We were privileged to tour the convention facilities at Mary Washington College recently and to take part in the facility playtest game. The physical lay-out is just about perfect for a convention. The halls make up a fine labyrinth for negotiations; there is access for the handicapped; and in the event of a huge turn-out, conventioneers can overflow upstairs. WHADJAGET?

A tourney needs a scoring system and everyone is invited to comment on MaryCon's system. The following is hereby run up the flagpole.

Winner (no strong second) 34 Winner with strong second 24

Two-way draw 17 (each)
Three-way draw 11 (each)
Strong-second 10

Each survivor (including

winners/drawers) 0.1 per supply center

At least ten centers are necessary to qualify for a textbook strong-second. A concession to win/strong-second can be made but must be unanimous, same as a draw. There will be some limitations on who can be voted win/strong-second, to avoid concessions to weak powers, e.g., the two together must have 18 centers, or some such variation. Questions: Is the win without strong-second overvalued relative to the draws? Well, the symmetry is attractive and wins should be encouraged. Is the strong-second provision a good idea or is it a bribe? It will make the 34-point win more dear, perhaps impossible to obtain. It does provide an alternative to a 2-way draw among unequal allies. It may be too easy for the losing coalition to choose their own second-place finisher and turn over enough centers to make ten. What do you think? Please point out any glitches you foresee. There will also be awards for achievements other than point accumulation, probably best countries and even individual game performance. Comments?

With Origins and probably another large east coast con also this summer they'll probably cut into your attendance. Late April may be a better time (you could call it Taxrefundcon), but then you run into possible problems with promotion and facility availability. Also, if you'd like to draw heavily from both DC, Baltimore and maybe Philly, a site just north of DC would probably be better for sheer attendance. The University of Maryland, College Park as a possible site? I know they have an active Diplomacy/wargame club and I've played in a small tourney there (4 boards) before. They may be willing to co-sponsor. I really couldn't say. My idea of an "ideal" tournament would be 3 six-hour rounds, with an extra hour (maximum) for initial organization and Q/A time. I figure with three rounds going to 1910 each, you could get a definite winner. If you want an "official" GM, I'm willing to tentatively offer my services. I'd have to know

more about how the tourney will be run schedule-wise and of course it'd be contingent on your acceptance.

Where's Dale City?

I don't play much face-to-face any more due to my crazy schedule and a lack of ready/willing opponents. Given the opportunity, I'd love to drop in on one of your little stabfests. I'm also not nearly as good a player as I once was- I've become too fair and trustworthy: I don't don't get away with half the stuff I used to. Oh, crisis? I usually survive, but nobody trusts me anymore-

Politesse is basically a postal zeen for a FTF group and the two don't seem to intersect very well. Keep circulating, play a game a month and dno't knock yourself but. Maybe you can last it out and it'll eventually catch on. It is an interesting concept, I just don't know of a perceived need for it. You may gather more interest by running a local phone or by mail game, but I don't know if you want to run games. Maybe making it into more of a "standard" postal zeen would make it more attractive.
