First Impressions of Anchorage

I got up at the ungodly hour of 5:00 AM on Wednesday March 23 to catch a 7:00 AM flight out of Seattle-Tacoma International Airport to Anchorage, Alaska. I flew Alaska Airlines, the people with the big face of an eskimo painted on the tail of their planes. I caught Flight 81 out okay and with my two year old son waving out from the terminal window we took off.

Now, I've only been flying twice before and that was before I read about how flimsy aircraft is in general and just how human our pilots and co-pilots are. I wouldn't say it was sheer terror as, the plane, lifted off but I sure wasn't as calm as all the businessmen who were also on the plane.

The flight was boring. Oh, right after takeoff I got to see all the Navy's war vessels at dock in Bremerton from about 10,000 feet which was interesting. And about twenty minutes before landing I got to see Anchorage and the surrounding plane it rests on pretty clearly. But the rest of the three hour flight was nothing but butterflies-in-the-stomach and a fairly decent breakfast.

The owner of the firm, Mr. Strand, met me at the airport and drove me into town. were a few baloonists in the sky that morning; I guess that's popular up there. It was cold too; I got there at eight o'clock Anchorage time and it was 22 degrees and clear. It went all the way up to 40 that day. Lucky I brought my warm overcoat!

There was snow everywhere. They told me it was 'breakup' time, that two or three weeks in spring when all the snow breaks up and melts away with the onset of summer. What a quaint term, I thought. My companions also had a habit of calling anywhere other than Anchorage 'the outside'. I could understand that; there are mountains to the north, south and east of the city with water to the west. I felt trapped and isolated.

The morning was spent with members of the firm, talking about myself and what I wanted to do and why and wanted to work in Alaska. I had already gone over all that in the first interview; maybe they were checking up on me to make sure I had my story straight. It was a comfortable office though with a nice view of a baseball and soccer field across the street. took me out to lunch at a restraunt which was on the top floor of the tallest building in Anchorage - maybe fifteen stories (I'm guessing, correct me if I'm wrong). Great view, saw t. McKinley to the north and all the other mountains which I can't remember the names of right now. I ate with Mr. Strand and the tax manager of the firm, I guess since I'm interested in going into tax. I had french dip and coffee.

After lunch one of the staffers, Carolyn, took me around town to look at apartments and condos and a tour through some stores. I 'bout gagged at the housing costs; \$500 a month for just a one bedroom apartment, 6-800 for a two-bedroom! To give you an idea of what I'm used to right now we're paying \$225 for a one bedroom cottage, and we used to live in a two-bedroom apartment for only \$300. Condos up there started at \$77,000 and houses at about \$100,000. A gallon of milk was three bucks (two here in Seattle) and it was rumoured that a lunch at McDonalds was four bucks, though this could not be confirmed by yours truly. They didn't tell me how <u>large</u> of a lunch.

I saw a little park where the ground from the big earthquake in the early sixties had ripples in it about two feet high. Also saw a ten foot stuffed bear in one of the shopping malls on display (and thus ending my boast to Patti I could take one on with just a Bowie). At the airport they had various stuffed animals on display; a polar bear, (they tell me it's the only mammal that actually hunts man for food) a moose, a wolf and several other neato critters. The state patrol keeps a 'moose kill' list in the winter; whenever some poor jerk runs into a moose on the road and kills it (and crunches his car all to hell) the patrol starts going down a list of people who signed up to come out and haul the moose away (for laughs, no doubt). About 250 moose were downed in the Anchorage area last year so it sounds like big business. don't think my wife's Arrow would quite do it; they weigh 1500 lbs.

So after all that excitement they brough me back in, had me talk about what I saw and then plopped me back on the plane for the trip home. I was really hoping they would put me up for the night but no such luck. Actually had another good meal on the plane. But with the two hour time difference and the three hour trip it was ten o'clock when I got home. Another candidate flew up the next day but I never did find out who it was; he/she was in my class too. Obviously it was fun, it was definitely worth it; ten days later Mr. Strand called and offered me a position with the company.

Today's writer and artist is Kevin Tighe (rhymes with pie) surviving at 1603 G st. in Arcata, Califloodnia, 95521. Everybody put your Dan Hicks record on the turntable, sit back and relax, cause here we go...

Humboldt update: Saskatchewan contains the town of Humboldt, Nevada has the Humboldt reservoir and Humboldt salt marsh, and central Colorado has Mt. Humboldt (14,000 ft.) climbed by Keith Sherwood. Nice going Keith. If you have a Humboldt feature near you, please let me know. In some future issue I'll print a map showing the geography of Alexander von Humboldt. Now many of you (well, two) have asked just who is this Humboldt fellow anway? So here's a quick history.

Alexander (see picture), a German, lived from 1769-1859. In 1799, he made a 5 year trip thru South America, Mexico, and the U.S. (only spent 6 months in US). During the trip he rewrote maps, noted meteor showers, charted tropical storms and ocean currents, and acquired the largest European collection of South American plants and artifacts. He stayed in Paris for the next 20 years filling 33 volumes of his observations in geology, anthropolgy, socialogy, and biology.

He was the originator of the term "plant geography" and proved vertical zonation of plants on mountains is similar to latitude vegatation changes.

In 1829, at the invitation of Czar Nicholas, he led a scientific expedition into the Urals and Siberia.

The last 20 years of his life was spent writing "Cosmos", an account of man's knowledge of the physical and organic universe (and you thought Carl Sagan was the first). In his time, Humboldt was the most popular generalist in Europe. His fondness for the U.S. was well known and Americans found him to be accesible whenever they visited Germany. In South America, peasants were taught that he was "the man who named the plants."

Most of his accomplishments are outdated now, but his name lives on in towns, counties, forests, mountains, expressways and subzines.

How far to take it?

I was, as Kevin exclaimed last issue, totally underwhelmed by the response to the obscure question I posed to readers in <u>The Prince</u> #8 concerning how far to take the reasoning of allowing an unwanted convoy manuver to work should a GM allow it. Three people stepped forward with answers:

Terry Tallman (renown gamemaster, never one to be at a loss for words) - "Chickenshit". Thank you, Mr. Tallman.

A somewhat more literate, if not as concise, response was elicited from Greg Ellis:

"Also, I would beg to differ on your solution on the convoys. What happens if the fleet is in Helg(oland) instead of North Sea? What if the French fleet in Mid convoys the same move? I would agree withan additional fleet convoying an army that needs a convoy to reach a space, but not if the army can move there without the help of a fleet. Example: A Bel-Nwy, F Nth C A Bel-Nwy(England); Russia: F Nwg C A Bel-Nwy; Fra: F NAO-Nwg, F Bar S F NAO-Nwg. The convoy is disrupted and A Bel holds. It will be very interesting to see how other GM's rule. Personally, I hope it never comes up."

Yes, it would have been interesting. If the fleet was in the Bight or in the Mid-Atlantic it would not legally be able to convoy the unit so its disruption would have no effect on the move. In your example where the French fleets dislodge the Russian fleet trying to give the English an unwanted additional convoy; it (the ploy) would work and the convoy disrupted. Conceptually, it is no different than having just a lone fleet try to disrupt an army's move, like A Bel-Hol. But onto another letter, by Stephen Wilcox, who raises further questions about the ploy where some sort of rule must be formulated to keep total ridiculousness from breaking out:

"According to the rulebook your "original" interpretation of an "unwanted convoy" ruling is correct. But how far can this go?

"There are problems with going all the way with "unwanted convoy" ploys. The first is listed in your zine #8. Also, what if Mid convoyed the move from Hol-Kie? What if Black Sea did?... "What about in the event of German A Bel-Hol, English F Nth C GERMAN A Bel-Hol. If Nth is dislodged, I agree the piece should not move. But what if England has fleets in Eng, Mid, NAt, Nrg, Nth and all convoy that (particular) move...if F Mid is dislodged should that stop Bel-Hol? OR, what if England only has fleet Nth & Nrg and both convoy the move...if Russia dislodges Nrg does the A Bel not move?
"The solutions I see are as follows:

1. The "unwanted convoy" ploy only works if <u>one</u> fleet of an opposing country convoys (legally-meaning it is in a position in which it can convoy the army to its destination) the army moving and is dislodged from its space.

Example #1 German A Bel-Hol

England F Nth C GERMAN A Bel-Hol

if North Sea is dislodged Bel doesn't move.

Example #2

English A Bel-Nwy, F Nth C A Bel-Nwy Russian F Nrg C ENGLISH A Bel-Nwy

if Nrg is dislodged the piece in Belgium doesn't move.

2. Otherwise, the only solution I see is to require all armies being convoyed by fleets of a different country to include that (fact) as part of its order.

Example #1 German A Bel-Hol (convoyed via English Fleet in Nth

Example #2 English A Bel-Nwy, F Nth C A Bel-Nwy Russian F Nrg C ENGLISH A Bel-Nwy

in Ex.#2 even if Nrg is dislodged the move to Nwy succeeds.

"What solution 2. does is not accept the "unwanted convoy" ploy at all... but it gives you a way to determine if the convoy was wanted or not. (This is by preference considering this is a wargame and logically a German navy would not board an English fleet unless it was specifically ordered to!" (cont pq(0)

Stephen hit the jackpot with solution #1. While the reasoning of not being able to decline a convoy would allow the unlikely situation of being able to stop A Bel-Hol by ordering F's Eng, Nth, Nrg, NAt & Mid to convoy and then dislodging F Mid to disrupt the convoy, it doesn't feel right. We don't want to open up a whole new doctrine in the matter of adjudication, rather, we just want to allow an isolated case of a rulebook ambiguity to open up a sneaky tactic. If we were to restrict the interpretation to just one fleet executing the move it would serve to keep the silliness out of the discussion. Additionally, the single fleet must of course be legally able to execute the convoy. With those two provisos the problem appears to be settled.

To discuss a couple of Stephen's counterpoints: solution two is totally unsatisfactory. Diplomacy is not a wargame primarily; it's tactics were kept simple on purpose to keep the emphasis on the diplomatic nature of the game. A brilliant diplomat can probably do very well in a game despite being somewhat less than competent in the tactical sense, but a tactical wizard won't get anywhere if he cannot master the basics of persuasion and influence. So to add 'explanatory intentions' to the orders of each unit would impinge on the simplicity and intention of the game.

One last point I would like to bring up. Personally, unless a unit is allowed to state it's true intention (which it is not) I don't see how a gamemaster could support his position of allowing a piece to move into the adjacent space should the 'unwanted' convoy be dislodged. How would a gamemaster know it was unwanted? As far as he is concerned, he has a set of German orders, a set of English orders that are apparently working within an E/G alliance and a nasty set of Russian orders that is screwing up the convoy. How can the GM know on deadline night as he's adjudicating the game what the intentions of theparties are? He cannot, and if he is to remain consistent with how convoys and supports are usually treated during the course of the game he must 'see' a legitimate convoy being attempted and a legitimate dislodgement occuring to disrupt it. (unless, of course, houserules state otherwise!)
