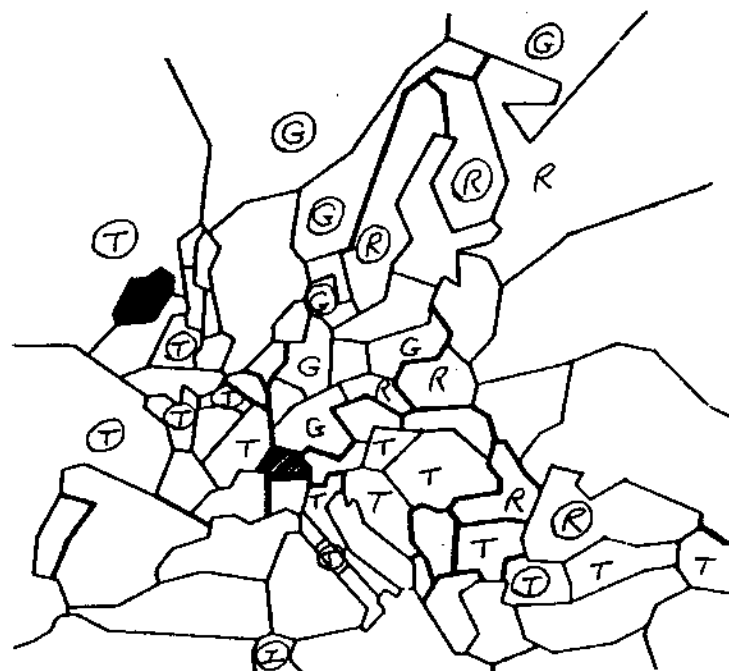

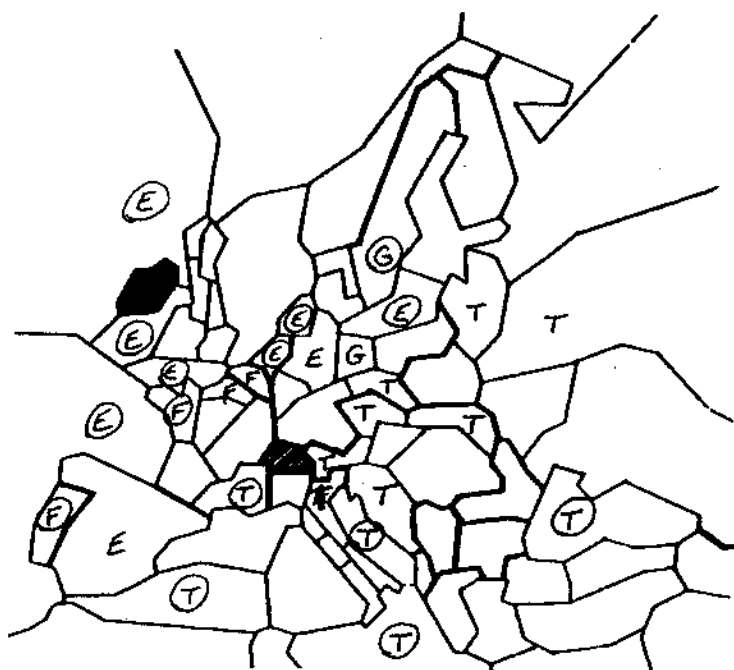

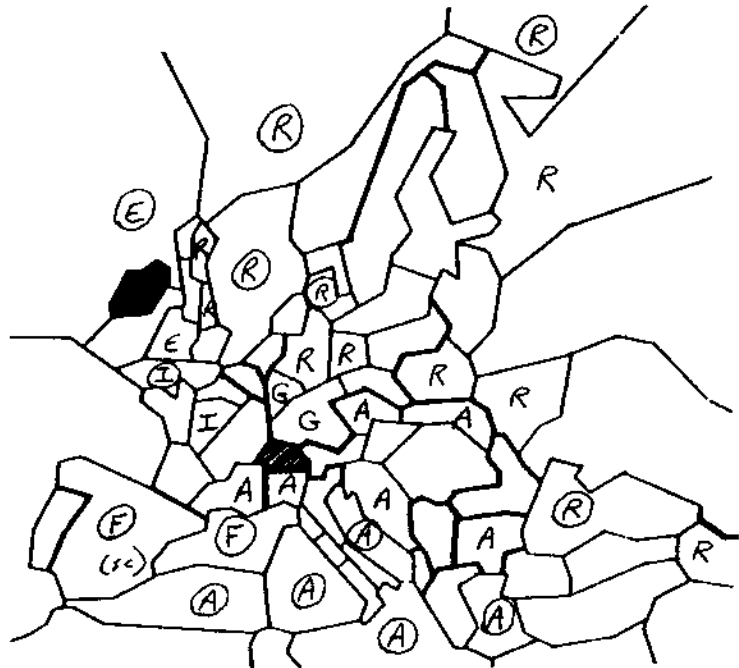

ROCKVILLE: "Trimming the defense budget over five years" will probably amount to no saving at all. The usual game is to

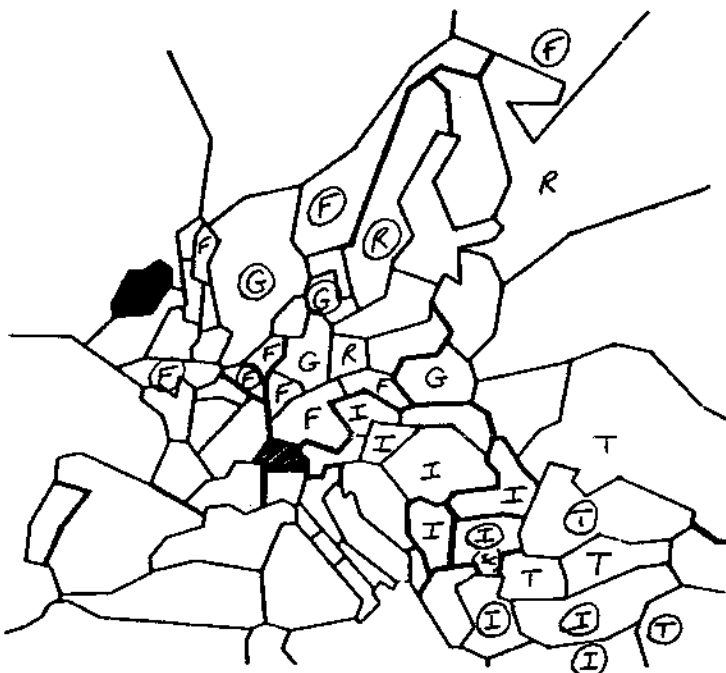

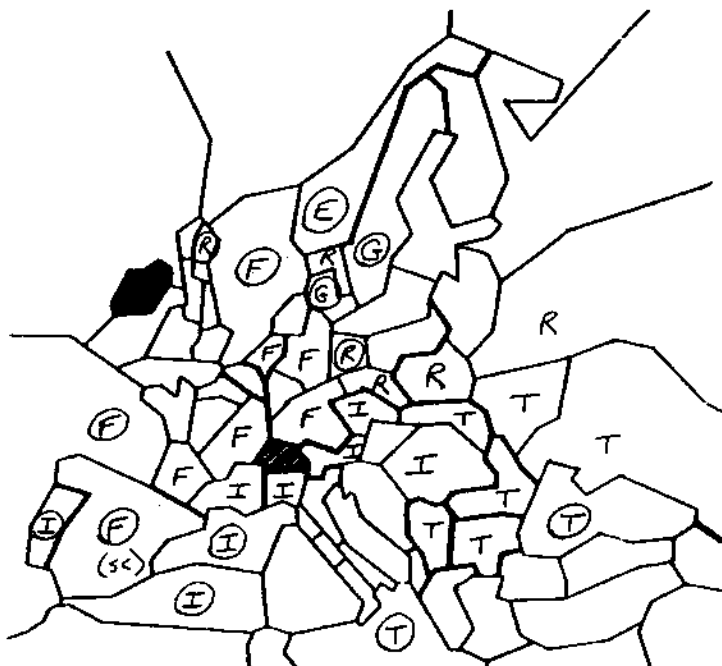

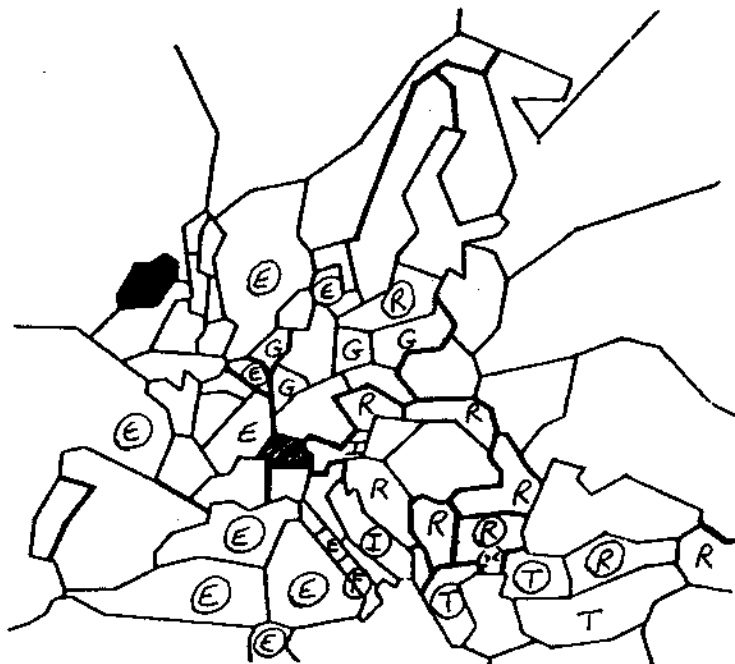

OK, now that we're entering a new decade, it's time to give my picks for the last one. Albums only:

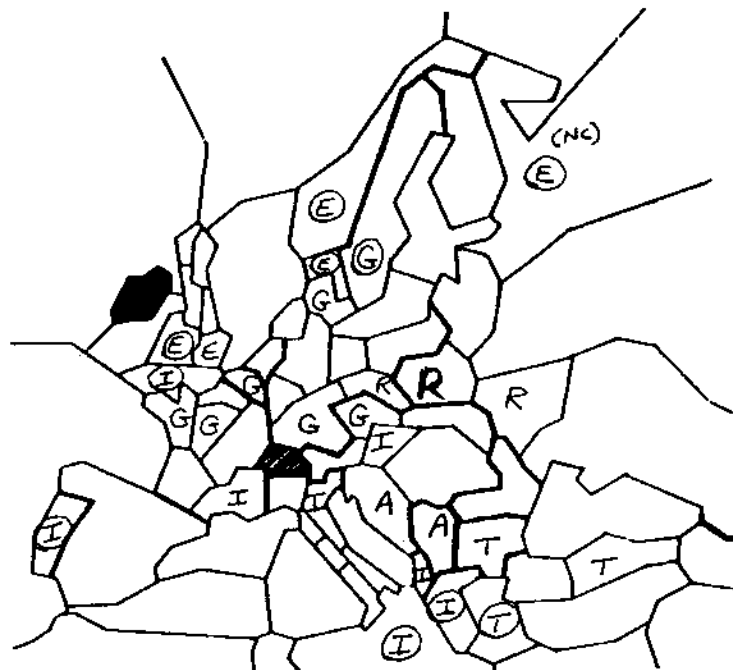
- #1: London Calling, The Clash. Punk rock learns how to play music. Unbelievable heart and conviction.

LONDON to ROCKVILLE: Remember when the ads in the back of *Rolling Stone* used to be for bongos, herbs, or Dr Atomic t-shirts? Anymore it's "GET ANY 12 X-RATED VIDEOS FOR

JUST 99 CENTS." Kind of reminds me of the transformation in the mid 80s of my old dorm (if you want to call it my alma mater) at KU—in 1980 our dorm president was the kind of guy that used to check out the stereo room and listen to Dwayne Allman while firing up...in just a couple of years they were electing Martin Borman types ("Four legs good, two legs better"). Purple Rain as #2??? The only people I used to know that liked it were the most shallow of my friends. Joshua Tree? Yeah, I can dig on that...I'm a recent convert to U2.

ROCKVILLE: Purple Rain has got a couple great songs, but is too uneven to rank that highly. I don't even listen to it anymore. Joshua Tree is still a regular, however. The big thing in the *RS* ads these days seems to be college girl calendars. One thing's for sure, the ads have become yuppified to the gills.

LONDON to ROCKVILLE OR REIFF: Okay, given that they can doctor the ball in baseball. What would either of you claim as the purest of sports (free from cheating)? I'm not sure if I can enjoy watching football anymore...it's getting closer and closer to Pro Wrestling (talk about cheating violations). Basketball is such a situation of "was the ref looking when the forward had his feet out of bounds or not?" Golf? Okay, but when you turn on the television you'd better bring along a good book, too. Bowling? No, they've proven that waxing the floors heavily can influence scores.

ROCKVILLE: Depends what you mean by cheating. Doctoring the baseball is illegal, but reliance on the referees to call a good game certainly is not. Waxing the floors in bowling might affect the game, but only if the wax job favors one bowler over another. For the major sports, I'd say the baseball umpires are the best, with the NBA refs a close second (though they tend to favor certain players). The NFL ranks a distant third. Football penalties are so severe, and are called in such a semi-random manner, that the refs always look bad. And the instant replay rule is a farce.

LONDON to GAMERS: Review: Warrior Knights, by Games Workshop. If you took Kingmaker and 1) simplified the map, 2) put more emphasis on the voting (a lot of emphasis on voting), 3) made the event cards ten times bloodier and randomized, you have, in essence, Warrior Knights. The good points are: exciting (for once) graphics and clean (legalese) rules. The bad ones are: there are many rules indeed (although uncomplicated), and thanks to the severity of the event cards the game can at times last indefinitely. A good indication of what you're up against would be what happened to me when I played it—after an 8 hour game my pieces (Knights) were only 1 space away from the square they started from (having done some travelling around the board before hand); I ended up being three attacks and three dies rolls of 6 (215 to 1) away from winning. A good statement about about this might be: "Stand still in this game and you'll lose, but don't even hope of forming a cohesive strategy, because an event card will dash your hopes." Personally, I find this kind of game frustrating and unpleasant to play.

ROCKVILLE: Isn't Warrior Knights the game where you raze castles, and try to hold half of the castles left to win? I've played it once, and thought it was much better than Kingmaker. Kingmaker is just endless.

ROME to LONDON & ROCKVILLE: Dick, you are giving Kremlin a bad rap. Brent, believe it or not it's an excellent game. you just need to look past the humor. You can also have a good game with four people. Try that with Dip. Civilization, on the other hand, takes days to play and is very boring half the time. And *never* play it by mail. zzz....

ROCKVILLE: If I want to play a good game with four people,

we play 1830. 1830 is the game of choice for five and six players, too. Titan is equally excellent for two to six. Civ only takes days if you let trading periods drag on and always force every player to play in turn—and we do neither.

ROME to LONDON: I'd have to say the biggest reasons I don't buy many games any more are the same two you mentioned — high prices and fifty pages of rules. Never buy a game with more than ten pages of rules, including optional and advanced. Kremlin has six, by the way, Dick.

ROCKVILLE: Unfortunately, Kremlin is a game of little skill. The 1830 rulebook is sixteen pages long, but only eight pages of rules...and none of this "advanced game" nonsense. The main reason I don't buy a lot of games is that most games aren't that great. For a while there our game of choice was Terrible Swift Sword. TSS is not exactly simplicity incarnate, but it's a good enough game to warrant learning. Also, it's hard enough to find one game that we agree on, much less a large variety of them. We tend to stick with the known winners.

ENGLAND to ITALY AND GERMANY: No, I don't think we made Fritz quit. I think Fritz made Fritz quit.

I don't like the way he revealed my plans to Russia (no offense, Gary) on turn one, goofed-up and tried to pin it on the Gamemaster on turn two, and in general came off as very wordy for someone that didn't know too much about the game.

He'll be back. How do I know? I made the same greenhorn mistakes when I first tried to play-by-mail ten years ago (and waited ten years to try again). I don't want to be unsympathetic, but this is a major reason I'm finding gunboat games a bit more satisfying—Fritz was not the first ally in more than one pbm game to determine my success (or rather, failure) by his inept moves.

ROCKVILLE: To tell the truth, I think I did screw up on turn two. That was so long ago that I don't remember any of the details.

ROME to LONDON: Have a lot of money ready if you want a wooden Dip set. The last one I saw at an auction went for \$150. Sentiment Dick? Hardly.

ROCKVILLE: Don't tell anyone that you can still get the wooden sets in Canada, and you'll be able to quit your regular job after one or two more auctions. What I want is a Risk set with wooden pieces. Mine walked off, and now I blew five bucks and picked up a used Risk set ("Counters Punched" it said on the box) with the plastic Roman numeral pieces. Uck.

BER to MOS: I'll get you for that! You scum-sucking pig. Oh, that was your country, wasn't it? Well, democracy must be spread (like a disease). You must reform your communistic ways, or die by the hands of your people. Resign now, like your cohorts, before we have you eliminated.

ROME to MOSCOW: Obviously my conversation with Germany was more fruitful. Any further perfidy will be dealt with equally harshly.

TURKEY to RUSSIA: Man, you ain't too bright, are ya?

FISH OF THE MONTH: Red Snapper. Scientific name unimportant. Best when fresh. Order broiled, with baked potato, rice pilaf, salad with ranch dressing and garlic bread makes a meal fit for a king, or even the Pope.

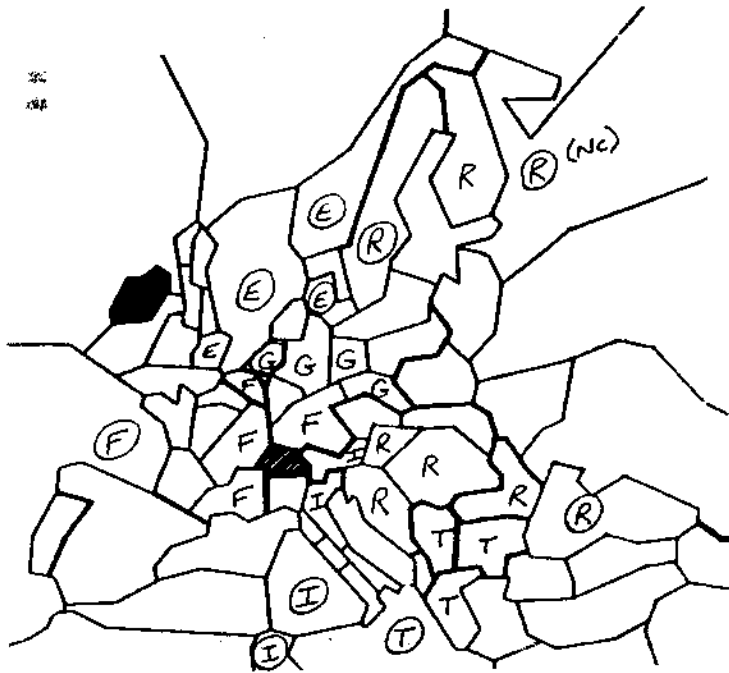
