Since I generally read about six-ten per week, they pile up fast. So if any of you are expecting aletter from me concerning something, never expect to come about the same time as TS. It's going to take me a day just to clean out this place, then another day going through the files and making sure that I've got all my moves in that I'm supposed to have it. Then another day to recover when I find out that I missed my moves in the three or four games which I'm on top, correction was on top.

The Room

Hanging a left turn we come to second file cabinet. On top of it is one of those desk organizer. You know the kind, on the box they show the picture of this nice neat desk with everything in its place. From there we (you might notice that I didn't bother to say anything else about the organizer, I'll let you figure out why) hit two combination book shelves and drawers. Pasted on the side nearest the desk is a picture of Michael Pollard, another one of my favorite stars. If you have to ask who is Michael J Pollard, forget it. On one book shelve we have my hard bound military history books, another paper backs of the same type. Theother two contain hard bound political sceince books plus some misc types. The Professional Moderator Rick Loomis

Recently I read a Diplomacy magazine which had a short article on moderators. He was discussing "professionalism" in moderating, and he was against it. It struck me at the time that someone ought to define "professional" and "amateur" moderating before a discussion is started about which is best.

An Amateiur is someone who moderates multizplayer pbm games as a hobby. But he makes his living doing something other than wargaming (like working, or going to school). No matter how good he is, or how much time he spends on his moderating he has to eat, and therefore for his other job comes first. He will most likely give more personal service than the professional and almost certainly will charge less. He may get his games out on time nearly all the time, but sometimes he will have to work overtime at his job, or take his final exams at school. You don't have the right to demand that he always be on time, as he has other obligations too. If he is a good moderator, he will have more requests for games than he can handle, and he is doing you a favor by running your game for you. Treat him well.

The professional moderator is someone who makes his living (hopefully) running wargames. He can't spend a lot of time writing friendly letters to all his players, but his games should be prompt. His games will cost more (after all, he has to eat) but he can start a game whenever there are enough players to fill it, and he must put the game above everything else. In order to make enough money to get by, he will have to have many hundreds of players. Thus you can play as many games as you like, and always meet new people and new strategies. His business is SERVICE. so if you don't like something he is doing, tell him.

So, as a player, you can look for a professional moderator who will run as many games as you want, whenever you want, as fast as you want, and charge you for it. Or you can look for an amateur who will make you wait for an opening and may be slow sometimes, but he wouldn't charge you much, and will recognize

your voince over the phone.

As far as I know, I am the only professional moderator of pbm games (by this definition). I run wargames full time, every day. I am expending my full energies providing service for wargames. But if you want it, you gotta pay for it. Fair enough?
