A new zine, with many game openings. #1 was hand-written which, even with Terry's neat script, is a bit hard to read. Hopefully, he'll be getting a typewriter soon. I've no idea what the name means.

SAINT GEORGE AND THE DRAGON by Robert Sergeant, 3242 Lupine Dr., Indianapolis, IN 46224. Subs \$5.50/10. Regular Dip and World War IIIb. Digest. Cartoons, movie reviews. No game openings.

WHITESTONIA by John Caruso, 160-02 43 Ave., Flushing, NY 11358 Subs? There's a game or two lurking in amongst all the letters and articles. W is put out for fun, and that's what it is. I'd like to mention W without including a note about KATHY'S KORNER, but KK ran to 12 pages last month, compared to W's 20. KK is much of the same, though more echinate. John Michalski's MOS EISLEY SPACEPORT also wandered into the package last issue. What more could one want?

The first issue of Steve Hutton's new zine arrived. He's calling it NO FIXED ADDRESS. Once he stops his wandering and settles down we can call it F.A. Anyhow, #1 is twelve pages long, complete with quiz (a snap, Steve), a review of a Mamas and Papas concert, jokes, notes, and a list of addresses. Subs are \$5.00 for 10. Try 103 Duhbar Rd. Rules

IV: DIPLOMACY (Part Three)

"Public announcements may be made and documents may be written and made public or not, as the players see fit. The rules do not bind a player to anything he says; deciding whom to trust as situations arise is part of the game."

I like the idea of writing up formal treaties, but it rarely happens. In FTF play there simply isn't time to draw up formal documents and postal players don't seem too interested. Of course, a fancy scroll with elaborate script doesn't make an agreement any more binding than a mumbled "Okay," but, it can be fun.

Of course, in postal play, the press releases provide a great forum for public announcements. The press release can be a way of comfirming private deals, of confounding the enemy, or simply an outlet for one's creative impulses. It doesn't replace private negotiations though. After all, everyone else will see what you've written.

One type of document I don't like is the pre-game deal. It happened once in a FTF game I was in. I was playing Austria and kept trying to get either France or Italy to attack each other. Though there were times when it would have benefitted one or the other, there was no budging either from a strict neutral regard for each other. No army ever went to Piedmont. At game's end one of them produced a document which the two had signed a few days before the game, saying that if one attacked the other he agreed to donate \$50.00 to a charity.

I realize that many would say that's quite kosher. But it strikes me as being in violation of the idea of the game: which is deals between countries, not players. I'm not sure it's illegal and don't know how I'd rule if I were called upon to make a ruling in such a case. The point is the players made the deal before they knew which countries they would draw, and that makes me uneasy. If, once the game has begun, Russia, say, were to offer Italy \$50. to attack Austria, that would be a different story because in this case all players would have an equal opportunity to match the bid. I'm sure there would be no concensus on how to deal with pre-game deals.

I had a suggestion that I list the "net worth" of each country along with the report. If I had this tied into a computer it might be feasible, but, the more arithmetic I have to do, the greater the chance of error. Players with calculators (or patience) can work out their standings by multiplying the currency by the CMP and adding US\$ in their accounts.

Mark Keller: "In my opinion, when a GM begins handling his games improperly (5 month hiatus, fake fold, etc.) the players should be able to get their games rehoused if they want to. Without having to go thru further waiting and mass resignations which will surely damage the games. I hope that this is the way it will be someday. I'll have an article on the subject in an upcoming VOICE OF DOOM."

Well. Dave. I have played with the idea of establishing some sort of fund to protect part of what players submit as game fees to be financed by a "tax" that GMs pay on games they But the idea appears to be too unwieldy. If anyone wants to develop the idea, go ahead. And, Mark, players do have the right to move their games to another GM if they're not happy with the way things are going. This happened to me as a player in one of JIHAD's games. I tried to convince other players that we should move the game we were in to Ed Bapple. Not one of them responded to my suggestion. So we waited for about five months until the game was moved to Ed by the Mensa SIG committee. The end result was the same, but players could have been playing during that five months if they had been willing to take the initiative rather than waiting for Big Brother, in the form of hobby custodians, to bail them out. That's probably the way it will always be. Most people are in this hobby to play a few games and have fun and don't want any part of hobby politics and feuding.

Interestingly, a letter arrived on that subject, from Scott Marley, whom I had met at DipCon: "I plan to maybe enter another game later this year, but I'll never again be as active as I once was. Too much hassle, and too many people like Sacks, Michalski, Linsey, and Masters and on and on, people who are intolerant of other people who don't want to do things their way. Sacks is by himself enough reason for me not to get involved in such things. That kind of aggravation I just don't need. Never again."

On the bright side, I had written Ben Schilling to thank him for uncovering the 1978 O stats and he answered: "I was only returning a favor to the hobby. When 76 IC (my one and only win) ended, the GM had more or less disappeared, taking the results of the game with him. I was able to get the results that I didn't have from Mark Berch so that the game could appear in EVERYTHING."

It cuts in all directions, eh? Mark Berch does someone a favour a few years ago and that's repaid a way down the line. Someone else drops out of the hobby because of the feuding. Without people like Lischett, Smyth, Daly, Berch, Walker, Ditter Linsey, Davis, the hobby simply would disintegrate into little factions with games disappearing everytime a pubber caught a cold. As much as some disagree with what they may, or may not, do, they're only people doing the best they can in difficult circumstances. As for Sacks, my advice is to ignore him. I also have a simple rule for any arguments I get into in the hobby that settles everything to my satisfaction and that is: I am always right. If someone wants to believe otherwise, that's his problem.

What a great excuse to talk about Christopher, who is now five months old and still growing, heading for over six foot, I'm sure. His favourite toy these days is a punching clown which is almost as big as he is. That doesn't stop him from trying to eat it though. In fact he'll try to eat anything except cereal which, as f ar as he's concerned, is only good for smearing around. Next to the clown his favourite food seems to be my fingers which he gnaws on while growling like a puppy. He's a bit of civilizing to go through yet!

I've been saving Scott Hanson's letter until the end, as I find it so interesting and well-written, I think it should have the status of a separate article. He was responding to my "farewell to teaching and Québec" a few issues back.

"Your article...really struck a chord with me. Reminded me a lot of my hometown, Madison, MN, pop. 7,700, stuck out in the middle of nowhere in west-central Minnesota. Small towns are great to grow up in, but it's very easy to become trapped there, not looking at all past the fields at the edge of town. The area is totally dependent on agriculture, which means the whole town varies in cycles between just barely coming out ahead to barely surviving, like the farmers.

"A lot of good memories, and many bitter ones, too. The parties are great. Your description of your wedding reception seemed like many a wedding dance I've been to, except the uptight relatives. Like is simple—a good blizzard can shut the town tight for a day, allowing you to catch up on your reading, crocheting, or just thinking. But there's loneliness—empty days and nights, alcoholism, drugs, battered women and children, poverty—and many people see no way out.

"I've seen my classmates become pregnant and marry, the relationship doomed from the outset, become alcoholics, go to prison. I saw two friends killed within two months, a devastating blow to a senior class of just 80 students. I'll always be bitter at the town for that I suppose. Two kids died and no one seemed to care, as long as no beer cans and tire tracks got in their yard.

"I try to visit Madison as little as possible. I see my family when they come to Minneapolis (200 miles) or at their lake cabin. Funny, out of my best friends in school, I ended up staying closest to home. One got married four months before graduation, his wife having a miscarriage on the wedding night. They're in Seattle; he's in the army. My other friend was always in trouble despite a Mensa IQ. He stuck around town for a while, but now is in Arizona, going to computer school. And I'm here, close to my family, but keeping the town at arm's length."

That bitter-sweet sadness of small town life reflects pretty much how I felt about Maniwaki for the seven years I was there. There's a song by Neil Young called "Helpless" about a small town in northern Ontario, reflecting the same feelings. I guess small towns are the same everywhere, as are people.

Scott adds a postscript: "Canada is spelled C,eh?, N,eh?, D,eh?"

Yeah. In fact I'm beginning the believe Christopher is a child genius, as he can already spell half of it, eh?

24 SNAFU!

There are no real rules or patterns in Diplomacy, despite what the hobby statisticians would have us believe. We have some interesting games in SNAFU! In 1980 HM, for example, we have a strong Austrian sea power—and the experts would have us believe that no such critter exists! (By contrast, 1979 AE has an equally strong Austria with only one fleet.) In 1981 W, there have been annihilations in almost every season for the past (real) year. Contrast that with 1980 IC where there are also two alliance structures facing each other and yet there has been almost no movement for a (real) year. In 1976 CX, we've a Russia with control of the eastern half of the Mediterranean, yet most of the other Russias. have few or no fleets. The game depends more on stubbornness, cunning, and just plain luck than on pre-determined patterns. There is no magic opening that will predestine your end. I think it was Mike Mills who said that Diplomacy is simply a matter of selecting a target and praying that you survive.

Last June, Doug Milistone sent along a newspaper cutting on the origins of the word SNAFU. (I'm sure you all realize that the term was coined by British forces during WWII.) The article included many spinoff words, like TARFU (Total And Reliable Foul-Up) and FUBAR (Fouled Up Beyond All Recognition). Worse than a SNAFU is a SNEFU (Situation Normal—Everything Fouled Up). Thanks, Doug, I enjoyed the article.

The name SNAFU! came to me two years ago as I was casting about for a name for the 1980 IC game report (which is how all this began). Ann made horrible faces when I'd come out with names like "The True North," "Whiteout," or "Ron's Rag." Being September I was back at work as usual. And, as usual, the first few days of school were disasterous. For example, the textbook order forms I had filled out in June were still sitting on the Vice Principal's desk, despite the fact that I needed the books to begin the year. Student schedules were not ready, so kids were wandering around not knowing where they were supposed to be. Computer technicians in Québec were on strike so our pay cheques couldn't be calculated. It's just going to continue being SNAFU: (or TARFU or SNEFU). If you try to make sense of it all, you'll just wind up confused.
