Larry Peery recently ran a poll which I've found to be really useful in terms of the analysis and feedback. I am delighted with Snafu''s placement and show of support from the few of you who knew about this poll and voted. Of the 37 zines listed, Snafu' placed tied for 7th place. The poll results were broken up into categories which told me what some of you think. In the following catergories, Snafu' placed in the top 10: Scheduling (tied 2nd), Communication (2nd), Editing (tied 3rd), Gamesmastering (tied 8th), Reproduction (tied 9th), Houserules (2nd), and Entertainment Value (tied 10th), I placed middling in Useful Material (16th) and Source of Stimulation (14th). In two areas I was second from the lastr one was Price, the other Variety of Games.

So, you seem to be pleased with the areas that are important to me. I would like a

better score as a Gamesmaster, as that's what this is all about, but, it's up to me to get rid of the typos and oversights which, unfortunately, seem to occur too often. I have no complaints about anything else, except I'm baffled by the very low rating for Variety of Games. Virtually all the zines ahead of Snafu! run only Diplomacy and offer nothing else. If there are variants you guys would like to play, try me, as I enjoy them. But I have a feeling that isn't what the voters had in mind, though what they were thinking of is beyond me.

Anyhow, thanks for the support and feedback. Appreciate it.

Now, don't forget the Runestone Poll coming up soon. I'm going to try to put together a ballot and complete rules for you this issue or next. (The deadline isn't until July, so we've lots of time.)

Hobby News

The Canadian Diplomacy Organization has a new Co-ordinator. Only one qualified person submitted his name for consideration (see the Letter section for some submissions from unqualified individuals), and that is: Anwyl of Weismark. Yes, that is a pseudonym, but, I know Anwyl's "real" identity and have met and spoken with him. He is a friend of Dave Carter's, new to the postal hobby though he has been an active gamer for some time, and is publishing Weismark Dip-Press. I have every confidence in Anwyl.

Anyhow, the date of transfer of the Co-ordinatorship has not been settled upon as I write. I assume it will be a date agreeable to Anwyl and myself some time this summer. I've already filled him in pretty much on what's been going on—which isn't much, really. After the stormy Summer of '82 things settled down into a quiet end of tenure for me.

Here's a review of what I've done. The most noticeable was the fold of Passchendale. François was given a couple of deadlines to meet after his players began complaining of extremely long delays (like six months between issues). He responded in a very disagreeable manner, but, eventually, gave up and dropped out. Andy Lischett did a great job of rehousing the games with a minimum of delay once the issue was settled.

I also was forced to "fire" our Novice Package Director, Nick Russon, as his mail was being returned by the post office as "undeliverable." God knows how many potential newcomers we lost. I asked Bruce Linsey to take this post over and have been very pleased with the quick and efficient way he has been responding to requests for information from novices.

The Waddington's connection was very poor, as their contact with the hobby was Nick Russon. They were rather hostile, or indifferent, to my first approaches to them. Finally, a personal visit to their offices straightened things out. They began forwarding questions regarding rules to me and giving my name and address to persons inquiring about postal Diplomacy. I secured their permission to rewrite the flyer to be included in game sets and sent that off to them. I am uncertain if they did, in fact, print up the new flyer as promised.

I had hoped to see a revitalization of the francophone element in the hobby. The new Waddington's flyer is fully bilingual, but I have had no responses to that. Claude Gautron has begun a French-language zine to carry on one of John Leeder's games and Pierre Touchette is considering a zine. But, I understand that both of them are having problems mustering enough forces to begin a game.

There is the continuing problem of what to do about the Infidel account. I never wanted this money to begin with, but it was thrust upon me. I've managed to get rid of some of it to a few people who had outstanding accounts with Russon and Tonge, and to Bruce Linsey to help pay for Supernova and Fred Davis for the Miller Memorial Trophy. Most of it will go to Anwyl. Let him figure it out.

Can't think of much else at the moment. Oh, I toyed with the idea of rewriting the CDO constitution, or of merging the CDO with the NADF. The only one who had anything to say, really, was Rod Walker, who, as President of the NADF, didn't think a merger would benefit the hobby. I gave up on the National as a waste of time and money. (The National is supposed to be the official publication of the CDO.) I did make some contacts with the European hobby, but not because the CDO constitution said I was supposed to, but because I was interested in an international game. Frankly, I think that if we're going to take that constitution seriously, it will have to be rewritten and adopted properly. (The present one was adopted by a vote of 2 for, 0 against, and 200 or so absentions.)







RULE VI: The Board and Set (Part One)

Sections one and two of this rule simply describe the playing board and pieces. The set produced by Waddington's House of Games, who own production and distribution rights in Canada, is a one-piece board, with elevations marked on it, and wooden playing pieces. They have assured me, by telephone, that they intend to stick with this "quality" (their word) product. Waddington's cannot ship these sets to U.S. addresses, but there are no laws about private individuals doing this. The complete set costs about \$25.00 CDN these days, and the postage comes to about \$6.00. The exchange rate is about 20%. I mention this as I have already sent several sets to the USA.

Why should this be? Americans are stuck with boards cut into pieces, but, worse, they are stuck with plastic playing pieces. I have seen the British and German sets as well. The British set is atrocious, with garrish purples clashing with yellows and pinks. It is hard to believe that there is a lively and large postal Diplomacy hobby in Britain when, to look at their sets, you'd think it was a demented version of Snakes and Ladders. The German set, though, is beautiful. It is very similar to the Canadian set (in fact, Waddington's imports their playing pieces from Germany), but the colours are more subdued.

Actually, for postal play one doesn't need a playing set. All you need are a few conference maps and map pins. Waddington's sends out packs of 25 for \$1.00 but, all you really need is a friend with a set and a photocopy machine.

Heaven Can Wait

Ron's editorial on the Christmas story in SNAFU! 26/27 prompted more subscriber reaction (both positive and negative) than any previous article appearing in the 'zine (see "Letters", SNAFU! 28). Some subbers rejected the thesis of Ron's article as un-Christian. In unpublished comments, one reader said that he would no longer contribute to SNAFU!. Later, the same person sent in picayune moves for his game, commenting that he intended to make the adjudication difficult for Ron. Although this column's train of thought was prompted by these letters and actions, I would like to stress that in no way are my comments directed particularly towards any one person.

The reactions I have mentioned seemed, to me, to be all too typical of many of today's self-confessed "Christians". In the rush for heaven, earth and simple humanity appear to get left behind.

It reminded me of the first fundamentalist I ever met. She was a member of the Pentecostal Assemblies, and very devout. We often discussed her beliefs. I wasn't much impressed. Among other things, she introduced me to the concept of "the Rapture" and gave me a "good Christian" novel to read. (That very dull book would have had me believe that the heroine's pre-marital misdemeanors with her boyfriend caused her father's death and the loss of her family's money and home. All was righted, of course, when the boy was "accepted Jesus", located the heroine, and married her.)

On the other hand, I <u>was</u> impressed by the church my fundamentalist friend attended. The congregation there really cared for its members. They ran a nursery for infants, and a Bible class for children, during the services which the adults attended. There was simultaneous sign-language interpretation for the deaf, and a wheelchair section for the disabled. I left thinking that such care for earthly needs also did much for the spirit.

But a later incident reversed my opinion of the kind of "Christianity" my friend professed.

I accepted a lift with her, from Halifax to Montreal, during the Christmas vacation. The second day of the trip, driving down the Trans-Canada in a blinding snowstorm, only one lane of the highway clear, she attempted to pass a sensibly slow-moving car. We spun off into the centre median at about 100 km/hr (65 mph), after barely missing the other car and a signpost. If we'd hit anything harder than a snowbank, I wouldn't be here today.

As we slid off the road, my "Christian" friend was praying loudly for deliverance. If God had a hand in our safety, I suspect He had His own reasons. I certainly wouldn't have expected Divine help after deliberately endangering my own life.

It's that kind of dichotomy between spiritual belief and earthly action which puzzles me. Human life can't be very sacred if it can be endangered simply to gain 20 or 30 minutes during an eight-hour drive. By extension, human intelligence can't be very sacred if scientific thought is totally discarded in favour of creation mythology, or if Jesus' human history is totally ignored in favour of the "incontestable" revelation of the Bible.

I'll skip the prayers in favour of sensible driving, thank you. And if exercising intelligence, common courtesy and concern for my own, as well as others', well-being isn't sufficiently Christian -- well, heaven can wait.

Back to Diplomacy! I've had a couple of questions from new players lately I thought that I should share with everyone, in case others had the same kind of questions. These are from various sources: "May I be excused from the requirement to formally sign my name to my orders? I prefer signing just my first name....Do you accept 'MS' for 'Mutual Support'?...You are my first Canadian GM and I always do my orders based on the model that Cepheids offered via Randolph Smyth....Must I put both the game name AND Boardman Number on my orders? I prefer to use just the BN."

My purpose as a GM is not to find ways of invalidating orders and making life miserable for players. I have a set form for orders given in my House Rules, but that's more of a guide to make things easier for me. For example, I am a player in 1982 Q and GM for 1983 Q; I was playing in 1980 AC while GMing 1980 IC, so if you use both the house name and Boardman Number it makes it less likely that I'll stick something in the wrong folder. But, I'm not going to throw out orders on that basis. Same for signing your orders. I prefer that you always use the same format so that it is easier to catch any "funny" orders. As for "MS," I included that with the list of revisions I sent out recently. If I know what an abbreviation means, it's okay with me. Problems arise only when people use abbreviations like "Nor"—which genuinely confuse me.

In response to Kathy Byrne's comments on Hush Puppies and the South last issue, Gary Coughlan (Memphis, Tennessee) writes: "You're just like Steve Langley, thinking Hush Puppies are a shoe. They are, as Kathy Byrne says, a real Southern delicacy, the food of the gods! I've given boxes of the stuff to Kathy at Wichita when we were at Bob Olsen's house. But Ms Byrne cuts the enjoyment of Hush Puppies in half when she refuses to eat them with catfish, yum, yum! Do you like catfish, Ron? (I'm talking about river catfish, not ocean catfish.)
