Perestroika Dip (aka Investment Dip)

Yes indeed, inspired by a need to restrain the relentless bloodthirsty ravaging encouraged in our world of regular diplomacy, a variant has been developed which may put curbs on this. Aha, you Vietnam era folks say, finally *Dove Dip!*

Perhaps — but this game has a profit motive, something for foks of the 80s. Do I hear someone groaning "Yuppie Dip"? Well, economics and ambition certainly plays a part, but the key feature

is more cautious militarism. *Prosperity* is a goal, a necessary ingredient to attain prosperity being *Peace*.

In honor of that New Wave politician of the East, Gorby Dip occurred to me. Followers of George Bush may prefer the name Wimp Dip, while those of a past era may smell Chamberlain Dip. Overall I hope we have a game that is both exciting and enlightening as a reflection of the latest in world politics. And now I hear John and Yoko singing "Oh we are saved, just give peace a chance...." Admittedly an economic variant, allow me to introduce a kinder and gentler dip—Perestroika Dip.

We use the same board, tactics, nations, provinces, supply centers, and number of players. The

only rule changes are below:

Innovations involve an Economy and Infrastructure. "Building Blocks" are added to represent the infrastructure which in turn generates the economy. Each Supply Center in 1900 has Four Blocks. These blocks each generate a value of One Point each per year (four points per supply center initially). A nation's Points are totaled each year yielding a national budget. The budget can be spent each year on buying or maintaining fleets and armies (which cost four points each), or it can be reinvested, ie used to purchase more building blocks (which also cost four points each) in any of the nation's supply centers. Points not spent can be put in a treasury (described below).

Note: The investment scheme which underlies this is one that yields 25% on investments (blocks)

per year.

Starting Units: 1900 starts without any armies or fleets, but each supply center yields 4 points each and players decide how they want to spend it in Winter 1900. This version reflects the reality that some nations never had fleets and some did not have to militarize. Winter 00 and 01 are separate seasons.

Play otherwise begins as usual. In the fall of each year one point is earned for each building block in each supply center possessed. The number of blocks occupying any given supply center are signified by a number after each center's name, eg Lpl-5, etc. The sum total is the national budget. For example if in Fall 1905 England owns the following centers with their respective blocks: Lpl-10, Lon-5, Edi-7, Den-3, Nwy-5, Bel-1, then the budget is 31 points, which could purchase up to 7 new building blocks or maintain (or add) up to 7 armies and fleets (total = 28 points) and still leave three points to add to the treasury. Points in the treasury are added to the national budget the fol-

lowing year. To repeat, each army and fleet costs four points per year. Points not spent on the military can be used to purchase blocks (for four points each) in any of the supply centers a player possesses. Those points not spent are put in the treasury.

The Treasury can hold points indefinitely and represents liquid assets. The blocks reflect non-liquid investments. The liquid assets may also be loaned or given to other nations at any time. Repayment is as reliable as the word of other

players.

The Transfer of Points from one player to another is accomplished by simply telling the gamesmaster that such and such is given to so and so, and may be done at any time. These may be gifts or loans. The gamesmaster publishes the amounts transferred each season along with the moves.

Overspending is not allowed. If orders involve overspending the orders written first are executed, while those beyond budgetary means are ignored. Thus the order of moves may be important.

Neutral supply centers put their income back into themselves as building blocks with extra points

going in the national treasury.

The Rubble Rule addresses the conquering of supply centers in battles. All warfaer follows the usual dip rules. When a supply center is taken by another power without opposition by simply moving a unit in, the number of blocks remain the same. But when it is taken in a battle it suffers economically. Only one half the number of blocks which were present remain (odd number rounded up). This is called the Rubble Rule. This applies only when a supply center is taken by force, overpowering another power, ie there was resistance of any type.

National treasuries are not subject to the

Rubble Rule. The treasury is located in the capital unless moved to another supply center. It is moved by simply telling the gamesmaster and costs one point to do so.

Disbanding: To encourage peace and reflect reality, fleets and armies may be brought home at any time and disbanded in home supply centers only. This allows income to be spent elsewhere.

The Goal of the Game is for a nation to dominate Europe, of course. This is determined by having a budget equal to one half or more of all Europe's combined budgets.

Go for it!

[Ideas? Sure I got some ideas for you! [How about a voluntary Rubble Rule: the Looting Rule. This just means that any turn a unit spends in any center (except one of your home centers) it can destroy one block and convert it to one unit for the Treasury.

[Disbanding is pretty tough, why not make it adjacent to any home center, or have it cost something to disband units away from home.

[I guess you can only build military units in

home centers, still?

[Why not let the players put blocks in any land province? Or limit the increase to one block per province per year? And round the ravaged lands down, instead of up! Be harsh!

[Would variable strength armies and fleets, depending on how much you spend for them (four minimum, and lose strength if involved in battle—losses can be negated by spending from treasury) be too difficult?

[There, that should be plenty enough meddling


from me for one day.

[And you've already got two players, even though they haven't even seen the rules yet!]

Well fans, here it is, the first issue of that long awaited but untitled magazine of Diplomacy, "?". Since I only have four players at this point, it looks like next issue will see the first game start. This particular work of art will be devoted to an outlining of my house rules and an all out recruiting effort by all concerned (no recruits means no games, right?). Each of you lucky people will find a few spare copies of "?" to give to other Dippyists (friend or foe, it's up to you) or other likely candidates selected at random. The main crunch is that I need Gamers willing to shell out the necessary pittance to keep me afloat. Anyway, enough triviality, on to bigger and better things.

My house rules are as follows:

1) All the standard rules of Diplomacy will be followed, except where ammended for postal play.

2) Orders will be due every fourth Friday after the game starts. Builds and retreats will be due ten days after the issue in which they are necessitated comes out. I don't care how They come in,

just so long as I get them.

3) The GM will consider the orders most recently received to be valid, any other orders sent in by that player for that turn to be invalid, and any orders not received at all to be unfortunate.

4) The GM's decisions will be considered final and not open to dispute unless they clearly contradict the written rules of Diplomacy available in any new Dippy set of Avalon Hill origin.
5) Any player who sends in another players orders will be immediately be dropped from any games he may be involved in at the time. Deception is not illegal if practiced exclusively between players. It's not nice to fool Mother Gamesmaster!

6) Conditional builds and retreats are strongly recommended.

7) Due to the shorter period for builds and removals, only the first set of such orders from each player will be considered valid.

8) Each player will be notified of each such move at the first possible moment.

- 9) If a player fails to get his orders in on time, his units go into a state of civil disorder, holding in place (if they are not dislodged). Dislodged units are allowed to retreat, but if the retreat is not received in time, the unit is disbanded. 10) If a player misses a Fall or Spring move, then the GM will request that an assigned standby send in an alternate set of orders. If the same player again fails to submit orders for the next turn, the alternate player's orders are followed and he takes control of that country and it's units. The original player is then out of that game.
- 11) Once out of a game there is no return during that particular game. For example, player A fails to submit a set of orders for Spring. The GM requests that alternate B send in orders for Fall. If player A submits Fall orders, B is put back onto the list of alternates. However, if Afails to submit Fall orders also, then B takes over control and his orders are followed. 'A is out of the game and may

not return as another country in that game. He is not barred

from entry into a later game, however.

12) A player wins when either he achieves the eighteen center victory conditions or all remaining players agree to declare him victor by a unanimous vote. An abstention counts as a negative vote. Yes, you must vote for yourself....

13) Adraw is determined by a similar vote or if there is no net change in supply centers over a two year period.

14) Any player may propose a draw or concession.

15) Game fees are \$3 per game, subscriptions are \$3 for ten issues.

Players must maintain their subs.

Is there anything I missed? Any suggestions, comments, snide remarks? I shall take my role as GM very seriously and interfere in the games as little as possible. I'll also learn how to type.

And, as a final show of benevolence, the first fourteen people

need not pay a game fee, only the sub. Got it?

Oh yes, be sure to send in a country preference list with your application.

I hope to recruit enough players at Origins '79 in the next

few weeks, but every little bit helps.

Come next issue, and I'll tell you all what Origins was like. Don't die from anticipation in the meantime....

Until next time, take care.

And that, believe it or not, is how this all started. The lamest, most pathètic, most nameless, most pizza-stained first issue of any zeen ever in existence. By the way, those houserules are not in effect anymore. Ignore them!!!!! Last time I printed this little beastie, an alarming number of players actually thought they were the new relevant rules. Come on, you're certainly sharper than that.

I printed up a bunch of the suckers to hand out at Origins in 1979, but after seeing what typical zeens looked like (I'd only seen three at the time: Graustark, Non Sequitur, and Beaucouillon), decided that it was the better (and less embarrassing) part of valor to send them out through the mail instead. The rest is history. In spite of a lame frontpage article from me every issue, the zeen survived until issue 9 and the Spring 1901 turn of R3, my third game, which featured Bob Olsen, Gary Coughlan, Jack Masters, Tom Hurst, Stephen Lee and Steve Langley, among others, and some of the best (and certainly most voluminous) press ever printed here. Not as off-the-wall as Mike Mills's picture press, maybe, but far more hilarious. R3 also turned out to be my Waterloo, as Gary took the game far more seriously than I did and the resulting fallout has yet to fully settle. You may know of it

as "The Great Feud."

Soon after, R5 started, with Kathy Byrne(now Kathy Caruso), Brad Wilson, Al Pearson, and brief appearances by Don Del Grande and stacked German armies.

Bob Osuch ran two guest-gmed games here, Maniacal and Mass Murders, the second one turning bitter toward the end. Jack Frost started a game here, but pulled it out, and John Chickering guest gmed a game for a brief time, before I took it over. Julie guest gmed a game of Vacation Diplomacy which didn't really get off the ground, and a game of her design, Everybody Plays Dip, which worked out very well. Stephen Lee ran an entertaining Dip game which went by the name "Elephant Heart." Besides Dip, I've run Gunboat, Gunboat Tourneys, Blind Postcard Dip, Magic Realm (abortively), and now Anarchy. Mark Larzelere invented the postal Monopoly hobby here. Now we've got Mike Scott running Civ and Kingmaker games, and Larry Cronin trying to fill up Perestroika Dip (so sign up!). We've done our fair share of dabbling in the gaming arts, run a bunch of games, invented a few variants, inspired a few more, and prodded a fair number of suckers into starting their own zeens so we can torture them for a change. It's been fun!

GERMAN HQ to ALL GERMAN TROOPS: When you march into Russia, let the last man on the left brush the Baltic with his sleeve.

GERMANY to ENGLAND: In the words of Valtin, "For a cornered mind, salvation lies in action."

MOSCOW to AH: I hate to contradict you, but in fact the California A-K Killer (what's his name, anyway?) passed a waiting period check just a couple weeks before the massacre, and as a result was sold a 9mm pistol that he carried but did not use in the crime. Please note that he, in the previous few years, had somewhere between ten and twenty misdemeanors for drug crimes, robbery, and as I recall, weapons violations. At one time, he was ruled "a danger to himself and society" by a state psychiatrist. Yet due to our incredibly incompetent criminal justice system, crime after crime was pleabargained away, he never served any real time, and was fully legally entitled to buy a handgun or rifle under California state law. Incidentally, their standards are similar to those of the "Brady Bill" that first sparked this discussion.

I was going to let this subject die down, since I suspected the public-at-large was sick of hearing about it. But since you brought it up....

Why do gun owners oppose the ban on assault weapons? I mean, it would be really easy for us to agree that Uzis and Mini-14s and AKs are inherently evil, and should be done away with. This action in itself, while it would financially hurt us (every confiscation scheme I've seen calls for no compensation for guns turned in and many of them go for a grand and up!) would by itself be fatal to the shooting sports. However, there is a great gaping problem with this idea — what happens when it doesn't work? I mean, most

people just don't seem to understand that semi-autos with big magazines aren't more deadly than other weapons. The kind of firepower talked about by the media just doesn't exist in the real criminal world. Let me debunk a few myths:

1) Semi-autos fire faster than other gun types. The world record for speed shooting is held by a man using two double-action (policetype) revolvers. In long guns, pump actions are invariably faster in the follow-up shots than semi-autos. But it doesn't matter, because only aimed shots count. And I don't care who you are, you can't aim faster than a shot every two seconds or so, unless you are the sort that burns up 500 rounds a week in practice. Even then, you're not going to approach the 600 rpm (rounds per minute) claimed by many for the Uzi.

2) We need to limit detachable magazine size to 15 rounds. This one's a laugher. I know of one gun with a 145-round fixed magazine --- it's intended for long target shooting sessions with the .22 long rifle. And fixed magazines can be quicker to reload than detachables, using stripper clips. The biggest joke of all, however, is that whether a magazine contains 5 or 10 or 100 rounds, it can usually be changed in 1 1/2 seconds or so with practice or 3 seconds without practice. Besides, the average gunfight in the USA sees a total of 2.5 rounds fired, counting both sides. Yes, I can see where turning in my 30-round mags (without compensation) could be of real value to society....

3) Assault rifles are good only for killing people. Just plain not true. I would be a rich man if I could have a nickel for every deer killed by M1 carbines. The government has released five million of them to the general public, and every year I see them in the hunting fields. The same holds true for Mini-14s, Garands, AKs, SKSs, and

HKs, I'm sure, though I haven't encountered them personally. In fact, there are several guns like the Mini-14 and HK that are sold in both assault rifle and sporting rifle trim. The difference? A nicer stock....

What's worse, the bills before Congress would outlaw virtually all magazine-fed shotguns, which for the past 30 years or so have dominated the sporting market. Now, I own three of these (one of them a rare 16-gauge of 1930s vintage) and I can tell you that I'm less than thrilled at surrendering them without compensation in the vain hope that criminals will do the same. Yet, there is no point in any of this legislation unless repeating shotguns are outlawed, since the 12-gauge shotgun is in fact the most lethal short-range personal weapon in existence, followed closely by the smaller gauges.

So why does the military love assault rifles so? They operate in a different world than the criminal. In battle, I have seen estimates that one bullet in 10,000 finds a target, There is no common need for precise aiming because battles are relatively long affairs where volume counts. Detachable magazines are more durable when severely bounced around than stripper clips, so the strippers were replaced after fifty years of front-line usage. And the magazines are large to support long bursts of unaimed fully-automatic fire. It is also interesting to note that the US Army has used large numbers of 12-gauge shotguns in every major war of the 20th century. Pump actions, in fact.....

Operating under the definition of current "assault rifle" proposals, there are roughly 30 million owners of such weapons in the USA — indeed, pump-action and semi-auto shotguns coupled with semi-auto rifles and semi-auto pistols would, at my own personal guess, total over half of all firearms sold since 1900. Again, my own personal (somewhat informed) guess would be that about 100 million of these weapons are legally owned today. Of my own collection of BATF defined firearms (ie, not including black powder or air guns) I own seven "assault" weapons and five non-"assault" weapons. This should be a fairly typical proportion. To pick and choose among them makes no sense, since they are all equally (in general terms) useful to the criminal. Any attempts to outlaw "assault weapons" are based purely on emotion and not on facts. Fact is that we use them for duck hunting, deer hunting, ventilating soda cans, selfdefense, rabbits, squirrels, formal target shooting, and just to admire on the wall.

ROCKVILLE: So what do you think of the recent Federal law (supported by Prez and NRA Life Member George B) banning most imported assault rifles? Naturally, the domestic gun makers love it, but I don't think the notion of keeping our streets safe is exactly foremost on their minds. And the number of assault-type weapons I see in the paper most these days is 3 million. Sounds like a case of apples and oranges.

One of your main objections seems to be that there is no compensation for guns turned in. I agree that this is ridiculous. Certainly that would make the law unconstitutional in itself.

Criminals don't have the firepower talked about in the media? Only aimed shots count? I think you're mistaken there, at least in this neck of the woods. If you shoot fast enough, aim is immaterial—something is going to hit. That's one reason the Uzi is so popular: kick in the door, reach around and spray the room with bullets. But, or course, this is a fully automatic version of the weapon, and those are already outlawed (or at least tightly regulated, supposedly). Semi-autos just allow your average bozo a slightly higher rate of fire.

I guess that the notion that new regulations won't work is the

last question most regulators are asking. These are desperate people now, desperate to show that they're "tough on crime." A popular stance with you midwestern conservatives, I note. All along you've made a fairly convincing case for allowing us to keep guns. What are legislators to do in place of confiscating and outlawing guns? What is the solution?

PS - LATER: I just saw a piece where an anti-gun group said we ought to outlaw "sniper rifles" (ie, scoped, bolt-action deer rifles) while we're in the process of outlawing "assault rifles." Had Patrick Purdy used one of these on the unfortunate schoolchildren (and thank God he didn't - a lot more of them would have been killed) would this be the law pending before Congress?

One prominent gun-writer I enjoy reading (Jeff Cooper, of "Guns & Ammo") refers to the anti-gunners specifically and the Liberals in general as "the hoplophobe," since they seem to unreasonably fear everything. I am sick at heart over the new LA anti-gun law, especially since they are confiscating (without compensation) among other things, the Ruger model 10-22 rifle. Like millions (literally millions, now) of other Americans, the 10-22 was my first gun, and a neater, more innocuous hunting rifle never existed. If the government can take away my 10-22, it can take away anything and everything I can ever hope to have. Usually when there's two sides to an issue (like gun registration) I can understand the feelings of both sides, even though I only agree with one. In this case, however, the American people are just cheering on the forces of ignorance, prejudice, and political exploitation as they stomp all over the Bill of Rights. Anyone with any significant working knowledge of firearms (a minority even among sportsmen and policemen, unfortunately) will tell you just what a poisonous bunch of garbage this whole "debate" is.

Meanwhile, in Denmark a law was recently passed banning the carrying of slingshots in public. According to my source ("Shooting Times", August 1989) the ban was enacted to "help stop street crime." This is dignified, respectful treatment of citizens by their government? If this measure fails, will rocks and sticks be outlawed? How about if we just require everyone to be handcuffed to a chair at all times, except when accompanied by a police officer to work and perform biological functions? That ought to really take a bite out of crime!

Crime is part of the price we pay for freedom, and an armed citizenry is a sign of the respect and trust that a free country places in its people. Those nations that do not trust their people enough to allow them to bear arms cannot be truly free. And any people that cries out to have the responsibility of bearing arms lifted from their shoulders by "Big Brother" because they have lost faith in themselves and their brother citizens quite possibly no longer deserves to be free.

End of sermon.

The idea of confiscation should be to get the guns used against people off the streets, and the 10-22 just doesn't fit in that category. Of course, this is probably just a backlash against the NRA. Instead of working for a reasonable compromise to limit the sort of weapons we'll allow, the NRA has long held to the hard line that all guns are good. Your average person, or Liberal as you tend to call them, seems to believe that guns whose primary or exclusive use is against other people rejects this view. In the process, the NRA loses much credibility: how can guns be so good when they kill thousands of people each year? The NRA has stonewalled for too long, and now runs the risk

of losing everything instead of bargaining away things they don't really want anyway. Phil, you ought to teach these guys some diplomacy.


