

#### The Brazilian Times

Recently I acted in an amateur play in one of the best English schools in Brasília (Independent British Institute). When my wife (Lídia) and I learned that they were looking for people to act in the play, we volunteered. I was a bit apprehensive at first, because I was quite out of practice in speaking English. However, I found out that my English came back easily, so easily, in fact, that I am now preparing the group of which I am the Game Master for game sessions in English. I really need this practice.

What prompted me to write about this play, though, wasn't my skill in English language (or lack of it). In one of the rehearsals, one of our colleagues was literally astonished to see my wife and me kissing during one of the breaks. When we asked what was so startling, he said "I have never seen married people so fond of kissing one another."

That astonished me -- but it shouldn't, because we have met such feelings before. Lidia and I are now married for more than a year, we were engaged for almost two years, and always since there always were people surprised to see how we like to kiss each other.

I hope nobody thinks that we like to show near-explicit sex scenes. In fact, most of the time we only hug, or throw kisses, or even exchange smiles and looks. But a lot of people think it is almost unnatural. My mother-in-law has said many times over that "things like that should not be public"; one of Lidia's sisters-in-law said that she only kissed her husband like that when "in the acme of passion."

These ideas look strange to me. We love one another, and we like to express it whenever we can. I find it most strange that such expressions of love are viewed as inappropriate. A curious note is that many people have said that this will fade with time. Since they are saying it for more than three years now, and there hasn't been any perceptible change in our ways, I believe that these people are wrong.

I will now take advantage of this space that Andrew so kindly ceded and promote myself a bit. In a few more weeks, it will be published the first issue of Hy-Brasil, my own fanzine (in English). It is dedicated to tabletop games (specially wargames and strategy games -- naturally Dip has a special place in it) and role-playing, plus a bit of ramblings that don't fit any classification. As of today, I have no idea of how much will it cost; if you think you might be interested, write me and I will send you a sample. Trades and contributions are welcome. (Of course, Rambling Way and the Green Goblin already qualify for this.) It will be bi-monthly at first, if it can survive the dire straits of the first issues, we'll see if we can make it monthly.

I play both kinds of games, as many of my friends here in Brazil do. But I have noticed that in the US there is some disaffection between the two groups, and I don't understand it. Is it really so, or is it a misconception of mine?





#### MODERN DIPLOMACY #13, by Michael V. McCabe (Tokyo, Japan)

Except where otherwise indicated, the views and opinions expressed herein are solely mine and are not necessarily those of the Department of State or any other U.S. Government agency.

One of the jobs of diplomats overseas is to issue visas to qualified applicants desiring to visit, work, or live in the diplomat's country. U.S. diplomats authorized to issue visas are commissioned Vice Consuls or Consuls. The U.S. Congress has set forth the qualifications that applicants must meet in order to be issued a U.S. visa. For example, to receive a tourist visa, the applicant must show to the consular officer that s/he intends to depart the United States at the conclusion of the visit and that s/he will not work illegally while in the U.S. The determination, however, as to whether the applicant has adequately proven these points rests with the consular officer.

In addition to disobeying government orders, Mr. Sugihara, I suspect, also violated the regulations which set forth the requirements applicants had to meet to be issued visas. Nevertheless, now we look back at his actions and call them courageous. I'm sure there were other Japanese during the war who did "what is proper as a human being." It's too bad that their actions, also, are practically unknown.

Since issue #6, this subzine has dealt more with history than with "modern diplomacy." Those columns, however, were background for what has become a clear modern diplomacy issue for the Government of Japan: whether the Emperor or the Prime Minister should apologize for Japanese actions during World War II, and, if so, in what manner.

An article in the 7/28/90 <u>Japan Times</u> said that the former Emperor, Hirohito, "never went beyond a declaration that 'the unfortunate past...should not be repeated again,'" or as the 9/19/91 <u>Asahi Evening News</u> said, an expression of regret for the "unfortunate past" or "unfortunate war." The latter article noted, though, "When South Korean President Roh Tae Woo visited Japan in May [1990], Emperor Akihito said, 'I think of the sufferings your people underwent during this unfortunate period, which was brought about by my country, and cannot but feel the deepest regret.'" The same article explained, however, that during the Emperor's visit to Thailand, Malaysia, and Burma in September-October 1991, he "will avoid a strong expression of apology as used in the address to the South Korean leader." The main reason given was that the three countries were not insisting on a strong apology, whereas South Korea strongly insisted.

In October 1991, Queen Beatrix of the Netherlands visited Japan. According to the Mainichi Daily News, the Queen "suggested the Japanese people are not well aware of the fact that numerous Dutch soldiers and over 100,000 civilians were interned for years, and many did not survive. 'Those who did return are marked for life by their experiences. Consequently, they are still suffering, in spite of the time that has passed since then.'" In his remarks, the Emperor reportedly said that he "finds it 'very sad' that the two countries' traditionally friendly ties 'should have been marred because of World War II.'" Then-Prime Minister Kaifu "expressed Japan's 'regret' that many Dutch nationals residing in the then Dutch (East) Indies underwent unbearable sufferings and sorrows during World War II. During his visit to the Netherlands in July, Kaifu said he became aware that 'the scars in their hearts would not heal easily.'"



January's Question: Impending Changes with the New President:

John Breakwell: In the next four years I see a lot of change in the way people feel. Although it is impossible to wipe out people's greed, I do expect a move to an acceptance of lower standards of living and more charity, especially to foreign countries. People will not be so well off - the economy of the 1st world will not be so affluent as the 2nd and 3rd worlds improve at our expense. Luckily the Democrats will not be blamed - the Republicans will be the fall guys which probably will delay their return for quite a few years unless Clinton REALLY makes a mess of things.

Me?: Well, I'm worried as John is about the Democrats and the next four years of foreign policy. I'm quite glad the helm of the country was steered for twelve years by the Republicans - the

The biggest change that won't happen - an improvement in ethics for our elected (and appointed officials). This is a campaign year issue; quickly forgotten until the next vote is cast.


#### Regarding Holiday Traditions (December 1992):
