If anyone has results for other pairs, or better results for these pairs, I'd be glad to publish them. As to abandoning your theory, it is a matter of definition. Our board is not simply connected, due to the 'hole' of Switzerland. The majority of games are played, in the opening years, as if that hole were extended by a cut running from, say, Basle to Dresden. If we regard that cut as being there then Germany and Austria are not neighbouring countries in the ordinary sense.

For an all-Canadian game. It has been suggested from time to time. When Derek Nelson and Bob Lake began Jutland Jollies they proposed having such a game. It was pointed out to them that while this guaranteed a Canadian winner, barring ties, it likewise guaranteed 6 Canadian losers and that if 7 Canadians were available they might do better spread out a little thinner. They abandoned

the idea. Canadians had had a high ratio of success at that time. The first game completed, 1963A, was won by Derek Nelson, a Canadian. So was the second, 1964A. The latter was almost an all-Canadian game in its final stages: It was won by James Hackenzie, the only other survivor was the aforementioned Derek Helson, and the last player to be eliminated was Bill Christian. It was carried in Graustark and the press releases and headlines had remarks about Canadian influence in European cabinets. The only fully all-Canadian game so far was one of the games in Nemedian Chronicles. That journal was published in Saskatoon and carried, among others, a semi-local game, all the players being in northern Saskatchewan. Conrad won Hetzke (Box 8342, San Diego, California, 92102) is now trying to organize a Canadian game. (In case you are wondering how someone who lives virtually on the Mexican border is getting into the Maple Leaf act. it should perhaps be explained that Conrad's grandfather was a Nova Scotian.) His game is by invitation only. However, if things turn out as they usually do in such cases, it is likely that some of the invitees will have to decline, so that I think it would do no serious harm if any Canadian seriously interested dropped Conrad a note indicating his interest. Conrad is, by the way, looking for a suitable name for the bulletin to carry the game. I have suggested several possibilities to him but, on later thought, I am wondering if '1812' wouldn't be appropriate. Conrad is a great music lover and the title will, no doubt, recall Tschaikovsky to him. To us, north of the border, it will recall the battles of Chateauguay, Queenston Heights, and the rest. where the great invasion attempt was foiled. -jamcc)+))
