Shawn Erikson's <u>Victims Wanted</u> has announced its official fold. This was the first zine I ever subscribed to, and a fun place to play. The fold was not completely unexpected Shawn has been slowing down over the past year, and recently some of his old subscribers started disappearing. I haven't heard anything about rehousing the few games still going on there - I don't know if the players have any interest in continuing them.

Word on the street is that Tom Nash's <u>Been There</u>, <u>Done That</u> has officially bit the dust. Recently there's been a rash of Nash-bashing (hey, that was pretty cool, wasn't it?) and I'd like to take this opportunity to thank Tom for the hours of enjoyment I've gotten from reading <u>BTDT</u> and his issues of the <u>Zine Register</u>. I hope you hang around the hobby for a while!

Robert Stimmel: A list of teams which have won consecutive conference championships may be of interest. UC David (Northern Calif. Conf.) has 20 (starting in 1971). Central Arkansas (Ark. Conf.) has 8. Winston-Salem (Central I.A.A.) has 8 in its southern division (but lost play-off to north in 1989 and in some of the other years). Pittsburgh (KS) has won six (last two Missouri I.A.A., first four in Central States I.C.). Emory & Henry (Old Dominion) has six, but three were ties. Possibly Carroll (Mont.) (Frontier) and/or Carson-Newman (South Atlantic) have records, but they are NAIA, and I have their results for only last three years. Currently, Div. I-A and I-AA have no long streaks. Michigan U. has three (including a 4-way tie). Furman has three (one a tie). Others go no longer than two years.

<u>Paul Milewski</u>: Analysis of the information about games started in 1990 reported in issue #83 of the Boardman Number Custodian's publication <u>Everything</u> reveals the disproportionately high level of participation in the hobby on the part of relatively few people as measured by number of starting positions. For purposes of this analysis, all seventeen games started in <u>Electronic Protocol</u> were excluded. Those seventeen games represent 108 players, of whom three were crossover players from the play-by-mail side of the hobby and none of whom was from among the top twenty in starting positions. The games started in <u>Electronic Protocol</u> constitute a branch of the hobby distinct from the play-by-mail mainstream. Also excluded from this analysis was 1990HR (flyer, local, players not starting elsewhere). Had the BNC continued the past practice of identifying electronic-mail games as such, all such games might have been found to constitute a distinct branch and for that reason been excluded from this analysis, in which case the results might have been more dramatic than they were.

The 87 games included in the analysis represent 609 starting positions (87 X 7) distributed among the 357 players as follows:

Only 23 of the 87 games were without a top-twenty starting player. The 64 games with at least one top-twenty starting player were 73.6% of the 87 games. Those twenty people are only 5.6% of the 357 players starting in those 87 games.

Many of those twenty people publish their own zines, perhaps in part to support through trades their high level of participation in the hobby. Many of them are also active as standbys and play in more games that just those in which they start. By virtue of their high level of participation, these twenty people can be considered experienced, knowledgeable players.

[[If you truly want to do these calculations based on PBM, you must also remove all gamestarts in The Armchair Diplomat, the electronic zine from Compuserve. I skimmed through issue #83 of Everything, and counted 8 TAD gamestarts. Of the 56 positions in those 8 games, only one was held by a player in your top twenty (Tom Nash playing Turkey in 1990AP). This increases the percentage held by those players to 25.7 (142 of 553 starting positions), making their impact on the hobby that much greater. My numbers are just estimates - I didn't go through with any precision and calculate the results. Of course, heavy impact when playing equals just as heavy an impact when they burn out (for example, when Steve Sulzby dropped most of his games earlier this year).]]

(Oh no, not again!) Paul Milewski: In The Gamers Guide to Diplomacy, Rod Walker described how to use preference lists to assign countries to players. He wrote that "unique first choices are automatically given. Ties are decided by coin toss or lot. Those still without a country are given their second choices if available, repeating the process used for first choices," and so on, until everyone has a country. Breaking ties by coin toss or other arbitrary method is not the optimal method.

The example Walker used to illustrate his method was one with seven players submitting complete preference lists:

The unique first choices of players 1 and 4 were automatically given, so players 1 and 4 were Austria and France. By coin toss, players 3 and 7 became Turkey and England. Eliminating the four countries already assigned from further consideration, player 6 had a (now) unique first choice of Italy, player 5 got his second choice of Germany, and player 2 got what was left, Russia:

The idea is to give each player his highest choice possible. Assigning the value 1 to a first choice, 2 to a second choice, and so on, we are trying to minimize the sum of the values. The country assignments in Walker's example can be analyzed in that manner:

Is any switch possible that will reduce the objective function we are trying to

minimize? Yes, a switch between players 2 and 7. Russia was player 7's second choice, and England was player 2's first choice. That switch reduces the sum of values to 11, its minimum.

This result can be obtained relatively informally. Uncontested first choices: A to 1, F to 4. Cross out all A and F entries in the original table of preference lists. To resolve the tie between 3 and 6 for T: nobody else has I for 2nd choice, so I to 6 and T to 3. This leaves a 3-way tie for E as 1st choice: give R to 7 (2nd choice), G to 5 (3rd choice), E to 2.

The same result can be obtained formally, using a table of values (choices):

In that table, a unique first choice is a 1 in a column with only one 1 in it. Those are the A and F columns. Circle the 1 in each of those two columns and line out the rest of the row and column of which the 1 is a part (all of player 1's other choices are irrelevant). There being no other column with only one 1, look for a column with only one 2. That's the I column. Circle that 2 and line out the row and column. Now the T column has only one 1. Circle that 1 and line out row and column. Now there is no column with only one 1, but R has only one 2. Circle and line out. Now no column has only one 1 or 2, but column G has only one 3. Circle and line out. Player 2 is left with E. Solved.

It is an iterative process in which one looks for columns with only one remaining (or relevant) entry on integer n, starting with n=1 and incrementing by 1. Upon success, the integer n is reset to 1 and the iterative process repeated until all countries are assigned.
