MONTY'S NEWS AND COMMENT presents the 1990
ACADEMY AWARD PREDICTIONS

BEST PICTURE: *Batman*. I know it wasn't nominated - but it won the "real" Best Picture award - *most money at the box office*. As for the Oscar, even a nominated *Batman* would have been no match for *Born on the Fourth of July*.

BEST ACTOR: Tough one. Personally, I like Kenneth Branagh in *Henry V*, but I think it'll go to Tom Cruise.

BEST ACTRESS: Jessica Tandy (*Driving Miss Daisy*). Longshot: Pauline Collins (*Shirley Valentine*), who won a Tony (and an Olivier award - London's version of the Tony) for the same role on stage, but that was literally a one-woman show (she even played her husband, from what I've heard).

BEST SUPPORTING ACTOR: Denzel Washington (*Glory*), mainly because (a) he's good, and (b) *Glory* didn't get nominated for anything better. (Plus, the fact that he's black can't hurt...)

BEST SUPPORTING ACTRESS: Julia Roberts, mainly because they have to give something to *Steel Magnolias*.

BEST DIRECTOR: Oliver Stone (*Born on the Fourth of July*).

OTHERS OF NOTE: Best Original Screenplay will go to Woody Allen for *Crimes and Misdemeanors* unless he's a serious contender for Best Director, in which case Spike Lee gets it for *Do the Right Thing*. Best Foreign Language Film usually, but not always, translates as "most talked-about foreign film" (although a special committee, not the entire Academy, decides this one); this year, it's Canada's "Jesus du Montreal". The tough one is Best Original Song - the Academy tends to go for non-rock love songs, but they also go for popular songs, which points to "Under the Sea" from *The Little Mermaid* - another one for the Disney gang. (Disney's other best original songs: "When You Wish Upon a Star" from *Pinocchio*, "Zip-A-Dee-Do-Do-Dah" from *Song of the South*, and "Chim Chim Cheree" from *Mary Poppins*.)

What a surprise - this is the third time that the Manorcon winner turned up at the top of the IDTR table, although this year was a lot closer than in the past, since the weight on tournament size was reduced from the first two years. Obviously, it just wasn't enough; that's one of the reasons why the new "100 points to the winner" system is in effect. (Had the 1990 system been used in 1989, ORIGINS winner Steve Cooley would have finished first, thanks to his high finish at DIPCON.)

The complete 1989 final ratings are not available yet, as I don't have the complete results; however, Larry Peery's report on MIDCON in the latest *Diplomacy World* gave me enough information to determine that no one could pass Paul's 38-point total for his MANORCON win.

As is the custom, Paul's name will be engraved on the IDTR Championship Cup (still nameless) - which, by the way, will be on display at WORLD DIP CON II if I can remember to pack it.



There's a small problem with the new scoring system that needs to be changed. (Don't panic - this is NOT going to be a "change the system every month" thing. This is it for all of 1990.) The general idea - top 10 percent score points, and the winner always gets 100 - remains, but did you notice that, for example, third place in a 40-person tournament is worth 17 more points than in a 39-person tournament? There's too much of a jump using "divide by 10". Also, the "30-person minimum" is a little arbitrary; awarding no points in a 29-person event is also too much of a jump.

The following changes are to be made to the 1990 IDTR Rules and Regulations:

Rule 3(c) should read "had fewer than 21 participants".

Rule 5(b) should read "the total number of games played". (The number of rounds is not necessary.)

Rule 5(c) should read "the top ten percent of the finishers, rounded up, and with any ties specified. Thus, for example, in a tournament with 88 participants, list the top nine finishers."

The important one - replace Rule 6 (a) and (b) with:

(a) The winner of the tournament receives 100 points, minus 10 for each person below 30 in the tournament. For example, the winner of a tournament with 28 persons receives 80 points.

(b) Second and subsequent places score a fraction of what the winner receives. In a tournament with n participants, second place scores $(n-10)/n$ of the winner's points, third place scores $(n-20)/n$, fourth places scores $(n-30)/n$, and so on. Round all fractions down. No one receives fewer than zero points.

For example, in a tournament with 44 persons, first place is worth 100; second is worth $34/44 \times 100 = 77.27$, rounded down to 77; third is worth $24/44 \times 100 = 54.55$, rounded down to 54; fourth is worth $14/44 \times 100 = 31.82$, rounded down to 31; fifth is worth $4/44 \times 100 = 9.09$, rounded down to 9; sixth and below score zero.

Speaking of 1990 ratings, the 1990 AUSTRALIAN DIPLOMACY CHAMPIONSHIP was held January 26-28 (Australia Day weekend) at CANCON in Canberra. Andrew England ran the Diplomacy event, which saw 63 participants each play three rounds, with the Austdip system (Revised Stab Mk II) used to determine the winner.

AUSTDIP SYSTEM: Each person's score for a game is:

$$\left(\frac{Y(2) + Y(3) + Y(4) + \dots + Y(X)}{X - 1} + \text{Victory Points} \right) / 2$$

Each season *beginning with 1902* ($Y(2)$), the person with the most SCs receives 7 "year points" for that year, second-highest receives 6, and so on down to 1 for the fewest SCs. (Average the scores for ties - except that a player automatically receives 1 year point in each year after elimination.) Note that if a game goes past 1917, all seasons after 1916 are ignored except for the final season.

Victory points: 13 for a win, 5 divided among the losing survivors

in a won game (proportional to SCs), and 18 points divided among the players involved in a draw (again, proportional to SCs). In a three-round tournament such as this one, the average game score (sum of three game scores divided by three) determines the final results.

DON MILLER MEMORIAL AWARD - for hobby service during 1989

ROD WALKER AWARD - for literary excellence during 1989; this award goes to a particular piece of writing (e.g. an article), and Ron requests that a copy of the item in question be included with your nomination

JOHN KONING MEMORIAL AWARD - for outstanding play of Diplomacy in any form during 1989

MELINDA ANN HOLLEY AWARD - for outstanding female participation in the hobby during 1989

When making your nomination(s), please include the reason for your nomination. (For the Walker award, a copy of the item being nominated is requested but not mandatory.)

In case more than five nominations are received for any category, a screening committee will reduce the nominations to five per category. NOMINATIONS DUE BY MARCH 15

TALISMAN "INTO THE WOODS", TURN 4 - What's that around the Warrior's neck?

For those of you who don't know what the Centaur's bow does: when the Centaur is in the Outer or Middle regions, he can fire his bow (instead of taking a normal encounter) at any character or stranger on the same level within 3 spaces; this is resolved as a normal combat, except (a) the Centaur cannot lose a life and (b) if the opponent is a character, that character must lose a life if he loses the combat. (Other Centaur advantages: safe in the Forest; add up to two to each movement die roll; Siren has no effect; if he meets another Centaur (as an enemy), and the character can roll the enemy's strength or higher on one die, then the enemy becomes a follower until the character's next combat)

CLARIFICATION: When describing spaces, remember that "left" and "right" are determined from *the center of the board*.

FIRST MOVE

NOTES: The Monk spent 1G to take the Mercenary as a follower (Monk has 1G left); the Wizard takes the Staff of Mastery from the Monk instead of making him lose a life as a result of their combat

CENTAUR (Tavern) - Village

MONK (V3L) spends this move getting out of the maze

WARRIOR (Ch1L) - Ch1L (NOTE - you can't use part of your die roll; you must move the entire distance - see rule 11.1; also, even if you could get to the City; the healer restores lives for 1G each)

WIZARD (V3L) - V1R

ENCOUNTERS: Centaur visits Mystic (no effect); Warrior gets a Talisman in Ch1L; Wizard gets 1G in V1R (now has 2G)

SECOND MOVE

CENTAUR(Village)-V3R (You can only fire your bow *after* you move)

MONK (V3L)-T2L

WARRIOR (Ch1L) - Chapel

WIZARD (V1R)-V3L

ENCOUNTERS: Centaur finds 1G in V3R (has 2G); Monk finds a Shield in T2L (whenever you lose a life in combat, roll a die; a 5 or 6 means the shield saved the life); Warrior pays 1G to restore a life (has 3L, 0G); Wizard is unaffected in the maze

CURRENT STANDINGS

CENTAUR (R Hanson): 3L, S3, C3, 2G

MONK (D Hanson): 3L, S2, C2, 1G, Potion of Strength, Shield, Mercenary Follower

WARRIOR (Pierce): 3L, S4, C3, 0G, Talisman, Water, Pixie Follower

WIZARD (Dorneman): 1L, S2, C5, 2G, 1 Spell

FACE-UP CARDS: Ch1L - Zombies (4xS2); V2R - Ghost (C4); V1L - Cave; V3L - Maze; T2R - Gargoyle (S5) and Enchanter; T1R - Giant (S6)

YOUR TURN 5 DICE ROLLS:

DEADLINE FOR TURN 5 IS MARCH 23. Press:

CENTAUR: How's it feel to be a pincushion, you maimed mage? And as for you, Warrior, next time you go to fight Zombies, make sure you eat your Sugar Crisp first. You know, "the crunch with punch".

Hey, Monk. Lost in the maze, huh? Too bad you didn't buy a road map. Oh well, it's time for this mobile cavalry to canter off.

WIZARD-GM: Any Pools of Life out there?

GM-WIZARD: For EVIL? Only for a price. (In the City...)

WIZARD-MONK: And what's your problem?



KREMLIN "AIN'T MISBEHAVIN", TURN 4A - That Mischif sure was active right up to the last

CURE: Karrienko and Nieweitko go into the Sanatorium. LNTC declares 6* on Talksalott.

AGING: Schukrutoff is 84; Manjak is 84; Niewitko is 75; Mischif is 78; Karrienko is 64. (Remember, aging for "?" takes place even if that character is in the sanatorium.)

PURGE: As Manjak is indisposed, Talksalott (LNTC) attempts to purge Palavrian (needs 10 or better, rolls a 3) but fails - Talksalott ages 3 to 70.

SPY INVESTIGATION: Mischif (CREEP) investigates Shootemdedsky and Schukrutoff, and closes investigations on Manjak, Mischif, and Karrienko; Mischif ages 5 to 83.

HEALTH

Schukrutoff (rolls 14) becomes 84+

Manjak (4) becomes 84++

Niewitko (18) becomes 75

Mischif (4) dies

Talksalott (17) remains at 70

Palavrian (17) remains at 70

Karrienko (19) remains at 63

Shootemdedsky (12) remains at 71

Henceforth, the Party Chief will be referred to as "Tsar", Comrade Schukrutoff will be referred to as "Lech I", the Soviet Union will be referred to as "Imperial Russia", and the other factions (except CREEP) will be referred to as "reactionary outlaws". Lech I predicts the onset of a Golden Age in which the Okhrana roots out and destroys all of the reactionary outlaws. Your cooperation is requested.

GM: I'll stick with "Party Chief", "Schukrutoff", and "Soviet Union", if it's OK with you - and if it isn't, for that matter.

1830 "STARLIGHT EXPRESS", TURN 7 - Two corporations hurt by sudden train recall

CORRECTIONS: First, B&O's stock marker is at B L1 (\$82), since it should have been moved to B 0 after it was bought from the Bank Pool; second, since C&O had 20% in the Bank Pool, \$22 of its dividends goes back into the corporation, so it has \$132.

STOCK ROUND

RICH HANSON buys 20% (President) of CP for \$164 (par \$82)
VINCE PRATT sells 30% NYC for \$270 and 30% C&O for \$225, and buys 20% (President) PRR for \$200 (par \$100); **NYC drops to \$71 (F R1) and C&O remains at \$70 (G R2)**

RICK PIERCE passes *for the entire round*, has \$60

DICK MARTIN sells 10% NYC for \$71, 10% of B&O for \$82, and 10% of PRR for \$100, and buys 20% (President) B&M for \$200 (par \$100); **NYC drops to \$69 (G R1), B&O drops to \$76 (C L1), and PRR drops to \$90 (B 0)**

JIM GOODE passes *for the entire round*, has \$86

RICH HANSON passes *for the remainder of the round* (Rich, a corporation can only buy a private company during the Corporation's turn in an Operations Round); has \$14

VP buys 10% PRR from pool for \$90

DM buys 10% B&M for \$100

VP buys 10% PRR for \$100

DM buys 10% NYC from stock pool and sells it right back; **NYC drops to \$68 (H R1)**

VP buys 10% PRR for \$100

DM buys 10% NYNH from stock pool and sells it right back; **NYNH drops to \$60 (I 0)**

VP buys 10% PRR for \$100 - **60% of PRR has been sold**

VP passes *for the remainder of the round*, has \$19

DM is the only one with orders remaining; in his next three orders, he buys 10% B&M each time for a total of \$300 - **60% of B&M has been sold** (DM has \$0 remaining)

All players pass - Rick Pierce has the priority deal for turn 8

The main purpose of the newsletter is to serve as a source of information to members of the Hobby about our event this June, as well as to facilitate communication between members of the two Committees who are working to put the thing together.

In addition, Jef Bryant (121 Rue Jean Pauly 4300 ANS BELGIUM) will serve as the Francophone contact. Any other gaps we have concerning the various national hobbies should be taken care of once Larry Peery's worldwide Dipinfo service gets going later in January.

Con Details. The Con will be held June 22-24, 1990 at the University of North Carolina in Chapel Hill, North Carolina. There will be four rounds of Diplomacy, of which one must play two to become eligible for awards. During the Saturday morning round, the individual scores will also be tabulated by seven-man team for the team competition. Teams are already beginning to be organized in Canada and California, and I hope other places as well. This will add even more enjoyment to the tournament, not to mention more bodies to the Con. There will also be tournaments for variants, Gunboat, and Railway Rivals. There will also be a Diplomacy Geography Exam to be written by 1989 DipCon champ Edi Birsan that will focus on the Diplomacy map and the real-life places represented. Fees are \$20 entry, \$15 per night housing.

Certificates will be awarded for the subsidiary tournaments and for places 4-7, but plaques will be awarded to the top three places in the tourney. Edi Birsan has donated plaques for the

seven Best Country awards, as well as two other coveted DipCon awards - the "Hammered" trophy and the "Golden Blade" award, for excellence in being stabbed and stabbing, respectively. There will also be certificates awarded to players in games who stick it out in bad positions ("Death With Dignity" awards) similar to those awarded at the 1986 DipCon in Fredricksburg.

Avalon Hill Game Company will also be donating prizes for the various competitions. Although the final package has yet to be decided upon it will likely include games, merchandise certificates and free subscriptions to their gaming magazine The General. Games donated by other parties for use as prizes so far include BATTLE FOR ITALY, VENTURE, and GUNSLINGER, all Avalon Hill titles.

Tournament Schedule. The first Diplomacy round will begin on Friday, June 22 at 5:00 p.m. Also beginning Friday night will be the Gunboat tourney (which will continue on an as-needed basis throughout World DipCon) as well as the Railway Rivals competition. Saturday morning will see the second DipRound, which will also double as the team competition. Consters not into 9:00 am Diplomacy can instead play in a Titan tournament to be held concurrently. After an early dinner the third Dipround will begin at 6:00 p.m., as will the Diplomacy variant tournament, which will feature a 5 or 6-player variant. Finally, Sunday morning at 9:30 will be the fourth Dipround as well as the starting time for the Civilization tournament. Awards would be given out and the tournament brought to a close around 5:00 or 6:00, depending upon the completion time of Round 4 games. This schedule allows alternatives for any participant who wants to eschew Diplomacy (God have mercy on his hapless soul...)

Scoring System. Not a whole lot of comment so far about the CAD scoring system outlined in the last newsletter, but what we have received has been mostly negative. Should we use a simple win/draw system like was used at the 1987 DipCon in Wisconsin? Below is a prototype for such a system - send us comments and suggestions!

Win-10, 2way-5, 3way-3, 4way-2, 5way-1, 6 or 7way-0, plus .1 for each supply center.

InterCon. Don't forget about Jason Bergmann's house Con to be held during the week between World DipCon and the Origins Con in Atlanta. There will be lots of gaming there, or you can just use his house as a home base as you tour the Atlanta area. Also don't forget that he can carry up to three people with him to Chapel Hill from Atlanta (and back) so some Consters may want to fly directly into Atlanta from overseas and carpool with Jason. Get in touch with him at PO Box 23780 Atlanta GA 30322.

Travel. Unless one is coming from overseas, you can probably get a direct flight into Raleigh-Durham from any major city. Alternatively, you can fly into Charlotte and carpool with Morgan Gurley and his ilk (address on other side). Internationals should contact me or Simon Billenness about your travel plans. There will also be carpool possibilities for many hobbyists. Mike Gonsalves (1401 Haven Rd #T-6 Hagerstown MD 21740) will be driving his van and can pick up people through MD/DC/VA. I will announce other rides as I hear about them.

Internationals. Get in touch with the DipCon representative for your area to coordinate travel plans, registration fees, etc. We look to have a truly international Con given the tremendous interest already shown abroad. Pete Sullivan promises two teams from Britain alone, and has begun publishing his own newsletter Globetrotter to help promote World DipCon in the UK.

Housing. For those who don't want to stay in our air-conditioned dorm rooms, I will print a list of nearby hotels in DN#4.

Publications. There will be a Con booklet ready before the Con, including directions, schedules, etc. and there may also be a souvenir booklet afterwards. If I get written bid proposals for DipCon 1991 I will include them in the Con booklet. There will definitely be a zine table where pubbers can hawk copies of their zines to Consters - several pubbers have already said they will send samples, and the Australians will be bringing a bunch of their zines with them.

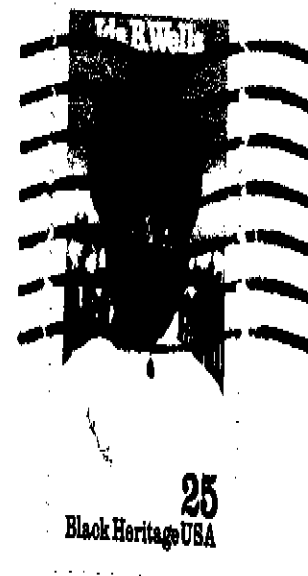
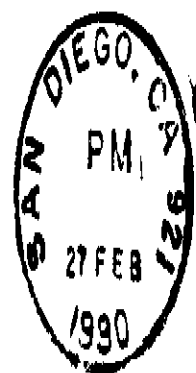
