

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POLL QUESTION



April's Question: Terrorism in the US

Jack McHugh (PA): I have always thought it was just a matter of time until terrorists decided to come here. Up till now I believe fear of getting caught and embarrassing their benefactor--i.e. the USSR--had inhibited most groups. With that threat no longer hanging over them and the moderate Arab oil states cutting off most funding to radical Islamic groups in the wake of the Gulf war of 90-91, I'm surprised this hasn't happened sooner.

Bob Acheson (Alberta): Terrorism, for decades, the rest of the world has seen & borne the brunt of numerous terrorist acts. I believe that for years the U.S. was spared deliberately so, I think because of fear of reprisals. The past couple of U.S. Presidents were perceived internationally as two cowboys who no one really wanted to mess around with (i.e. Libyan bombing). A new regime is elected and we see the shades of Jimmy Carter. I'll be watching the American reaction with interest.

John Schultz (IN): Personally, I don't feel threatened, no. But I don't think it's unusual that someone would feel threatened. It's a reasonable response. The U.S. has been extremely lucky, thus far, to have avoided much terrorism. I think the public is in for a rude awakening and I believe we sorely underestimate the enmity felt toward us which lingers around the world. sorely overestimate our 'humanism' in the eyes of others. By the way, how do you define terrorism? I find it tough. One man's terrorist is another's hero. As an example, I do not consider the man who killed the Marines in Lebanon a terrorist even though I may, as a warrior, hate him. Yet, though I may love my country, by my own definition, I have put innocents at risk to fulfill a political/military goal. I was called a soldier. In reality I was a terrorist. I feel anyone, be they government or individual, who consider innocents a legitimate target (or screen) in hostility should be termed a terrorist. The argument that this is justified as an aspect of warmaking sickens me.

Mark Brush (PA): Since I live in a small, dying town, the burn from the crosshairs is non-existent (that's what the Scots in Lockerbie though too). Radicals are a mixed blessing. Things need to be stirred to get people to open their eyes to the world's problems. However, destruction of <u>useful</u> material does not justify this - let them blow up a statue of "art."

Me: I believe that the US has been very lucky, overall, in that there haven't been many major terrorist incidents within its borders. Our open borders all but invite terrorists to enter the country, and there is almost no difficulty in obtaining explosives or weapons. I do believe the strong reactions in the past (such as Libya) have been all that keeps terrorists from our shores.

Even then it wasn't too late but I misordered a unit one season which caused loss of strategic placement. And as Austria pointed out in his last press, removing both fleets from the Turkish arena was the bumble of bumbles. But a victory is a victory and I can't take anything away from Jim. Congratulations. To the rest of you. Sorry again. I hope I get a chance to redeem my honor at some point with you guys.


If you had written and offered peace and alliance earlier, I would have listened, but I only heard from Germany.



MODERN DIPLOMACY (#I-One), by Michael V. McCabe (Tokyo, Japan)

Except where otherwise indicated, the views and opinions expressed herein are solely mine and are not necessarily those of the Department of State or any other U.S. Government agency.

After 15 episodes of Modern Diplomacy, which probably contained more than you ever wanted to know about Japan, World War II, and some post-war aspects of Japanese diplomacy, it's time for a change. I'll now write a bit about India. Perhaps I should change the subzine's title, because I don't plan to write too much about India's diplomacy. To keep continuity, though, I'll keep the title the same but will begin a new numbering series.

My family and I moved from London to New Delhi, India's capital, in January 1986 and transferred to Tokyo in the summer of 1989. One of the advantages of coming to India from London was that we always had a topic of conversation -- virtually every upper middle class Indian whom we met had been to London as well.

Living in India is "an adventure," rather than "a vacation." When my wife is asked if she enjoyed living in India, she uses words like interesting and fascinating. Neither one of us thinks the verb "enjoy" is exactly accurate.

On the one hand, for people interested in history and color, there's a lot to be said for spending a few years in a country like India. For example, we visited the Taj Mahal several times, several forts including in Rajasthan a sprawling castle-palace called Fateh-pour-Sikri, and Mother Teresa's hospice. After a small group meeting which Mother Teresa addressed, my wife had to choose between meeting her or taking her picture. She chose the latter, so we have several upclose pictures of this lady, surely one of God's angels on earth. We rode on elephants, saw snake charmers, monkey and bear trainers, and ox- and elephant-carts in the middle of the city. We stayed on a houseboat on a lake, and in a hotel featured in one of the James Bond movies.

India has been a major player in the "Nonaligned" movement. The country has a space program, several nuclear power plants, and before I left had leased a nuclear-powered submarine from the former Soviet Union. It has technical universities so good that graduates get into Cal Tech and MIT grad schools, and computer programmers so good that they get jobs around the world.


Prices for some things (e.g., clothes, picture framing, servants, food) are low in India. After we got to Tokyo (the land of very high prices) my wife thought for almost a year before paying the equivalent of about \$40.00 for an outfit made in India. That was 4-5 times more than "it should cost," she thought. While in India with our three children, we had three servants - not just one. Indian food is world-reknowned, and although we didn't care for most of what we tried, most foreigners seemed to like it.

Ah yes, India. The land of some 850 million people, of Gandhi, Far Pavillions, The Jewel in the Crown. The home of religious spectacles, monuments to ancient civilizations, and a culutre which in much of the country continues as it has for millenia. A land of history, color, adventure. There is much to be said for living in India.



The Brazilian Times

Last month's Poll Question, ironically, was of interest not only regarding British monarchy, but also the Brazilian one. Strange? Not a bit. Brazil is a republic since Nov. 15, 1889, when Army C-in-C, Field Marshall Deodoro da Fonseca, deposed Emperor Pedro II from the throne in an (almost) bloodless coup. Curiously enough, Deodoro wasn't interested in setting up a republic, but he was overruled by other members of the clique. The royal family was exiled to France until some thirty years later, when they were allowed to return. Since 1889, it has been illegal to promote the cause of the monarchy.

That is, until the promulgation of the new constitution (Oct. 1988). According to it, there will be a nationwide plebiscite, when the people will decide between parliamentary republic, presidentialist republic and parliamentary monarchy. There has been a strong tendency for parliamentarism for some years now, and the debacle of President Collor strengthened it. Among the parliamentarists, the monarchists are growing.

Except for one brief period (1961-1962), the Brazilian republic was always presidentialist. The imperial tradition, however, was parliamentarist -- although it was created against the imperial constitution, which was slightly autocratic. During the Empire (1822-1889), there were several revolts and civil wars, and one major foreign war (the Triple Alliance War, 1865-1870); however, the Empire weathered all the turmoil, showing a remarkable political stability. The Brazilian republican period is not very different of other Latin America countries: oligarchies, coups, caudillos, and general instability.


Although there isn't here the kind of public interest on the royal family that rampages in the UK, our royals are well liked; also, there are no bad feelings against monarchy. Indeed, for many years after the republic, the majority of the population was still monarchist. However, should monarchy be restored, there is no consensus on who will be the next Emperor. The trouble is, Pedro II's grandson, the heir presumptive, renounced his claim on the Brazilian throne in order to marry a plebeian woman. Now, both his descendants and those of the cadet branch claim to have the right to the throne. So, there is no monarchist party, but rather three separate movements. Undoubtedly, this division will reduce the odds for the monarchists in the coming plebiscite.

Lastly, I would like to thank all who wrote asking for *Hy-Brasil*, my new fanzine (see last issue). Unhappily, I had a crash in my hard disk that let me without my computer for some days (and that's why The Brazilian Times wasn't here last month). So, issue #1 will be delayed some time -- but I hope it will be good enough. Just you wait and see!
