

PRESS

Dateline Paris: President Le Pin, in response to a regrettable telegram issued from the Berlin Foreign Office, announced the complete severance of all diplomatic ties to the ailing nation. "We hoped the great German nation might wish to share a place in the sun, but before we even had a chance to demonstrate our good will, we discovered that the Germans like the dark.

(France) The Vatican (Reuters): Papal emissaries to the Sultan of Turkey have returned with promises of tolerance after a scare last week frightened thousands of Catholic Apulians. Turkish heavy warships apparently made a show of force near Taranto and upset city-dwellers, who feared invasion. Recognizing the imminent possibility of Turkish forces landing in Italy, the Pope sought to preserve the rights of Catholics to practice their religion should the Italian government continue to disintegrate. No representative of the Italian government was available for comment.

(Turkey) From 1534 to 1573, Ottoman and Spanish forces exchanged Tunis five times. The Ottoman Empire, naturally, was the eventual victor and occupied Tunis for three centuries. We intent to hold it for three more.

As a result of superior diplomatic and military maneuvers on Turkey's part, we consider Greece to be secure and now formally annex it, to join Bulgaria in our territorial conquests.

MODERN IPLOMACY, by Michael V. McCabe

This is the 3d in a series of columns by one of your diplomats abroad. Everything expressed in the column are my views and are not necessarily those of the Department of State or any other U.S. Government agency.

The November 1991 issue of the $\underbrace{\text{National Geographic}}_{\text{article about Japan.}}$ Although no single article can comprehensively cover any country, I believe that article does present an accurate snapshot of Japan today and its growing influence in Asia.

The photograph of the city on p. 38-39 reminded me of the time my family and I went to the top of Tokyo Tower and looked out over the city. To the east was the harbor. But from the northeast around through the west and to the southeast were buildings to the horizon. was told once that "within 30 miles of the Imperial Palace in Tokyo live 30 million people." Japan is a country just about the size of California containing a population half that of the entire United States! But what's even more dramatic, due to the country's mountainous terrain, the Japanese live on less than a third of the country's land area!

Although there are used car lots in Japan, as shown in the picture on p. 45, the used car business is not big here for several reasons. Japanese, seemingly much more than Americans, want modern and up to date cars "with the newest technology." Also, it is expensive for cars older than five years to meet Japan's annual auto safety and appearance standards. Additionally, there is a growing market in Asia for used Japanese cars. Increasingly, the cars that the Japanese replace every 3-5 years are resold elsewhere in Asia. Yet another Japanese export.

The article, also on p. 45, mentions Regain! - a popular soft drink. That drink and an almost innumerable variety of other canned drinks are sold in vending machines throughout the country. There are more vending machines per capita - and perhaps more in total numbers - in Japan than in any other country. (Coca Cola Japan brings in more profit to the parent company than does Coca Cola U.S.!) Some machines sell beer and some sell both hot and cold drinks. These drinks have a range of names, some of them odd. One could, for example, begin the day with a can of Ucc coffee, have a can of Pocari Sweat with lunch, and head home at the end of the day after finishing a can of Calpis.

As the National Geographic article clearly shows, Japan is expanding its influence in Asia. One method is for Japanese companies to relocate part of their operations abroad to benefit from lower costs and cheaper labor. Another method might be called the "buy and build" plan. A Japanese firm might purchase already existing facilities (e.g., office building, hotel) or might buy the land and build new facilities (e.g., hotel, golf course) thereon. A third way Japan expands its influence is by exporting its products. During the past decade or so, Japan has used each of these methods to expand its influence in the United States. One of the jobs of your diplomats in Japan is to expand U.S. influence here. In the next column, I will explain some of the ways we do that.

POLL QUESTION

Last Month -- What is on the TOP of your New Year's Resolution list? or. What is the worst Christmas present you received?

Peter Gaughan: No bad Christmas presents here this year. Ever? A door-knocker with a Scripture verse on it. No New Year's resolutions either—I spend enough time beating myself over the head with my shortcomings that I'd rather not set aside a special time of the year for even more guilt!

Myself?: No bad presents for myself, either. As for the top of my Resolution list, it would have to be drop a few pounds. The middle-age spread is definitely spreading.

Regarding which charities you support (January 1992):

Peter Gaughan: ...dropped Public TV as I'm down to maybe watching one hour a month; otherwise I still support the Sierra Club, Audubon Society and Yosemite Association, plus a couple of scholarly societies like Phi Beta Kappa. A short list, mainly because any group I get into gets my time and activity as well, as my money and time is short! (Does the Golden Gate Raptor Observatory count—it's a non-profit and scientific, but not public—service, group....) ((Yes)).

Regarding gun control (November 1991):

Phil Reynolds: Yes, I am a big supporter of gun control. starters, we need to ban sales of all semi-automatic weapons. These are military firearms that are designed solely for the purpose of killing lots of people fast. (You don't see one of these wacked-out disgruntled postal workers go on a shooting spree with a revolver, do you?) Then, any civilian caught committing a crime with one of these illegally obtained guns gets the electric chair. Other guns revolvers, rifles, shotguns, etc. - can be sold with a waiting period for a background check. There's no way we could totally abolish guns if we wanted to do so, but measures such as these will contribute towards saving innocent people's lives. Traditionally, the Gun Lobby and other firearm freaks cling to the Second Amendment as their God-given right to wield any weapon. The Second Amendment states: well-regulated militia being necessary to the security of a free State, the right of the people to keep and bear arms shall not be infringed." First, our nation is not at war necessitating its citizens to defend themselves from invasion as hinted at by the Amendment. Second, we do not have a well-regulated militia; we have a bunch of people acting independently to further crime with semi-automatic weapons. Third, the founding fathers never could have envisioned such killing machines as we have today. For all of these reasons, we need to make semi-automatic weapons illegal with the appropriate punishment waiting for violators.

Jack McHugh: As for my two cents - I am in favor of strong gun control. I thought Curt Milbourn was right - yes, we have strong gun control laws but no space in prison to enforce them. Currently, Philadelphia is forced to release prisoners from city jails to meet a mandated cap on the city's prison population. One cannot crowd an

infinite number of citizens into Jail - eventually it becomes "cruel and unusual punishment."

I do disagree with the notion that "people kill people" and that if a person wants to kill they will do so without a gun simply by switching to another weapon.

Generally speaking, countries with much stricter weapons owning policies - W. Europe and Japan - generally have much lower homicide rates. If "people kill people" and not guns - then why are their rates so much lower and generally that pattern holds across the entire developed world. The more guns per capita the more deaths from homicide per capita.

As for the philosophical argument - I am entitled to a gun as a free citizen or I need a weapon to defend myself. I would answer that government, which we all have agreed has the sole monopoly on deadly force, is to be the final arbitrator of our disputes. As such guns should play no part in resolving differences between law abiding citizens and they are too dangerous to allow us to use them to protect ourselves from criminals. One is equally dead if shot by a criminal or if shot by a civilian attempting to stop a criminal. I also don't feel one needs guns to guarantee the liberty of the general populace from a tyranical or an unjust government. There is no historical proof guns are a guarantee against tyranny. Unrestricted social warfare with each of us armed to the teeth is a method of tyranny — witness Lebanon.

Regarding social program sponges (October 1991):

Jack McHugh: I just have this to add as an aside. It seems that when "welfare mothers" were moved from segmented public housing — i.e. the type of housing where it is ALL PUBLIC HOUSING and like the projects — they didn't work. As part of a new program at HUD many were dispersed — this had nothing to do with WORK or getting people off of welfare — just getting more housing available without building more "projects" — over 60% of the welfare recipiants found jobs. Why? (1) Now that they were living in suburban areas — it was in Chicago — they were able to find jobs — e.g. most job growth in the US is in the suburban, not urban areas. (2) They were embarrassed because unlike in public housing projects, everyone works, so they wanted to work too and fit in with their neighbors.

The Legend Eegins is an operational level game on the North African War from March 1941 to December 1941. The period covers the Tobruk siege, Operation Brevity, Battle Axe, and Crusader.

The scale is brigade and regimental, but includes a substantial number of bactalion units. Each weekly turn is divided into segments, allowing players to realistically simulate the fast and furious desert battles that sometimes lasted only a few days (Brevity and Battle Axe). The beautiful full-color map covers the entire area of action from the Gulf of Sirte to Alexandria.

Never before has a game on the North African campaign given players a chance to manuever their forces with realistic limitations, while covering all of 1941 in a playable fashion. Bold battle-field manuevers (like Rommel's daring end-runs around the Allied open flanks) can succeed in this game, but they can also lead to disaster.

The design emphasizes the superiority of the tank in the desert, and the progress both sides made in tank and anti-tank warfare during the campaign. At the start, the Allied player is suffering from a disadvantage in tank quality, but slowly his obsolete British M-VI's and Cruiser tanks will be replaced by Crusaders and Stuarts. Eventually, his superiority in numbers will allow him to undertake a large offensive.
