will be readers seeking to understand the mentality of the British government that preached democracy at home whilst enforcing colonial rule on foreign peoples; that warred with Argentina over the Falklands; that ceded independence to Canada and Australia while clinging to dominion over Northern Ireland and the Home Countries.

Anyone with an agenda will find little against which to rail. James points to the

honourable and the execrable in all things.
On slavery:

"I was shock'd at the first appearence of human flesh exposed for sale. But surely God ordain'd 'em for the use and benefit of us: other his Divine Will would have been manifest by some sign or token."

The overall method of the book is to look at policy, thought patterns and opinion in Britain's leaders and populace. Most major events are given mere mentions. Waterloo, for instance, merits half a sentence on British economic policy in war versus that of France [Britain borrowed money from businesses and investors in exchange for bonds; France taxed the common man whilst the clergy and nobles were exempt.]

Somewhat problematic is the book's assumption that the reader is familiar with most of the personages that held sway in the events. While many are famous or at least familiar to the English reader they're not exactly household names to the common reader raised on an American schooling in History. Yet in most cases it is the quotes by these figures that best indicate British policy and attitude. Examples abound:

Admiral George Rodney on the hesitancy of British Naval commanders to engage French ships:

"I taught them to be what they had never been before - officers. Yours to obey. The painful task of thinking is mine."

King George II on being told that General James Wolfe was probably mad:

"Mad is he? Then I hope he will bite some of my other generals!"

Colonial opinions of the British changed as the Dominions (Australia, Canada, New Zealand) felt attached to Britain but wanted the link on their own terms.

"The Syndney Bulletin also denounced attempts to promote imperial consciousness in Australia as a plan to further Britain's selfish interests, and accordingly renamed Empire Day as 'Vampire Day'."

And of British sentiment towards colonials there is this discussion on the mass resignation of British oficers rather than disarm Ulster Volunteers during 1914:

called with direct "What was Incident the Curragh understatement (Curragh being the name of the camp where the first batch of resignations occurred) was a testament to the depth and passion of imperial loyalty within the army. They could not remain true to themselves if they made war against men who wished to remain part of the empire on behalf of those who wished to leave."

Overall, the book is a good introduction to British imperial policy from 1600-1900 and the decline of Empire from the Boer War to Thatcher's 1979 election. The book's concentration on events in America and the Caribbean for the first four chapters allows American readers to more easily assimilate the British view. When familiar events are read with the British slant applied it allows for an easier understanding of unfamiliar events in World history.

The Rise and Fall of the British Empire is not at its best as a source of historical fact or biography. It also fails to provide enough maps to allow knowledge of unfamiliar places and regions. Those maps it has are often bare and include too few of the relevant sites and cities. Rather it succeeds as an illustration of what made Britain tick, despite its isolation from the mainland, its weaker economy and its small population in regard to its rivals throughout It also well-demonstrates the history. mirrored view when all that was achieved was lost to emancipation, independence, rebellion and war.
