

END-GAME REVIEWS OF SWISS DIPLOMACY II, 1978 Rje RECENTLY COMPLETED HERE

PHIL COOPER (Austria): Actually, I was far luckier than I deserved. Russia and Turkey never could trust each other until it was far too late. Also, my early growth allowed me to deal from a position of strength with them against each other. It was obvious from the start that the Swiss and Germans were allied, and when both offered me a non-aggression pact, it drove Italy into my willing arms. My only regret is that the last took all my strength, and none could be spared for a loyal Italy.

From fairly early on, I had been in frequent contact with London and Berlin, warning them of each other. When Germany did stab me, slightly earlier than I had expected, it gave Karl the opportunity any real diplomacy player would jump at. I hammered home to England what would happen if I collapsed and how Germany was with the Swiss to the death. What also helped was the growing Anglo-Swiss friction over the remains of France and Iberia. This friction rocked away valuable Swiss units needed in their attack on me, and made it impossible for England to join the German-Swiss alliance and difficult for him to remain neutral when they jumped me. By the real key to my strategic decision to offer England a two-way draw, a deal Germany and Switzerland couldn't match. It was either this or face a long-drawn-out struggle leading to a four-way draw. The necessity of allying with England to turn back Germany and the Swiss, although I probably could've held on indefinitely, allowed England to reach a position of strength which killed my chances for a sole win. (Besides there are times when loyalty is important).

Lastly, I'd like to comment on my early success. I don't think I've ever played a more strategically and tactically good game as this through the first four years. But, I don't think I'll ever see another game where I was so lucky, for so long. It was almost like I couldn't do anything wrong!

KARL SCHUTZ (England): I started out in an alliance with Germany and Switzerland versus France. I had planned to stay firmly allied to Germany and France still, and work my way into the Mediterranean. However, Germany decided to break with Switzerland and I was placed in a position of

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pricing in a game which begins with an even number of players. As a rule of thumb, Diplomacy variants having an odd number of players will result in better games, since there must always be an "odd man out." However, a good map design can overcome some of this; 90% of the Swiss Dip map is the Master's (Calhoun's), but I believe my amendments make the variant viable. Perhaps there is a bit too much crowding at the center of the board, where the provinces are quite small. This could be overcome, in part, by making a larger sized map, so that Geneva, Zurich, and Swabia don't look tiny. I thought that the creation of Croatia and Swabia provided sufficient ordinary space in the center. I now see that perhaps there ought to be another ordinary space somewhere in the middle, based on what's happened to Switzerland in the other Swiss Dip game which I'm playing (in Diplomas), but I don't see that there's any room for one.

I felt that the addition of the High Ocean space, which makes neighbors out of England and Turkey, would serve to eliminate corner positions. However, only England was clever enough to see how useful this space could be. I was a bit disappointed to see only one unit use the High Ocean; but then, naval forces were not of prime importance in this particular game.

I am thinking of removing the 26-center two-power alliance victory rule. In this game, the two winning powers won with a total of only 24, but I think the knowledge that they only had to get two more centers to declare an automatic victory may have sorted to cause Italy and I to recognize the inevitable, and concede at a point prior to where we might have conceded had no such rule existed.
