"Nominations should be sent to Larry Peery [Box 8416, San Diego, CA 92102 USA] by APRIL 1st. Nominations for the Walker Award may also be sent to Alan Stewart, #702, 25 St Mary St, Toronto, Ontario, Canada M4Y 1R2. Committee volunteers should contact me directly."

"Your participation and cooperation is requested."

From Paul Kenny (75A Maple Ave, Collingswood, NJ 08108) *Hello. Just wanted to respond to Doug Rowling's statement/question about RF shielding. I am no expert on this myself, but from what I understand, the problems are not really the RF signal, but other signals interfering with it.

[&]quot;Televisions are the most complicated piece of electronic equipment that most people will ever come in contact with. The problem is that there is more

than one type of signal rolling around and, while these signals are all different enough not to interfere with each other, they will sometimes superimpose on themselves once they reach their destination and do what they have to do."

"The worst violator of noise is just plain electromagnetic radiation. Of the biggest sources, one is from a part called the high voltage power supply, which has a large transformer and powers the $CR\bar{T}$ ((?)). The CRT

is the biggest source of EMF."

"As far as the signal-in goes, the problem is most likely going to be right at the antenna itself. Other signals are being propagated, and there is no way for the antenna to stop them. That is the job of the tuner. It has filters built in to onlylet in the signal you select. The tuner then

adds another frequency to help it go through the TV."

"The reason RF cables are shielded is to try and prevent the cable from acting like an antenna. I believe the reason the TV itself is shielded is to prevent it;s EMF from interfering with outside devices, like AM radios, computers, and all. I don't know of any plastics that can work as a shield, let alone transparent ones. That doesn't mean they don't exist, just that I haven't heard of them. Hey, this is worse with computers when line noise can change your data and, instead of putting info from your disk into your computer, you are putting in garhage. The rule here, as in RF cables -MAKÊ THE CABLE AS SHORT AS POSSIBLE."

"Trying to enclose a device to shield the outside from EMF has it's problems, one was mentioned, that of venting. The device will need air to keep cool, but the vent holes, even wire mesh, are large enough for wave lengths of very short distances, to "float" through."

"Well, I hope that didn't add to the confusion too much. Keep up the

good work!"
