Herelandra Postal Diplomacy* Houservles, 1 June 1982

I. To participate in a game, a player must:

be a subscriber to Perelandra (I am going to try to keep the subs down to about 40);

pay the current gamefee (now \$1.00) in U.S. dollars. A standby

- taking a nation after Winter 1904/5 is exempt from the gamefee; pay a \$1.00 NMR fee, which will be refunded (IF the player has not MMRed) when the game ends or when the player is eliminated, whichever comes first. (Standbys are not exempt from the NMR fee.)
- Registration of a player in a game creates the following agreement II. between the GM and the player: (note: agreement, not contract)
 - The Gi agrees to manage the game in an accurate and prompt manner, and to provide smooth transfer of the game to another GM if he is unable to do so. "Accurate" means correcting mistakes -- if the GM is aware of the error before the next deadline.

The GM agrees not to editorialize concerning the game or its В. players while they are in the game.

The player agrees not to deceive the GM as to address, identity, C. or any other game matter, under maximum penalty of expulsion.

- The player agrees not to call the GM between 11 p.m. and 8 a.m. D. Pacific Time, under a maximum penalty of expulsion. Please note: it is very difficult to contact the GM by phone -- do not rely on phone orders as your primary means.
- III. The GM will endeaver to keep deadlines four weeks apart.
 - There will be three major seasons: spring moves, fall moves (including spring retreats if necessary), and winter adjustments (including fall retreats if necessary).
 - Orders will be due by 11 p.m. Pacific Time on deadline day; deadline day will usually be the Friday closest to the 25th of the month.
 - When a player's orders are not received by deadline, the GM will request that a standby submit orders for his position with the next season. The player's country will be in civil disorder for the current season (all units hold unsupported, defeated units retreat off-the-board, GM performs any needed disbands); however, the MiRing player is still the player of record until he resigns -see rule IV.
 - Mail orders <u>must</u> <u>be signed</u>; unsigned orders will <u>not</u> be honored, even if they are the only set received for that season. Each player will be asked to subnit a signature card at gamestart, and should always sign his/her full name.
- IV. A player who MMRs three times in a game, or in two consecutive seasons, has resigned and a standby will receive his position.

Standbys will not be called for nations with fewer that three supply centers.

Concessions or draws may be proposed beginning with Spring 1905, and may pass only upon the 'yes' vote of all remaining players having at least two supply centers.

Herelandra Postal Diplomacy Houserules, continued

- Votes on concessions and draws should be sent with orders. a timely, officially received 'yes' vote constitutes agreement to a concession or a draw; all votes will be published, with their countries identified.
- Press is encouraged, and will only be edited if space demands it. Press must not be datelined from the GM's reserved dateline (announced at gamestart) or from "USC"; players may not dateline press from another player's supply center.
 - Press containing vulgar, obscene, or excessively abusive language will not be printed. Please be informed that my opinion of obscene is probably more "Puritanical" than other players', in keeping with the literary tone of this magazine.
- VI. Players will note that any practice not expressly forbidden is on a case-by-case basis at the GM's discretion; any rule herein may be appealed to the GM by two players, each having at least two supply centers. Note that right of appeal does not guarantee victory.

The New Intolerance?...

Maybe I'm stirring up more trouble than this is worth, but I'd like to reprint here an article which I wrote for the April 13th Daily Trojan. There was no special occasion; like this 'zine, much of my effort is spent on "routine" efforts at making people think

The biggest problem in the current debate between right and left is the refusal of both sides to see how similar they are, and how similarly uncaring.

We all know there is a raging social debate in the United States. The most striking feature of this conflict is this: The civil liberties activists (composed especially, but not exclusively, of Libertarians, homosexuals, and feminists) and the "new right" (especially its largest constituent, the Moral Majority) are equally dangerous. Each would like the rest of us to believe that its enemy is un-American, unscrupulous, and out to control our lives in defiance of this country's heritage. I submit that all of these things are true of both sides.

Since its inception, the Moral Majority has drawn justified criticism as an organization committed to legislating morality. Led by the much-maligned but sincere Rev. Jerry Falwell of Virginia, it has unfortunately degenerated from an active supporter of a set of principles, to an active opponent of certain people. This clearly refutes what should be its main concern, if it is indeed a Christian organization: to see that individuals understand and are given the opportunity to accept a biblical point of view

When quotes are presented to us claiming that a particular "Christian" leader is an anti-Semite, or that another advocates a "first-strike" capacity, the only question is why other members of their groups don't disown these men. It is hard to justify groups with such unjustifiable ends.

One of the central accusations weighed against the religious new right is an apparent ignorance of the principle of separation of church and state (although this language is not found in the Constitution). The Constitution essentially forbids a (cont'd next page...)

Imagine yourself at the Tuolumne Soda Springs on the bank of the river, a day's journey above Yosemite Valley. You set off northward through a forest that stretches away indefinitely before you, seemingly unbroken by openings of any kind. As soon as you are fairly into the woods, the gray mountain-peaks, with their snowy gorges and hollows, are lost to view. The ground is littered with fallen trunks that lie crossed and recrossed like storm-lodged wheat; and besides this close forest of pines, the rich moraine soil supports a luxuriant growth of ribbon-leaved grasses--bromus, triticum, calamagrostis, agrostis, etc., which rear their handsome spikes and panicles above your waist. Making your way through the fertile wilderness, -- finding lively bits of interest now and then in the squirrels and Clark crows, and perchance in a deer or bear, -- after a lapse of an hour or two vertical bars of sunshine are seen ahead between the brown shafts of the pines, showing that you are approaching an open space. and then you suddenly emerge from the forest shadows upon a delightful purple lawn lying smooth and free in the light like a lake. This is a glacier meadow. The trees come pressing forward all around, planting their feet exactly on its margin, and holding themselves erect, strict and orderly like soldiers on parade; thus bounding the meadow with exquisite precision, yet with free curving lines such as Nature alone can draw. With inexpressible delight you wade out into the grassy sun-lake, feeling yourself contained in one of Nature's most sacred chambers, withdrawn from the sterner influences of the mountains, secure from all intrusion, secure from yourself, free in the beauty. ... You are all eye, sifted through and through with light. ...

Go where you may, you everywhere find the lawn divinely beautiful, as if Nature had fingered and adjusted every plant this very day. ...

The influences of pure nature seem to be so little known as yet, that it is generally supposed that complete pleasure of this kind, permeating one's very flesh and bones, unfits the student for scientific pursuits in which cool judgment and observation are required. But the effect is just the opposite . . . the mind is fertilized and stimulated and developed like sun-fed plants. All we have seen here enables us to see with surer vision the fountains among the summit-peaks and the great history of the relatively new-born meadow.
