

My move to Tyrolia was initially intended to be only defensive. wanted to be sure that Italy didn't put two units on Trieste. Russia and Turkey looked to be working together and that didn't look for me, but I looked to get at least two builds. so I wasn't too worried.

Three builds in 1901. Not too bad. I didn't expect to get Mun at all. I only wanted to make Germany cover it so he'd not get three. As it turned out having Mun was more trouble than it was worth. Ironically, after losing it Mun turned out to be #18 needed to win. Italy was fighting France and Russia was in the Black. Things were really looking great.

And Italy decided to cover Venice giving me only one center out of the stab, and I will certainly lose Naples next year. The only redeeming factor in the season was the fact that Russia cut the German support in Berlin and I regained Munich.

The turbulance in the Balkans continues and now it is me and Russia against Turkey. had the choice of supporting either of them and I chose Russia because Turkey was stronger.
