If you're interested (or anyone else, for that matter), drop Mike a line, he'd love to get these two games up and running before the openings get stale.

#### KARUSO'S INDICTED FOR INDECENCY



## How to Play Postal Dip Like à Consummate Genius

Chapter 2: How to Win as Austria, or, Dream On, Sucker!

There is a general misconception that Austria has very little chance of winning. This is not true. Austria has no chance of winning. If Russia, Turkey, and Italy all NMR in Fall '01, Austria might, with skilled guidance, achieve a four- or five-way draw. But don't bet on it. If you have Austria high on your preference list, then don't bother to read the rest of this article since you are clearly an airhead. If you have the misfortune to have drawn Austria, then this article intends to help you redirect your ambitions so as to make the best of a hopeless situation.

Austrian Objectives 1. Getting Even

One possible objective for Austria is to get revenge on someone who walked on you in the past. If that person is Italy, Turkey, Russia, or Germany, then one good strategy, for example, is to cede your centers to Italy and ally with Turkey against Russia. Or cede your centers to Russia and Turkey, and kamikaze against Italy. Or cede your centers to Russia, Italy, and Turkey, and go after Germany. (For example: Spring 01—Aus: A Vie-Boh, A Bud-Vie, F Tri H; Ita: A Ven-Tyo, A Rom-Ven, F Nap-Ion; Rus: A War-Sil; followed by Fall 01—Aus: A Boh S Russian A Sil-Mun, A Vie-Sil, F Tri H (d/r OTB); Ita: A Tyo S A Ven-Tri, F Ion-Gre; Tur: A Bul-Ser. Austria builds A Vie in Winter 01.)

2. Building an Image

Another possible objective, if you aren't sore at anyone (ie, you don't know anyone else in your game) is to use the situation to create a "nice guy" image. I did this myself in a recent game. As Austria, I got pretty well pulped (as usual) by Italy, Russia, and Turkey. France, who was even dumber than I, got stomped by Germany and England and soon found himself with one unit left in Pie. I had about two or three units left as Turkey was taking his sweet time about killing me, so I offered to support the French unit to Ven. It was purely for "image" effect since it had no bearing on the game. France thought I was a saint. He continually wrote

me telling me how "decent" I was, and how he fervently hoped to get in a game with me "under better circumstances." I told him I looked forward to it. If we ever do get in another game, I'll cut his liver out. (Unless, of course, I draw Austria.) In Diplomacy, you must always consider the next game.

3. Propaganda Value

To the skilled press writer, Austria offers the greatest opportunity for playing to the gallery. Any Austria worth his salt should be able to wring tears; of sympathy from players and spectators alike at his miserable demise. One word of caution: Occasionally, just occasionally, you will get Austria and have mental midgets as Russia, Turkey, and Italy, and Austria might be able to gain centers early. Resist this temptation at all costs! Remember, when you are Austria, victory is a mirage. Rapid growth only destroys your opportunity to reap propaganda benefit. And there is nothing more heartbreaking than watching an Austria surge to 10 in 1903 only to be reduced to 2 in 1904. For example, see Woody's Austria in Voice of Doom "Milky Way," or Bob Olsen's in 1979KW. To his credit, Bob learned from his early catastrophe and is now the consummate master as Austria. There is no one who can better milk sympathy while his Austria is being crushed like an insect. It is Bob Olsen who should be writing this chapter.

But isn't it ironic that the one issue you offer a prize of any kind it turns out that only one game has any press worth reading: Brilliant Disguise. Now, I have a personal bias, which I must disclose here. We have a saltwater aquarium, so Fish of the Month is always welcome! But how anyone can salute a press item besides Pepperland is beyond me. "Brucie and His Poll Reminders" will be sung at the next filk session I attend that has any Dipsters around (too few of those events, to be sure). Pepperland, then, for best press.

(Jay Ouzts) Moscow to Rockville's argument on Gun Control (in Henway) was an interesting discussion on a topic on which, quite frankly, I can't seem to make up my mind.

London to Philosopher (p27, Brilliant Disguise)

sums up my philosophy of the game.

But the winner is: No Dateline (from Brilliant Disguise)

(Philosopher Fritz) Best press in #125 is "Mack the Reiff." Best judge in #126 will be the Typist. [nice try! -dm]

(Bruce Reiff) Oh boy a ten dollar gift certificate! I could really use that. With Dave Andersson assaulting my character so much I could get a game to improve myself. Like Outdoor Survival! Oh please Dick pick me! I definitely want to improve myself so Dave isn't mean to me anymore. You got to help me. Even Nurse Phil couldn't help. Pleeeeeeease! Oh yeah, my vote. The runner up is in Hyboria page 15, "Somewhere on a small Mediterranean Island to England" and the winner in Lex page 19 "Brilliant Disguise All to Austria." Lex Annoyance, I kind of like that. I wonder if that was the same person who wrote the Caesering stuff that I liked too?

[I'll never tell! Good to see that you all will come out of the woodwork with a little bit of incentive...we thank you, and TAHGC thanks you. The press winner last time, submitted by a non-player, no less, is the "Pepperland" press. Good stuff!

[And for promising to sing our press, Pete G wins the prize. Congrats, and come again soon!]

## New Civ Cards for Civilization

Recently, I played Civilization for the first time without the expansion cards. I prefer playing with them—the trading is much more interesting—but I could see that in Civ as originally designed and playtested, it's an accomplishment to max out in civilization cards. That is, to buy the top 11 cards (none lower than 80 in value), and then wonder what to do next. Without the expansion cards, calamities come more frequently, and you often don't have a chance to recover from one before the next hits (makes you glad you didn't live in those times, huh?). It's a struggle to meet the AST requirements at all, and you can't hold out for high-value cards only.

With the expansion cards, however, the last few games I've played have ended early when some-body maxed out, collected 5 or 6 bronze cards, and then just sat there dumping gold. It's too easy to max out in a fun game. I suppose in a game for blood, everyone will keep close track of how everyone else is doing, then fix the leader by simply refusing to trade with him, but the game just isn't

as interesting that way.

Two solutions to this problem come to mind. One is to shorten the game so nobody has time to max out, but Civ is such a short game anyhow—who'd want to do that? (Ha, ha) The other is to add some new high-value civ cards. This will also make the different peoples more different from each other, so different civilizations will take on different characters. Some modest suggestions for new cards are (your comments are welcomed):

Horse Breeding, value 110, craft (orange). Special: If you have this, your tokens can each move two areas in a land move. You must stop after the first area if anyone else's tokens are present. You still can't combine land and sea movement. Bonus:

orange 10.

Military Tradition, value 140, civic/science (blue/green). Special: Each of your tokens now takes two hits to kill in combat. After the first, flip it over; after the second, it's gone. At the end of the combat phase, however, all wounded (flipped over) tokens die. Bonus: blue 5, green 20.

Example: A (3 tokens, Metalworking) vs B (3 tokens, Military Tradition) in a "2" area. B flips one, A loses one, B loses flipped one, A loses one, B flips one, A loses his last one, combat ends, B loses the flipped one, and B has one left.

Monotheism, value 200, art/civic (red/blue).

Special: lose one less city than you would otherwise to Civil Disorder, but lose one more city than otherwise to Iconoclasm & Heresy. This applies both as a main victim and a subsidiary victim of these calamities. Bonuses: blue 5, subtracts 25 from the cost of Law.

With these new cards, maxing out requires that you buy nothing worth less than 110 (these replace the three 80s), which is significantly more difficult.

And another new rule to make it a little easier on the poor leader nobody will trade with:

Trading with the bank: If a player makes no trades with any other player in the trading phase, he may trade once with the bank. He may buy a card from the 6, 7, 8, or 9 piles (no lower numbers, so this can't be used for calamity evasion) by paying twice its value in trade cards and/or treasury to the bank (discard the cards involved). Sets do count, so 2 salt cards (12) buy you the top card of the 6 pile, for example. However, you can't buy a card from a pile unless some player, sometime, has drawn normally from that pile. Once a player trades with the bank, the trade phase is over for him.

This represents low-level illicit trade that a determined buyer can always find sellers for, in spite

of the wishes of the authorities.

[Don't recall where this came from or who wrote it, but it was so interesting I just had to run it anyway. If you're the guilty party, step forward and

take your blame credit!

If agree with the notion that the extra trade cards make the game too easy. Being held back one time can cost you the game, as everyone else marches right along. Next time I play, I'd like to do it without the extra trade cards. Then again, I like a quick game of Titan on occasion, too.

[These look like some very interesting, well thought-out civ cards. Military Tradition looks awfully powerful, but probably only a bit more so than Metalworking. True, it's 140 points to buy, but it's safe to assume that the green bonus will account for most of that. Probably a bit on the cheap side, or maybe it should be red/blue. I've never really seen much reason to buy blue cards, myself, and this may provide some incentive.

[Horse Breeding is the land equivalent of Astronomy, and I think it makes for a very nice touch.

[Monotheism...well, we've never lacked for the big-point cards in our games. Certainly a contributing factor to that is a tendency of some players to stock up on too many of the cheapies just so they can keep pace on the AST. But the effect of the card is fairly minor, and it also looks like a nice addition. I assume three of each of these? Four?]





My grandfather was kind enough to do this for me, but many people never get proper instruction. It causes a lot of tragedies, as I am well aware.

The NRA has a point, however, in that in many localities where mandatory education has passed, classes have been deliberately never held in order to bring about a de facto handgun ban. Also, many jurisdictions have required minimum marksmanship standards for the issuance of concealed weapon carry permits that I couldn't meet after three steady years of practice with highly-accurate guns. This is the kind of thing that has led to NRA to its "no compromise" position.

Yeah, the Maryland Handgun Ban was pretty big news here,

too, especially since it is the first time that the NRA has lost a statewide referendum. And I sincerely hope that the law works as it is supposed to. However, I'm willing to bet my S&W 629 that ten years from now only a handful of very expensive handguns will have been approved, and that there will have been no effect on crime. After all, if a drug dealer can get drugs, he can get guns.

Also, just for the record, I refuse to buy any sort of weapon unless I know the seller well. While I have been offered back alley deals, neither I nor any reputable shooter has anything to do with them.

Dave, if you can figure out how to pay for a background check without it costing me anything. I'm all in favor of it. I don't particularly think it will do any good, but I'm not unalterably opposed to it, either. What I don't like about it more than anything is the fact that all these background checks take up police efforts that could be better used in catching criminals. As to your situation regarding concealed carry, that is exactly the reason that Florida ended up with its law. Talk to your legislators.

I wanted to mention also that if I were to kill someone, I would saw off my 12-guage and use it. If I had to use a handgun, it would be my registered .44. All that registration means is that the police have the serial number, and know I own a .44. Considering how many .44's there are in the St Louis area (5,000 at a conservative guess) that's not much of a clue.

44, at which point you may wish you had used something a bit more

obscure, though possibly less effective.





IM title except the rating requirement is 2450 and the norms required are correspondingly tougher. Bobby Fischer (who breezed to the GM title before he'd even earned the IM title; only one of two players to ever do that) had a 2810 rating; Kasparov is around 2750.


