the Boardman Numbers would be, in my humble opinion, wrong.

Abandonment would hurt no one, except perhaps a few variant fenatics.

The players do not really benefit from having a "Miller Number". This is clear, because during all those months when nothing was done variant games went on without, to my knowledge, any player losing much sleep. Not only that, but just think of all the useless work saved!

Useless?! Well, what else? It is probably impossible to devise a system for rating all variants together fairly. 90 per cent of variants are played only once or a few times, then never again, so a record of them doesn't need

to be maintained for any real reason.

Now, Boardman Numbers serve a purpose, in that they facilitate information gathering for statistical purposes, Even here, though, I do not think it necessary to number every game. We need to eliminate unusual games, not clutter up the lists. I feel that listing local telephone games or other irregular games hurts the Boardman Numbers. In fact, thought should be given to assigning Boardman Numbers only after a game is <u>finished</u> and it was regular. The transcript would be submitted by the Gi, and after ruling the game regular it would be assigned a number based on the order in which it was finishes.

Gamesmasters or players who didn't want to submit their games wouldn't have to. These are likely to be more irregular (less formal) anyway. What would result would be a chronological list of homogeneous games,

perfect for statistical purposes.

Why clutter up the list with games which are not ratable and/or which no one cares about, as evidenced by not submitting an application for a Number? (continued on page 6)

Also, if everyone agrees, we can convert to 2-week deadlines. (However, unless it's unanimous, we stay on three. As well, I don't want players to depend on the phone to send in orders. It's all right occasionally, but don't get into the habit. If two weeks is too short for regular postal submission of orders, stick to 3-week deadlines,)

Thirdly, a slight misprint last season necessitates, I think, a delay. Russia retreated "f den-hel", not "hol" (which is impossible; this is obvious - it's the next bit that creates the confusion) and disbanded a hol.

If you've got a bit of reading-writing fluency in French, why not rush to get into the last spot currently available in the once-vast RUNESTONE games empire?

Fred Winter Letter (continued from p. 1): Perhaps somewhat off the subject, this connent nevertheless strikes at the question: why? Why list variants at all?

((This letter deserves a complete answer, and I don't know if I've got the space... or the time - it's getting late. But I'll make a start, and

maybe finish off next issue.

((Last things first? Why list variants? For the same reason we list regular games: it's interesting! It's interesting for some people to see their own names in print and get a bit of an ego boost (or puncture, as the case may be). On a less childish level, it gives people a chance to see how friends, enemies and acquaintances are doing. In this way, it provides a badly-needed binder, a unifying influence in this sadly-centrifugal hobby. It also gives raw material for ratings systems (and even if you personally aren't interested in ratings, surely you'll admit that it's a valid concern

and area of pleasure for those who arel.

((These are some reasons for listing information on games, and no doubt some readers unaffected by Tuborg (we've got a brewers' strike on our hands here in Alberta) will be able to think of others. A somewhat separate function is the assigning of numbers, whether Boardman or Killer. I think there is a valid reason for doing this, if only that it's easier to say "1977Alid" than "the 4-player Madman game in RUMESTONE". The Miller Number system, cumbersome as it is, is better than nothing. But more than that, it provides another unifying function. In applying for a Miller Number, a GM plugs himself into something bigger than himself and, for one brief shining moment, participates in The Variant Hobby. Perhaps his participation ends there; perhaps he goes on to make a greater input in other ways. In any event, a door is opened, if the GM chooses to enter, without Miller Numbers (or some equivalent) that door just never exists. As we see now; I feel that a lot of the insularity in the variant hobby at present can be directly attributed to the failure of the Miller Number Custodian and Acting Miller Number Custodian to perform their fundamental duties.

((Sure, it's perfectly possible for players to play in an isolated variant game, have a good time, and walk away. But why restrict ourselves to that? Thy ignore the overtones? Why not plug into the greater possibilities as well, work on the higher levels, have a richer experience? It's possible.... ((I'll continue my response in a future issue — next issue, I hope...))
