A new month and the start of some changes in <u>Rambling WAY</u>. Besides what's listed below, there's a gamestart (look for "StarDate" inside). But first, congrats to Jim Grose who was the winner in the Nuclear Destruction game! I was too wrapped up in watching the game I missed the end!! Another game has been opened. Also, a note for those of you watching, <u>RW</u> was mailed one day later than the normal Monday. The printshop was having problems over the Christmas weekend and couldn't get the issue printed as they normally do. I'm hoping this won't happen again.

The new feature is a Scattergories game (thanks to Stven Carlberg and <u>Hoodwink</u> for the idea behind it!!). The rules are listed, along with the first categories and letter. Anyone may play, there are no game fees or limits on participants.

I'm looking to update and revise my houserules and how I handle a few things in \underline{RW} . Any suggestions will be greatly appreciated and considered. There is one change that is going to take effect immediately.

Instead of an NMR fee, I'm going to collect a \$5 game fee for all future games (unless otherwise indicated). Of that, \$3 will actually be the game fee; while, the other \$2 will be donated to Texas Public Radio (the 'theme' of RW) on a quarterly basis. This idea germinated from Eric Ozog's Ramblings by Moonlight where he designates a portion of his game fee for the Orphan Service. If I ever take over a Hobby Service, I may change from TPR to that service. I figured this would be a good time to implement the long considered switch - it effects three individuals.

I'm looking at a revised method for game reports. Check out "BluesStage" and let me know what you think.

I've also expanded my convention list past what I can provide here. The current one is almost two pages long, and lists all international events I know of; as well as gaming cons here in the US. A complete list can be had for a SASE at any time.

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Samples are free, though a stamp or two is appreciated.

GAME FEES: A \$5.00 fee is collected for each game. Of that, \$2.00 is donated to Texas Public Radio on a quarterly basis. A subscription to Rambling WAY is necessary to play.





The Green Goblin Speaks #4

I am very grateful to Andrew for inspiring this issue with the Royal Family poll question. There was I scratching my head trying to think of something to write a page on and then *bing* Royalty! Of course, such a subject of world-wide interest but with negligible importance.

As the Queen said, 1992 was an "Annus Horribilis". Not that the previous few didn't have their ups and downs but for some 1992 was a turning point. There have always been discussions about whether the Royal Family should continue to exist, especially at the expense of the general public - we got rid of the feudal system some time ago! - but recently the press has been devoting column feet to the subject of their future.

That wouldn't be happening if the public could take them seriously but they have certainly gone out of their way to dispel the mystique of Royalty. They are no longer the perfect people they use to be which makes them more human and that isn't the sort of person you want in charge. If Joe Public thinks that he's as good as the people at the top then he's going to want the things they've got (or bring them down to his level, whichever's easier). And the trouble is that the Royal Family ARE normal people!

Of the Queen's children, three have had their marriages fail and the fourth looks unlikely to be invited to his own wedding in the first place; in a time of recession, some of the more public figures spend a lot of time on expensive holidays abroad; similarly, the income of the top Royals is not taxable which means the world's richest woman get seven richer without making the basic contributions to the country that the rest of us do. All these and more are plastered across the newspapers seemingly incessantly which I find annoying, not because I particularly like the Royal Family but because I HATE soaps which is what they are - you only see these people in the media and its always only the highlights of an exaggerated plotline, just like Eastenders or Dallas.

Now what is going to happen in the near future is a trend towards a "smaller" Royal Family - not in the sense that there will be less of them but that only the central core of the Queen's family will get the privileges and money from the Civil List, the Government money paid to Royalty to cover expenses (staff, accommodation, transport, etc.), whilst the rest (hanger-ons in most people's eyes) will have to fend for themselves. The problem of tax has been solved by the Queen deciding that she will pay tax after all - not that this is such a big shake-up as Queen Victoria paid income tax but it does look good for public relations.

The Royal Family as a concept cannot yet be removed as the repercussions would involve major shake-ups in how the United Kingdom is run. For example, if the queen retires and takes the rulership with her, then the Constitution would have to change, taking such things as the two-tiered Parliament with it. A lot of people are arguing that this would be a "good thing" for Britain, that we need a fairer, more democratic, society. On the other

- 01) My explanation of the illegal disband order was challenged. However, the decision stands. The rules do not allow units to unilaterally disband without a loss of a supply center (rule XIII.2) or by retreat (rule XI).
- 02) It has been asked if a player may attack their own forces creating a retreat situation. Please refer to rule IX.3 regarding self-dislodgment.
- 03) Error last time with the center count. England controlled Sweden, not Germany. Players were notified of the correction.
- 04) Only one request was received for a separation of seasons.

- (Turkey) Ali Nesbar, unfortunately, will not be available for the memorial service that England and Germany have planned for Lance Anderson. Though the memorial is scheduled for Winter 1903, Ali has no intention of weathering a stormy Norman outdoor funeral, when he ponders the alternative. Ali much prefers the prospect of relaxing with a Romanesque beauty under each arm in the balmy sands of a Neapolitan beach. Ali continues to deny rumors that he will winter with a fat Russian babushka at a Crimean resort. Tur-World Press: I love the press, and no offensive was taken, or intended at any time.
- Tur-Eng: I'll meet you in the Baleric Islands.
- Tur-Fra: Lance, if you pull this one out of the fire (without the assistance of a German or English NMR), I'll fly to Lewisville to shake your hand. Your goose is not yet cooked but it is ready for basting.
- (Italy) Rome: the Italian Government today officially declared its support for the Tsarist regime. In a prepared statement before the Italian Senate the President made the following declaration: "We respect the right of all nations to prosper in peaceful coexistant. With respect to Imperial Russia we support the Tsar's right to govern his own nation and hope that other European powers will do likewise."
- (Italy) Rome: Rutters Press -- The President of the Italian Republic in open session of the Italian Senate today declared with respect to current Italo-French relations: "regarding the lawful Republic of France we have not in the past been the first to violate her sovereignty, neither are we the second nation to do so in the present, nor shall we be the third in the future."
- (Italy) Budapest: Rutters Press -- Rumors abound here in the chaotic capitol of the former Austrian Empire. The latest today concerns the goings on at the Theatre Machiavelli where last night the Italian Charge D' Affairs, Armani "AC/DC" Castrovalva, Count D' Moni, was seen with his latest love interest, the Turkish cinema starlet, Mad Donna, at the premier of her latest Cheese & Crackers film production, "Desperately Seeking Anybody".

MODERN DIPLOMACY #14, by Michael V. McCabe (Tokyo, Japan)

Except where otherwise indicated, the views and opinions expressed herein are solely mine and are not necessarily those of the Department of State or any other U.S. Government agency.

In December 1991, Japanese Diet (Congress) members were unable to agree on a joint statement about the war and Pearl Harbor as the government prepared for the visit of President Bush. In January 1992, Japanese Prime Minister Miyazawa's visit to Korea resulted in many articles in the press dealing with Japan's conscription of Korean (and other) "comfort women" during the war. The following background is from The Economist of London (1/18/92), and the 1/25/92 Nikkei Weekly.

The soldiers of Japan's old imperial army were often brutally treated by their officers. But they were well provided for sexually. From 100,000 to 200,000 women were taken from their homes in Korea (about 80 per cent), China, Burma, and Malaya, and put into military brothels so that Japanese troops could forget the misery of the front line for a moment or two. Records show that individual comfort women were used as many as 80 times a day. Many died from exhaustion, disease, and shame. Some were murdered to stop them giving evidence to the advancing allies.

In the past the Japanese government always claimed that the comfort facilities were operated by private concerns, and that there was no official evidence that the government or the military was involved. But last December, Shoji Motooka, a Socialist member of the upper house of the Diet, found a list on microfilm in the National Diet Library giving names and addresses of a contingent of Korean women who had been forced into prostitution. Earlier this month, Chuo University Professor Yoshiaki Yoshimi unearther further documents in the Defense Agency archives showing the Japanese Army was deeply involved in the recruiting and controlling thousands of Asian women. Two days after Yoshimi's discoveries were reported in the press, Japanese Chief Cabinet Secretary Koichi Kato stated, "According to private and Defense Agency records that have recently been located, involvement of the Japanese army is undeniable."

According to the 1/18/92 Mainichi Daily News, Prime Minister Miyazawa told the South Korean National Assembly on 1/17, "Never should we allow ourselves to forget the fact that, at certain moments in the history of our relations with your country for the past couple of millenia, Japan was the assailant and Korea was the victim. Allow me to take this opportunity to express our sincere remorse and apology for Japanese past actions which inflicted unbearable suffering and sorrow on the people of the Korean Peninsula.

Recently the issue of 'comfort women' in the service of the Japanese Imperial Army has come to light. I cannot help feeling acutely distressed over this and I express my sincerest apology. As one who lived through the last world war I believe that history must be taught correctly to the future generations...by teaching them our faults so that they will never again be repeated. That is the responsibility of our generation. While Japan has been working to disseminate correct understanding about the relationship between our two countries, we intend to continue to work hard to that end. I am determined to nurture in the Japanese people, especially our youth, the courage to face squarely the past facts, understanding for the feelings of the victims, and a sense of admonition that these misdeeds should never be repeated."



February's Question: Views of the Royal Family

John Breakwell (England): See his column, The Green Goblin Speaks

Jack McHugh (Upper Darby, PA): I believe that a Royal family can serve a limited purpose in a democracy by separating the head of state from the head of government. Thus not allowing debate to be inhibited by the fact that one must respect the office if not the man.

Having said that the monarchy must limit its cost to the people of the country. The monarch should also strive to be seen of the people, not above the people. This will also allow the monarch to be seen as more human and less than objects of worship.

The British monarchy would do well to copy their cousins in the smaller Scandinavian and Low Countries governments. Those monarchs are cheaper and closer to the people. They are allowed to be more human as well, so human failings are more easily tolerated.

Bob Theriault (Westbrook, ME): The British Royal Family serves a tremendous purpose. It provides tremendous opportunities for the press to print stories of interest and <u>no</u> redeeming social value. Gives everybody in Great Britain a common topic to fight and argue about. It provides the same type of cathartic response that sports provides for those who follow sports. Just think of all the characters and situations that have been covered over the past several years. The best part of the whole institution is that it doesn't cost the Americans a penny.

John Schultz (Michigan City, IN): It could be argued that the Monarchy never served a definite purpose. But I won't be the one to make the argument. On the list of my priorities whether Charles and Di are screwing around on each other holds about the same importance as whether Miss Piggy might marry Kermit someday. the pretentious belief that the 'Royal House' represents the moral integrity or the soul of that nation Anyone who really believes that is either stupid, or ludicrous. blind, or both - and has ignored the history of the 'Roses'. I have a little sympathy for those who would argue to maintain the Monarchy for the sake of tradition. I don't agree with blindly following tradition, but I do understand it. It's their country, not ours. Let them do with it what they will. Irrelevant issue to me.

Me?: Well, I believe the Monarchy serves a purpose, and much of what John Breakwell says in his column is quite apt. The contributions that the royalty brings to the British society, as well as the (positive) publicity it provides to Great Britain is significant. Unfortunately, the press can't keep their noses out of personal affairs (see next month's question). Yes, I do believe that the monarchy should pay their fair share of taxes.

Regarding Impending Changes with Clinton in Office (January):

Bob Acheson (Edmonton, Alberta): ...have to comment regarding upcoming American foreign policy. It's the one thing that Bush can point to with pride, He went in and stopped Iraq when everyone else was waffling (sure he strongarmed the UN, but justifiably so). He went into Somalia, sure it was good PR, but before they went in hundreds were dying daily. This he's basically stopped.

Now, expect Saddam to pull off something - to test US resolve. I found John Schultz's comments about India/Pakistan and Cambodia interesting and don't' disagree with them. John doesn't mention that the last time Vietnam invaded Cambodia, China got involved and expect to see it happen again.

I think that the problems in the West Bank will continue - but mainly as an irritant to the peace process there. Even the reemergence of the Islamic fundamentalists in Egypt are in a minority at present.

The hot spot has to remain the Balkans and if Serbia is not curtailed quickly - expect to see this one expand. Tacit Serb support from Greece is noted by the Turks - who have expressed moral support for their Muslim brothers in Bosnia.

This one could easily still blow wide open and how will Clinton react if it does. If it does, hopefully he'll remember to call George and ask for advice.
