FITERS Dear Mr. Staples:

Clated hearing from you concerning the international narcotics trade.

Mr. Steples, your very well intentioned suggestions are greatly appreciated and I wat to assure you that they will be given special consideration. I am at a loss, though, to know where you get your information that 70% of the herion supply in this country is from Communist China. This is contrary to the findings of the Narcotics and Dangerous Drugo Division of the Justice Department.

The two major sources of supply have been from poppies produces in Turkey and processed in Japan and from the cutlying areas in the mountains of Thailand and Burma, with some from South Vietnam. It has been a continual problem trying to shut off these supplies. No doubt people of Chinese ancestry are the biggest operators producing heroin in both Thailand and Burma.

Dear Senator Young:

I realize that it is all too seldom that constituients write thier representatives, and it is quite unusual to get a reply. I thank you graciously for the time you have taken to give me a personal reply, and apologise for the delay in answering your inquiry.

Documentation on the involvement of Communist China in the international, illegal narcotics trade is, unfortunatly scarce, especially recent statistics. The Justice Department either desar't knew the full story, or is not telling it-because documentary evidence on China's involvement in the narcotics trade is quite plentiful a few years back. It would be most strange to assume that in recent years, the People's Republic has suddenly, and without warning dried up thisr poppy production— considering (1) it is in a stage of economic developement, and revenues from a profitable secure such as this would be badly needed, (2) the demand for heroin is rising rapidly, along with the problem, and (3) no administration that served after the dates on this evidence has even suggested that Communist China might be involved, let alone pressured them to stop it.

So, if we are to assume that Communist China, whom the Nixon administration is auxious to extend friendship to (an act which might in itself be questioned, the morality of seeking friendship with a tyrannical state responsible for ten times the minimum number of murders performed by Nazi Germany can certainly be questioned), no longer engages to any substantial degree in the dirty herein trade, one first must answer when they stopped doing it, and why.

Now, that old evidence ...

Illicit drug production in Red China has been escalated so rapidly over that at the present time various intelligence estimates, "included one circulated in Eastern Europe by the Seviet Union, put the worth of Communist China's yearly opium production in the BILLIONS of dollars. This 'death trade,' as it is known by U.S. Marcotics officials, is believed to be Peking's most profitable export. Earnings from these opium sales are now being used by Communist China to purchase Western goods, especially heavy machinery, sircraft, transportation equipment and food grains."

After the raw opium is transported to Hanoi; Mr. Mai said, 'about half is flown to China to be processed into herein. The other half is shipped to Haiphong and leaded on Soviet ships."

"By international agreement, "legal" opium production is confined to seven countries- Bulgaria, Greece, India, Iran, Turkey, U.S.S.B., and Yugoslavia-where the product is supposed to be strictly controlled and channeled exclusively into "pipelines" leading to legitimate pharmaceutical industries.

According to the latest "official" report of the Bureau of Narcotics and Dangerous Drugs, "legal" opium production during 1968 came primarily from India, which supplied seme 750 tons to the pharmsceutical industry. Turkey was second, with 120 tons. The Seviet Union reportedly produced 115 tons for its own use, experting none. With about 5 tons from 'other' legal sources, the legitimate world production of epium came to 990 tons in 1968, the last year for which figures have been offered.

As you can see, Senator Young, the problem is grossly underestimated. The Nixon administration evidently puts questionable 'good relations' with Communist countries ahead of the welfare of the American people. The Soviet grain robbery is another such example, but that's a different subject.

Mr. Nixen has no conscience, Senator Young, and you do. Please use it, this country depends on honest, well-intentioned men such as yourself to save us from eventual rule by power-hungry politicians like the President.

First We background:

1972T was a gene run by Tony Pandin in Kalgan, one of his three small journals. By May, 1973, it became apparent to him that he could no longer publish and he so netified then erphan games director Courad von Metaka, shortly after. The moves collected by Pandin from his games in progress were to be sent to von Metaka to distribute to the several publishers who would take ever the gamesmatering of Teny's unfinished games.

By the time mid-July had rolled around, there had been nothing received from Pandin, many of the players were anxious to continue the games, and it did not appear that he would come through (1972T was at the WO4/SO5 stage). Hereo, Course sent most of the games to thier new themes! - where the lest moves sent to Pandin would have to be redone. The adjustment deadline (WO4) for 1972T was August 13.

This did not coincide with the deadline of The Riget, but nonetheless, I printed up a special issue of Farfy Blue (which, I do not zind doing, don't get me wrong) and mailed it out to all the players on August 15 (which also happened to be the special deadline for another recently adopted orphan, 1973%). I had received adjustments from everyone at this time, and appointed Tem Gengler a replacement player for Bob Matthews, one of the original players who quit.

Within a short time after mailing out the adjustments, I received SO5 orders from Gengler. Van De Graaf, and Weidmark- 3 of the six players. I also received a letter from Paul Wood regnarding financial arrangements (he had taken over 1975% from Paudin, a game I was a player in)—and, I belive, his moves—which I lost. So, a few days before the August 30 deadline, I sent Paul an airmail reply card to get a duplicate on his moves—I got it nearly 3 weeks later, on September 15, with a short explanation for the delay and and a statement that he hadn't got results from WO4.

To complicate matters, about this time, Conrad sent the set of VOA/SO5 moves that he had finally received from Pandin, everyone's moves were there except Paul Vood's. A few days later, I got a letter from Rick Brooks stating that he hadn't received any winter adjustments (some three weeks plus after they were due) but he thoughtfully (intended sincerely) included SO5 conditionals. Since the conditional orders were quite explicit (and there were only three builds anyway) I felt it uncreasary to hunt up and send him duplicates at this late date (some two weeks after the deadline) - I had still gatten at moves from Wood or Berents at this time; the deadline before The Right #17. Hence, I felt the game had been delayed long enough - I used Herb Barent's moves from the set submitted to Pandin, put an "NAR" for Paul (no units were dislocated as a result) and sent the moves out on September 9. from a greecy store mailbox that had Sunday pickups. You may read all about that on the previous page.

A few days latter, moves arrive from Barents (SO5) with a note; "I did NO." get this until today!" and Wood, then the cute little note from Brooks:

You are improving. Last issue came 15 days after the deedline ((refering to the builds)). Now this issue cames one day before the deadline. And you wonder why you have "an unhealthy supply of NMRs" ((Totally irrelevent— The Right #16 was mailed three weeks before #17, and arrived on time for everyone— there were NO complaints about lateness of this, nor any of the previous issues, except in a few rare cases where I granted necessary deadline extensions as requested WHEN I WAS NOTIFIED OF THE DELAY PROMPTLY)) If this game is distanteful enough to you that you want to get it over with as soon as possible, why did you take it over? (1973) was transfered with no problems or inconviouse to the players.

in fact, I was complimented several times on "the speed with which I took it ever", if you are not intrested on games which run on a regular basis, I could recommend some GMs who do thier turns whenever they feel like it and/or when enough players decide to turn in thier moves.))

I AM WITHDRAWING and I demand a refund of my money. Grounds: There is a new player and I got no time to deal with him before spring moves and only five days before fall moves. I have not had time to even plan between moves, let alone communicate with the other players.

I will also try to get this game transfered to another GM.

Has it occured to you that the Postal Dept, doesn't give same day service? ((Has it ever!!!)) My copy of RB (Barfy Blue) came in 5 days ((about par, I figure 4 days for first class mail, 2 days for airmail- I don't count the day it's mailed if pickup is after 11 a.m.)) while the postmark on The Rigot ((#17)) is unreadable. ((As a side note- It wasn't there, Charles Maylon sent me a photocopy to prove it- 'tis much less embarassing to postmark it late as was the case with Barfy Blue (I would assume, since three of the six players got it, and submitted thier moves well on time)))

I am fairly sure that Herb will side with me on a new GM and it looks like Paul will ((sounds like you've been doing a lot of communicating, for someone who doesn't have time to "communicate with the other players.")) One more player and we have a majority and can transfer to a new GM that will give us time to play.

The problem with #17 has been explained, not satisfactorly— either to me or the players— but explained. The delay in three cases for Barfy Blue could be:

(1) Wood, Barents, and Brooks didnot get them on time and Weidmark, Van De Greaf, and Gengler did due to one of many frequent screwups in the USPS.

(2) They got them on time, forgot to send them in on time, and explained it by telling me they hadn't received them. ((VERY unlikely in three cases))

OR, as Mr. Brooks seems to imply;

(3) I just leve playing malacious tricks by sending to f the players their moves, and helding the other to until the deadline so I can chuckle over the moves not turned in, and appoint standbys from my inadequet list.

Nonetheless, it was evident that this was not 100% the fault of the players, so, on September 20— I send a duplicate of the adjustments and a re-call for Spring; 1905 moves out to the players on the condition that Barents, Wood, or Brooks would pay postage, Herb did. This was done by sending six copies for each player out via airmail to Barents, with instructions to send to Wood if he didn't want Spring moves redone, who would send them to Brooks if he didn't. Hence, all three people were given a chance to have the previous moves nullified and re-done. Herb did so, and the SO5 results can be seen in this issue.

Case closed, so I thought,

But, when it came time for Brooks to send in his new SO5 orders (which, by the way, I was expecting to get— despite his statement that he was resigning from the game in the previous letter; you can't take a person like that seriously), which he did, he had a few new comments:

It is good that you have finally decided to take up you responsibility as GM. I will remind you that I did send in conditional moves for spring. Herb got fall moves a day after deadline. ((that's strange, I haven't called for any fall moves at this time- beyond those that weren't published which were canceled due to the SO5 rocall)) You must go to 3 weeks or a month ((go to have, you aren't running things- you're now on four weeks, snicker)) Hope-fully we will have another GM by next move set... I suggest that you read up on Dislowacy, especially postal, before further GMing.

I may not have handled this case 100% correctly, but I doubt then many other Was would have done very different given similar circumstances. I can accept pertial responsibility for postal err se long as it is reported immeadeatly (before the following deadline), in fact, houserule #3 so states:

late moves will be accepted ONLY in the case of a clear postal failure and if it can be corrected easily and the player turning in late moves will pay 75% of the costs ((now 50%)) in correcting it.

All new players, including Brooks were sent houserules. Herb may have been wronged in part because I didn't share my 50% of the costs (I recently wrote offering to do so) - and certainly has mone cause to complain

I have tried to present Brook's position us much as possible by quotations from his letters, but this, nonetheless, is my account, Keep that in mind when you send comments, or draw conclusions.

I sust say, the simultaneous movement system, which, I think, in he long run will be a big improvement both from the standpoint of playability and realism takes some genting used to: The SMS pads are copyrighted, which can't be done- things that are used to record information and which do not give it /nemselves are uncopyrightable

Sad to hear that SPI will not be publishing FRIGATE ov LETTE GULF until late 1974. one of thier few good points was thier willingness to design in unexplored areasof which navel tactics (especially pre-modern, of which there's NOTHING beyond the Viking fleets in DA/K AGES- and no ship-to-ship combat) is the largest.

I hope some smaller group picks up here and runs SPI out of the market just for

COAST_RUNNING VARIANT

by Eric P. Verheiden

Varints of A I tooos

For this variant, the rules of regular <u>Diplomacy</u>, as outlined in the 1971 rulebook, will be used with certain clarifications and one addition as described below.

Convoys
Rule XII.5 is deleted as unwerkable and replaced with the following:

A CONVOYED ATTACK MAY NOT AFFECT THE CONVOYING FLEETS. If a convoyed army's attack would affect the outcome of an attack on any of its convoying fleets, however directly or indirectly, the convoyed attack does not take place and the army to be convoyed must hold in its original position.

This eliminates all so-called paradoxes which could arise with convoys under the regular rules. It is to be interpreted that no part of Brannan's rule will be used under any circumstances; note the adjudication of the following example:

ENGLAND: F Len S F Nth, A Yor-Hel, F Nth C A Yor-Hel, F Hel S A Yor-Hel

GERMANY: F Hol-Nth (disledged), F Bel S F Hol-Nth
The unsuccessful supported attack of GF Hol on EF Nth does not stand off the supported convoyed attack. However if EF Nth were insupported, it would be disledged irreguardless of how many supports were given to the convoyed attack, as opposed to the convoying fleet. EA Yor would then remain in its original position.

Coast-running
Any army situated in a costal province may give up its move to protect (abbreviated 'P') a single fleet running the province's coastline(s). The fleet in question, if situated adjacent to a coastline of the protected prevince, may then move along that coastline to any (non-landlocked) space bordering the given coastline.

Examples:

F Ion-Wes, A Tun P F Ion-Wes F Edi-NAt, A Cly P F Edi-NAt

Multiple ceast-running is pessible with an unbroken string of protecting armies.

Further, coast-running is possible through all fleet-permeable land previnces (Swe, Den, Kie & Con), but not through double-coasted previnces (StP, Spa & Bul). Fleets may however run both coasts of a double-coasted prevince in the course of a single coast-running maneuver.

Examples

F Tri-Ion, A Ven P F Tri-Ion, A Apu P F Tri-Ion

F StP(n.c.) Eng (illegal), A New P F StP(n.c.) Eng, A Len P F Stp(n.c.) Eng (the string of protecting armies is broken in the North Sea, so the move is illegal)

F Bal-Nth, A Kie P F Bal-Nth, A Hol P F Bal-Nth

F Bar-Bet, A StP P F Bar-Bot (illegal, fleet not running single coast)

F Mid-Lyo, A Spa P F Mid-Lyo (only southcoast is run)

F Rum-Gre, A Bul P F Rum-Gre, A Con P F Rum-Gre (legal, since F Rum may run both coasts of Bulgaria WITH fleet-permeable Constantinople in between)

The restrictions on coast-running fellow in general the lines of the analogous restrictions on convoys. In particular, coast-running attacks may be supported as regular attacks; if unsuccessful, the coast-running fleet is returned to its

Coast Running Variant (continued)

original space unharmed. Protection given by coastal armies may not be cut, however if any army in a string protecting a coast-running fleet is dislodged, the entire manbuver is disrupted and the fleet may have no effect upon the province to which it was ordered. Ambiguous routes for coastal runs are handled in the same way as ambiguous convoy routes. Finally, coastal runs are subject to the rule quoted above for convoys (replacing rule XII.5) with the words "army", "Tleet" and "convoy"— being replaced by the words "fleet", "army", and "protect="respectively.

Examples

- 1) IF for Wes, IA Tun P IF Ion-Wes, FF Mid-Wes (both the Italian and French fleets and up in thier original positions)
- 2) RF Ma-Aog, TA Con P RF Bla-Aog, TP Say S RF Bla-Aog, AF Aog H (dislanged)
- 3) AF Alb-Aeg, AA Gre P AF Alb-Aeg, TA Bul-Gre (Docan't cut protection)
- 4) FY Pic-Nth, FA Bel P FF Pic-Nth (dislodged), GA Buh-Bel, GF Hel S GA Ruh-Rel (the dastal run is disrupted by the dislodgement of FA Bel)
- 5) (F HgB-Bel, GA Kie P GF HgB-Bel, GA Don P GF HgB-Bel(dislodged), NF Nth-Den, RF Sw S EF Nth-Den (GF HgB doesn't neve because route is ambiguous)
- 6) IF Mor-Mid, FA Spe P FF Mar-Mid(dislodged), EF Por-Spa, EF Mid S EF Por-Spa (FF Ma: in not allowed to cut the support of EF Mid and thoughy to affect the outcome of an attack on protecting FA Spa)
- 7) F. M'd-Bal. FA Bre P FF Mid-Bal, FA Pic P FF Mid-Bal, FA Bal P FF Mid-Bal. FA Ho. P FF Mid-Bal, FA Kie P FF Mid-Bal (dislodged), GA Ber-Kie, GA Mun S GA Ber-Klo (FF Mid is unable to move because of dislodged FA Kie)

Staples here. I added the seventh example (on the end) mainly because I lake Eric's v/riant with one minor point I'd like to kibitz about:

A nuggented rule to add a bit of realism:

WHEN A PROTECTIVE ARMY IN A STRING OF PROTECTING ARMIES IS DISLODGED, THE WIFET IT WAS PROTECTING SHALL (IN THE RETREAT PHASE) MOVE TO ONE OF THE SPACES ADJACENT TO THE STRING. LAST PROTECTING ARMY THAT WASN'T DISLODGED IN THE STRING. Hence, in Example #7 above, the French Floot would retreat (or be 'pushed out') to one of the spaces adjacent to Holland. (non-landlocked, notch) I think this in a little better than making the coast running fail altegether. But, if it bothers seem people— yeu may also give it a combo of the following options:

- i) to remain where it started (as in Verheiden's variant), or
- to retreat to ANY space adjacent to the coastal provinces containing protecting armies (prior to the one which was disloged), or
- ")to retreat to a space adjacent to the first costal prevince containing a protecting army to which there are spaces available to retreat. ("first" see fering to the province nearest in the string to the dislodged army).

The purpose of this rule is simply because the disloggement of a protecting army further down the line shouldn't affect what happens to the fleet prior to that point. The army is 'protecting' the fleet with coastal artillary and the like and not actually carring it as a convoying fleet carries an army.

It should also be noted that these variant rules can be used with practically any nulti-player game resembling Diplomacy. Fact is, I would like to use the (with my little addition) on the next section of 1934. Comments from these signed up please....

LENSMAN VARIANTS

To state than Lensman is a game that cannot be changed is like referring to an ant as
weak. Ever since its publication, Lensman has
attracted numerous fans, as well as laid the
foundations for the development of such games
as Webula - 19 and Second Galactic War. Having
pooled my ideas together, I have formed several

variants to the game, variants which | hope to share with you. They have been placed in a certain order, so all can be used with or without thier counterparts.


1, WARPING

Warping is a characteristic which, in the game of Lensman, would allow a vessel the power to move anywhere in the entire mapboard. For a vessel to do this, it must be in the same square as an interdimensional transport (I.T.). The I.T. costs 50 KC to build, it may take two turns to build one, as done with maulers. For attack, defense, and movement factor, treat it as a freighter. What makes the vessel unique is its ability to send any vessel to any part of the board (strategic as well as battle), provided the vessel meet the following characteristics:

- 1) It must be either friendly to the side wishing to use it for warping, or minus total use of its pilot control.
- 2) It can move into a vacant battle board square on the board into which it is sent. If not sending a vessel into a BB square, ignore.
- 3) As mentioned earlier, the vessel must inhabit the same strategic board square as the I.T.

A vessel being "warped" may use its movement factor after the warping attempt is completed, the process to wrp a vessel takes only ten seconds. In the case of a battle board conflagration, the L.T. can warp vessels while the battle is taking place, provided it is not captured or destroyed. The equipment that causes the "warping process" to occur is located in the cargo section of the vessel's(it is still a freighter, remember?), hence a hit to the vessel's pi-con would not affect it. (The warping, that is.) The L.T. MAY WARP ITSELY to any square along with any vessels (t wishes to do so with. It would not have to go with the vessels, though, and the vessels could only be those that applied to the three prerequisites mentioned earlier.

(b) Those who started any game described in (a), but did not finish.

(c) Those who played at least the last 3 seasons in any game described in (a), but did not start.

(d) Those who did not start nor complete any game described in (a), but played within 3 seasons of the conclusion, either by completion of the game, or elimination of country.

Players that weren't rated:

 $\gamma(a)$ Those who neither started or completed a game, and not covered by $\langle d \rangle$

(f) Those who completed a game (either by elimination of thier country, or conclusion of game), did not start, but played less than 3 seasons (spring or fall only).

(g) Those in games whose validity is subject to serious questioning; all of these games will eventually be rated in one form or other; and now include 1971 CJ-CO, & DR.

I, personally, do not care for the name of this system. It will only be temperary until a good permanent one can be thought up. Any suggestions?

SAFA does not recognize irregular games, all are rated. Those subject to serious question due to gamemasterial error or similiar reasons will all eventually be rated with special considerations given. In the cases where gamemasterial action penalizes the players (such as arbitrarily throwing a player out for illegitimate reasons)— the player will be rated UP TO THAT POINT, and the gamemaster will be penalized for any result following. This will, I know, bother many— but it is, I belive, a better solution than penalizing all the other players by not rating the game at all. The fact that one's player score can be influenced by his action as a gamemaster is a price that must be paid if the proper party (the gamemaster) is to be punished, rather than the uninvolved players.

Note: all scores given are based on a "curve". That is, someone who always averaged fourth (the 'average' finish(a)) with an average country in an average situation (standby players are follow awarded "free points" to compensate for the diplomatic disadvantage they have upon entering the game) would have a SAFA rating on an even "O". Theoritically, "3" is the best possible rating, and "-3" the worst. But there can be extensions from those limits due to a player doing exceptionally good in a 'below average' situation, or exceptionally poor in a situation 'above average'.

This rather inspired game is a tactical battle situation based on a hypothetical attack on West Germany, by Russia, in the 1970's. There are ten scenarios of ten turns each. The scenarios range from airmobile operations to a head-or-head armored battle. Added attractions- helocopter gunships tactical nuclear weapons, plus all the modern weapons in today's arsenal.

As to the other aspects of the game; it plays easily, surprisingly easily, for a game as complex as it is and compared to other armor-tactical games. This is probably because the board's not covered with terrain, there's a phaserecord keeper on the mapboard, and the set of well-integrated rules, One can really get involved in enjoying the game rather than worring about technicalities. The combat result table is also smooth to use, but allows considerable leeway in possible outcomes

The only possible fault in RS/WS is that the scenarios tend to be unbalanced in seme cases. This is not really critical, as it is easy to adapt to the players,

In conclusion, I think this game is a well-developed one, providing much enjoyment, but still very challenging, you can't take anything harder than "Borodino", stay away from this game, but if your intrest lies toward some experimentation in something that could happen (but hopefully won't), then try Red Star/White Star.






