He will probably be furious that I pointed this out, but I would have given anything for his finish. Maybe someday I'll get the hang of FTF, but it's been years, and I still have trouble. I don't think fast enough, make the wrong builds, tactical mistakes with my moves, etc. ((**Sigh**)).

Glenda and Lorie spent most of their time shopping and swimming with the kids. For those of you in attendance, the kids with the prune like appearance WERE mine. I got to swim once (during round 3). The pool was marvelously warm. Glenda usually swims once for a few minutes. She probably swam 3 times a day, at least an hour each time. I received an inquiry re: Carla's moves last turn (from someone who is not even playing in this game!). The question: If someone is on the collect call list, why do you allow them to have no builds, and misorder 2 units? Shouldn't you call them collect and allow them to correct the error?

The problem is there is no way to know if the orders were in error. Sometimes a person wants to "switch sides" in a conflict, and will purposely misorder units and not take builds. It's unusual, but it DOES happen. I believe that calling a player in this circumstance gives them an unfair advantage over the other players, and do not feel I should be second guessing their orders. If orders are in, they are considered to be legitimate. If orders are missing, I will call a player to prevent an NMR.
