GM: I'm not sure what to do here....The letter carriers are in a strike position, but have not called and are not calling a <u>national</u> strike, only rotating local ones. I'm not sure I'm even doing the right thing sending this adjudication out, but...here it is. I am setting a tentative deadline of <u>MONDAY</u>, <u>AUGUST 3,1987</u>. If any player feels that this slightly-longer than usual deadline does not give enough in compensation for the length of the rotating strikes in their local area, please contact me, by collect call if necessary, and I will set a longer deadline. Expect this to be the deadline until and unless you hear otherwise.

Russia to Germany: You're quite right in assuming that your Valhalla awaits you in the north, Gilda.

Russia to France: Instead of 8 inches, why not say 20 centimeters, it sounds much more impressive, don't you think? Think metric...

Russia to Austria and Italy: If any of my units can be of the slightest use to you please don't hesitate to ask!

Russia to Turkey: Well, this season (unless he is excessively stupid), Germany can walk in and take Moscow and Sweden, all of this courtesy of your ill-considered stab of me, your faithful ally. I'm sure the Kaiser kneels to Constantinople five times a day to thank you. It's really all he can do, because he sure won't be able to use the SCs to build anything in Germany. It seems such a waste, doesn't it? P.S. Is this the season you make your grab for Budapest, or are you waiting until the fall?

No, this isn't CARLETON press—it is an interpolation. The rotating strike tactic used by the Letter Carriers Union was quite shrewd. The Union has no strike fund, so the tactic allowed the great majority of the union members to continue to receive their pay on any given day. The disruption was always great enough to cause anxiety in the average citizen and to make the press but never widespread enough to run the risk of allowing the Government to pass back—to—work legislation. Picket line duty is tiring, and a pro longed picket runs the risk of inciting either apathy or violence in the picketers, and from a union's perspective, it's hard to know which is worse. A short picket duty allows picketers to approach their task energetically with the knowledge that it will not go on forever.

Germany: As our hero flew northwards he saw below him long lines of German soldiers marching north, forever north. I don't appreciate the nature of your press - I may be naive, but I do not believe in passing on letters from other players - I may paraphrase what another player has said, but I would never copy another player's letter as part of my negociating in a game. I feel violated by your direct quotes in the press - a little bit unfair isn't it, when I haven't received a letter from you since DEC 23 (02 04)? I resent your being bitter at me - I did what I thot was best for my game - and to hell with you. - Frank.

Follow up:

Gary - As I said above, I find it remarkably sad that a player in a "game"would allow their poor showing in that game to lead to the type of slander and personal insults that you have resorted to. It's pretty convenient when you can edit the evidence by picking and choosing items to be presented in your case - sort of like being both prosecutor and judge, isn't it?

As for voting in the RUNESTONE POLL last year - since when is it any of your business (and hence the rest of the world's!) how or for whom I vote? It seems to me that you are taking advantage of your position of trust within the hobby for your own petty purposes.


Final Comment to the World:

- Marseilles: Thousands lined the streets today to cheer the victorious French army as it entered the city. Captured Italian weaponry was displayed and hundreds of Italian prisoners were guillotined while jeering French patriots looked on. The entire nation rejoiced, because once again they could sunbathe on the Med.
- Paris: The effects of war are being felt here, as nail polish seems to be in short supply.

 Also, certain wall papering patterns are said to be unavailable. The question here is, how long will the beleagured citizenry be able to keep making such sacrifices?

Randolph Smyth COMMENTARY - Pre-Spring 1902:

The global strategy for 1902 may be a bit different from the usual game of regular Diplomacy. In the game we're all used to seeing, only perhaps two centers remain neutral after 1901. Their occupation is a peripheral matter relative to the need to attack someone else. Here, we still have a huge number of neutrals - eight centers in the southern regions alone - and any power with access to them can do quite well just by avaoiding conflict and scooping 'em up. Relative to the regular game, then, this one has the potential a quiet, positional 1902.

That's not how these players seem inclined, though. Even in 1901, we've seen more than the usual level of fighting, and I have no reason to predict that things will get quieter. At least Russia and Turkey seem to have resolved their differences, based on the press; but clearly, that's only in order to let them fight other enemies more effectively.

Let's start with Italy/Austria: their allaince seems the most clear-cut and successful so far, though they haven't got around to tactical cooperation yet. How can they keep things going? I would expect them to woo the English furiously - Bruce can make all the difference against Turkey, and can also be decisive against Russia or France. Similarily, it doesn't matter whether Paul goes East, West, or both: he'll be invaluable in tying up either Russia or France. In fact, if an E/G/A/I alliance doesn't run into compatibility problems, the other players can pack their bags already. So don't expect to see Austrianarmies in Germany, or Italian units fighting English ones in Egypt.

Paul can use the allies, but I'm not sure that Bruce will or should buy the whole package.

Randolph Smyth COMMENTARY - Pre-Spring 1902 (continued):

His initial deal seems to be with Steve's France, and it may still suit him best to keep Steve viable for a while. In his shoes, I would do some self-interest waffling about his (real or imaginary) non-aggression pact.

I'll take the notice of Russia's early silence at face value - a sensible explanation, since I was surprised to see a good diplomat like Alan in some trouble in 1901. He's patched things up with Turkey, and his builds allow him to hold Austria; but what of the north? Germany seems committed, unfortunately; unless he can steer England in another direction, he's still in trouble. Bruce may be headed straight for Scandinavia, though - there are neutrals beckoning, and he can then intervene in favour of either Germany or Russia. Both must promise him the moon to get him to go against the other. While Italy may have the best strategic position, England still has the most profitable diplomatic options. The south has declared itself, and each of his three northern neighbours needs him. Can he cash in on his present flexibility in terms of centers?

As Steve pointed out privately, my "hit percentage" is bound to drop dramatically as the units have more options. He suggested I change to a prediction of "which units will be committed to which specific objective". However, I think there is often a right way and a wrong way to attack a center, so I'll stick with the specific orders until I become too embarrassed at guessing wrong.

GM's COMMENTARY COMMENT:

OK Randolph, you're the boss. But don't say I didn't give you an out! Let's see how you did this season ... (the starting positions of correctly predicted orders are capitalized) ...

Not bad! Certainly nothing to be embarrassed about. When you're guessing at their various strategies the prediction of their actual tactics is **an i**ffy proposition. Certainly the battle for MAR was a tactical situation, whereas F psn-CAD, A vie-TYL and A fra-WUR are on a much more strategic plane. However, as you said in your pre-Fall 1901 commentary, the places you're wrong will be the best jumping-off points for the next seasons commentary.

GM's COMMENTARY COMMENT (continued):

Also, as you say, there is often a right way to attack a center, but there are often situation where its a fielder's choice between attacking and supporting pieces. I'd hate to see your accuracy fall based on any such toss of the coin situations; so if you run into any I think it would be fair for you to flag them as such and I'll credit you a "hit" if either set of orders is actually issued to the troops. Reasonable?

Fall 1902 looks exciting as more Great Powers come into contact and the neutrals get scooped (I'd guess 8-10 will fall and maybe even a couple of ½ SC pairs). Reconciliation of short and long term interests with the crystalizing power structure should give the players plenty to think about and you plenty to write about. Good luck to all!




E L G I N

James Bruce, the 8th Earl of Elgin (1811-63) was Governor General of Canada from 1846 to 1854. He supproted responsible government (boo, hiss) and was active in securing United States Senate ratification of the Reciprocity Treaty of 1854.

ELGIN, as a result of the redistribution of 1986, now includes the whole County of Elgin. Aldborough and Dunwich townships had previously been part of KENT-ELGIN. This is tobacco country, a quaintly scenic part of the province. Highway 3 is the scenic route through the district if you are proceeding from Buffalo to Detroit (and if you are, it is no doubt on an unpleasant task of some kind) while Highway 401 is the faster route from Detroit to Toronto.

The Member for ELGIN, Ron McNeil, was elected in 1958, making him the longest-serving member for the Legislature. Although his party, the Progressive Conservatives, formed the government continuously from that time until 1985, Mr. McNeil never made it into Cabinet.

Lord Elgin was a pragmatist, accepting the necessity of increased self-Government of the Colonies as the demand for it manifested itself. Hence it is highly appropriate that **E**, will be the first game played under my relaxed separation-of-deadlines rule in response to popular demand:

2. SEPARATION OF DEADLINES

- (b) The deadlines for winter adjustments and spring moves shall be separated
 - (i) upon the request of fifty per cent of the surviving players in the game;
 - (ii) upon the request of players controlling fifty per cent of the supply cent at the time of the last winter adjustments; or
 - (iii) where the Gamesmaster considers it desirable, considering the complexity of the board position.

Dipcon-Madcon '87

I have been delaying the writing of this for the longest time, for the most obvious reason. I played in three games at this Con, and in two of them I got eliminated—in a most humiliating fashion. I do not enjoy chronicling such occurences. However, I had a Hell of a good time——so, here goes.

Out of character, I made my transportation arrangements for this Con very early, and so got a tremendous American Airlines Summer SuperSaver bargain rate--about \$150 Canadian, as far as I can remember. To get this rate, I had to pick my flight early--and I picked a flight arriving in Chicago early Thursday evening. Now if you were in such a position, I bet you would have opted for an evening of ease--maybe calling Andy Lischett or Bruce Geryk or Ron Krukowski ahead of time, letting him know that you would be in town, trying to wangle an invitation to stay overnight, maybe offering a free dinner out if necessary (what does this 'Carolyn' person look like anyway?) Not me--I thought it my duty to so some investigative reporting, just like Terry Tallman used to do in the late, great, North Sealth, West George. I was there to report to the Good People of PRAXIS. And so, herewith, my report--on the bars of Chicago. In the order in which I patronized them.

Choices. ***. Downtown, somewhere near Michigan Avenue. A place very much like P.J. Muggs, or whatever it is called, in Toronto--also like 'Mr. grummps.'

Very much a downtown worker place, I think. Kitchen closes at 6:00! Watched the beginning of the Knicks-celtics game, poor reception. Short on Lite beers Darts; music; TV. Called Dave Carter from here to submit my final orders in Awbri, my second three-way draw. Thanks, Evans!

4th Edition, in the Chicago Marriott. *1/2*. Disco manqué. Big dance floor, the coloured lights were flashing, the music was loud, no-one was dancing, and the few patrons tried to get as far away from the dance floor as possible. \$3.24 per beer--unremarkable in Canada, but very high in America.

Howard's Bar and Grill. 125 E. Ontario (great name for a street). ****.

The look of a neighbourhood bar, downtown. Small, cozy. Great bar snacks—sausage—type things. Tap beer only. The barmaid served me some Wisconsin beer with a long name—asked her to spell it, and she said, 'Who cares?' It's a popular one, I guess—saw it later at the Wall—Fleming—Barno pad in Madison.

<u>Pippin's Tavern</u>, Rush Street. Too crowded to get in. Saw it listed later when I looked up a Chicago tourist guide--very popular, I guess.

Streeters, Chicago Street. ****. A sports bar--Celtics were losing 129-107. Old look. Crowded, loud, friendly atmosphere.

Flapfaw's, Pearson Street. Crowded again, but not packed. **1/2*. A study in the failings of a not-quite-up-to-snuff bar--modern, black, plastic tables and seats, surrounded by cheap, imitation wood panelling.

Walton Street Waterworks. Still walking north. A new bar--'Grand opening' was May 31. Unpleasant--am I getting into a different part of town? Big dance floor, nice set-up, mostly empty, except for a few black patrons who look like the villains in Death Wish 3. **.

Joe's. ****1/2. Address--don't know--my notes are getting somewhat illegible.

Probably the light was bad. Anyway, it is here I stayed. Why? They serve 'Miller Genuine Draft', which I have seen served only once before, in a dive in Myrtle Beach, North Carolina. Play great 60s music too--courtesy of radio station WRXR. I always meet strange, interesting people in bars--and this was no exception. My drinking companion was Sergio Perez, a professional guitar player and Marxist political economy student. I kid you not--I have his address, as he wrote it, sitting here in front of me, and I explained Diplomacy to him and promised to send hima copy of Praxis. (Haven't done it yet.) We almost got into a knife fight--I went to the can, somebody tried to take my seat, Sergo tried to stop him, the intended usurper challenge Sergio to a fight (the usurper had a friend), and Sergio was, as I kidded him, one second away from pulling out his knife. Tremendous time. Bars close at 4:00 A.M. in Illinois very civilised--and we left when the cop car parked outside the bar at 4:15....

Where did I go? To the Greyhound station, of course—for the bus to Madison that left at 5:30. Walked by the headquarters of one of the Chicago papers—didn't note which one—and it was fascinating to watch the melee as all the drivers tried to load up to take the morn ing edition on its way.

Next story—there I was, standing in the terminal, a ugly, dirty, sort of place, the sort of place where the people who prove they have a ticket are in a roped—off area, and everybody else is thrown out by the security people—when this absolutely begatiful young woman walks in wearing a 'Roots' sweatshirt, a pair of shorts, and little else. What the Hell is she doing wandering around downtown Chicago at this time of night? She asked me for directions to the ticket counter—actually, it was obvious where the ticket counter was, but it was temporarily closed and she was wondering what was going on—and I gave them. Thirty minutes later, ahe turned up in the same linup as I was and I brazenly engaged her in a conversation. Turned out she was a student at the University of Buffalo, not far from me, had a boyfriend who plays for the Buffalo Sabres (I didn't ask his name), and was a part—time model (I told you she was beautiful) who was taking a bus to Milwaukee, from Buffalo, to apply for a summer modelling job.

We talked on the bus, then she got off at Milwaukee.

OK, so it isn't that great a story.

But you might have thought differently if you had seen this blonde apparition manifest: itself in the Chicago bus terminal at 4:45 A.M. when you were completely loaded.

Take my word for it.

And she wasn'e sleazy looking, either. Innocent looking--a nice girl.

I poured myself off the bus in Madison, Friday morning, and wandered around, listening to <u>Jesus Christ Superstar</u> on my Walkman--hadn't listened to it in 14 years, picked it up a few weeks ago, and love it. Then, trying to follow the Madcon map, I walked down Washington street, to and all the way around the State capitol, to the University, and eventually found the Hall.

I love this city--big university, state capitol, relaxed atmosphere. Kingston is the closest Ontario comparison I can think of, but Madison is an order of magnitude greater.

In the Student union, I ran into--who else?-- Steve Swigger, from Toronto. Call to headquarters, and Mike Barno was there to pick us up. James Wall drove us around, to a comic book store, past Paul Rauterberg's former bar (as we walked by it, James warned two people walking in 'Don't go in; the new owner's sleazy.') around and around, back to 514, where I played Naval Warfare for the first time. Bobby Acheson won because I occupied myself for too long with an anti-Wall vendetta. Such is life.

Headed for the residence where I was to stay, Matt Fleming's car broke down, had to walk (hope you don't mind the stream-of-consciousness).

I was still feeling badly from the night before, and decided not to play in the first round, but only after a long agony of self-questioning and self-doubt. If you spend a lot of money to go to con a long way away, shouldn't you play in as many games as possible? Anyway I sat Friday night out, marvelling at the strength of the players assembled. Met Greg Ellis, met the great Randolph Smyth.

Went home to bed--early.

Round One--Never Give a Sucker an Even Break.

AUSTRIA--Fred Davis; ENGLAND--Duane Bronsen; FRANCE--Steve Smith; GERMANY --Alan Stewart; ITALY--Dave Henning; RUSSIA--Fred Townsend; TURKEY--Greg Ellis.

FRANCE was not interested in attacking ENGLAND; Steve told me in the post-mortem that nothing I could have said would have convinced him to do so-he doesn't believe in it. ENGLAND seemed pro-France, and gave off the general air of not knowing what he was doing. Solution: western triple.

The East organized itself quickly against this threat, under the spur of Greg Ellis, whom I had the misfortune of meeting up with twice at this tournament, who always warned me what was going to happen to me (bad) if I didn't do what kerecommended, and who was always right. A perpetually active diplomat, always aware of the whole board—a superb player.

I was, very early on, in a desperate situation. I must tell you that Fred Townsend and I just don't seem to get along nohow. There's no-one I've met in the Hobby I dislike, but. We have met, now, in three tournament games. In the first I eliminated him, and he has now returned me the favour twice. In bad times, he is a whiner, and in good times a bully.

I had convinced ENGLAND to launch into a northern attack against Fred with my support. This attack had absolutely no prospect of achieving anything beyond the capture of St. Petersburg, and ENGLAND wouldn't make the necessary moves to do that expeditiously—which suited me fine, because I knew that when he realized that he wasn't going to get anywher his only practical choice was to go against me.

A desperate game.

Steve Smith was under constant Eastern pressure to move against me, which he eventually succumbed to, in a clever way. He took Munich in a Spring season. I tries to convince him to move east in the fall-and he had already thought of that and was going to try to convince me of it. If he had succeeded, our triple would have been in a commanding position, and we could have told the east to go stuff itself. But getting out of Munich was a guess. Steve tries to take Bohemia with my support, failed, and that was it—even in my opinion, he had no sensible choice after that but to try to get as much as he could by taking me apart.

Townsend. I don't believe in cross-game influences, so at a crucial moment, I accepted a Townsend peace offer ('let's all the small powers get together') and convinced ENGLAND to go along and break off our attack. Fred quickly convinced ENGLAND to turn this into an attack against me and refused to negotiate with me thereafter. The East eliminated first dave Henning and then Fred Davis (who was wandering around telling people what a weak power AUSTRIA was, and how he was pleased not to be the first one eliminated) and somehow convinced Steve Smith to accept a two way Ellis-Townsend draw.

Townsend had been down to four centres, and we could have reduced him to three had ${\rm I}$ not accepted his plan for alliance.

I was the sucker. Never give a sucker an even break.

Round Two: The Livonian System Rides Again

AUSTRIA: Bill Becker; ENGLAND: Dave Henning; FRANCE Dan Sellers; GERMANY Scott Drane; ITALY Bruce Geryk; RUSSIA Steve Clark; TURKEY Alan Stewart.

As TURKEY I always do everything I can to get RUSSIA to agree to a steamroller, mostly ignore everyone else, and then decide whether I want to go along or take him out with a stab in S 1 01.

Steve Clark and I go off immediately and start to talk about an R-T. We are both keen. Then he says, 'And I want to hit hard in the north--send two armies there, one to St. Petersburg and one to Livonia. Only if you agree and think you can handle the south of course.'

Instantly I thought of Richard Sharp's comment about Don Turnbull's Livonian System in The Game of Diplomacy. 'Brrrr. He must have played against different Turkeys than I have.'

I go to talk to AUSTRIA and ITALY. They tell me bluntly that they have seen me and RUSSIA talking, that they smell an R-T, and will do nothing against each other until they see one of us attack the other.

I corner Bill Becker tell him what's up, and encourage an alliance with him moving to Galicia. I'm tired of playing around with conservative moves. Let's get into a real alliance and have some fun and get some centres.' He agrees. All I have to do now is talk to TURKEY fad not mess it up. 'Well', I say reluctantly, 'if you really want to move two armies north I guess I can handle the south and AUSTRIA. But remember, I'll need some help soon.' Steve is keen.

Boom. F Ank-Bla, A Smy-Arm, Sev cannot be defended. Steve made an excellent try at convincing me to break off the attack, but I refused.

Now to wait. Even as late as W'03 I had only 5 centres, same as AUSTRIA, ITALY, and RUSSIA, but I was always in a commanding position, able to stab AUSTRIA at any time. First the wait for Bill to decide when to stab Bruce Geryk. I didn't want to strategic reasons, Dan Sellers eventually and in F'04 we did it (at Dan Sellers' suggestion.) Bruce had asked us to move our fleets west to meet the French threat.

Fall '05, stabbed AUSTRIA, went from 6 to 10 centres. Nothing left but to keep RUSSIA and FRANCE from working together, maximize my win possibilities, and decide who to go for the two-way with. I was actually working with RUSSIA again at this point. In fall '08 I stabbed him again and settled for a 14-centre two-way with FRANCE. My first two-way. Would have won a best country--if avid Hood had not got an 18-centre Turkish win...

Round Three: The Puppy Bites

AUSTRIA Eric Diamond; ENGLAND Alan Stewart; FRANCE Mark Frueh; GERMANY John Cannon; ITALY Scott Drane; RUSSIA Greg Ellis; TURKEY David Hood,

If the final prizes are any guide, this was a heck of a strong board. I'm not sure how I got on it.

At no point in the game could I get John Cannon to agree to, or seem interested in, anyhting. Not in attacking FRANCE; not in attacking RUSSIA.

I took a chance and made an alliance with Frueh and conceded Belgium to him for three builds. Conceded Belgium? Usually it's GERMANY who is responsible for stopping FRANCE from getting three builds if that is a problem, I think, but John Cannon just didn't want to get involved. The epitome of the 'I just don't want to offend anyone' player.

Greg Ellis warned me that Frueh would eat me up. He was right again. In S'02 had decided enough of this, I'm moving to Hel and am going after GERMANY. GERMANY and FRANCE had decided to go after me that same season. GERMANY, typically, came in too late with too little and never got, nor was close to getting, an English home centre. I puppeted to Frueh as soon as the attack was launched.

Couldn't figure Frueh out. Hadn't known that he was considered such a stabber before playing with him--understanding elements of the MadLad mystique was part of the reason I came--but after I agreed to puppet to him, he would come up to me every season with a sort of hangdog look, asking my permission for certain moves, as though I (the puppet) was the senior power. I told him I would simply move as he ordered, didn't care aboyut survival (by this point), etc., but he continued to view my efforts to take myself out in his behalf as if I were an old but healthy person insisting on committing euthanasia.

Time to head down to the bar and buy a few pitchers of beer for the masses, and relax.

I have organized successful events of a different kind in the past and so look at tournament organization with a fairly critical eye, although I am not the type of person to complain aloud. This one was well done. The essence of tournament running (well, advance planning is good, of course), is calmness, avoiding the appearance of disorganization or, even more dangerous, panic, and the Madlads had coolness in spades. Well done, madison people. Only one real complaint—since the final round was unavoidably going to be time constrained, it should have been ready to start, organization—wise, at 9:00 A.M., as it was not—delayed for an hour, as I remember.

Who won? Well, I'm not sure--Steve Swigger and I went out to McDonald's and missed the award ceremony. I hear Pavid Hood won--that's right, he did, and he deserves special kudos for playing in the final round Sunday morning when he already had a tournament win locked up and could only hurt himself. Well done! Greg Ellis second--also well done. Mark Frueh third--way to go. Scott Prane won a prize too-another good player. All great Canadians.

I had a special surprise on the way back. My flight back to Toronto was overbooked, and I volunteered to stay in Chicago overnight—free hotel and a \$300 U.S. travel voucher. That's right—\$300 U.S., even thought my return flight only cost \$150 Canadian! San Anton, site of the 1988 Dipcon, is only \$335 Canadian at American Airlines Supersaver rates!

Staying over another day in Chicago, I got to see, for the first time, the Freindly Confines of Wrigley Field. Quite an experience, and the Cubs beat the Mets on a Manny Trillo home run in the ninth after the Met catcher had been picked off (hehehe) at second base while standing around watching as another Met was being given an intentional walk.
