Winter 1905 (builds). De'In Rungstone * 272 (Nov. 12th), Winter was called for by Dec. 2rd. I never received his orders, as he apparently sent them to John, from what I could make arom his letter. As I did not receive them, and as they had been called for, I have to rule that he did in fact NBR.

Bob also claimed that he sent in orders for Spring 1906. This matter is further complicated by the fact that Spring 1906 was never actually called for; in *272 it states only -Winter 1906 due Dec. 3rd. However, having received Spring orders from everyone except England and Italy, and England not having sent me Winter orders either, I dacided to adjudicate Spring and Winter together. Admittedly, this was an indiscretion on my part, however, a reversal of the Spring O6 adjudications is not warranted. Italy (John Morgan) had sent orders to John instead of me, and Bob sent tentative orders to John instead of me. Therefore I conclude that my adjudication of Spring without it being called was not the cause of Bob's NMR, rather, it was that he sent orders to John instead of me. So I'm letting the NMR stand, as well as the NBR.

Returning to this wason, Bob has sent in orders based on his argument in that he does in fact have his builds of Winter O5. I am willing to delay the game for two weeks in order to let him resubmit orders based on his units was they are listed in the last adjudication of Winter O5/Spring O5. I'll make Winter Warch Wash the deadline for the resubmission of orders, hopefully Bob will be able to get them in by then. Realizing, however, that the mails are unpredictable, if I do not receive them by then, I will wait until they do come in, and accept them if they are postmarked on or before Wednsday, March 26th. If Bob feels that he really needs more time, due to further negociations required, etc., he can write to me immediately stating so, I will then postpone the new deadline by a week. What I'm trying to do is save as much time as possible without being unfair to anybody. Revised orders from other players will be accepted as well, up until the new deadline.

I hope Bob will accept my resolution of this problem. Of course, he has the right to appeal to the CDO Ombudsman, Francois Cuerrier, in which case there will be an interminable delay. I'm hoping however, that he fixed sees and accepts the reasoning behind my ruling.
