HOLLYWOOD & VINE

Yes, coming at you live from beautiful downtown Los Angeles. Actually, Hollywood & Vine is about ten minutes' drive from U.S.C., but I spend a lot of time in Hollywood, Westwood, and the other totally unique areas of Los Angeles. Hollywood Blvd. is really everything you hear about it: from hookers to preachers, head shops to the most beautiful legitimate theatre on the West Coast (the Pantages).

The neighborhood I live in, though, is one of the most depressed in the U.S. University Park is about three miles square, and even though it includes 'SC, three major museums, and the '32 Olympic facilities (Sports Arena, Coliseum and Swim Stadium), the medium family income is around \$7000. The crime rate and living situation are vastly exaggerated, but could be better. I'm in a boarding house with 8 other students; my large room shared is only \$150 a month. There are quite a few large, renovated Victorian homes in this area; the school was founded in 1880, and the "slum" (not entirely accurate) only grew up around the campus after WWII.

U.S.C. pumps a lot of money into this community, but never has gotten a lot of respect in return. The administrations have always understood that they wouldn't get any support for new buildings or student recruiting unless the various area interest groups felt it was worth their while--so the school builds low-income housing, supports minority studies and programs, and has built a large modern shopping center, and still gets accused of being a "fortress-mentality snob center." Groan.

The rap on L.A. has always been that it is a city of tinsel, a town without any real meaning or value. But that, folks, only applies to suburbia--see map--and those of us who live in Los Angeles know that we have a long tradition of appreciating life. The Times is now 101 years old; City Hall is still in use and is a prime landmark, even when dwarfed by new, boring bank towers; our musical companies and their facilities are among the best in the world. So there.

Well, it's drizzling here (they're trying to get the Dodgers-Giants' game going) and this issue is going to be short anyway, so let's get movin' to the Diplomacy. Watch out . . . it's going to be a Freeway Series this year!

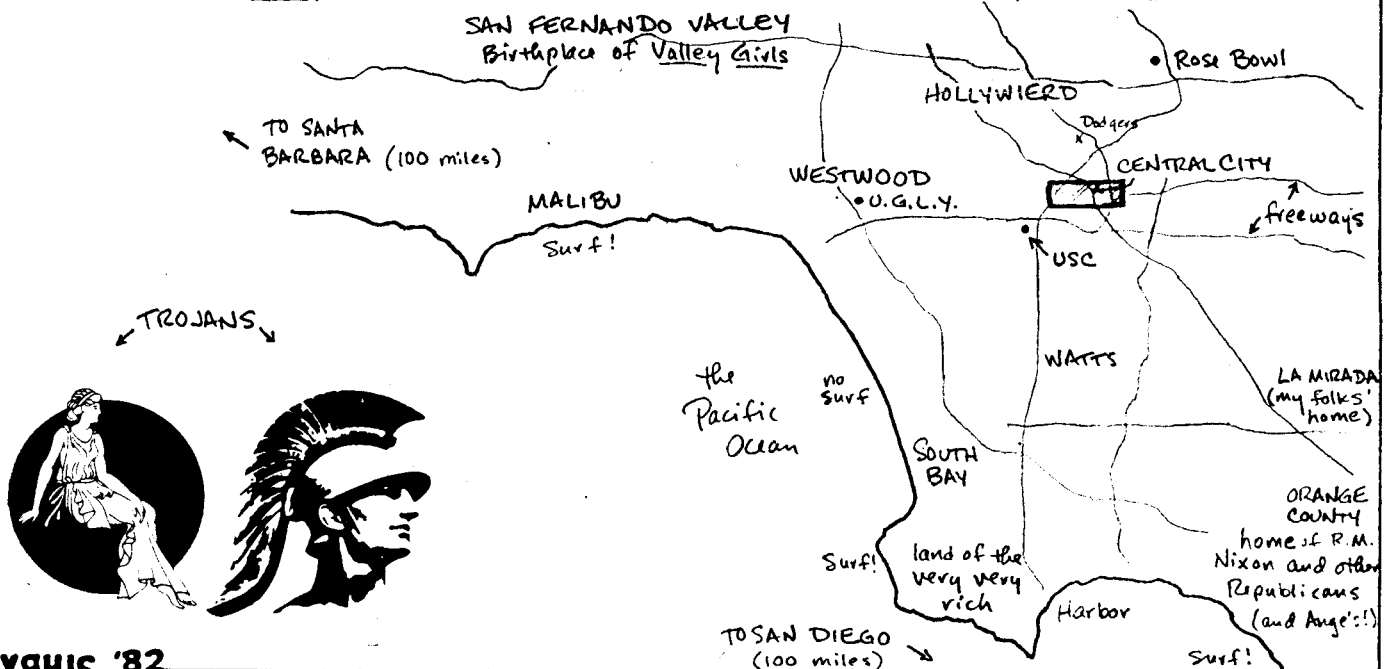

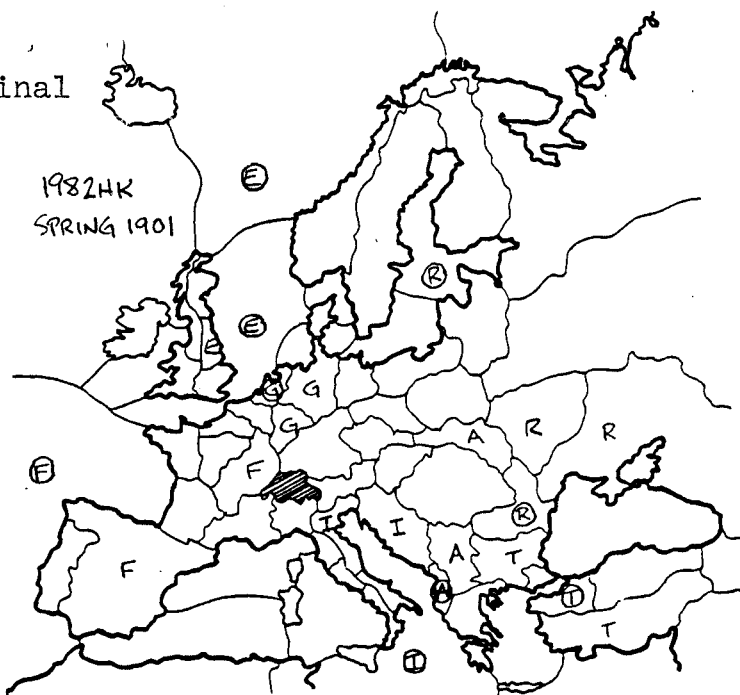

Los Angeles to All Europe--This will be where I deal with most procedural matters. Notice that we have a Boardman Number for Yavin; please use it on all your correspondance. Proposal number 1 (required press) was defeated; proposal 2 (combining Winter "moves" with Spring) was passed with provisos. Beginning in Winter 1902/3, retreats and builds will be combined with the following season's moves unless two players request separation. Even then, I may not separate Summer from Fall unless you can prove extreme need.

Rome (1 January 1901, St. Peter's)--Her Holiness Pope Joan III (often referred to as the Southernlander because she is from Bari) today stunned the western musical world by calling for a new crusade against the Moslems and other practitioners of the 13-tone scale. The call has been greeted with wild enthusiasm in Italy and Austria. Her Holiness has appointed Gen. Vittorio Negri to command the armed forces of the crusade. Gen. Negri will be assisted by his two sub-commanders, Gen. Placebo Domino and Adm. Luciano Pavarotti. Domino will command the crusade's armies, giving him a chance to practice his domino theory of warfare; and Pavarotti will command the crusade's navies, thus making him the official King of the High Seas.

Venice (1 February 1901, St. Mark's)--First elements of the crusade army left here today for Peerijavo on their way to the eastern front. Units of the St. Mark's Choir, advanced vocal elements of the Mormon Tabernacle Choir, and the Choir of the Abyssinian Baptist Church of Harlem (NY), and members of the Milan Opera House's La Scala Scale Climbing Corps were on their way to Peerijavo where they would join musical ranks with units from the Vienna Boys Choir, the Vienna State Opera, and the Vienna Philharmonic.

Naples (14 February 1901)--Adm. Pavarotti arrived here today to review units of the Italian fleet as they prepared to scale their way into the Eastern Mediterranean. The battleships Anna Moffo, Renata Tebaldi, and Renata Scotto were joined by the heavy cruisers Levantine at Any Price and Birgit Nielsen.

Peerijavo (14 February 1901, St. Lorenzo's) ((Italian reserved dateline))
--His Eminence Lorenzo Cardinal Peericelli today presided over a memorial concert performed by the entire crusade ensemble. Among the works performed were: Haydn's Missa in Tempore Belli and Lord Nelson Mass; Beethoven's Wellington's Victory; Mozart's Turkish March and Rondo; and Lorenzo Repposi's The Martyrdom of St. Lorenzo Peericelli, a work specially commissioned for this event, marking the 400th anniversary of the birth of Lorenzo Peericelli.

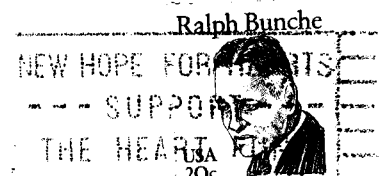
Guest of Honor
