

Although fewer than two percent of India's people are Christians, the country has a long Christian history. When the Dutch landed in SW India in the 1500s, they were astonished to find Christian communities who were descendants of converts made by Thomas.

India. An adventureland, yes, but not a vacation land. If you want a vacation, go to Switzerland or Hawaii. Here are some highlights of our family vacation in Srinigar, Kashmir. Many Embassy families visited Srinigar. I'm not sure whether their standards were lower, they didn't care when things went wrong, or whether less went wrong on their trips, but few seemed to have as bad an experience as we did.

The five of us had planned a four-day vacation with the three nights being spent on a houseboat on Dal Lake. We arranged the flight and the first-class houseboat rental through an Indian-staffed American Express office in New Delhi. The flight up was fine. The houseboat, according to its owner, was the same one in which Mick and Bianca Jagger stayed some years before, and the bedsheets were the very same ones the Jaggers had used, he said. We thought that was pretty neat until we saw that the sheets looked as though they hadn't been washed since the Jaggers had used them.

We took a nice boat ride on Dal Lake; the scenery and vegetation were very pretty. We also visited a mountaintop fort which overlooks the town. Both these were enjoyable, but the city is located in a basin which helps trap the city's badly polluted air, which principally comes from dung and wood burning and especially from vehicle exhaust. On another day, our local rented car and driver came a couple of hours late to begin our visit to a ski and horsebackriding resort. The resort itself, however, was quite satisfactory.

Since the houseboat was dirty and its beds were uncomfortable, we spent our last night in the local five star hotel - quite nice; more expensive. On our departure day, we went to the airport only to find we had no seats on the return flight to Delhi -- our return reservations were for several days later! After several phone calls, several hours of negotiation (but no baksheesh, or bribes, were paid), an extra night in another hotel, and lots of worry and stress, we were able to leave the following day. American Express did give us a letter of apology and an appropriate refund, but the whole thing definitely was not a vacation experience.

We did find, however, that most people when they traveled most places in India had to put up with unexpected problems. Unexpected problems were the norm. That's okay if you're going on an adventure, but not if you're taking a vacation. We also found that we could not rely on the evaluations of others about their experiences in India (or in Japan, for that matter). People would tell us that this servant was so wonderful, this place was so great, and this food was so delicious, and most of the time after we had the same experience we did not agree with them.

May's Question: Our Superpower responsibilities?

Jack McHugh (PA): None, the US has no responsibilities outside very narrow strategic interest. The justification for caring about events worldwide was because, being in competition with another nuclear armed superpower, we had to care. The Soviet/US competition was literally spread all over the planet. No country was outside of you caring. However, the Sovs are gone and they aren't coming back soon. Even if the communist/nationalist get rid of Yeltsin they will find that the old Sov military-industrial complex is gone and the military is in no shape to attack anyone. (In fact I doubt the Russian military could defend Russia against the Chinese or the Germans in its present form.)

The US must not allow itself to be dragged into conflicts all over the world that are not of compelling interest to the US. It is all too easy for the rest of the world to cop out and turn to the US via the UN to solve problems. The historical purpose of war has been to solve political disputes between states—that hasn't changed. To stop all war is to stop all political change between nation states that cannot be agreed upon at the conference table. I don't see how stopping war will stop the root causes of war.

What I fear is an unholy alliance between the bleeding heart goody-goody left and the macho, muscle flexing right to-use military force all over the world for reasons other than defending US interests. The left wants us to give us a reason to leave intact the overkill capacity of the Reagan era. Unfortunately, I fear, with encouragement from lazy, politically gutless, they will succeed and it will continue until we run across another Vietnam and get our nose bloody. The fact that we lost 50,000 American dead in Vietnam before we declared 'victory' and left is what bothers me. What will we tell their parents/siblings/friends this time (and where will the UN be then?)

Will Richardson (AL) Who said we were the only superpower left on the planet? And who thinks superpower status is a good thing? The fact is, the US is not a "superpower". Our economy has been on a slide since the early 70's, and Germany and Japan have had stronger economies than our own for years. Granted, we may still have a strong military, but that is a holdover from the "military industrial complex" days, when our economy could bear the strain of an inflated military. We can't do it anymore, folks. We lost the meaningless title of "superpower" the day the Soviet Union collapsed; the USSR was the American Empire's reason for living. Do we have a responsibility to the world? No. We never did. At the height of the Cold War, the US and USSR never did anything out of a feeling of "responsibility" for the world. It was a game of power plays, not charity. Anybody who believes otherwise is living the "nostalgia of impermeability", I believe is what Sartre called it (and if I am using his phrase correctly). Logically speaking, the premise of US as superpower is moot, so the rest of the question is meaningless.







Brazilian Political Scene

Part 1 of 2

Recently, I have been reading *The Age of Empire 1875-1914*, by Eric J. Hobsbawm. I began to read it partially for a perennial curiosity for history and partially because I have been playing *Pax Britannica* for some weekends. Hobsbawm's book is a finely written history of the period of the game, but what prompted me to write this has no relationship whatsoever with the game.

Rather, it was the fact that I found a peculiar similarity between the political scene in the "first world" countries of that period and present-day Brazilian political scene. In chapter four, Hobsbawm writes about the big change in the western democracies, from a liberal-bourgeois *regime* to a mass-party one. The political parties created after 1848 -- characteristically conservatives and liberals, which dominated politics by carefully controlled ballots and voters -- were then at odds with the new popular parties (socialist, Marxist, etc.), which threatened to overthrow the nice stability of the aristocracy and the middle class.

Of course, the revolution feared by the middle classes did not happen -- with the notable exception of Russia -- and the proletarian parties were incorporated to the political scene, like England's Labor Party, accepting the *status quo*.

Brazilian politics today is very much in the same state. Since the independence (1822), through the Empire and the Republic (since 1889), even in the so-called "democratic" periods Brazil was ruled by an oligarchy. There were changes of oligarchies, but the result was always much the same.

In the days of the Empire, franchise depended on property -- the more rich you were, the more votes you had. Ballots were in the open; the electors voted in a list of names, which was sent to the House of Representatives, which in turn selected the candidates of its choice. The "democracy" of the Empire was so in the hands of the rich merchants and farmers of the South.

The Republic changed the picture, rejecting the property requisite for franchise, but allowing only literate people to vote. This shifted the political center to the North, poorer, but with a greater oligarchic control.

(In the Empire and the First Republic -- 1889 to 1930 -- there was a National Guard in Brazil. The officer ranks to colonel were sold, so the local oligarchs usually were colonels of the Guard. It was also a convenient excuse for the armed men that were the true badge of a colonel's power. Even after the disbandment of the National Guard, the title "colonel" retained a popular meaning akin to "lord".)

In 1934, a new Constitution extended the franchise to women. Until very recently (1988), though, illiterate people could not vote, thus excluding a great part of the population. Even today, official figures estimate that 30% of Brazilian adult people can't read or write. But this is an underestimate: today, as ever, a man is legally literate if he can read and write his own name.

Next month, we'll see some of the means used by this oligarchy to keep the ballots under its control.

CHOOSING UP SIDES IN GUNBOAT

by Joe Brooks

Country selection before a Diplomacy game gets started should not be taken lightly. In a regular Diplomacy game Austria and Germany should only be picked if you have confidence in your own ability to form strong alliances. The lone wolf attitude doesn't bode well when playing either of these countries. If you are the lone wolf player you should pick Turkey as this position is better suited to go it alone more than any other. If you are a one dimensional player who is good at focusing all your attention on one task, completing the task then going on to the task - stay away from picking Russia. The Russian position requires a split personality to be played successfully. Focusing only on Scandinavia or the Black Sea region or an overland excursion to Germany will lead to defeat as all of these fronts must be not only considered but acted upon.

After saying all this it is wrong to think the same holds true for a Gunboat game. The lone wolf attitude prevails at the start for all countries. In no-press Gunboat this continues for the whole game but in Gunboat with Press open negotiations really don't get rolling until someone emerges as a leader in the game. At this time cries for help and plans for stopping the leader start appearing in the press where before this the only press releases were breast-beating speeches and curses toward "those infidel neighbors."

In Gunboat you should consider what your own strengths in tactics Since you have only yourself to rely on, you have to gamble on moving to the unexpected avenues of attack. Because of this you must pick the country that reflects your own personality. like to be the center of attention you should try Austria or Russia these countries' movements will influence how the others If you like to sit back and react to what happens around you then choose France or Germany. These two are good reactionary countries because they both have easily reached neutrals that make it possible for you to sit back and wait to see how the others are acting, then react to these movements. Choosing England is for those who think they're pirates at heart. Stealing, stabbing, and invading foreign ports are in store for the English player if you want to get beyond three or four centers. Choosing Turkey means yo like to sit in the back row and watch the others stumble around while you slowly grope forward. Italy, like a deadly poison, must be played with a lot of care. Go with the flow and don't rock the boat and Italy will last at least a few years.

Choosing what country to play usually is done without much thought by many but if you don't pick a country that plays to your own strengths you may be fighting your own personality as well as your neighbors units.
