Play on most parts was pretty good, and I can't say that I was disappointed with the outcome... all three richly deserved the draw. My only regret is that Fred Hyatt showed me that yes, one can do well with Austria in Youngstown. (I simply cannot play Austria in any game under any conditions and do well.) I hope that many of you have end-game statements. If so, please have them to my brother by September 8, and they'll go into the next issue.

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1978Sth -- Colonia IV -- Winter 1756 -- ANGLO-RUSSIA DRAW DECLARED
 Several players circulated, by themselves, to all players in the game, a proposal for an Anglo-Russian draw last month. When asked about whether or not that would be legit, I said that it'd clear it if all players were notified. All were, and all players voted yes... unanimously, then the draw comes about. I did not get any orders from Gene Prosnits yet, but, as always in my games, no vote or missed move/a/no vote always equals a yes vote. In any case, the 75% vote would have been easily achieved without his four centers votes. So, then, the game is over at last. Congratulations to Karl Schuetz and Fred Hyatt, who share the draw, and congratulations to all for their play. Congratulations to Komad for actually game-mastering this bummer to completion, a feat I wouldn't want to try again. The action was hot-n-heavy in this game from the very first year, and I hope that I'll have statements from some or all of the players on exactly what was going on anywhere. AUSTRIA TO RUSSIA: I am striving to bury you with graves-full of help from my friends.

AUSTRIA TO TURKEY: It looks like Carter's last stand, my friend.

AUSTRIA TO GERMANY: Are we in a position to capture Narva from Russia?

AUSTRIA TO FRANCE: I am compelled to support Germany against France.

AUSTRIA TO ITALY: I am compelled to support Germany against France.

POLITICIAN: Oops, that last to Italy should read "I aim to continue our phony war." Sorry..

And as for your claim of carrying the banner of truth I shall first paraphrase Al Capone who said "When I sell liquor it's called bootlegging; when my patrons serve it on silver trays on Lake Shore Drive, it's called hospitality," and second, Maxine Hollander who said "My method is basically the same as Hester and Johnson, only they charge thousands of dollars and it's called therapy. I charge fifty dollars and it's called prostitution." So remember that a man never discloses his own character so clearly as when he describes another. And while you may use knives in the lobby, you're not playing with novices here. And, your threats of using someone else's cross-game grudges as a sword over my head, just down wash with me.

POLITICIAN: I like the variety of the people you quote! One of my favorites is another from Al Capone, occasionally used in Diplomacy: You get more with a smile and a gun than with just a smile. And as for Stalin...

PARIS: Stay tuned for the next volume of the Laws of Diplomacy. A sudden attack of mental health, and a matter of principle, should have passed by next issue.

POLITICIAN: I happen to love those laws...make great ideas for press.

BERLIN TO PARIS: If what I've heard is true, the move to Burgundy is in retaliation. If I've been lied to, please accept my apology for the intrusion.

ITALY: Fear not, world! The mysterious black-clad figure failed to kill our beloved press agent George N. Drivel, but instead killed last week's President Raoul N. Repugnent.

POLITICIAN: Go on! That's all the press you can manage? I think Seriously, a few players write decent excuses for not having any...congratulations to Bob Kluge, especially! OK, so now the game...after some reappropriet words from Rod Walker from the year 1975 (which happen to apply today as well):

"The only important thing in postal Diplomacy is the press. I don't know what the poor people who have to play the game FTF do. Without press releases, the game is unspeakably dull...an occasional stab will liven things up, but after a while, it doesn't make much difference whether you do or you don't. At that point, I always suicide against all of my neighbors simultaneously and go out to the kitchen for some cold pizza."

"In postal Diplomacy, it is otherwise. The game exists merely as an excuse to write press (and perhaps as a background for it). The deadline is when the GameMaster wants the press or he can type it up. Negotiations are for the purpose of coordinating releases. Rating systems and organizations exist entirely to give us targets for topical and artificial malice. Strategy and tactics articles are written only to give us ideas for interesting things to do on the playing board so we can write press about them..."

7) Well, I think the rest of the space here should go to personal notes. So, until next month...and remember that next issue will likely be a week or so later than usual. Mail orders to the usual address.


