It's been a busy month catching up on all of the mail that accumulated during my vacation in July. I'm hoping to see the bottom of the pile during Labor Day weekend. Then, everything should be back on track (I hope).

The biggest news is that I've bought an IBM computer. I was going to be needing one that was compatible with the system that being be installed at work, so I went looking. I finally ended up (for those who are interested) with a Packard Bell Legend 750 Supreme (486SX/25) with a VGA monitor, mouse, 2400 baud modem, both 3 1/2" and 5 1/4" drives and most importantly an Epson 5000 24-pin printer. The printer should make RAMBLING WAY much easier to read!!

The preloaded software is a LotusWorks package; however, I'm planning on installing WordPerfect 5.1 and either PageMaker or Ventura desktop publishing software. This (along with the new printer) will result in changes in RW format, game reports and such.

I'm going to take it slow as I don't want to delay RW because I'm not able to handle the software. That is the primary reason I'm using my Commodore for this issue. I don't want to sacrifice the content or turnaround time for fancy presentation (though I do want to spruce up the game reports as soon as possible adding such things as lost/gained supply centers, computer underlining and such).

This issue has two more game starts. One is a Gunboat with Press, while the other is an International Game. I decided to go with three in the US as they are widely seperated (Maryland, Texas and Washington) and the game had been pending for quite awhile.

Speaking of game openings, Cal White's NORTHERN FLAME has two regular Dip games open, a Flintlock II game and an 1885 variant. He also runs FACTS IN FIVE games, which I thoroughly enjoy. In August 1990, Karl Schoenberger wrote a column for the Los Angeles Times that was carried in the 16 August Japan Times. Schoenberger wrote, "Five decades after Tokyo joined the Berlin-Rome Axis, sensitivities about the old fascist military alliance are still raw among the victims of World War II aggression. Moreover, the means by which Japan and Germany are coming to grips with their past are poles apart. This distinction may have profound consequences as the Japanese superstate attempts to gain the trust of suspicious neighbors and wary trading partners. Both Germany and Japan face intermittent pressure from old foes to repudiate past acts of territorial aggrandizement. But while Germany is tormented by guilt and generally expresses unequivocal contrition, Japan still tends to see itself more as a victim than a perpretrator - or at least as a lesser villan, culpable but with mitigating factors.... A revisionist view that Japan was forced into war by the United States is common among Tokyo's conservative elite. Conquests in the 'Greater East Asia Co-Prosperity Sphere,' the theory holds, were no more sinful than Western colonialism."

Alan Booth wrote, in the 12/04/91 Asahi Evening News, "To young people here, apparently, it has come as something of a shock to learn that the Pacific War did not begin with the B29 firebomb raids on Tokyo and the invasion of Okinawa by U.S. marines, and that several crucial events are now known to have preceded those calamities....I was moved this autumn to contemplate the ways in which Japan commemorates selected events of the Pacific War while on a visit to the south coast of Okinawa, where the worst of the fighting in what was surely the worst land battle of the Pacific theater, and perhaps the entire global catastrophe, took place. Certainly, the battle for Okinawa was the most destructive of civilian life. Approximately 150,000 civilians are believed to have perished in just under three months of fighting, more of them at the hands of the Imperial Army (or at their own hands with strong encouragement from the Imperial Army) than at the hands of invading U.S. forces..."

Booth continued, "Of the 150,000 or more civilians who died, 167 belonged to the Himeyuri Butai, a nursing corps consisting of 223 girls of high school age, made famous by a 1950 novel about their deaths called "Himeyuri no To " ("The Tower of Lilies") and a 1953 film version of it by the late Tadashi Imai. The site of these girls' deaths, many by suicide, in a cramped complex of pits and caves is an eloquest reminder of the disasters of war, and one of the most frequently visited by busloads of Japanese tourists. I watched the tourists as they arrived in front of the pits. Their guides encouraged them to incline their heads there for about three seconds and then whisked them off to the large new "Himeyuri no To Brand Plaza" next door, where they could buy souvenirs of their visit.... I've seen some examples of crassness in my time, but I think that the Himeyuri no To Brand Plaza will remain in my memory for as long as I have one. yet the bus guides shepherding their charges between the Cartier pracelets and Louis Vitton bags showed every sign of expecting them to take the horror commemorated there seriously. It seemed to me at the time, and seems to me now, a remarkable demonstration of the obtuseness with which Japan parades its selected memories of the war around, inviting native and foreigner alike to exclaim "How terrible!" "How sad!" and of the utter vacuity of such memories when unrelated to nistorical cause and effect."







THE BRAZILIAN TIMES

by Luis Claudio Duarte

This country has recently housed ECO-92, a world summit on ecological affairs. The site for the summit was Rio de Janeiro, Brazil's second largest city and our capital from the 17th century to 1960. The security measures for the summit caused a very curious situation.

Rio is today a beseiged city. There are a great number of slums ("favelas") - not only around the city, but even inside it. These slums are completely dominated by organized crime, involved mainly with drugs and gambling. Thanks to the corruption and inefficacy of the government, the slums are lacking many services (medical care, for instance). So, the gangsters themselves furnish these services to the population. The result: the slums have become virtual independent states within the city.

The police and the judges are almost completely corrupt. The average citizen is as afraid of the police as of the gangs, for there are many policemen who are criminal themselves.

So, what happened during ECO-92? The Brazilian Army has its largest contingent in Rio. The Army and the other armed forces, as well as the Federal Police, were used in force as security troops during the summit. Naturally, the crime rates dropped dramatically. So, there are now a great many citizens asking the armed forces to take over the city!

The Army High Command does not wish to do this, however, for it thinks - correctly - that the Army would become as corrupt as the police in a matter of months, since the average pay of the military is now very, very low. But the liberal circles of Brazil are alarmed with this popular cry - it seems that the people prefer to have storm troopers suffocating liberty in order to save their properties - and their skins.

Two interesting notes: Brazilian law forbids citizens to have weapons of .38 caliber or greater (of course, the criminal gangs are better armed than the police); and Rio's Chief of Police, when asked about measures to reduce crime rates, answered that the police were preparing a series of meetings with the population of the slums in order to make them happier. The police are not used in ostensive patrolling, but concentrates on traffic control and other activities. The Governor says that crime isn't a police matter, but exclusively a social one. So, the population is forbidden to defend itself and abandoned by the forces it maintains with its taxes. In the near future, there is no chance for Rio again become the "Cidade Maravilhosa" (Wonderful City).

Regarding "Rap Music" (August 1992):

John Breakwell: If musicians feel so annoyed they advocate murdering people then there is obviously something seriously wrong and the powers that be should listen. Happy people do not sing about police brutality and racism so these lyrics must be a reflections of social injustice. There is no point punishing these people as censorship will only exacerbate the situation. Freedom of speech would hopefully oil the wheels of change.

WAY: Well, I agree that censorship isn't necessarily the solution. However, I feel that each right (such as that to free speech) brings with it a responsibility. If what a person says (or sings) has a direct causal relationship to another individual's actions, the speaker should be able to be held accountable. September's Question: "Assuming Quayle isn't the Republican VP candidate; who should it be?"

John Schultz: That's an easy one. Baker would guarantee a Republican victory. I sure hope they don't wise up. The Dems might not be able to fix things but it's sure the Reps can't. Too much more of them and we're headed for class war.

Stephen Glasgow: I read the Sec. Defense Cheney and Gen. Colin Powell are popular choices, but not with me. Choosing either would indicate Bush is still more concerned with the rest of the world than with our own problems. I don't know much about Sec. Housing Kemp, except he may alienate part of the ultra-conservative Republican base. Didn't Sen. Dole of Kansas make a bid for the Republican nomination in a past election? [Yes, he has run before]. He could bring some support to the ticket. How about Rostenkowski — of course he'd have to shorten his name to "Rosty" so it would fit on campaign buttons under "Bush."

WAY: Personally, I would have liked to see Baker. However, I don't feel Quayle is that bad a leader — he's just received a plenty of 'bad press' which makes him a potential liability to the Republican ticket. Cheney and Powell I think are being kept in the wings and will be brought out in 1996 if Quayle's image doesn't improve. I think that they wish to keep them out of any potential political blunders which would harm their future chances for Presidency. Could you see them as together on a ticket? A sure winner.

Question for October: There has been quite a bit of finger pointing about the response the devestation Hurricane Andrew wrought in Florida and Louisiana. Do you feel it is justified (Feds, state, or local), or was the destruction so widespread and complete that it overwhelmed the system?

Well, I found out that in Kansas City, after 8pm you have to PAY before you pump — a concept I had yet to experience anywhere in Texas. Needless to say, after I showed the clerk that I had plenty of money and credit cards, I had no trouble filling my tank up. Also, I vowed never to fill up after 8pm in the (ahem) great State of Kansas.

Upon arrival back to HoJos, I got together with Larry for a long chat. Having only talked with him once around Christmas '91, there were plenty of topics to discuss until 11:30pm when Gary Behnen and Shuttle 1 from the airport arrived.

Pete and Cathy Gaughan, Gary, Larry, myself, Steve Cooley and Don Del Grande headed out to find a place for the West Coasters to eat at. After a lengthy walking tour of closed establishments, we ended up at Denny's (practically across the street from the motel). Interesting conversation, hilarious discussions with the waiter and other patrons topped the night off.

In the morning, I had been invited to go with Larry to visit Truman tourist sights in Missouri. Not being a Truman fan, and being a Civil War buff, I decided to visit Lawrence, Kansas — site of the infamous Quantrill raid. However, before I headed out I decided to grab a quick breakfast at the HoJo eatery.



My visit to Lawrence was very interesting. There wasn't too much about the Civil War that I found; however, a small museum had some artifacts and material.
