(By the way . . . the 1992 election will not have the same electoral vote distribution as in 1988, thanks to the 1990 census. The current guesses include California gaining six and New York

losing three.)

- 1. In each issue of A Sharp Mind and a Straight Knife (ASM&ASK) from 99 to 108, ten questions will appear as part of this contest. Answers must be postmarked no later than four weeks after the date on the front cover of that issue unless a different date is given along with the questions.
- 2. There is no need to answer all of the questions in any issue, nor is it a requirement to send in answers for all ten sets of questions. Each entrant may answer as many questions as desired.
- 3. If a person sends in more than one set of answers to a set of questions, the ones that appear to have been written last will be used. If it is not clear which are last, only answers that are correct on all of that person's sets of answers will be considered correct. Any answers submitted by a person for a set of questions will be ignored if that person sends in a legal subsequent set of answers. Statements along the lines of "other answers the same as last time" will be ignored.
- 4. The results of this contest will be based on the total number of correct answers given by each person. The person with the most correct answers is the winner; the person with the second-most correct answers finishes in second place, and so on. Ties will be broken by random draw.
- 5. As the publisher of this 'zine and poser of the questions, I am the final judge as to whether or not a given answer is correct and as to whether or not a set of answers is acceptable.

- 6. All prizes are awarded as sub credits to any 'zine(s) other than ASM&ASK, subject to the approval of the publisher(s) of the desired 'zines. The top five places will receive \$10, \$5, \$4, \$3, and \$2, respectively; the next five places will receive \$1 credit. - 10. In the 1912 Olympics, the first modern pentathlon shooting, swimming, fencing, horse riding, and running was held. Back then, in each separate event, the winner received one point, second place received two, and so on, with the person with the lowest total for the five events winning the gold medal. In this competition, Lieutenant George Patton (yes, that Patton) finished fifth, mainly because he finished 21st out of 32 in shooting. Assuming he loses any ties, what place would he have had to finish in shooting to win the gold medal?

WARRIOR (T2R) - V1R

WIZARD (VIL) - VILLAGE

Centaur fires bow at Wizard (combat result 5-3) - WIZARD LOSES ONE LIFE (now has 2L).

Wizard visits mystic - WIZARD GAINS A SPELL.

Encounter in V1R: MERCENARY - if the Warrior or the Monk want to pay 1G to get the Mercenary as a follower, they may. Note that if both want the Mercenary, it goes to the Warrior (by random draw), but the Monk does not pay 1G.

SECOND MOVE

CENTAUR (Village) - Tavern

MONK (VIR) - V3L

WARRIOR (V1R) - C1L

WIZARD (Village) - V3L

Centaur fires bow at Wizard (8-4) - WIZARD LOSES 1 LIFE (now has 1L)

Monk attacks Wizard - Wizard casts PSIONIC BLAST and adds craft to strength (5-11) - MONK LOSES 1 LIFE (has 3L)

Encounter in V3L: MAZE (place remains in game; lose 1 move if craft is less than 5) - MONK LOSES ONE MOVE; no effect on Wizard

Encounter in C1L: BAND OF 4 ZOMBIES (S2 each) (7-6, 10-3, 5-8 (yes, the warrior rolled two 1s there)) - WARRIOR LOSES 1 LIFE (has 2L) and there are (once again) 4 zombies in C1L.



FUNERAL COMMISSION: LNTC declares 1° on Niewitko (D), 5° on Schukrutoff (B). CREEP declares 1° on Palavrian (G), 1° on Karrienko (N), 2 on Shootemdedsky (H). RNM declares 2 (total of 3°) on Shootemdedsky.

Niewitko, controlled by LNTC, nominates Manjak (P). The following declarations take place: on Palavrian, OLM 6°, CREEP 5, LNTC 4; on Shootemdedsky, RNM 10°, OLM 9, CREEP 4, EFC 4; on Karrienko (N), CREEP 6°, EFC 5. All five voting Polotburo members vote NO - Manjak's nomination is rejected and Niewitko ages 1 (to 74+?).
