VIENNA (TASK) The Austrian Yearbook Company today repossessed
 the Austro-Hungarian Empire for non-payment on the annual military
 yearbook. The managing director of the ~~company~~ company, Count
 Othenandott, announced that he was seeking pacts of mutual assist-
 ance with all nations, including the great state of Russia, but
 that he would not hesitate to liquidate the country as long as the
 company was paid. The Emperor and all other major government
 officials have not been heard of since the writ of seizure was
 executed. All propoganda has ceased on the theme of Austria being
 in the war to make the world safe for autocracy.

ELLIS ISLAND (SPECIAL) A mild disturbance occurred at the immi-
 gration station here this afternoon when a person named Franz
 Joseph von Haspburg struck an examiner. The apparent provocation

for the event was the questioning of the inspector of von Hapsburg's stating that his former occupation had been that of Emperor. The assailant, who seemed to be without any financial assets whatsoever, was held in the hospital on the island for observation. As he was led away he muttered (in German) "When I make the world safe for autocracy, you will all pay!!!!!"

(MOSCOW) - Comrade Hagelshawski is apparently pleased by the progress of the war in Eastern Europe. "We have met the enemy and he is ours!" said the Premier, quoting the famous Russian, General Ivan Petrovich Chekov (1813). When asked if Russian armies would stop advancing now that the borders are secure, the Premier repeated the words of Admiral Bartoi (1795) "We have not yet begun to fight." The Premier announced that a new secret weapon is about to be introduced into the war. He would not elaborate, but said only "This is the greatest achievement for mankind since the discovery of electricity by Pyotr Travinski in 1768."

(Naples) * The fleet set sail today after nearly 2 years in port. Tunisian corsairs last month captured seventeen Italian merchant ships. The present expedition reportedly has as its purpose "A continuing assurance that the sea lanes will remain open to all nations." The possibility of capturing new ships which the United States recently delivered to Tunis may also have been a factor. This marks the first time the fleet has set sail since it was defeated by the Prince of Lichtenstein's private yacht.

GEORGE POMPOUS DOO ELECTED PRESIDENT OF FRANCE

(Paris) - George Pompos Doo (Cons.) was elected President of France last fall (1900) in an extremely tight contest. Opposed by Hubert Humphrey Dumphy (lib. - Picardy), and third party candidate George C. Floorace (Ind. - Marseilles), Pompos Doo won the provinces of Paris, Gascony, Brest, and Burgundy, thus insuring victory. Humphrey Dumphy, prominent for his stand (or fall) on the Berlin Wall, captured his home province of Picardy, while Floorace, whose campaign emblems were black and white roses, separated of course, was victorious in his home province of Marseilles. Pompos Doo unexpectedly did well in the liberal provinces of Brest and Gascony, probably on his campaign slogan "Peace on the Seas", which is of special importance to these provinces. The Liberals swear revenge in 1904, but until then, France belongs to Pompos Doo.

(Radom, March 13, 1900): The Polish army suddenly appeared on the outskirts of this village at dawn. Without even stopping to loot or pillage (perhaps because this is still Polish territory), they pushed on. Rumor has it that General Neckolas Obuchowski, the only Communist in command of a whole army, is pursuing the kidnapper of his fiancé.

(St. Petersburg, March 14, 1900): The entire bureaucracy was shaken today (and you know what it takes to do that). The cause of the furor was the arrival of Winston Anderson's column in yesterday's London Times. It contained the most secret secrets of Anglo-German correspondence. Included in the documents revealed were the ominous phrases "an alliance immediate against Russia" and "a fake alliance with Russia." It has been decided that the Cossacks now in Moscow must be brought to St. Petersburg to protect it when the fleet goes.

(St. Petersburg, March 14, 1901, later): News reached the capital today of the march of the Polish into Galacia. It is feared that this action will disrupt what should have been a very productive peace talks with the Generals behind Kaiser Kukia and his wife Fran, the puppet leaders. The southern fleet has been dispatched to patch things up but it won't arrive in time. The kidnapper is rumored to be either a Serbian nationalist or a loud mouthed Turk.
