(Turkey) French and Turkish military and diplomatic representatives met in Sicily this past winter to celebrate their rout of the Italian navy and to plan their joint attack on the Italian mainland in 1905. With Italy's navy rusting away in port, these two long-time secret allies have succeeded in linking up their Mediterranean fleets and re-opening their trade routes which were disrupted for four years. France was the first European country to negotiate a commercial treaty with the Ottoman Empire, back in 1535. We have been at war with France only once, when it invaded Egypt in 1798 under Napoleon.

Italy managed to start a war between former allies France and Germany, as well as to order puppet Emperor Stora's forces east and south. We have all seen through you now, Sam! Venice will soon fall - maybe to your former puppet's forces. President-for-life Polak's term is about to end.

Fra-Ger: I'd like to set a mutual border. France gets Belgium and  
Burgandy. Germany gets Holland, Ruhr, Munich.

Eng-Ger: The Prime Minister offers his apologies to the Kaiser for  
the unfortunate bounce in Belgium. Your offer to France of an  
alliance is most troubling to the PM. Since the French have more  
armies than anyone else on the board they will have to cross your  
border in the hunt for more dots.

Eng-Tur: First one to Moscow gets the Kremlin.

Tur-Eng: May I suggest that you find the North of great interest and  
profit? If you can avoid an entanglement with the French and German  
forces, this is your most likely avenue of gain.

Tur-Fra: I must express some concern about your directions against  
England inasmuch as that may distract attention from the North.

Tur-Aus: It is not my intention to initiate hostilities. No doubt I must find my own way out of the mess in the Black Sea. I am willing to negotiate on matters of mutual interest. I await your consideration. Meanwhile, please consider moving A BUD-RUM, my forces will support this move in SPRING 1902 in repayment of your succession of GRE to us.

Tur-Ger: Most interesting move in the North. The Sultan will not forget it. It may well be of your own benefit to pick up a dot or two in the East while Russia is engaged elsewhere.

Tur-Ita: As you can see, we expect to be engaged in the East for a season or two. If a change of fortune falls upon us, we will repay our debts in future seasons of prosperity.

Tur-Rus: We regret your obstinence in the matter of the Black Sea. It is always better to negotiate than to engage in ceaseless and profitless hostilities. Even if you build a fleet, I suggest that you will not be able to profit in the South. There is still time to turn your ambitions in another direction.

Palazzo Viento, Rome: "Ah, Montessori, welcome home! What news from our eastern allies?"

"They do not seem eager to fight, milord, but neither are they eager to cooperate. The Sultan firmly controls the Black Sea, and appears more interesse in Rumania than Serbia."

"Mal biento, Montessori, this is not good! They must see that simultaneous attacks on Trieste and Budapest are our best opportunity to crush the degustare Austrians."

"Aye, milord, it is hoped they will see the benefits of your plan."

"On other matters, send a message to the French that we will understand their need to build a fleet in Marseilles, and we will not take offense should it then move through Spain to the Atlantic, for they will certainly want revenge upon the English."

"It shall be done, milord."

"Also, warn the Germans against aiding Austria. Tell the Kaiser it would be foolish to book passage on a ship fated to sink. Assure him, upon my honor as a man of the cloth, that he is safe so long as he does not interfere."

"As you command, milord."

From the Swiss Capital, Berne: In an obscure fjord in Sweden, a report of the successful repulsion of the Russian forces was claimed to be a result of the use of a new mini-submarine tested for the first time in combat. Reliable sources in Sweden reported that the Russian fleet was unable to respond to this new naval threat. Trading in the Austrian Shilling resumed at markedly lower values today. The Russian Ruble and the Turkish Lira continued lower against the British Pound. The Mark, Franc and Italian Lira remained stable, while the British Pound continued its rock solid performance, as usual.

It seems that love is not detered by war. Caught in Paris in an embarrassing liason were two consulate employees, one an Austrian cook, the other an Italian maid. French officials dismissed the incident as just an 'affaire de la coeur.'

MODERN DIPLOMACY, by Michael V. McCabe

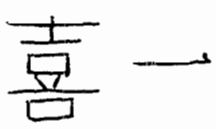
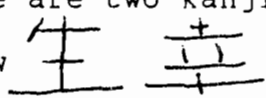
This is the 2d in a series of columns by one of your diplomats abroad. Everything expressed in the column are my views and are not necessarily those of the Department of State or any other U.S. Government agency.

The term "peaceful uses" is used differently by the U.S. and the Japanese Governments. To the U.S., peaceful uses can include military use, say for defensive purposes or in satellites used for observation. Japan, however, equates peaceful use with nonmilitary use. As Japan's space agency was getting underway, its charter called for the organization to conduct activities for peaceful uses only. That term was defined to the Diet (Japan's Parliament) as nonmilitary uses. Thus Japan's space agency cannot cooperate with any military organization, domestic or foreign.

This difference in definition was a difficulty that had to be overcome in negotiating the space station agreement. Readers will remember that the U.S., Japan, Canada, and Europe have agreed to collaborate in the building of Space Station Freedom. Japan is building one of the station's modules. The way this difference was resolved for operations in the space station was to have each country's definition of peaceful uses apply to that country's module. Therefore, work in the U.S. module could be used by a military organization but work done in the Japanese module would not be used by any military organization. This also could be an issue if a new space cooperation agreement is negotiated.

Cultural Item. The Japanese language is complex. One aspect of its complexity is that three "alphabets" are used: kanji, katakana, and hiragana. (Actually, the kanji, or Chinese characters, are not really an alphabet but are word or thought pictures. Katakana and Hiragana actually are alphabets.) The Japanese learn them all. Sentences that are written in katakana or hiragana can be sounded out in the same manner as if the sentences were written in the Roman alphabet. Kanji sentences are more difficult; the characters, their meanings, and their uses must be memorized -- even for names. Here are two kanji; they mean, in order, "to live" and "happiness." Yet when placed together in a name, one who does not know the person does not know how to pronounce the name!

This is because the first one can be pronounced as "say," "show," or "ee," and the second can be pronounced as "ko" or "satchi." They are the characters of the first name of one of the Japanese employees in my section, who pronounces his name "Seikoh" and not "Iisatchi." Here are the characters in the first name of Japan's new Prime Minister. They can be pronounced "Ki ichi" or "Yoshi kazu". When they were printed in the Japanese language newspapers, the hiragana was printed next to the kanji so readers would know that the correct pronunciation of Mr. Miyazawa's given name was Kiichi.

## INTERNAZIONALE

"The Dark Side of Nationalism"

or

"Use the Force, Duke"

The problem with nationalism per se is not its existence; by definition, it raises national feeling and consciousness and helps bind together a nation, something which I believe is positive. The hitch comes in the focus of nationalism, or more specifically, its target. Often the prevailing climate of emotion is not "Look how good we are" but rather "Look how bad they are - we're better than that."

In Europe, this phenomenon often gives rise to the slogan "Germany for the Germans!" "Italy for the Italians!", etc. With a more unified Europe, people are also starting to say "Europe for the Europeans!" Facist parties in Europe (yes, they still exist) have capitalized on this in taking an anti-immigrant stance, winning themselves substantial support in the electorate. In Italy, the Lega Lombarda (which support creating a loose Italian federative state) has built much of its growing power in the North based on this feeling. It also plays off old anti-South sentiment; northern Italy has been subsidizing southern "development" for the past forty years.

European right-wing parties also capitalize on legitimate concerns, such as inefficient state-run enterprises, high taxes, and education. Their co-optation of these issues, however, is to a large extent insincere. Support of the right is based on anti-immigrant, nationalist, and racist sentiment. Much of the rest of their "programs" were just recently generated, sometimes years after a party's formation.

Unfortunately, the United States is also beginning to see a rise of the far right. David Duke's defeat in Louisiana has not stopped his career of being a professional candidate, now continuing in the presidential arena. The story of his success is even somewhat more disturbing. There is no chance that any of the fascist parties in Europe could achieve power in any state, as the opposition is just too strong. In America, the two-party system allows more "fudging" across party lines, as people in the U.S. now vote more for the candidate than for his party affiliation. Though it is difficult to see someone like Duke actually winning a serious office, a candidate with a less blantly National Socialist past could easily do just that. Even Mr. Duke has had a shocking success, easily winning the majority of the white vote in Louisiana.

The methodology in both European and American cases is strikingly similar, involving a base appeal to racist and nationalist feelings. In the U.S., nationalism is a more diffuse thing, as Americans are not part of one "nation" as are the French, Italians, or Germans. American nationalism instead takes on a racial character, with WASPism trumpeted as being best for the country. This offends those white anglo-saxon Protestants like myself, who see no specific applicability of my own heritage to the national situation, which is quite diverse in ethnic, religious, and cultural terms. If we are to have nationalism, let it be the United States of America and ITS unique heritage that are supported, not the views and background of a minority.
