





The Turkish Power Position in Diplomacy

Part I: Initial Considerations



This is the first installment in a short series analyzing the dynamics involved in playing Turkey. In this and following discussions, the initial strategic choices facing the Turkish player area examined more closely than the midgame play options. However, a full treatment of the possibilities available to the aspiring Turk will of necessity include some observations of possible midgame strategies as well

To anyone who has played Diplomacy for some time or perused the literature, it is rather obvious that Turkey occupies a strong and somewhat unique position, comparable only to that of England in its characteristics. It is helpful, however, to fully articulate the factors involved. Invariably, these include:

- 1. Lack of a true "rear area." Turkey is able to cover a single front entirely without having to immediately worry about penetration from the rear. This is the result of being positioned in the SE corner and also of having no empty provinces at home every home area has a dot, allowing quick builds in the face of possible challenges.
- 2. Controlled approaches to the rest of the board. It is much easier for the Turkish player to spread out, either through the Balkans or the sea areas, than it is for others to come through into Turkey. The situation can be visualized as a funnel, with Turkish forces starting at the bottom and finding more and more space the further out they go (and vice versa).
- 3. Freedom in build strategy. Unlike the English, Turks can select a strategy and produce an appropriate mix of armies and fleets rather than having strategy dictated by build necessities. Other countries generally only reach this capability (if at all) well into the midgame. Italy and France have similar positional flexibility, it is true, but often are limited in exercising their options to the fullest by the presence of strong neighboring opponents.

Turkish play in the opening takes account of these factors almost unconsciously, as the good moves are the obvious ones. Bulgaria is seized as a foothold into the Balkans (opening the "funnel") and, depending on the strategy selected, the other units are moved to face the front of choice - yet are always available for defense, if necessary. However, anyone playing Turkey must also think seriously about long-term strategy from the first, since Fall 1901 will indicate whether a northern or western orientation will be pursued. How should a good understanding of these principles - and of the other players - guide Turkish play? We will begin to examine this in the next installment.

A hostile unit in Syria, Armenia or the North Atlantic is the biggest fear for these two as units in these areas spell d-o-o-m in the coming turn. These backdoors are many times left unlocked as a direct frontal assault must be first defended against. If you can slip through this backdoor the reward is usually dots galore!

One more aspect these two share is they both fear Russian fleets. Russian boats sailing out of Sevastopol or Northern St. Pete are coming to throw buckets of water on these two witches. The Russian Dorothy must be reckoned with by both witches and if one witch goes down quickly the other will be facing the Bear's boats next.

If you are playing on of these two countries remember: think before answering Glinda (the good witch of the North) "Are you a good witch or a bad witch?" I prefer to play the part of the bad witch when I play one of these witches!

Excerpts continued. The 15th article, titled "Asian schoolbooks describe war, " focused on a book written by the principal of the high school which the current Emperor and his two sons attended. shows school textbook excerpts from 16 East and SE Asian countries on WW II. The article quotes from almost a dozen Asian texts "passages [that] convey to children [the] brutality of the 'New Order'. The principal reportedly said that accounts in Japanese textbooks on the country's military aggression against other Asian nations are very scanty compared with those in textbooks from other parts of Asia. The scanty compared with those in textbooks from other parts of Asia. Japanese should know what the people of these countries think about Japan's military invasion of these countries, " he was quoted as saying. A Japanese university professor colleague is helping organize Japanese and South Korean scholars to make textbook recommendations for both countries. The professor said, "The goal of screening textbooks in Japan has been to blur the reality of Japan's military invasion of other Asian countries. But we have to call a spade a spade. Only by doing so can Japan gain the trust of other peoples. People in neighboring countries never forget what Japan did to their countries."

Lest anyone think that every Japanese during World War II committed atrocities, I call the readers' attention to the story of Mr. Chiune Sugihara, Japanese Vice Consul in Lithuania in 1939-40, which I read about in a 12/24/91 Mainichi Daily News editorial. According to the report, "When the Nazis invaded Poland, many Jews flocked to Lithuania and the other Baltic states. There thay sought visas that would enable them to pass through Japan and escape to the United States. Sugihara repeatedly asked his government for permission to issue the visas. This was rejected. Greatly distressed, Sugihara finally decided arbitrarily to issue visas as a humanitarian gesture. Up to the day of his transfer from Lithuania, he continued to sign visas, [saving] the lives of 6,000 Jewish persons seeking to escape from Nazi persecution. Even then, a considerable number of Jews were left behind without being able to obtain one. The course of events has been described in detail by his widow in a book entitled 'Visas for 6,000 Lives.'"

"Following the end of the war, when he returned to his homeland after being detained in the Soviet Union, Sugihara petitioned the Foreign Ministry for reappointment to his former status. Instead, he was told to submit his resignation. The arbitrary issuance of visas was considered 'a violation of government orders.' Severing all relations with the Foreign Ministry, Sugihara spent the remainder of his life working in the private sector. In regard to his decision, he said, 'I only did what was proper as a diplomat and as a human being.'"

"We feel proud that there was such a Japanese. At the same time, it is shameful that his deed, unrecorded in the pages of history, remained practically unknown until recently....Sugihara's achievement is being evaluated highly internationally. Upon gaining independence from the Soviet Union, Lithuania has named one of the principal streets of its capital 'Sugihara Street'....Israel, lauding Sugihara as 'a benefactor of the Jewish race,' has built a memorial park centering on 'sugi' (Japanese cedar), while the Sugihara Memorial Foundation has been established in the U.S. This spring, a big 'meeting of gratitude' was held by Jewish people in New York."

THE BRAZILIAN TIMES

When Andrew asked me to write this subzine, one of the things he asked me to write about were highlights on life in Brazil and South America. This month, I decided to touch on some of the (wrong) ideas that many foreigners have about Brazil and other countries in South America.

I have met people from the US, visiting Brazil for the first time, who marveled at seeing that we have real cities, that there wasn't an impassable jungle around town, that you don't see boa constrictors, monkeys or naked Indians strolling in the streets, that the majority of the people are white.

One Brazilian magazine published some time ago a poll in which most Americans couldn't find the US in a world map; many said things like Argentina being the capital of Brazil, and so on. And we don't forget one visit by President Reagan, when he saluted us as "People of Bolivia!"

What really shocks many, however, is that here in Brazil we don't speak Spanish, but Portuguese. There is a widespread belief that all America south of Rio Grande speaks Spanish; I have read a description of South America that said in South America Spanish is spoken in the towns, but Indian dialects are spoken in the country. In Brazil, one speaks the same Portuguese from one end of the country to the other (with but minor regional variations). In Surinam, the official language is Dutch; in Guyana, it is English. Local dialects are more common in countries with a still large Indian population, as Peru, Bolivia and Paraguay.

Hollywood is to blame for much of this misinformation. In Moonraker, for example, Bond goes in the same scene from the Amazon River to the Iguacu Falls (near the border with Argentina and Paraguay) and thence to Rio de Janeiro - where he, naturally, finds himself in the middle of the Carnaval (which is annual). Other films, such as Lambada, are even worse.

Of course, this kind of information isn't interesting for everyone. But what I find most odd is that so many people go to a country without getting information on it beforehand. I wonder how many of these are disappointed. For example, I know very little about Ghana; but, should I ever go there, I would certainly be curious about the country and would try to get some information on it.



With our mutual front uncluttered, we can also pounce on those Tyrolian sheep ... farmers.

Fra-Eng: You use that tongue prettier than a twenty-dollar hooker! "Cultural brethren in Belgium." - I could care less if the Germans pull a <u>number six</u> on them!

Fra-Rus: Norwegian cruise lines are offering a full-service halfprice special in 1902.

Fra-Tur: If any Moslem garbage scows find their accursed path to my waters, they will not be sunk. Of course, the crew must be

- executed, but the English pay a good price for ships as good as theirs or better. We thinks our 'mates' will need every cracked hull they can get.
- Rus-Aus: I'm not trying to invade Aus, just trying to protect myself from the Turk. It's also in your best interest as well. Can we work together?
- Rus-Ger: I hope you permitted my entry into Sweden, so that I can defend myself in the south. It's in your best interest.

Wil Nesbitt: I was raised an Irish Catholic and there are very few of those traditions which I now practice. I am an atheist so midnight mass and all its trappings are out.

Pete Gaughan: Our traditions have all developed out of necessity. We used to always buy a tree on Christmas Eve because we couldn't afford the prices earlier - the tree lots in Ohio used to cut prices to 20% of normal. So we've always trimmed the tree Christmas Eve, even now when we might buy the tree three or four days sooner!

When we lived in Ohio, we'd alternate years spending either Thanksgiving or Christmas at my mother's parents' place in Rochester. Finally we used to keep the turkey roaster out in a shed, and it would only come inside for Thanksgiving or Christmas dinner. Somehow, it developed that I was always sent to go ge the roaster. Eventually, it became the signal that the cooking could start - and one year, my brother was chastised for getting it, and made to put it back so I could perform my traditional duty.

Eric Voogd: Regarding holiday traditions, our family was just that ... very traditional. We sawed our own tree on the first or second Saturday of each December. We came home, decorated it, listened to some awful Christmas records and drank about 5000 calories worth of Egg Nog. As I have built my own family, I have followed many of the traditions of our family but have had to adjust it for the realities of today. I no longer saw down a tree (buy a live one and plant it afterwards). We still listen to records although I had a heck of a time finding Christmas records and had to settle for 'A Down Home Country Christmas' even though I hate Country. I'm too cheap to buy CDs. The family get togethers are still the same, just that Grandma is a little older and I can't sit back and gorge myself like I used to because I have to chase/feed/keep safe from spoiling my kids. You don't change a season that has been perfected!

Me?: Well, I don't remember too many real holiday traditions in my family. The only one close is the opening of presents on Christmas Eve. We'd open all of them, trading turns around the family. The only ones saved until Christmas morning were those 'delivered' by Santa overnight. However, that ended when Santa's aura faded.

Another tradition that lasted a few years started when I moved out and shared an apartment with a long time friend. We created a

Gingerbread house every year - even after he married, and we both headed to Texas courtesy of the USAF. But, again, that tradition faded with children (his) and distance.

Today, there isn't any real tradition that I follow - I don't even put up a (fake) tree anymore. One of my good friends has custody of the tree and all of the ornaments - something that he enjoys. About the only thing I do is send Christmas cards. It's funny how changes occur over time.

Why go round with a name that makes you unhappy and let's face it some parents go out of their way to pick totally ridiculous names. 
