AVALON HILL, THE HOBBY, AND YOU!

AN EDITORIAL

There have been a number of hints dropped lately regarding Avalon Hill, the new edition of Diplomacy, the gamebox flyer and a few other things. I think it's time to detail exactly what is going on with Avalon Hill and the

At Kansas City back in July, Rex Martin attended Dip-Con and had a number of interesting proposals. He told us that Avalon Hill was definitely going to be doing a new edition of Diplomacy and that they wanted some input from us as to how they (AH) could help us promote the hobby and thereby, the game. Rex has been a big fan of Dip from way back and has even played a few postal games, so he wanted us to know he was on "our side", as it were.

Basically, Avalon Hill was planning to repackage the entire game as a sort of 35th anniversary edition. We would see a return to the wooden blocks of old and no more little plastic armies and fleets. The board was going to be redone by the AH graphic artist staff. No more purple Russia! (As an aside, I would have liked to have seen the old Rand-McNally topographical map back, but I don't think AH has the rights

Two other features were of particular interest to the postal hobby and Rex wanted our direct participation.

First, Rex wanted a new postal Diplomacy flyer to go in the gamebox. The old one was outdated and AH wanted one that would be good for a number of years. It will either be an insert or, if Rex gets his way, the flyer will actually comprise the back page of the Rulebook.

Second, AH wanted to do a brand new Gamers Guide to Diplomacy to replace the Rod Walker version of a few years ago. This will be available separately from AH, although I have heard that it may eventually be included with

In short, David Hood, Gary Behnen and myself were appointed to look after these two things. As of this writing, we have made a fair bit of progress. More on this later.

After Rex spoke in KC, the point was raised that the postal hobby needed a new way of handling novices if we were to get a wave of new blood from the flyer. Edi Birsan came up with an excellent idea that we have since put in place.

Edi's idea was to have a group of "Mentors" who would receive all inquiries from the flyer and who would be able to answer all questions and refer novices to game openings throughout the hobby. Each "Mentor" (or "Contact" as we've changed the name to) would have on hand a stock of material which would be useful in assisting the beginner. The basic material which each novice will receive will be a list of game openings, a novice package such as Supernova or Masters of Deceit and a personal note welcoming them to the hobby. Other material may include a list of relevant hobby services and a coupon sheet good for discounts on game openings, zines and other things (ZR, DW, etc).

The following people have been chosen as Contacts:

These people have been chosen as being the most stable in terms of hobby commitment and being most likely to have a stable address for the long term future, as well as being well informed about the postal Diplomacy hobby.

The task of writing up the gamebox flyer was given to yours truly and it has already been completed and approved by Avalon Hill. A brief description of the hobby was given as well as the addresses of the five Contact Persons. Rex expects the first copies of the new game to be rolling off the presses (hopefully) in time for Christmas.

As an aside, those of you who worry about Rulebook revisions need not do so. Virtually nothing was changed. While a couple of suggestions were made by myself and others, contractually, Allan Calhamer has the final say and he didn't see the need for any changes beyond the correction of a couple of typos.

As for the Gamers Guide, some progress has been made. I drew up a proposed Table of Contents and sent it to David, Gary and Rex for comment. It was more or less approved as is. What we are going to do is try to find articles that have already been written to fit as many of the categories in my Table of Contents as possible. Once we've done that, we will try to write articles to fit whatever is left and, if that doesn't cover every topic, we'll commission whatever needs to be done. One article already slated for inclusion is Jim Meinel's fine article on the History of Postal Diplomacy which his Encyclopaedia of Diplomacy Zines, I phoned him (at \$2 a minute! Ouch.) and got his permission.

Here's a quick capsule of what will probably be in the Guide:

The History of Postal Diplomacy; Diplomacy Fandom (guess who's writing THAT one?); a country by country analysis; articles on a 1901 opening for every country; complimentary pairs: midgame play; the psychology of alliance; stalemate lines; holdfast lines; stabbing and stab prevention; postal housefules: a demo game; dirty tricks (I suspect Gary will write this...); variants (with possibly a sample game); etc. ((CONTINUED ON BACK PAGE))

Dear Cal:

Enclosed find a printed copy of the new rule booklet which will go into *Deluxe DIPLOMACY* (which should start shipping a couple weeks). Take a few moments and glance through it; I'd love to hear your impressions. I did manage to shoe-horn everything in that was required (even the Q/A and Replacement Parts boxes), but it was a tight fit. However, it is the best organized and most lavish

rulebook (short of ASL) we have produced to date, in my humble opinion.

Of especial interest to you, no doubt, is the back cover. I elected to place the PBM blurb here, as it is one of the most visible pages in any soft-back publication. Hope you approve of the layout and presentation. Once the first wave of games are out the door, I hope to get a separate printing of this page as a flyer (with an advert for DIP or other multi-player games on the other side). These will be available here for our staff to send out to those who mention DIP, to be handed out at conventions, to be passed on to store owners, etc. And, of course, this same page will appear somewhere in the new "Gamer's Guide" (although release for that has now been put back to the summer). With the widest distribution possible, I'd hope that you five fellows are inundated with requests for more information. Such an influx of novices into play-by-mail might even see me do better now and then.

As soon as the new game is complete, I'll try to get each of you fellows (along with Calhamer) sent a copy. I fully expect that the first drop-shipment will be sold mostly to long-time players who are already aware of PBM. However, inevitably some copies will go to gamers who have not yet experienced the game postally. The second-wave shipments will, if true to projections, be sold in the main to those unfamiliar with the game. So, at that point, you'll likely get more requests. Let me know how things go (especially the number of requests you personally get from this; I'd be curious to see how it breaks down regionally).

My only concern is that this doesn't stir up a lot of controversy among the occasionally volatile and vocal old guard of DIP players. If a lot of flak comes your way from some elements of the hobby on this approach, or who may be involved, or whatever hobby-horse they are trying to ride, just refer them to me. I'll be glad to respond. I'd truely hate to see something this good for the DIP hobby overall soured by the loud cries of a few malcontents.


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PLAY DIPLOMACY BY MAIL!















One of the most intriguing and exciting ways to play **DIPLOMACY** is by mail. Through this medium, the game takes on new dimensions and aspects. For three decades thousands of gamers, who would otherwise not have had the chance, have enjoyed the challenge of DIPLOMACY through by-mail play.

Play-by-mail requires the services of a "Gamemaster", as noted in VII.5 of the rulebook. He or she assigns countries to the seven players, adjudicates the moves mailed by the players, reports the results to them, and sets deadlines for the next turn. The time allowed between reporting the result of one set of moves and receipt of the next set of orders by the Gamemaster is usually from four to six weeks. This allows the players time to negotiate with each other by mail. In addition to the orders and adjudications, the Gamemaster may also pass on news of the game, or public "Press Releases" from the players, and may even print other material related (or not) to the game of **DIPLOMACY**. Generally, a nominal fee is charged for his services to cover the costs of postage, printing and materials. This fee tends to range from \$2.00 to \$10.00. Many Gamemasters also require that their players maintain a subscription to an amateur DIPLOMACY magazine, or "zine", wherein the results are published; the cost of such a subscription can range from free to around \$2.00 an issue.

Joining a postal game is easy. Most people who publish amateur 'zines trade their publications with each other, forming an international network with news of game openings, game fees and other pertinent information on the postal hobby. Various representatives from the wide-spread postal DIPLOMACY hobby have volunteered to serve as "Contact Persons" to help you find postal matches. Their sole purpose is to help others discover and enjoy the game which has occupied them for so many years. Their names and addresses appear below.

If you are interested in playing **DIPLOMACY** by mail, write to the Contact Person in your region. You will be provided with information designed to familiarize you with the postal hobby and help you become involved in a game in short order. Please include a STAMPED, SELF-ADDRESSED ENVELOPE with your inquiry.

Once you have joined a game, please bear in mind that six other players must still sign up for the same game before it can begin. This may take a few weeks. However, once your game is underway, you will find the suspense and keen competition of a postal game unrivaled. Postal play is sure to add new excitement to your enjoyment of DIPLOMACY!

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

I will shut up now. Don't worry about me trying to continue this discussion or submitting any future violently racist, right-wing diatribes. It won't happen again.












JOHN LEEDER CALGARY, ALBERTA

Sorry I can't write as often as I was getting used to; I'm once again editor of the CANADIAN FOLK MUSIC JOURNAL, at least until the end of the year, and it takes up a finite amount of time and energy. I'm enclosing an issue you might be interested in due to the country music tie-in; if you like it, tell your friends! (If you don't, just keep quiet about it...) It's available as a back issue for \$3.00 plus \$1.50 shipping. And there are lots of copies in my basement.

((I enjoyed it very much, especially the poetry sections (I'm not normally much on poetry). If anybody has the slightest interest in folk music, I recommend the CMFB.))

It seems that as soon I open my mouth about an issue, along comes a newspaper article which says what I was groping for, only a lot more clearly. Not long after I pontificated on the population of Canadian cities (NF#37, P.11), an interview with the Mayor of Calgary made it clear that the "unicity" route was deliberately chosen by the city as the way to go. To grossly oversimplify, Canada's large cities follow three different models of government: the "patchwork quilt" (eg: Edmonton); the "twotier" system (eg: Metropolitan Toronto); or the unicity (eg: Calgary). The disadvantage of the patchwork quilt is that the areas with the expanding tax base are not usually the areas with the growing problems, so the suburbs get rich and the older areas decay. The two-tier system has the means to correct this problem, but they are hard to apply politically, and this makes for antagonisms between the constituent boroughs over where the tax moneys that go to the umbrella government are going to be spent. Whereas, in the unicity the taxes go directly to the city government and are applied where that government sees fit. Any political problems occur directly at the voter level. I'm paraphrasing the mayor of a unicity, of course, but the fact that Calgary has no slums in spite of hard economic hard times tends to support the theory.

((There are other problems associated with the two-tier system. Right now, Metro Toronto has rammed through a new tax bill called "Market Value Assessment". What this is supposed to do is re-assess all taxable property in Metro and eliminate some special privileges that the city proper has enjoyed. Unfortunately, what will actually happen



is that, while the outlying boroughs will see drastic reductions in their property tax bills, the city will face tax bills averaging TRIPLE what past bills were. While this may be "fairer" the real effect will be to drive a large number of downtown businesses under, thus crippling the city. The reaction to this has been a vote by Toronto City Council (which passed by a good majority) to WITHDRAW from Metropolitan Toronto. It will be interesting to see what happens.))

On to other matters. Re: Claude Gautron's letter (NF#38, P4): It's no surprise that Laurier Lapierre is considered an outsider in Quebec intellectual circles. If he's right, of course he's going to be ostracized! To be as charitable as possible, Claude's argument is totally irrelevant. But the fact that Claude chooses an ad hominem argument rather than dealing with the merits of what Lapierre is saying is significant. Why can't he find a response to the substance of what we're talking about? Maybe there is no rebuttal?

Of course the upcoming ((letter dated October 13)) referendum is going to cast a whole new light on this question. By the time this gets into print, the vote will be over; but my prediction is that, however the vote goes, the separatists will view it as a rejection of Quebec by the rest of Canada. As I said before, their minds are made up, don't confuse them with facts. The important point (as far as the future of Canada as a united country is concerned) will be how the results (whatever it is) will be viewed by the Quebecers who haven't yet chosen a position.

I myself haven't yet decided how to vote. On the one hand, the current system is lousy, and any new system has a chance to be better. On the other hand, I hate change for change's sake, and I hate the thought of yet another level of elected politicians over us. As well as the added expense of more elections and more people running for office, there's that much more chance for the politicians to screw up the country. (My God, Cal, I'm starting to sound like a Libertarian...)

((There's worse things to sound like. I've voted Libertarian for years but, with the emergence of Presto! Manning, I will be voting Reform next election. BTW, if you don't mind telling, I'd be interested to hear how you ended up voting in the referendum. I suspect you did as I did and voted NO.))

Re Brad Wilson's comments (NF#37, P15), I don't think Brian Mulroney is a "complete moron, a loser". He's a very intelligent and capable man who happens to be the wrong man in the wrong place at the wrong time. The problem: (a) Mulroney is incredibly ambitious and self-aggrandizing; (b) Mulroney's background is as a labour negotiator, and his talent lies in the area of achieving agreements. He's very good at it. Who else could have got all ten Provincial Premiers, plus Native leaders, plus federal government representatives, to come up with a consensus on the future of Canada? Trudeau couldn't, despite his vaunted intellectual capacity.









The problem is that Mulroney wants an agreement for its own sake, so that he can take the credit and bask in the public acclaim. He couldn't care less about what the agreement actually says. The fact of agreement is what matters, not whether what the people have agreed on is right or not. In this aspect he is totally amoral. Re Brent McKee on Franco-Saskatchewanians (or, better, French-speaking stubble-jumpers) (NF#38, P7): Mea culpa! I messed up a gender somewhere, I think.

Re the Olympics (John Breakwell's letter, NF#39, P14): My understanding is that the founders of the Olympics intended the games to be restricted to "gentlemen". Only people who had enough inherited wealth to be able to devote their time to getting good at their sport, without the necessity of making a living, need apply. Nowadays the category is widened to include people who happen to come from a country which puts a lot of government money into subsidizing people who devote their time to their sport. I say that people who have found a way to make a living by devoting themselves to their sport should not be excluded. Let the best compete, regardless of whether somebody somewhere considers them "amateurs" or "professionals". Or "gentlemen" or "social inferiors", for that matter.

And, yes, re John's other comment (P13): I guess the British TV coverage was especially skillful in hiding from their viewers the fact that the games were taking place in a city bigger than most in Britain. (I know, we're back to relative population again...)

In one of your snippets in reply to John Breakwell in The Mailman Cometh, ((NF#39)) you mentioned that Foolhardy says that "Popular Cutlery has a fax game open. I don't know the address or even who publishes it as you can't get that info in Zine Register anymore. Pity..."

Um, Cal, if you're still trying to find that address of Popular Cutlery, I would suggest that you recheck Zine Register. Yes, there it is on page 72. Another point which you may not be aware of is that the two issues of ZR that I've published listed 13 and 20 "foreign" zines, respectively. Indeed, the 20 zines listed in issue #20 matches the best of Tom Nash's "foreign coverage". Tom covered 20 overseas zines in #15, 19 in #16, and 20 in #18 (#17 was the fake).

Granted, this coverage of foreign zines is primarily due to Pete Gaughan (with help from a few others). And in no ways were the writeups by Pete (and others) as extensive as those of Tom Nash's (though note that my comments on the two foreign zines that I do receive were roughly equivalent to those for NA zines). Another point - Ken Peel's issues #13 and #14 listed but 7 and 8 "overseas" zines, respectively (those are the issues I have available).

Personally, I think the space devoted to "overseas" listings was just about right. You don't. Fine, send in some thoughts on foreign (and domestic) zines for issue #21. They'll get published, along with every other word I receive.

I guess I'm responding because I wanted to set the record straight. I don't really bear any antipathy to overseas zines or overseas publishers. It's just that trying to fulfill ZR's mandate of service to the North American hobby is already an overwhelming job. There are literally hundreds of overseas zines, Call There is just no way I can review them all, or even print listings of them all! Thanks to the efforts of Pete (and others), I haven't had to worry about foreign coverage, and I've been able to focus on "Job One" - service to North American zine publishers and gamers.

Unfortunately, you are not the only one who is mistaken on the matter of "overseas service". A certain other publisher has accused me of "cutting trades" with overseas zines, and of refusing to sell Zine Register to overseas purchasers! (Since my advertisement for ZR has appeared in numerous hobby publications, each one announcing a purchase price of \$4.00 for "overseas" publishers, I'd only be creating a huge mess for myself if I suddenly refused to sell overseas.) For the record, I have sold Zine Register to overseas purchasers and will continue to do so. Overt feud hostility is the only possible rationale for spreading these sorts of lies about my service.

((Ta for clearing that up. Re: your last sentence. While you may quite probably be right, I would find it easier (were I in your position) to at least consider the possibility of it simply being a misunderstanding. Phrasing your feelings the way you do makes you seem paranoid. The time comes when it's easier (all around!) to ignore detractors and lighten up. It works for me.))

On another matter, it's interesting that you've gone the "redesign route". Interestingly, two issues ago I gave UPSTART a new type treatment (Lithos and Centennial for display copy, but keeping the Times for body text - you can pack a lot in with good old Times!), and have also gone to a three column format. I've kept the digest format though. Pete Gaughan has also done

a little redesign work on his zine, but it seems like it's not much more than a new logo. I guess your use of an "asymmetrical" three column grid stamps your zine with perhaps the most "radical" design that I've seen in the hobby. Good luck with it.

((Thanks. "Radical" is pretty well what I was looking for with the asymmetrical columns. I also wanted the challenge of trying something new and making it work. As for typeface, I prefer Palatino. It's just about the same as Times, but I find it a bit more compact/modern. As for sidebars and other elements, I haven't exactly settled on what I want. But then again, that's half the publishing fun for me - experimenting.))



You commented that the new AH version of Diplomacy is to have wooden blocks. Does this mean the old one doesn't? I have an old House of Games version, which has wooden blocks. 





Cal, I imagine you are really happy. The Blue Jays not only made the World Series for the first time, they won it. So Canada has its first series win. the Blue jays will be around for the '93 season, albeit with many changes. But will Canada? The Oregon press reported the failure of the initiative as though Canada will break up immediately.

Another question: will baseball be there? The same newspaper printed an article after the series saying it was almost certain there would be a season-long major league lockout in 1993. The reasons include the collective bargaining agreement (and a rumored desire of some owners to destroy the players' union), disputes over whether and how to re-define the office of the commissioner, and general worries about the financial health of several franchises. There is also concern about where future TV revenue is going to come from; CBS is very unhappy about their ratings for baseball during the season(although the World Series were pretty successful for them), and ESPN is not going to renew their contract after 1993 (at least not at the current rate of \$155 million for '94 and more for '95) That baseball needs the revenue from national broadcast and cable TV in undisputed. The question is what will happen if that revenue goes away. Thus some believe that there will be a management-labor showdown severe enough to cancel the entire season.

A lot of people will be very displeased with that. The most disappointed probably would be the fans in Miami and Denver, where the Marlins and Rockies are slated to play their first seasons in 1993. Toronto fans (enough to sell 4 million tickets a year) will want to watch their team try and repeat. Atlanta fans will hope that '93 is the year the Braves finally hit the next level and gain a world championship.

And baseball will be facing these questions without a leader, at least for a while. There has been little agreement on a permanent replacement for Faye Vincent, and there isn't even agreement on what sort of power the commissioner of baseball should have. Whoever gets the job will probably lose his "best interests of the game" powers, so he wouldn't be able to enforce re-alignment (a serious problem for the National League) and might have less freedom to investigate things like gambling scandals and owner misconduct. He would probably have to get approval of most of his actions from a committee of owners. That committee might even become the commissioner's office.

Still, I do not yet believe the season is doomed. Baseball people have shown remarkable brinkmanship in the past, and I think owners and players recognize the damage that would be done to the game from totally skipping a season. It is possible, but I don't think it's inevitable.

Here in Portland, all eyes are set firmly on the return of basketball. This NBA season brings several changes to the Portland TrailBlazers of various degrees.

There have been a lot of roster changes. Last year's rookie flash Robert Pack is going to be coming off the bench in Denver rather than Portland. Alaa Abdelnaby is going to continue his big-man education in Milwaukee. Danny Ainge joins Charles Barkley on a

that I have to be careful when discussing these things simply because nobody understands what I'm talking about. But there is something undefinable about watching an entire season flash before your eyes.

PTP has the full rosters for all of the 1991 major league teams and the full 1991 schedule for both leagues. So you can go to a schedule and select a game or set of games to be played. Once you are in the game, you can make managerial decisions for one or both teams, or leave everything to the computer. On a 386 everything blasts by. You can speed it further by switching off the full display and showing only the linescore. You could easily do an entire season, for both leagues, in the space of two or three days. Even just having it run an entire league schedule, from beginning to end, can take as little as five hours! And the results I've gotten have been very accurate. The computer automatically keeps track of the pitching rotation, fatigue, and injuries, and the computer manager has a profile for each team that can (with effort) be modified and customized. It is also possible to create players from real statistics, and form draft leagues from any pool of players that is on the hard drive. I really enjoyed playing around with this one.

I've been having trouble getting my copy of *Big League Football* to copy onto my new hard drive. What I saw of this new release looked pretty good. I just hope it really does support Hercules.

The basketball games are still what they were two years ago. Like the baseball game they feature the statistics and ratings of the players from the most recent basketball season, and like the baseball game these will compile stats for everybody. But their autoplay is a bit cruder; the player enters the schedule fifteen games at a time. The football game can have a full NFL season on its schedule (that's 224 games) and the baseball game can handle schedules of up to 2,268 games (for both leagues). For the replay enthusiast a larger autoplay would help. So would the equivalent of the baseball game's player tracking system, which would let them add injuries to the mix and give the guy starting Larry Bird every night something to think about. The current software has no problem with giving a player twice to three times more starts than they actually got (if the player had been injured during the season). Ideally, the player would still get injured a reasonable amount of time, but when should be utterly unpredictable. You know Bird's back will give way sometime, but if you're lucky you'll be able to keep him off Injured Reserve through that crucial road swing in March.... Despite these realism problems, these are still entertaining simulations of basketball at the pro and collegiate level.

That's four computer games from PTP that all work rather well. This might be a good time to ask for their price list, as the latter part of winter is utter chaos for any firm putting together a baseball boardgame with player cards going out to thousands of prior owners.

The next few months are going to be busy sports ones for me, and busy in several other ways as well. Winter is usually by heaviest sports-watching month, mainly basketball, hockey, and football and whatever oddities come around. Thus I found myself watching highlights of a rugby Grand Final from Australia this afternoon on cable. It's interesting what will catch my attention and what won't. I am also amazed at how frequently the American networks will besiege us with golf and bowling. Golf looks like a challenging game to play, but I also find it challenging to watch. There are also such huge numbers of announcers for a tournament. It must keep a lot of people employed at ABC.

Still, I'm going to have a hard time choosing channels (I suspect the NBA and hockey will be opposite each other a lot), figuring out what I want to tape, and trying to make sense of it all.

My prediction for the NBA: Chicago over Phoenix in the finals 4-1 after the Suns beat Portland in the conference finals. let me know how I did in eight months.

The game corner has quite a bit going on. I've gotten a look at a lot of the computer stuff from Pursue the Pennant recently. I have also changed my computer to a 386 with a Hercules card. (Yes, I know a 386 without VGA graphics seems incongruous, but this is a *work* machine.) So what stuff I can convince to run is running pretty darn fast.

PTP currently offers computer simulations of baseball, football, and pro and college basketball. The baseball game is probably the best known (to people who know this hobby, that is; the typical sports-bar fan would look at you funny and ask "huh?" if asked about games), and it went through a substantial revision. Version 4.0 offers a huge variety of features to the manager who wishes to use them, and is especially useful for replays. In fact, this game is probably the king of all replay simulations for baseball.

A replay is, to a sports gamer, something utterly unexplainable. Most people will watch a sporting event to see how it turns out. In a replay, an individual plays an entire season of a league or college conference to see how it comes out. He can then compare the records and statistics his replay generated to those obtained in the real season and learn some interesting things that way. Now the replay fan is a sort of select market. I find

We are going to be taking Dikembe Mutombo with our first pick (the first pick in the draft after a dismal 6-22 season, worst record in the league, and last place in the division). Yes, things get weird in SP leagues. One team is so stocked that they have an Olympian (Chris Mullin) they never use. I've always found that a bit galling, and it's a reason that there are have teams and have-not teams in this league and the twain never seem to meet. I find that frustrating, but I will have to live with it for at least another year. Even with Mutombo, the Lazers are probably more to be pitied than feared.

Anyway, back to Portland. There are some other changes on the horizon. One that will have am immediate impact on fans is that Bill Schonely will give up radio play-by-play to announce the Blazers' TV package, Shonz described more than 2,000 games in portland since the franchise's first season in 1970. I do not even remember the name of his replacement. I just have a lot of memories of listening to Schonz and the phrases he frequently used, and he was a subconscious model I used in high school as a basketball announcer. I just somehow got the idea that this was what a basketball announcer did.

The most famous of Schonz' catch-phrases, of course, is "Rip City!", a by-word in this town used to describe a particularly attractive score, at least three restaurants, and a popular gourmet coffee. There are also things like "Lickety-brindle up the middle", "Crossing the cyclops at midcourt", "NBC - Nothing But Cord", and the unheeded warning of "You've got to make your free throws." (Free throws have been a weakness of the Portland team over the last few years.) In Portland the man is a legend, and somehow in my mind he defines the Portland attitude towards their team. The poor guy with those shoes to fill is going to have a rough few months. Especially if this team continues its habit of converting blowouts into close contests - he can become a convenient scapegoat that way, blaming the messenger as it were.

Another basketball note is much less cheerful. Early in October the Lakers convinced Magic Johnson to return to pro basketball after a very impressive showing in the Olympics. But then a lot of private murmuring circulated throughout the league, and a week before the start of the season Magic had to retire again. It wasn't his health - it was a fear expressed by many players that Magic would somehow infect them with HIV, the virus which causes AIDS, on the court.

If you have been following this zine (HA!) then you know my opinion on this subject. Fear born out of ignorance has destroyed many careers over the years in many fields, including sports. It's always ugly and usually needless. Fear of HIV appears to be becoming an integral part of our culture, and frequently extends to a hatred and an
