THE LAGERSON TAPES OR

THE CREAT FAKE SABERTOOTH NEIGER EXPOSEE

Recently it has been alleged by certain publishers that there has been a change. Allegedly, members of The POUCH staff have left and a certain Gil Neiger has allegedly taken over control of the vast publishing empire know as The POUCH. With this change, former POUCH publishers—Drunken Smith, the pineapple lady, and St. Nick—have departed for points unknown. Well, I'm here to say that it

ain't so, and I offer some proof that it ain't.

First, I site the physical evidence available. Look at the new issues of The POUCH and compare them with issues before the alleged change (or BC). Is there any real difference? The paper is still of the same poor quality, the ink still the cheapest to be found. Sure the words "THE POUCH" on top are a little more squiggly and sloppy, but the heading still has the stupid horizontal lines it always had and still looks the same. Is there any real change? Is the editorial policy any different? Diplomacy World is still blasted, as is THE PRESIDENT. A change in any of this? NOT HARDLY! Sure, Gil Neiger (or should I say, the alleged Gil Neiger?) began his alleged publishing career by apologizing for the low quality of the 'zine. Well, how is that different? After all, the 'zine was always low in quality (could it be otherwise, coming from the East Coast where low quality is the byword---just look at 'zines like Mixumaxu Gazette and teams like the Yankees). Actually, the low quality is probably why we subscribe in the first place. So Gil's apology was nothing more than an attempt to direct attention away from the fact that no change had taken place at all.

There is much baloney about losing the alleged people—St. Nick, Dunking, penny wise and pound foolish. HOGWASH! Everyone knows (the insiders know anyway) that one person, and one person only controls The POUCH (schizoid perhaps, but still one person). Stories; articles, including the alleged fight between Badmouth Druken and the Sweater Girl; the press and all were created by one person, who also, with the aid of a digital computer built from a \$29.95 Heath Kit, managed the billing (often sending two or three bills per subscription period and then, if discovered, blaming it on the computer—which

may, after all, not exist either).

Difficult to believe that only one person is in control of The POUCH and created all those "people"? After all, there were GM's and they played in games. There were articles and feuds. There were even phone calls to the outside world. How did all this occur if "they" were only one person? Simple. The different addresses are all controlled by "MR. (or MS.) BIG" who also has the phones tapped into a central office. Not so hard to do. And the phone voices are even simpler. Have you ever talked to Ulanov or Neiger or the Smith Brothers? Haven't you noticed how much alike they all sound (all

those New Yorkers sound so much alike with their horrible accent anyway)? Well, "they" are really just one person disguising his voice to sound like a bunch of high school kids. (Who ever heard of high school kids creating a monster like <u>The POUCH</u> anyway?)

So you see the evidence for one central Wr. (Ms.) Big. WHO, you ask is then in control? Well, there are several possibilities. First, there is Roberta Byline Lipton Tea, former Easton publishing magnate extraordinaire, who might be behind it. Obviously among the Eastern Liberal Establishment and with known Marxist leanings, Lipton Tea is also known to oppose both Diplomacy World and THE PRESIDENT, and, by observing his multi-colored 'zine, one finds a strong literary link with The POUCH, as well as foreigners like Gilbert and Sullivan and others of questionable reputation. One also notices that, by surprising coincidence, Roberta moved to N.Y. just as the alleged "Old Guard" allegedly departed.

Perhaps the culprit is really Walter Buchanan. After all, look at all the publicity aroused by Ulanov's charges over the <u>Diplomacy World</u> affair. This probably increased circulation tenfold. Obviously Buchanan's operation in Indiana was suffering badly as he was finally forced out of <u>Hoosier Archives</u> publication due to lack of circulation. This was cleverly covered up, for a while, by publishing large numbers of copies and storing them in the Archives to make it appear as though the 'zine was fine——an old publisher's trick (how old is Walt?). One might even guess that <u>The POUCH might</u> just be entire early copies of HA in a new format to fool new hobby members.

Or perhaps SPI is behind the 'zine. Dunnigan himself might be the man, considering all the free publicity the struggling company has received from The POUCH. Or perhaps it is CRI which has been secretly contributing large amounts to The POUCH coffers over the past year. Or is it just a conspiracy of NYU computer operators.

But there is another reasonable choice: the alleged Nicky Ulanov. who, after all, doesn't exist except as a fictitious name created when he entered the publishing industry. Secretly building up substantial cash reserves on a minimum amount of product (his bank assets in several large New York banking institutions are rumored to be into six figures), Ulanov found it necessary to invest in other legitimate businesses in order to keep his financial empire growing. This is entirely reasonable since he is a New Yorker and everyone knows that almost everyone in NYC is into organized crime (would Efrem Zimbalist Jr. lie to us?). Soon he exhausted legitimate channels and was forced into the shady world of illicit drugs and flesh peddling (as seen in the work of his creations Dunking Smith and the Sweater Girl). Needing a new identity and a change, he wanted one last killing. Thus the feeble black-mail attempt made earlier this year which was clumsily excused as an April Fools trick. His strong arm tactics would have succeeded were it not for a few brave subscribers who have since dropped out of the hobby (probably into the bottom of the Jersey River).

This choice of WHO IS BEHIND The POUCH would certainly be compatible with the phoney phone voices. Nick is a New Yorker (New Yorkers being responsible for over ninety percent of all crime in the (continued on page six)

An amphibious invasion anywhere along the southern coast is imminent after hex 4407 falls. For that reason, forts should always be built in Charleston, (Savannah and Mobile) as soon as possible. Secondarily, Norfolk and Pensacola should be fortified if possible. Leaving one strength point in each of these cities will prevent a direct Union landing in the port until Winter 1863 (you have the garrison, plus any state militia, which, when tripled by the fort are six strength points; the city's intrinsic strength brings this up to seven, which cannot be double-matched from the sea until W'63; please note that Wilmington cannot be directly hit from the sea). Savannah, Charleston and Mobile are far more important than the other two, especially later in the game when the northern of the two main CSA rail lines is cut, and the southern is the only one which is intact. Savannah is also very important because its fall permits a possible Union breakout in Georgia. New Orleans should not be given too much weight. Union assault on it is very hard, and by the time he can do it properly, it will most likely be cut off. If you can entice your opponent to waste most of his sea-lift capacity on New Orleans, then by all means do so by not fortifying it. However, you will want to reinforce Fort Sumter, as if it's ungarrisoned the USA can land there directly (and attack Charleston on the same turn!).

In the west, western Tennessee should be a maze of forts. This prevents Union incursion on the Cumberland, Tennessee and Mississippi rivers by means of supply, riverine units and river-movement. Nashville and Memphis are important, but large forces should not be left surrounded in either. You may wish to fortify the Mississippi just opposite Vicksburg, and at the junction of the Red and Mississsippi rivers, as this will allow (for a while) your Texan reinforcements to cross these rivers in spite of Union riverine units. Somewhere in the Cumberland Gap there should be a fort,

and a fort should be prepared in Chattanooga.

Much of the Confederate strategy can be inferred from the opposing Union strategy. For instance, the Chattahoochie should be fortified to prevent Union penetration, particularly on hexes 2633 (or 2533) and 2631. Remember that your main object is to keep your supply-grid in a big piece. This usually means holding Georgia, but remember that in addition to holding supply-cities, you must keep them linked by rail-lines and rivers. You have two main eastwest rail-lines. The more vulnerable of these goes thru Decatur, Chattanooga, Knoxville and onward to Lynchburg (in Virginia). For this line to useful you should have most of the deep south intact. Later in the game, when that line is cut, you have the rail-line which goes thru Meridian, Mobile, Columbus, branches out into several lines in Georgia, which all meet in Charleston. This is the more important of the two, and if snipped in the right places (continued on page six) at the right time, it'll cost you the game. Note that usually a

Union attack anywhere in the deep south (Alabama, Mississippi and Georgia) will be (or at least should be) directed at cutting this rail-line. That is because in addition to being one the Confederacy's two rail-lines going from west to east, it is, unlike the other, vital for keeping together the CSA's main supply-cities in the south-central Confederacy that keep the south alive thru the last few game turns.

Many people have complained to me (of all people) that any merit that the game has is lost by the command-control rules. They say that these rules force the players' (especially the Union's) strategies upon them, making the game on of pure luck. My response to this utter nonsense is obvious to anyone who has bothered to learn the game. The main restrictions of the command-control rules are upon the Union player in the early turns of the game. This prevents the Union player from totally mauling his opponent before the CSA can prepare defenses. However, later in the game, the command-control rules in no way restricts either player's strategic options (barring terrible playing and luck). This is because the command-control rules are a tactical deterrant (by using hex-numbers) as the hex numbering pattern is set up along the strategic lines and not perpendicular to them.

By following these strategic guide-lines, American Civil War can develop into a finely balanced strategic game. Because the game is not unbalanced (some people would voice opposite opinions). The problem of the game that plagues many players is that the decision point can come quite early in favor of the Confederacy. But this usually comes because of extremely bad luck or playing on the part of the Union player. If the early decision doesn't occur than the outcome of the game can be up in the air until the very last turn. Remember that on the sixteenth (last) turn Macon, Atlanta, Columbus and Augusta can win the game for the CSA.

I have only touched on the subject of strategy in American Civil War (in five and one half pages!), and outlined only the obvious, because most of the strategy in the game is different in each game. These problems must be solved by the individual player, during each individual game. Have fun!

US, present statistics show) so the voices would be easy. He could merely hire a few hit men to portray "phone God Fathers" for the benefit of callers. Smythe had developed the opening in an early DIPLOPHOBIA game.

However, I think it would be equally ungenerous not to give credit to Edi where it is due. It is true, regardless of earlier uses, that he was the first person to call the hobby's attention to the opening in an article. It is also he who not only named the opening, but began the tradition of naming openings in the game—a tradition which, I don't really need to remind you, is in turn borrowed from chess. So even if he did get the idea from someone else, Edi did treat it in an original way which enriched the hobby. We can only fault him for giving an incomplete background to his contribution.

Although I am sure TDA made its contribution, I think it only fair to observe the recent expansion of the hobby was a cooperative affair in which many people and organizations labored. The problem with assessing TDA's part in all this is that its activities were largely not a matter of public record. I guess it is well known that John Beshara and I disagreed rather violently on the wisdom of this course of action. Be that as it may, that is what was done, and result is now, two years later, it is impossible to say with certainty, in terms of contemporary and verifiable

facts and figures, what TDA did do.

However, a good many other people were working on expanding the hobby. Walt Buchanan and Larry Peery did yeoman service with novices, of course. However, not to be immodest, but it seems to me that I made a contribution which was indispensible to all this. Of course I put out the only regular publication (PONTEVEDRIA) devoted exclusively to clueing

novices into the hobby. But there was more to it than that.

If John can jump on Edi for forgetting his contribution to one area, I guess I can take umbrage for his forgetting mine. ((Sorry to interrupt, Rod, but as I read John's letter (printed in The POUCH, issue 66) What I think he is saying is not that he feels that Edi forgot him in his article; he would have spoken up some time ago had he felt that; I think he was just trying to point out that Edi had not originated the opening; whether it had been developed before by any given person: himself, Don Berman, John Smythe, whatever, is unimportant; merely that it had been developed before is John's point)) There could have been no big expansion in recent years without the GRI flyer included with the Diplomacy sets. And whose idea was it to have the flyer compiled and inserted with the sets? Who sold the idea to John Moot? Why, the undersigned, of course! Where would TDA, or IDA, or any of the people working with novices be without that basic tool for gaining their attention in the first place? It is perhaps easy to forget these days that it was my idea originally. (And before that, I was doing similar work through my regular column in STRATEGY & TACTICS, and that column has brought in hundreds of inquiries over the years,)

I am not, by the way, in the least annoyed by John's omission of mentioning my contribution. My point here is that the notion that TDA was doing all the work, or even most of it, is a false one. I am sure John did not intend to leave the reader with such an idea, but I suppose that a reader not familiar with the history of the hobby from 1969 to 1972 would gain that impression from John's letter. This is intended to amplify
