

The Brazilian Times

Well, President Collor is now impeached and is being tried by the Senate. In a few more weeks, he will probably be convicted and expelled from the office. In the meantime, vice-president Itamar Franco is beginning to show some promise. We are holding our collective breath and waiting to see if he will succeed.

A thorough discussion of national ethics started as a direct result of the impeachment and its circumstances. Since some years ago, someone who can break the laws and is not caught is often admired. In a lesser and more widespread way, there is a national institution called "jeitinho", which is normally a request to bypass the rules in one's benefit – for example, asking the officer to "forget" a fine. These habits are now being frown upon by a significant part of the society. It is to be noted that this ethic – or lack of it thereof – is more prominent among the "dominant classes". The leading witness in the House of Representatives' hearings on Collor was one of his drivers, a humble man now under police protection.

This may help to explain the case of Grow, a company from São Paulo that published Diplomacy in Brazil (the game was discontinued some years ago). Grow started as a backyard enterprise in 1971 by four friends (Geraldo, Roberto, Oded and Waldir). There was no game industry in Brazil by the time, so they assembled and sold pirate copies of Risk (published here as War). It was an instant success, and the backyard was replaced by modern premises and equipment. Other games followed: Diplomacy (the 1961 version, as 1914 - O Jogo da Diplomacia), Tactics II (as MX-1), Acquire (as Cartel) and many others, almost all from foreign companies.

However, Grow often did not pay royalties, nor it acknowledged the original games by a copyright notice. This was done by changing minor details in the games, as one of the owners admitted in an interview in 1977. In 1914, for instance, this was done by two changes: North Africa is a supply center and Italy begins the game with a fleet (not an army) in Rome. There is one other change (I don't know if it was so in the 1961 version of Diplomacy): Heligoland borders on Berlin. The translation of the rules was not good, causing many doubts. Worse still, Grow didn't help its customers; some friends and I sent them letters that were never answered.

The ostensible reason for these changes was to perfect the games. The changes not always were for the better, though. American writers who have commented the changes in 1914 have speculated that they could boost Italy's chances, allowing (for instance) a faster Lepanto. In my experience, however, this is not so. The problem is that North Africa is easier to get for France than for Italy (Bre-Mid, Mar-Spa in Spring 1901, and Mid-NAf in Fall 1901). After all, Portugal can always be captured later. So France is much more interested in Mediterranean naval affairs – a truce between North Africa and Tunis is uneasy at best. For these reasons, I think that the original version is best. Italy must seek her answer elsewhere.

As an addendum: the current address of Grow is R. Vicente Leporace, 125 - 09895 São Bernardo do Campo - SP - BRAZIL. I informed the old address to Fred C. Davis, Jr. in a letter. There has recently been a change of policy in Grow, following a series of financial problems last year. It is possible that the new management acknowledges game copyrights, but I prefer to wait and see.

End-Game Statements

Marc Hight: As this was my first game ever in PBM Dip, the early game was spent getting my bearings and making mistakes. The early and middle parts of the game were particularly challenging, for my neighbors simply ceased writing (two of them simply withdrew from the game eventually). Italy even went so far as to stab me twice, and although neither were all that successful, both were troubling. Italy managed to convince me of an impending German attack (a mythical one as it turned out) that seemed plausible at the time given the lack of communication between myself and Germany. My naive reaction resulted in my having two hostile neighbors and no friends.

Then Russia and I "found" each other. Peter was both in an excellent position to assist me and non-threatening, and I like to think that I served the same role. The two year difficulty I had with unstable uncommunicative allies was suddenly gone. I suppose that this in some part explains my hesitancy and conservative play towards the end of the game (much to Turkey's chagrin). The ease and effectiveness of the Russo-French alliance simply stayed too convenient to abandon. I did agonize at a few points over whether I ought to stab Russia and take the centers for a potential solo win, but I opted not to for several reasons. 1) Austria was a perpetual wildcard. Thanks must be extended to Jim Lewis who stepped in and played really well. 2) I gained an early respect

for Turkey's play, and frankly I did not trust my chances against a Russo-Turkish alliance which I felt sure Jim would construct against me, despite his statements to the contrary. Perhaps in the latest stages of the game this was no longer a problem, but by then I had made the decision to stay the course.

I would like to thank all the players for a thoroughly enjoyable game, especially Jim Grose and Peter Kohnke, who were reliable players and sporting press-writers. Mr. Grose certainly deserves praise for keeping the press engaging (sorry I joined rather late in the fray, I hope you took my 'jabs' in the same light spirit as I took yours). Finally, thanks to the GM, who helped me get adjusted and answered a few pesky questions to keep me up with the game.

Peter Kohnke: I am pleased that the Sultan has learned that there is more than one way to approach the game of Diplomacy.

My thanks to France for being a loyal ally, and to the GM for running a tight ship. I'm glad the new A/H had a good time - so did I.

Jim Grose: If nothing else, this was quite an eye-opening learning experience for Sultan Jim the Great (Jim Grose) of Turkey.

As if it wasn't bad enough that five (count 'em, five) different players were in charge of Austria-Hungary, the person issuing orders for most of the time (Stora Harris) almost never responded to my letters. It was I who organized the English-German (George Kilmer - Konrad Baumeister) invasion of Russia in 1902. It would have worked if Turkey could have been part of it then, but Stora refused to agree to a ceasefire (or even to respond) and continued his pointless Balkan War.

He was joined by Italy (Sam Polak) who, for some reason, remained blind to the obviously impending French invasion. Italy in effect forced me to make a pact with the Devil: the Franco-Turkish Alliance.

Although Russia (Peter Kohnke) had warned me from the start that he held grudges, I was amazed at how he reacted to my belated and disastrous attack on Sevastapol, my withdrawal and the French threat. He refused to ally with me against France, willing to place second just to avenge an aborted attack! As France later wrote to me, "The color of some of the best French units on the board has been white."

The most absurd was yet to come. After France (Marc Hight) and Russia had carved up England, Scandinavia, Germany, etc. between themselves and were in first and second places, they turned, not against each other for the win, but south for a planned draw!

A planned draw!?! A draw is an ending of last resort, when you've run out of time, or reached a stalemate position. You don't plan one!

When informed by France of his and Russia's final intentions. I did almost everything in my power to split the, including proposing (and voting against) French wins. I came close to pulling out hairs when France refused a build!

True, I personally finished a mediocre fourth, but tell me.

Excerpts continued. The 6th article featured comments by a Japanese Army photographer who took some 20,000 pictures in China between October 1944 and April 1954. The 7th article focused on a meeting in Osaka, Japan, between Japanese who took part in forcibly recruiting Korean laborers to work in Japan between 1944 and 1945 and some of the Koreans who were forced to come and stay. The article quoted 1 Korean volunteer, who came over before the forcible relocation program began, as saying, "Japan was not the only imperial country, but it is the only one that has tried to wipe out the past without admitting its faults."

The tenth article was an interview with a current radio show host whose father was British and mother was Japanese. He "wrote about atrocities committed by Japanese troops and his own personal struggle with his identity as a member of the Imperial Army. His memoirs are entitled I was a Soldier of the Emperor. The 11th article was an interview with an English interpreter for the Japanese military police who worked on the Thai-Burmese railway during the war. The article stated "In Thailand and Burma, Japan forced Allied POWs -as well as laborers from Japanese-occupied Southease Asia- to build the 415 km military railroad through malaria-infested swamps from 1942 to 1943. Some 45,000 to 100,000 workers are estimated to have died of exhaustion, malnutrition, or from the harsh treatment by the Japanese military."

The 13th article interviewed the "leader of a local [Hiroshima] nationalist group [who] does not believe Japanese should see themselves as aggressors during WW II. [He] believes it is part of his job to prevent such perceptions [that Japanese were aggressors]." The 14th article described Hiroshima, the city on which the first atomic bomb was dropped, as "headquarters for the Imperial Japanese Army in western Japan" and as "armed like a fortress shortly before the atomic bombing."

(On 12/07/88, Nagasaki mayor Hitoshi Motoshima said that Emperor Hirohito could not escape some responsibility for World War II. In anger over the remark, a rightist shot & wounded the mayor in January 1990. The 2/25/91 Japan Times wrote that Hiroshima mayor Takeshi Araki "apparently bowing to rightist pressure, has turned down a proposal to display Japan's 'aggressive role' in World War II along with the sufferings of Hiroshima [after a renovation of] Hiroshima's Peace Memorial Museum and Hall...Araki cited...a remark by former Prime Minister Takeshita, who said it is the work of future historians to assess whether Japan was the aggressor in World War II.")





November's Question: "How satisfied are you with your name?"

Phil Reynolds: I went through a stretch (around high school or a little later, I think) when I didn't like my first name. It's a family name, smacking of nobility. I had rarely met another person with the name, and some of the jokes (FillUp, FeelUp, etc.) were irritating. Since then, though, I go totally by "Phil", using my full name (Philip) only in my signature and legal documents. My name is different enough without being really stupid (e.g., Ezekial Grobnik) and I like that.

Will Nesbitt: I have always loved my name, Stuart William Nesbitt II. Although if I could change anything I would like to be a Vth or higher. On the other hand I love naming things and I like my sons' names: Stuart William Nesbitt III and Aubrey J. Nesbitt.

Jack Jewart: Here in Washington State, they have vanity license plates for their vehicle. Unfortunately, with my name being Jack, it is somewhat common so all the variants of Jack are already taken. Jack, Jacque, Jackie, Jackee, etc. I once spoke to a friend of mine who was into the vanity plates and I told him, what a great coup could be accomplished by instead of sending in \$50 or \$75 for a vanity plate, to go to the County Courthouse and for about \$800 to \$1000 to have your name changed to your current license number! That would make MY name "02465V Washington State".

John Schultz: I have the utmost respect for my father and do not have any deep resentment of my name. However, you probably know that I'm of indigenous ancestry as well as European. Thus I acquired another name many years ago which reflects that ancestry. I'm no unhappy with my Anglo name but I will probably change it. But out of respect for my father who obviously wished me to have this Anglo name I'd not do so until it could not possibly hurt his feelings in any way. Those people who know me well know that my indigenous name fits me very well. I share it with very very few people for traditional and other reasons.

Pete Gaughan: I'm perfectly happy with my name because it fits the sense of family pride I was raised with -- I'm the fourth to bear it. Genealogy and tradition have been popular with us.

Also, "Pete" is just distinctive enough -- without being terrifically unusual -- that people find it easy to remember. My surname gets mangled but at least it's not 'close' to something else (e.g. Barber vs. Barker).

But at brief times in my life, I would have changed my name to Patrick; and I've always felt slight personality changes when people call me something other than Pete -- Peter, or P.J., have distinct connotations. 'Peter' is my family's diminutive for me: my grandmother calls me that. 'P.J.' is the college intellectual that I've always fancied myself!

Richard Weiss: My birth certificate says my name is Richard Craig Weiss. My Mother wanted to call me Rickey, but reasoned that as I aged I'd want a more formal name. By the mid-elementary grades I refused to answer to "Rickey" and insisted on "Rick." After two moves, in High School, the name was uncertain. Some people called me Richard, others assumed that any Richard was a "Dick," while others called me Rick or Rich. I had no firm opinion, and had given up on my stubborn assertiveness. Finally a girl friend decided that only one's full name was appropriate, so she called me "Richard," and carried that into college. There I gained a nickname of "Rev," and later "Ma." Gradually it became the old, Richard or diminutive issue. Currently, when another Richard moved into my offices, I considered changing my name, but there was "RC" was my favorite, but the "Ron" in the nothing wonderful. office had been "RC" as a kid and thought I ought not to take that.

As a kid, I was going to change my name to Craig McGee. That lasted for quite a while. After college I wrote/tried to have things published. I decided that if I took a pseudonym, it would be "Ver Moriah Ooo."

I continue to favor a one syllable first name with a long vowel, hard consonants, no ability to be changed to something ending in "eeeeeeee," and while easily recognized as a name not something that is very common. "Mike," is such a name. I favor "Bill," for some non-understood reasons, also.

I don't have much image of "Richards." There are certain names, I would not want to have, "Christian, Maximillian, etc." I think we all enter a phase of disliking our names, of searching for ourselves and rejecting our parents and others and with it some sense of ourselves. My current opinion is that it doesn't matter much. A name is like a facade, a place for others to recognize, and for when I drive up, a place to stop.

One more bit about names. Currently, I am trying to find a sweet nothing to call my girlfriend, and she me, and we are also trying to decide what we will really call the other, and want to be called. Having just the "W." would clear up confusion, some places absolutely insist that my first name be used. John Schultz: You were a little hard on the victims there Andy. << Yes, when I reread my comments, I was a tad harsh. I get fed up sometimes with the whining about how "the government isn't doing enough for me">> The vast majority had insurance policies. problem is with the adjusters, whose job it is to either get in quick and settle for as little as possible while shock still reigns, or to linger the settlement so that impatience will result in a lessor amount. The army is much better at deployment. For that reason alone they should be the ones to respond at first. <<I think the Red Cross is also an excellent private sector compliment to the military>>.

Richard Weiss: There was only one misprint in my letter to you about Andrew, and that was that one could not go more than 20 "yards" before any path was blocked by trees, etc (not 20 "years"). <<Ooops - that can't be caught by the spell checker, Sorry>>. Interesting responses. Russell Wallace's question responsibility raised numerous thoughts for me. One was that there is no justification to rebuild the air force base. One is that the government can insure safety, shelter, etc. but some of the rest is questionable. Our bailing out those without insurance, who knew that they had high likelihood of a disaster occurring, is something I have qualms about. I do not have earthquake insurance for a variety of reasons. One is that because I expect the government. or my insurance carrier through the fire clause, to come to my aid and provide some relief.

The main thought that I had about the disaster relief was why the entire nation wants to pay a few billion dollars for hurricane relief (probably because it is a form of insurance and if something happens to others and they are helped, then if it is ever "my" turn, then I shall be helped), and there is uncertainty about how long this aid should continue, or the depth of it -- meanwhile. there has been a greater disaster that has struck this country, for which the relative aid has been much less. It is no coincidence that I keep referring to government support as "aid," because I am referring to AIDS. It is a natural disaster, it is something for which no one could be prepared, it has been more devastating than any single hurricane, the effect has been much greater in some areas than others, and yet the proportional aid has been much less. and those areas effected have been left to deal with it on a local basis, rather than share the burden more nationally.
