SUBBERTIME!:

As usual, we have a few people responding to old questions:

"WHAT MAKES A GOOD CON?"

ROBERT ACHESON: Don't know, never been to one. Wine, women, rock-'n'-roll...

GARY COUGHLAN: What do you think makes a con a success or a failure? A success: lots of munchies, the ability of the host to make you feel at home, meeting people you've heard of or written to but never seen. A failure: I've never been to a con failure but I did receive a phone call at one con which upset me and the host, and interfered with my enjoyment of that part of the con. Going to a con where feuders on opposite sides would be, could make a con a failure, at least for me.

"IF YOU COULD HAVE ANY 3 PEOPLE, PAST OR PRESENT, TO DINNER, WHO WOULD THEY BE?"

ROBERT ACHESON: (A) Alexander the Great. Curious as to what motivated him to try to conquer the 'known' civilized world.

(B) Sir John A. McDonald. 'Our' father of confederation; again, just curious as to what were his actual goals. Sometimes (often?), history paints a better (or worse) picture than the original.

(C) (How come there aren't any famous women?) Marilyn Monroe -- why not? Why don't you ask the same question again -- on fictional characters? ((Good idea! In a few months, I'll ask it.))

GARY COUGHLAN: Benjamin Franklin, Napoleon and Kaiser Wilhelm II with dibs on Marilyn Monroe. ((Can't have her -- Acheson asked her out first!)) Franklin is one of my personal heroes, the man who did all things well, had a varied life in science, humor and diplomacy and was full of witty sayings. He was also a rake, a freethinker and ahead of his time.

Napoleon -- he himself said, "What a novel my life would make!" I would like to discuss his campaigns with him, his innovations -- like the Code Napoleon. This man made and unmade kings for almost 20 years and met some of the most fascinating people in European history. Definitely a stimulating dinner guest!

The Kaiser, so misunderstood and so interesting. He was the grand-son of Queen Victoria. He dealt on a personal basis with Bismarck and Hitler. He was like a breath of fresh air in the stuff, stick-in-the-mud world of pre-World War I Europe. His letters read like letters that we Diplomacy players write to each other now. He wasn't fit to be the leader of the most powerful European nation but he made history enjoyable to read. I would choose him over Napoleon and Franklin!

GARY COUGHLAN (cont'd.): Marilyn Monroe has always captured my interest. I remember that Gloria Steinem wrote in Ms. Magazine that for her, she remembered exactly where she was when she heard the news that Marilyn had died, just the same feeling she has when she recalls where she was when she heard of President Kennedy's death. And I do too, although I was only 11 when Marilyn Monroe died!

"IF YOU COULD CHANGE ANY ASPECT OF HOBBY ORGANIZATION, WHAT WOULD IT BE?"

GARY COUGHLAN: I would try to make sure that they were completely funded by the hobby so that the custodian doesn't have to take money out of his own pocket. These people work so hard for almost no reward. Their services are almost indispensable and their operating costs should be paid for by the hobby which so benefits from their efforts.

ROBERT ACHESON: Elect the custodians (if possible). Rewrite the BNC rules in regard to his role in declaring games regular or 'other.' ((Now those are suggestions that I would love to see expanded on by all of you in the letter-column! Definitely much food for thought there.))

BOB OLSEN: It seems clear to me that Melinda Holley is the most eligible female Dipper in the hobby today, what with Thomas Manning, Woody, me, and everybody else breathlessly pursuing her. There's really only one fair way to settle this; I propose that we raffle off Melinda in order to raise money for hobby services! If Manning is willing to pay \$10.75 to get his article to you overnight, he'd probably go \$11 at least for rights to Melinda, and spring for a pair of shoes for her to boot! (Or maybe a pair of boots for her to shoe!) As Melinda's close personal friends and disinterested spectators, I think that the Courtemanchi are the logical people to oversee this lottery. How about it? ((Now there's an idea!! If we raffled off Melinda, we could keep DW in the black for the next ten years...))

And now for this past month's questions....

"IS DIPLOMACY PRESS A DYING ART?"

STEVE COURTEMANCHE: I disagree with the statement that Diplomacy press is a dying art. It just seems that way because more people are participating in the Diplomacy hobby. The same percentage of them are sending in quality press as before. For example, in 1970, say 200 people were actively in the hobby and 20% were quality writers (I don't have hard-and-fast numbers; these are guesstimates). That would mean 40 people were good press writers. It is 1986 and we have about 700 people in the hobby. Twenty percent of that yields 140 good press writers, but they have to compete with 560 Bozos. Their press gets swamped by the infield banter. ((Good point, Bozo honey!))

BOB OLSEN: Considering some of the tedious drivel that's praised as Golden Age Press, I don't see how things could be any worse now. A good press game is sort of a freak or miracle--it just takes off spontaneously and unpredictably. There's still good press out there and there always will be. The style or standards might change, but there'll always be some good stuff popping up here and there.

NELSON HEINTZMAN: This is really a very broad question which may defy an easy answer. First, entire essays could be (and probably have been) written on what composes the definition of quality press (use of the word "art" implies skill and enhanced quality): involved characterization, intricate plots, wit and repartee? Other elements? Just what exactly? Could not a superbly clever and appropriate one-liner be of as high quality (as artful) as a longer, more elaborate scenario? Doesn't the determination of Diplomacy press as art, like beauty, lie in the eyes of the beholder?

Nevertheless, let us assume a reasonable definition of quality press could be agreed upon. The next necessary step would be for one to canvass the entire hobby zine pool in order to properly analyze all the current press. Who knows what press gems could be tucked away in obscure, out-of-the-way zines? Of course, one would then have to backtrack several years (at least) through all those zines in order to have a basis for comparison. And just how far back should one go? The early 80s? The late 70s? Further back yet? However, even having done all that, how does one go about determining an answer?

General hobby participation and each individual's own degree of personal involvement clearly moves in cycles. A not unreasonable inference would be that press writing also is cyclical. Those who write press float in and out of the hobby like everyone else. In addition, the quality of their effort is affected by the natural peaks and valleys to which their own creative activity is subject. So, at the very least, such a term as "dying" can only be considered in the most relative terms. Perhaps a better term (if applicable) would be "declining," which, after all, can be merely a temporary state of affairs and can be reversed.

Which brings me to my last point: whether discussing decline or brilliance, one needs the passage of time in order to truly assess a particular period or era. One must be sure of what came both before and after in order to determine the in-between. Thus, I would venture to say that 25 years, even, is too short a period of time with which to construct a "Rise and Fall of Dip Press" scenario. After all, who knows what talents lie dormant within the unknown Dipsters of the 90s?

MELINDA ANN HOLLEY: Disagree. But not everyone can write Golden Age.

KATHY BYRNE: I disagree, the press keeps the game exciting and interesting. I really get into the press, especially when I have a good GM to abuse, like the Bumbling Idiot or Melinda. I love the games I GM because my players write interesting press and keep me entertained.

FRANCINE BYRNE: I agree, because if you only have a 10-day deadline, how are we supposed to negotiate and write press at the same time? ((Francine is referring to a typo Steve and I made in announcing the Spring 'Ol deadline for The Chocolate Game. We tried to get fancy and set up a deadline that was "14 days before the deadline for REBEL's such-and-such issue" -- which confused the heck out of everyone...including us! Our players thought they had to get their orders in immediately. An object lesson for us, and for all new GMs: Make your deadlines EASY! You notice that our game deadlines are now the first of every month. As you have seen this issue, The Chocolate Game deadline is now September 1st, 1986. As for our Q & A deadlines, Steve and I are leaving them as they are because we want our readers to have as much time as possible to write to us before we sit down at the typewriter and get the issue out.))

"HOW DO YOU WANT TO BE REMEMBERED?"

STEVE COURTEMANCHE: I want to be remembered as a Morn'y loving husband. ((Snicker!))

NELSON HEINTZMAN: A generally nice guy -- reasonably intelligent -- who made it through life without screwing over anyone too badly.

RUSS WALLACE: I would like to be remembered as a person who loved his fellow man.

FRANCINE BYRNE: I want to be remembered just the way I am.

MELINDA ANN HOLLEY: Kindly if possible. If not, I just want to be remembered.

KATHY BYRNE: As a good Diplomacy player, not a good female Diplomacy player. Think about it, there is a big difference!

LINDA COURTEMANCHE: I want to be remembered as a woman who never stopped trying to make her corner of the world a little better. It is tempting to hope, along with this, that people forget all the times I overstepped the mark in my efforts; however, going too far is as much of my character as caring too much. I can only hope that, in the end, the good I have done outweighs the hurt I have caused. Certainly I would rather try and fail, than to always feel as if I could have done more, tried harder, made things better.

BOB OLSEN: "Who?"

"WHAT INFLUENCE DO HOBBY POLLS HAVE?"

STEVE COURTEMANCHE: The only influence that a poll has is on the people who pay attention to them. Otherwise, I'd say they were a waste of paper.

FRANCINE BYRNE: They have no influence.

KATHY BYRNE: I ignore them, or as Mike Goodman would say -- "Big fucking deal!"

MELINDA ANN HOLLEY: When the poll results are announced, interest is fairly high. Two weeks later, few care.

RUSS WALLACE: The only influence that any Poll has on the hobby is to inflate or deflate the already-inflated egos of those who the polls are about.

PETER MATEUNAS: What influence, if any, do polls have on the hobby? Little, to much, it depends on the poll and who reads it. If you consider country and people ratings as a poll, then obviously you'll use a different strategy or diplomatic approach for Kathy Byrne playing Italy versus Joe No-name playing Italy. Polls on viewpoints can only make a difference in that they form a consensus or centerpoint by which people can tell if they are left or right of the majority. However, statistically, your poll may have no meaning because of several reasons. (1) The way the question is worded may create ambiguity, or even lean (skew) the answers away from the mean. "Have you beaten your children today?" If you answer No, it still implies that you have beaten them in the past. (2) Does your poll reach an audience that represents a weighted average of the population, and do all of them respond. A poll on election night that asks Democratic voters who will win the election will be skewed toward a Democratic victory. The Republican could win, while the Poll showed a Democratic landslide. By the way, I hope Mario Guomo doesn't run for President and, if he does, I hope he loses. I think he's a lousy Governor. Henry Kissinger would make an interesting candidate. In the age of Chernenko, we need a diplomatic President.

Finally, a Poll of my own. I'm currently soliciting footnotes for an upcoming article to DW. When is a person not a novice? I have yet to read anything on this subject. If it is not or cannot be answered, then theoretically we are all novices at the PBM Hobby of Dip. This is one of those poll questions that form a consensus. I'm enclosing a stamp if you care to comment. If not, then use it as part of your prize fund. ((Thanks!))

((I just got a second note from Peter, adding that, "Elmer ((Hinton)) gave me the exact definition of a novice: 30 game turns +, so that article looks to be down the tubes." But I really think that the issue is still quite debatable. What do all of you think out there?))

BOB OLSEN: The current reductio ad absurdum of polls is merely the culmination of a long-developing problem, which is that polls ((...)) are vastly overrated. The electorate is just too volatile...too much influenced by outside factors...and too ignorant. ((...))

I think polls have entirely too much influence (any influence, let alone engine-of-patronage, is too much) because people allow themselves to actually think the polls have some meaning other than as a conversation piece to fill pages. There are people who actually get upset if they don't make Top Ten or Top Five or (glory bel) #1 ...and it's ludicrous.

NELSON HEINTZMAN: Anyone who stays up late at night watching the election returns on TV ought to enjoy hobby polls in general, I would think. Watching trends, being surprised or feeling vindicate following the fate of the contending few, all provide fascinating material for contemplation and reflection. The unfolding of the drama inherent in elections or polls can be most exciting and exhilarating. In one sense, polls have influence in that they are simply fun to participate in.

In more practical terms, however, polls do provide some form of feedback for those being voted upon. GM's receive some idea of how their efforts have been received; zine and subzine editors gain a general impression of how their product has been viewed. While no poll can be completely comprehensive in absolute terms (as regards the "totality" of the hobby which can never be perfectly pinpointed anyways), in general the greater the participation in polls, the greater the degree of representativeness, and hence the closer one comes to the goal of abstract "reality." Admittedly, an unreachable goal, but one to which one can come closer and closer all the time, and thus continually fine-tune the accuracy of the endeavor.

Of what eventual use, value, or influence are these various polls? I believe some individuals take them as a general barometer of quality. Certainly, if zines are attracting 30, 40, 50, or more voters in a poll, those editors are doing something noteworthy to attract attention! And if most of the votes are positive scores, why so much the better! Something must be occurring in a praise-worthy fashion. Does this mean that zines ranked lower are regarded by the voters as inferior and poorer in quality? Perhaps GMs ranked excessively low might take a second look at their performant but as regards zines, tain't necessarily so! Many lower ranked zines simply suffer by comparison to larger, more widely circulated reading zines. For example, the warehouse zines, arguably consides the backbone of the hobby, provide the invaluable service of runningust" the games, which are, after all, the base reason for the hobby in the first place. These zines may completely and fully satisfy their function, yet lose out in polls due to the extra effort put forth by the larger reading zines which perhaps reflect a heightened degree of ingenuity by providing the reader with varieties of substantive material. Still both types of zines may fulfill differing purposes admirably.

Are the polls thus rendered useless? No, but the discerning individual must be aware that different zines are set up to do different things. When reviewing poll results (or when voting, for that mat one must be conscious of this fact. And, rather obviously, one carenjoy a fine time in ANY zine given the right circumstances and dynamics.... For myself, I enjoy participating in polls: zine, subzine, GM, best player, best writer, etc. I enjoy seeing how various individuals and their efforts compare in the eyes of the rest of the hobby. I also enjoy seeing people rewarded for their efforts with public recognition. And for those who do not fare so well? Well, there is always next year...

((Before we wrap this up, we have a couple more answers from...))
