RATING LISTS & PLAYER POLLS-THE BROB CORRELATION

In PP #12, you will recall, Doug Beyerlein gave us a comparison of the rating lists with the two Polls, the BPP & the APP. At that time, we discussed whether the polls were a function of the lists (as I thought possible, maybe even likely) or whether the polls were a true reflection of the viewpoint of the "public" in the Diplomacy world. Now, I have a couple of other entrys. First, Doug has sent along the correlations of the BROBDINGNAG system, done by Jeff Power. Second, I have run across the letter from John McCallum that I KNEW I'd received on the matter. (You may perhaps remember that I started to print a letter from him in #13, only to find that it was off the point of the Beyerlein article in #12). To summarize the meanings of the various catagories:

- (1) All 18 players [of note on the two polls]
- (2) The top seven players in the polls
- (3) 18 players minus those outside the top 14 in the particular list analzed
- (4) Same as (3), plus removing Walker & Beshara as both are of a controversial nature, which may have influenced their ranks in the polls
- (5) The top seven players minus Walker

The BROB listing, you will recall, awards points for order of finish; +6 for first, +4 for second, 0 for fourth, and -6 for last, distributed down the line. Thus, no other system rewards strong and consistent finishing, and a minimum number of eliminations, more completely than the BROBDINGNAG method. The official listing, however, is very much the averaged one, and the "total" list is something that Doug compiled with the sweat of his own brow. In effect, the "total" system is not a rating list at all, just the same as the Calhamer Point Count List is not, because it takes no account of how many games the player has required to reach X score. This is somewhat ameliorated in the BROB listing, because negative points are possible. Thus, a slow accumulation will take place only for those players above average—usually the players that stay in the hobby anyway.

The correlation averages compare with the other averages as follows: CPCL-.965; ODD - .955; NUMENOR-average - .841; and NUMENOR- total - .888. Thus, the BROB average is somewhat less correlated than any of the others, but the total is right up there at the top. This implies, I think, the same sort of argument that Arn Vagts suggested in #13: that people have a tendency to vote for those who are most active, and have written the most articles. After all, "success" on a rating list is

have the theoretical ability to combat this sort of problem, but they don't seem to very much. Walt Eucheman and Mike Rocamora, who both have some degree of relative newness to the hobby, rank high on the lists, but Walt publishes, so that leaves us with not too many examples. All in all, however, I think that the accumulating evidence seems to indicate that the player polls are often predicated on the sort of information found in rating systems, with exceptions grafted into the framework in cases involving personal contact. This implies that a player goes through an interim period on the polls where, assuming that his ratings are high but his general noteriety is not, he will reach a peak. Then, as he or she becomes more well known to more players, they will note their personal experiences, and that player will either rise or fall based on their evaluation.

Then too, there are not too many ballots submitted for the polls. though this is improving. I think that when only a few players submit ballots, they are usually the active ones. These players have a rather ingrained tendency to vote for members of their own kind, and I'm not sure this is particularly wrong--it may well be inevitable. Just the same; the polls, both player and publisher, seem to profit from a greater number of votes, and I hope that the trend continues. To the extent that new players submit votes beyond the field of the players whom they have encountered in their limited numbers of games, the rating lists seem to be the only solution for an otherwise incomplete (and thus uncountable) ballot. Who can say that this is wrong? After all, fools like me (and you, if you are reading this far) are the only ones who are interested in rating lists, and the only ones who vote in polls. The critter is the same, I think, so the relationship isn't surprising. The only thing, in fact, which does surprise me is that the accumulative.totaling systems seem to have the greatest impact in the player polls.

According to my hypothesis, this shouldn't happen. Players know that the CPCL isn't a rating list, though that might not stop them from voting for players that have wen a lot of games. It is my suspicion that we are at a transtitional stage on the polls right now—the older active players cast most of the votas, and they vote for players with whom they have some aquaintence. As more new votes are cast, the system should adjust (according to me) more along the lines of rating systems. Well—its just a thought. Keep in mind that all my ideas are presumptively inane, however, and that PLATYPUS PIE has been denied a liscense by the Comics Code authority.

"Was interested in Doug's item on the correlations between player polls and the rating lists [in #12]. The rank correlation he uses is simpler than a correlation using actual scores. However, what you say about the player poll results being in part determined by the lists is quite true. Only once did I submit an entry to the poll but that time I did exactly as you did; i.e., players that I knew well from having frequently played them I rated on the basis of my own estimation, but those I had little drect knowledge of I rated on the basis of performance as listed in the rating lists. With the exception of individuals like Conrad [von Metzke] and Edi [Birsan], who have played in so many games that they have played against everyone, I am sure that everyone else does the same. So the polls are, in large measure, a function of the lists. It is not surprising, therefore, to find the two highly correlated.

"There is another matter. Only the top 18 are listed in the poll. By confining himself to so few names Doug is bound to come up with some very high correlation figures. All of the players listed will be mul-

tiple winners. All will have high scores on the Calhamer Point Count Listing. All will consequently have high scores on all the other listings too. The correlation coefficients, counting only these people, are bound to be quite high. If Doug counted not the top 14 only but everyone listed, even once, in the Poll then the correlations would drop considerably. [John here included a f concerning the difficulties presenting in resolving the large # of ties that would occur at the lower ranks, but which I'm editing out].

"You will remember thatin the early editions of the Beyerlein Poll Doug used to list the names of all the people mentioned at all in the retruns. [True, Doug?] A correlation of these with the ratings would

be more informative, and the correlations would be lower.

"But even this is hardy enough. The poll is itself a selective process. Anyone mentioned will be better than the average player. The rating lists, on the other hand, list everyone, good, bad, and indifferent. These coefficients would be much lower if everyone were included. After all, all systems reward a win. It is those who don't win that are treated differently by the various systems, some systems rewarding non-winning survival and some not. Correlations based on the scores of everyone, winers and non-winners alike, would show very much less agreement than is indicated by these figures of Doug's. Even then, though, I suspect that the correlations will be higher than one might think." [Thanks, John. Any comments, Doug?] [Anyone else?]

ITS THE ROGUES' GALLERY RATING LIST--COUNTRIES

The demise of Rod Walker as a force in Diplomacy has caused us all some slow moments, I'm afraid. Game numbers stagnated until Conrad von Metzke took them over, and the center charts are apparently being taken over by either Conrad or John McCallum, both, or maybe even Len Lakofka, who has put out an appeal for center charts for games which have finished since the last edition of NUMENOR.

One of the losses which I didn't think would be recovered was the NUMENOR system itself. The methods are somewhat different, but the rating list is being replaced by one under the name at the headnote above—the Rogues' Gallery list, to appear in Lakofka's LIAISONS DAN—GEREUSES sometime soon. He has, however, completed the positions of the countries, and I think that they are interesting enough to warrant republication. Very briefly, each winner gets 240 points, more or less; the survivors gets 340 points, minus the winner's points. Its apparently possible to get negative points, though I'm not too certain how—write to Len for a subscription to see for yourself. I'm not too clear on all the details, but the catagories are somewhat self—explanatory I think. "Elims only," for instance, means that, in that catagory, France has been eliminated less than all the others. Len's comments are in LD #37.

THE ARENA POLL IS OUT--PRELIMINARY COMMENTARY

Edi Birsan's much publicized poll concerning order of finish is completed, and the results are in ARENA #18. The simple fact that 101 questionairres were returned is enough in itself to warrant attention, because I think that that is some sort of a phenomenal record for Diplomacy polls of any sort. At this point, I am only going to summarize the results of part I of the poll; in a future issue, I may have time to get into the other areas and comment upon them. ARENA may be obtained from Edi Dirsan, who currently resides at: RD 5 Box 6, Bridge Street, Hopewell Jct, NY 12533, and subscriptions are seven issues for a dollar. ARENA is very much recommended.

Part I of the poll concerned order of finish, and players were asked to rank all possible results in a game in order of preference; two through seven way ties, and ranking I through 7. Naturally, all questioned preferred a clear-cut win as the most desirable alternative (save for a couple of ironic ballots, which Edi discounted). The respendent was asked to rank these positions from I through 13. After 100% favored winning, 76% preferred a two-way draw as the next alternative, while 20% opted for second place as the next best thing to a win. 4% scattered evenly between a three way tie, four way tie, and seven way tie. At this point, I will quote from ARENA:

"This break is basically the first determination of the size of the strict Strong Second segment of the Diplomacy population. That is, a clear 20% of the population answered the question of 'what if I cannot win?' by saying that they preferred coming in second to any other possibility aside from winning. These 20 questionairres will be taken aside in a later report to see if we can form a Strong Second player profile in order to test the ideas in 'Philosophies of Playing Diplomacy' [an article written by Edi in ARENA #2, I believe] as well as to see if there are any further breaks within parts ii & iii that are interesting.

Threers rated record place in two groupings. One large grouping of ballots was around the 2 to 4 region (from being second most desirable to fourth most desirable; and then a second group at 8th. leads as to draw the initial size of the strict 'win-only' players, as they would rate all ties above accord place. Thus, a win would be first and a two-way tie would be second, and the ratings would decrease down to 7, which would be a seven-way tie; 2d place was then listed as 8th most desirable. Some of the players whose answers listed only the win and the ties, without mentioning the other placements were also considered within the bounds of the strict win-only school, as was the respondent who listed the Win as the number one choice and noted: 'if you don't win the rest does not matter. [I WONDER who that could have becall. This gives us 16% of the population being win only in a strict awasense. The actual breakdown for 2d place was:

2. 20%

3-35% The high Don't Kare/No answer segment of answers here

reflects those three or so ballots that listed only the 4-19% 5 - 4%

win and ties and refused to rate non-win, non-tie place-

8-13% ment.

DK/NA-9%

Now that we have two groups isolated we can then compare the 20% who are Strong Second with the 16% Win Only, with the staggering 64% remainder lying somewhere in between; this comparison will come in a future issue."

I encourage all of you who do not currently get ARENA to follow this discussion there in the future, because PP will do not a lot more than mention the proceedings from time to time. Primarily, I don't think that I should subject readers who DO get both magazines to re-reading the information time and again. For my part, I'll probably comment in the future by writing letters to Edi, which he will then, with the past as an indication, refuse to publish on the grounds that they offend the public morality.

Parenthetically, however, I might note that Edi cited me as an example, in ARENA #2, of the "Strong Second School." I considered that description accurate at the time, and I still do. Nevertheless, I did not rate 2d place superior to a xim two way tie. This suggests to me that the 16% Win-only camp may be rather accurate, while the other figures, particularly the large 35% rating second place as the third most desirable alternative, seem to indicate considerable strength for the "Strong-second" camp beyond the very strict 20% figure. To the extent that I discuss the AREMA survey in future issues, I think it only fair to publicize my prejudices, so you will know of the source from whence all this tripe issueth.

WIN - 1; 2-way tie - 2; 2d place - 3; 3 way draw - 4; 4 way draw- 5; 3d place - 6; 4th place - 7, 5 way draw - 8, 6 way draw - 9, 7 way draw - 10, 5th place - 11, 6th place - 12, & 7th place naturally ranks a dead last 13th.
