As some of your know, Jerry Jones has decided to take over publication of Diplomacy World, with the consent of Conrad von Metzke and Walt Buchanan. He expects to print this coming issue in mid-February. Unfortunately, money is a problem. He has agreed to incorporate DW into the IDA if we give him \$150 for production of DW. In return, all DW subbers would become IDA members, dues would be dropped, and DW would give the IDA treasury 10¢/member/issue after this first issue.

This money would be used for hobby subsidies and projects, and we would also be willing to subsidize DW at a later date, with the understanding that Jerry MUST try to break even. Jerry will continue

- 79.04 In agreement with the new editor of <u>Diplomacy World</u>, the Council hereby approves of DW becoming a project of the IDA.

 All future editors shall be chosen from the IDA membership by a majority vote of the Council.
- 79.05 Council approves the editing and publishing of DW as Jerry Jones' Special Project for 1979.
- 79.06 Council authorizes Bill Young to pay Jerry Jones \$150 for publishing the current issue of DW and cov er current expenses.
- 79.07 The DW editor agrees to pay 10¢ per subscriber per issue to the IDA Treasury. Council approves this payment and will not charge further dues for membership.
- 79.08 Council authorizes the Periodicals Editor to submit 4 issues of <u>Diplomacy Review</u> to the DW editor, for inclusion of in DW.

Constitutional Amendment Motion #2:

Article "THE COUNCIL", Section IV. (Periodiclals Editor) is amended to read as follows:

IV. Periodicals Editor

The Periodicals Editor is responsible for the regular production of a magazine of news, Council doings, etc., titled DIPLOMACY REVIEW and issued five times each year. Four issues shall be printed quarterly in Diplomacy World. A fifth issue shall be printed between the third and fourth quarterly issues for the purpose of holding IDA elections, and shall be printed separately from Diplomacy World.
