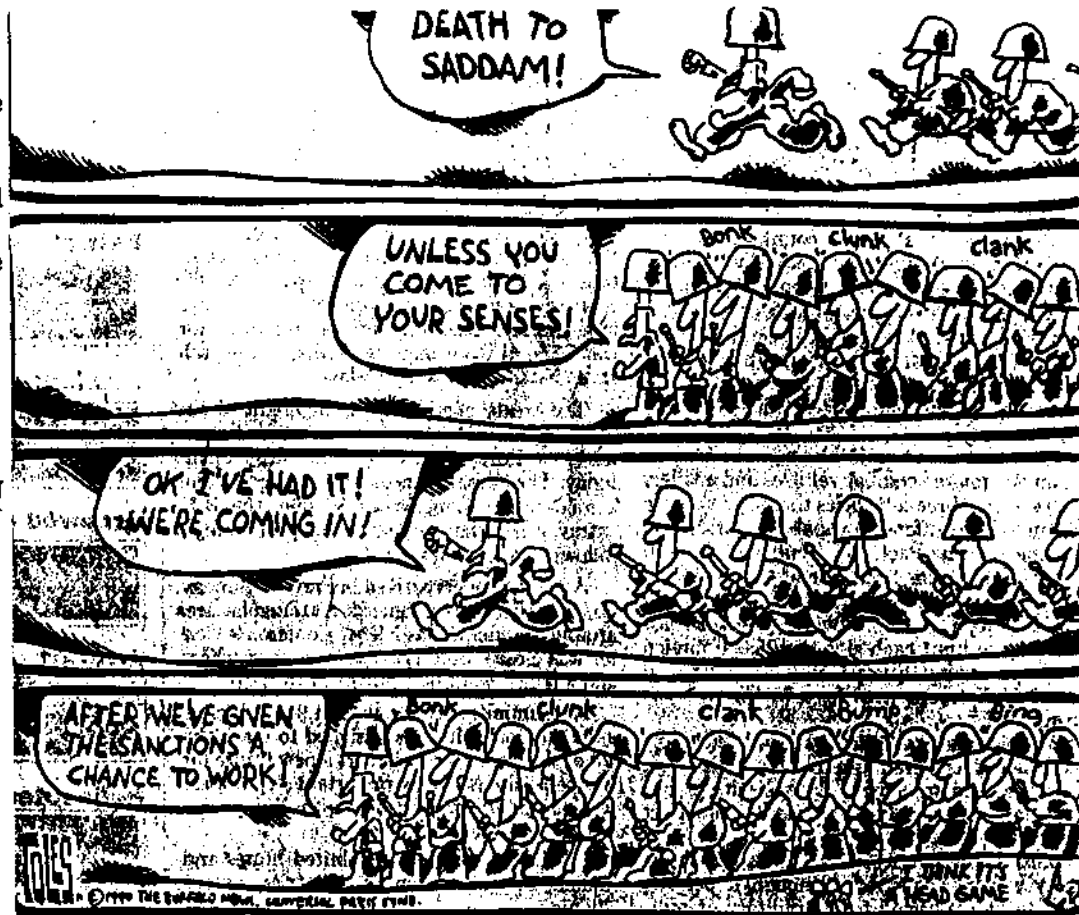

PAUL CHINNERY

I would put before the Congress a law making it illegal for any member of Congress to accept political contributions over \$5000 from any PAC and no more than \$2000 from any individual. This would also include a provision that a Congressman couldn't accept money for any political organization that would exceed those limits. (Alan Cranston got zillions from Keating for his various political groups.) Actually, I would like to see PAC's outlawed altogether. As a proviso to this law, I would also make it mandatory that during election years (during the time between a political convention and the election) television would have to provide, at cost, a certain amount of time to each candidate. 3. What is the best course of action for the US to take in the Persian Gulf?

ROBERT STIMMEL

Transfer the Palestinians to Kuwait and the Kuwaities to the West Bank. [[If that would happen I may be tempted to buy Iraqi War Bonds.]]

GARRET SCHENCK

The U.S. should withdraw its forces until a United Nations command can be set up. U.S. forces in the region should operate under the flag of the United Nations and not under a unilateral U.S. command structure. The United Nations, only, can authorize the international use of force, and by rights should command that force in furtherance of the aims and objectives of the world body, for the preservation of world peace. A force under U.S. command will inevitably seek further U.S. interests, rather than the lawful objectives of the United Nations.

Regardless of whether the U.S. is willing to put its forces in the Persian Gulf under the command of the United Nations, or will "go it alone" (perhaps in "coalition" with a bunch of other states depending mainly on our largesse for their continued survival), the U.S. people **MUST** insist that President Bush go to the Congress and obtain a declaration of war. It is unconscionable that he has not yet done so -- at the time of writing this letter it has been three months since Mr. Bush ordered troops into Saudi Arabia -- ample time to get a declaration of war if that is what the American people want. Why haven't we been consulted in this affair? Is Mr. Bush afraid that he would be repudiated by the U.S. people and their Congress? Our Constitution reserves to that body the sole right and responsibility to declare war. Mr. Bush, as President, is the commander-in-chief, yes, but that does not give him the right to unilaterally order troops into action against other states. Certainly not after three months have elapsed.

The founding fathers did not give the war making power to Congress as some sort of afterthought. Hadn't our nation just finished fighting a war of liberation against a despotic king, whose perhaps most heinous crime against our people was the fighting of unlawful wars without the consent of the governed? YES! The framers of the Constitution recognized the danger of allowing a single individual the right to declare war, and wisely left that perhaps most important of the functions of national government in the hands of the branch of government most accountable to the governed, the U.S. Congress.

We should not let Mr. Bush get away with this unlawful usurpation of the legitimate powers of the American people. If you find you have such disagreements with the Iraqi people that only a declaration of war will suffice, by all means let your representatives know. If, like myself, you hold no particular animosity towards the people of Iraq, no matter how repugnant their leaders, then you must petition your representatives in the Congress and demand that they reject any declaration of war against Iraq, and begin impeachment proceedings against Mr. Bush for his use of the armed forces of the U.S. in what would then be an illegal war. Remember that despite a surprise attack on our forces in Pearl Harbor, and ongoing and obvious threats to other U.S. forces around the world, President Roosevelt went to the Congress in December 1941 to request (and receive) a Declaration of War against Japan and Germany from that body. If Saddam Hussein is to equated with Hitler, then Mr. Bush owes the American people no less.

[[Very well thought out and spoken. However, let me add a few things from a regular guy's side of the street.

As for putting our forces under U.N. command, only if enough member nations are willing to put as many troops in the region as we have. Otherwise, its our show.

As to including Congress in the decision of policy in the Middle East, let me draw a parallel. When in school did you ever have to have (or were) the nerdy kid on your kickball team, and you knew he would be the one to blow the game for you? That's how I feel about Congress. Let them in and they are sure to muck it up.

However, it is the law, and it is Bush's responsibility to follow the law to the letter. In fact it would be to President Bush's advantage to include those on the Hill. Approach Congress and let them get their fingers in the pie. Should all go well, President Bush can say "See, I told you so". If all goes wrong, Bush can blame it all on Congress because, hey, he turned this over to Congress because of his misgivings. A classic no win solution for Congress.]]

PAUL CHINNERY

The Persian Gulf is becoming a really sticky mess. Bush adds 200,000 more men (or orders their deployment to the Gulf) and Hussein replies by throwing in another 250,000. Adding all those men to a limited front remind me of WW 1. Millions of men along the front led to a bloodbath of, up until that time, unprecedented proportions. Anybody who thinks a war in the Gulf would be quick is fooling themselves. Right now I support President Bush's movements in the Gulf. I am heartened by the fact that he is trying to build a concensus for military action before taking any. However, I think other nations (i.e. the French and the Russians) should become more militarily committed. The French have sent their Foreign Legion, at least. When I say the Russians should become more militarily committed I mean that they should put on a more threatening posture on Iraq's northern border. However, I still submit that limited air strikes, or a stand-off strike with cruise missiles, at certain military/industrial targets would send a definite message to Hussein and possibly threaten his control of Iraq. In conclusion, though, I would like to add that if and when Hussein falls let's not think we're going to get Mr. Goodguy to take over in Iraq. We will probably get somebody who will pull out (if Iraq hasn't already been shoved out) of Kuwait but I don't think we'll end up with somebody who's going to want to be a good neighbor. [[Unlike most, I do not think our casualties will be that great in a war with Saddam. Three reasons. The government has portrayed the Iraqis as giving no quarter and expecting none so when attacking Iraq proper it will be much easier to strike any targets we want with a lessoned fear of a press whiplash. Second, we will have superiority of the air. In this the Iraqis may have played into our hands. We only have so many of our expensive missiles we can use, then we must look toward more conventional means. With their fixed emplacements the Iraqis are begging for our inexpensive Iron Bombs. Third, I cannot see Iraq's greedy neighbors sitting on the fence while there is property to be gained. Also keep in mind that Iraq has oil futures that will be used for war reparations. Will Turkey sit by when they could gain economically and in the eyes of Europe? My guess would be that the Southern Front will start the attrition by air. On the Eastern Front, the Marines will load but not land, at least not for the first few weeks. This will however keep troops tied to the coast. Turkey will cross the border, as may Syria. I would not be surprised to see Iran follow up with an attack within a week. How long will Iraq be able to keep troops on every border? Greed is what started Saddam on his quest. His neighbor's greed will be his downfall. I also think it is absurd to give him a deadline to pull out. Will we

allow him to rape Kuwait until the deadline, and then pull back and refuse to pay for his injustices?]]

A few questions to ponder for next time:

1. Since Congress seems to be our favorite dumping grounds, what would be the best way to get these folks under control. My suggestion would be to limit terms to two and to cut back on spending, ie; mailing, aides, trips, etc. Anyone else have any ideas short of "a hangin"?

That's it for this months lengthy letter column, and what I consider one of the best. Many thanks to Tom, Paul, Garret, and Robert. Keep em' coming!

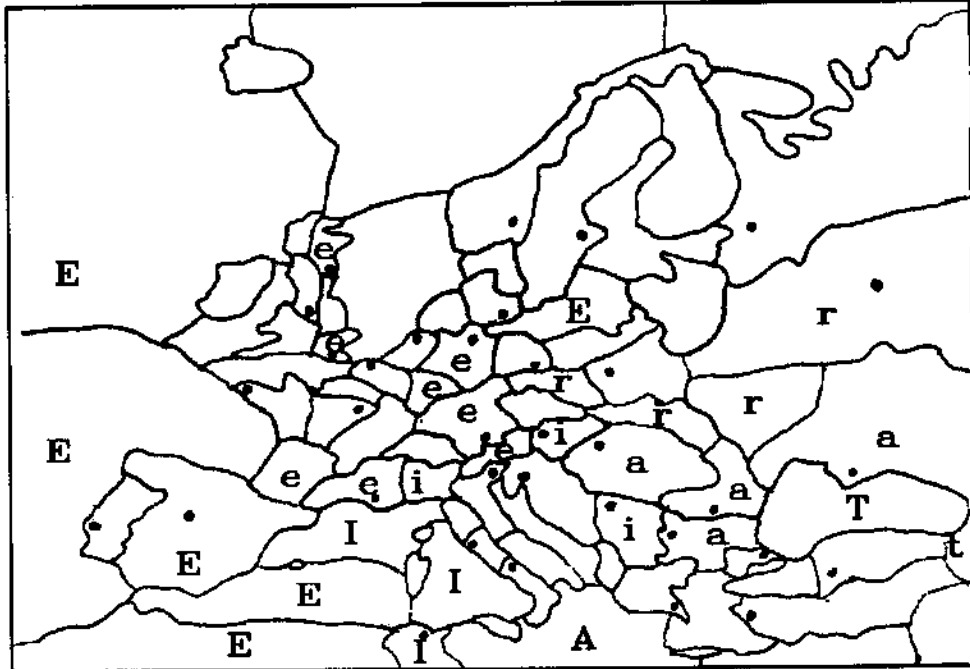

Bruce McClung: I had no idea that my remarks last month referring to "pro-life" demonstrators as obnoxious hypocrites would get people so hot.

I didn't actually get any threats upon my life, which I am thankful for. Considering the hypocritical nature of most pro-lifers, it was a distinct possibility. I did receive several responses, however. One of the most unusual being a critique on my use of grammar and punctuation that went on for four full typewritten pages!
